RESPONSIBLE AND COMOPERATIVE PARTY CHIEFS ANNOUNCE PLATFORMS, SLATES

Harvey M. Jacobson and Peter H. William have declared their candidacy for president of the Freshman Class as leaders of their respective Responsible and Co-operative Parties.

Both candidates, running on the controversial "college party" system, said in seperate statements they would attempt to present before the Freshman student body, a constructive and dignified two week campaign which they hope will benefit Portland Junior College regardless of the election outcome.

Jacobson has named William Angel as his running mate for vice president; Loel Craven, secretary and treasurer; Dick Turcotte and Robert Lund, student council representatives.

Williams' Co-operative Party ticket includes Peter Maroon, candidate for vice president; Phil Merrow, secretary and treasurer; Clafford Andreason and Ralph Lymbuner, student council representatives.

Williams said his party organization was based upon "equal representation for each individual, since the ticket includes graduates of Deering and South Portland High Schhols; and representation from Cumberland Center, Waterville, and outlying districts.

He felt such representation would reflect the "individual aspects" of his theket upon the campaign. xtwaxxxxxx He emphasised his party's slogan of "We are working for you," was dependent upon this "wide-spread interests" factor "The Co-operative Party candidates would he in a better position to poll student interests," he added.

Williams pointed out that the party's tentative platform includes projects representing suchna variety of interests. The three main objectives of the platform are; more group social events; a date bureau to assure dates for students unfamiliar with Portland; (Page 2)

and at least one class project

to benefit the college.
He said he would like to see a unified class project, but no was not going to "scream the issue" unless necessary, Powever he did mention new chairs for at least one class room or a new toaster for the cafeteria.

REPRESENTATION NOT IMPORTANT

Jacobson, in a seperate statemen ent, said his Responsible Party folt individual representation impractical and not in accordance with student needs. Pe added that his party considers group representation and group interests more important,

de said the Responsible Party would attempt to present to the student body constructive projects from student interests in the college. Te went on to say the part, could not heed individual whims when the need for projects and activibies that would arrouse group participation

and interest was so great.

Jacobson stated his party's platform was focused upon organization and execution of orojects and a tivities that would benefit both PJC and its. students. The Responsible Party's tentative platform includes: the establishment of a council of clubs meting periodically to or anize more social functions; the ostablish-ment of an alumni fund to finance future projects without soliciting the student body or student council; and thirdly a

Jacobson, more specific about the alumni fund, cited the Clubs fund-raising now in pro ross. General campus improvements such as repaying the parking lot might be possible through solicitation of the successful clumni, he said.

Jacobson concluded that his part, was or enized with the intention of putting "responsible mon in responsible offices."
