NEWSANCE EDITOR ANNOUNCES APPOINTMENT OF FROSH STAFF

Editor-in-chief, Kilton L. Saunders of Portland Junior's weekly newspaper "The Newsance" announced that papers newly appointed all-Freshman staff today.

Richard H. Fay was appointed Managing Editor, and James R. Transue, Assistant Managing Editor. Fay is presently employed by the Press Herald in Editorial. Transue although having no previous newspaper experience, has shown "a nose for news," Saunders said.

Appointed as Chief Typist was Lewis J. Gervais. Gervais is in charge of stencil proofreading and is presently Feature Editor of the PJC News.

Richard H. Cummings was appointed Publisher and will print the paper Tuesday afternoons.

Arthur C. Guy was appointed Circulation Manager. Guy is in charge of distributing the paper at the weekly Wednesday morning assemblies.

Harvey M. Jacobson, Freshman Class President, was appointed advertising manager.

The first meeting of the Portland Junior College Student Council was held Wednesday, Oct. 31, with Kenneth Taylor, Senior Class President, presiding.

Elections of Council Officers was the principal work on the agenda. David Ritchie was elected Vice President; Harvey Jacobson, recording secretary; Peter Baade, corresponding secretary; Peter Maroon, treasurer. Harold Lawrence, Council advisor, tabulated the votes.

The elected Council voted unanimously to advance an allotment of \$60 for the Outing Club's hunting trip expenses this week. The allotment is to be deducted from the club's budget.

The Council discussed in length Hollis Allen's employment program. The Council voted \$10 be allotted to the employment committee for stationary and for personal services in a drawing fund for this semester.

Smokers and suppers were discussed for the Classes. Lawrence suggested "smaller type" activities be considered representing all Classes and not separate groups. He cited the Pinochle Club and Open-Houses of past years.

He added the Council has gone to considerable expense for extensive activities not representative of the Student Body as a whole.

President Taylor appointed a committee of John Benoit and David Ritchie to canvas student opinion on social activities.
