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INTRODUCTION

The **Index to the Albany Times Union** is an index to the one-star final edition of the **Times Union** of Albany, New York. The **Index** provides access to news and editorial opinion about Albany, the Capital District, and the State of New York. Items of national and international importance are indexed only when there is local, regional, or state impact. Daily sports events are not included. Births, engagements, divorces, anniversaries, and announcements of events or attractions are not indexed. There is a special section for obituaries. Items with an accompanying photograph, illustration, graph, or chart are designated with an asterisk (*).

Index terms were taken from **Sears List of Subject Headings**, 11th edition. When an accurate term cannot be located in **Sears**, other sources such as the **Library of Congress Subject Headings** and the **Readers' Guide to Periodical Literature** were consulted. The names of institutions, places, people, and events were used to supplement the index terms. Reviews can be found under the following headings: BOOK REVIEWS, CONCERTS AND RECITALS, DANCE, THEATER REVIEWS.

For each entry there is a brief annotation taken from either the headline or the article. This is followed by the date and page number. For example:
