This is terrible," spouted one local angler. "You sure can't cast with heavy gloves on,"
moaned another. "I don't dress this warm to hunt ducks," Fishermen were trying every angle. Some cast plugs, spoons, spinners and spawn sacs and streamer flys in the streams. The law regulating early.season fishing in the streams says
