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





They were just a handful of people with but one mutual interest: to study and worship God in an organized fashion. Deprived of proper facilities, those few individuals, under the leadership of Rev. George H. Hollis, received permission to use the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester York for this purpose. The Yorks had moved to 484 Sycamore Street and were the upstairs neighbors of Rev. and Mrs. Hollis. The year was about 1921 or 1922.

Under the guidance of Rev. Hollis, who was a retired member of the Delaware Conference, prayer meetings were held on Sundays and Wednesdays. As more people were attracted to these religious gatherings, the quarters soon became inadequate, and through Rev. Hollis, who met with church officials from the Grace Methodist Episcopal Church, they were given permission to hold services in the basement of Grace's church building. It was located at Michigan and North Division Streets, the present site of the Buffalo Goodwill Industries. By this time, there were a choir, a ladies' aid and a young people's league similar to our present day MYF. The year was 1923.

In failing health, Rev. Hollis contacted the Rev. William R. A. Palmer of the Delaware Conference, who was appointed official pastor of the yet unnamed group in 1924. The first improvement sought by Rev. Palmer was to move his congregation from the basement of Grace Methodist Church to upstairs accommodations. In doing so, it necessitated holding services at 12 o'clock after the services held by Grace were over.

Lincoln's History

During this period, the Episcopal leadership of Buffalo, as a matter of expediency, was closing and consolidating certain churches. One such church that was to be closed at this time was the Sentinel Methodist Episcopal Church located on the corner of Howard and Monroe Streets. In the Fall of 1925, the small congregation was incorporated as part of the Genesee Conference and was moved to this property.


The occasion was marked by an eventful march on a beautiful Sunday to the new church home that was later to be named Lincoln Memorial Methodist Church. Among those founding families were the Yorks, (now known as Mrs. Madeline Anderson, Mrs. Anna Evans and Mrs. Geneva Herndon), the Houses (Mrs. Maude Dorsey and Mrs. Jessie Roberts), Mr. Arthur Williams, the James Robinsons, the Tillman brothers, the Mays, the Blacks, the Clemons, the Shermans, the Currys, the Burns, the Moores, the Channels and the Simmons.


In October 1928, this congregation celebrated its fifth anniversary. It was then and continued to be for a total of 17 years, primarily one of missionary and church extension projects of the Genesee Conference.


On March 1, 1929, the Rev. William H. Horner was transferred here from the Delaware Conference replacing Rev. Palmer. Throughout the trying times of the depression and post-depression years, the membership grew and a few years after World War II, was able to purchase the church and parsonage for a sum of \$9,250.00
















In 1953, the Trinity Methodist Church was offered to us for \$150,000. It was considered well worth \$750,000 and as an inducement, the Genesee Conference, through its Advance Program, arranged to give Lincoln \$50,000 toward the purchase price. The property on Howard Street, through extensive repairs and renovations and increasing property values over the years, had escalated in worth to \$55,000 for which it was sold.

Thus, on another historic occasion on July 4, 1954, the Lincoln congregation moved to its new location as co-tenants with the Trinity congregation for seven months. As a result of this temporary arrangement, the two groups developed a very warm and cordial Christian relationship that resulted in the Lincoln-Trinity Adult group.

The members of Lincoln rallied to their financial obligations which culminated in the burning of the mortgage in an inspiring and moving ceremony held in June of 1961.

After serving at Lincoln for 36½ years, Reverend Horner was transferred to Warren Methodist Church, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, as of November 1, 1965. During those years that spanned nearly four decades, Lincoln had experienced many changes and milestones in its development. In addition to the new church, the parsonage on Donaldson Road had been acquired. Improvements had been made in the church's heating system. The 147th Annual Conference of the Methodist Church was held here in June 1956.

Under the direction of the late Mrs. Emma J. Horner, wife of Rev. Horner, the choir had grown in stature. Mrs. Horner was known throughout the community and state for her choral arrangements and

musical plays. Some of her arrangements are still being used today. Mrs. Horner also worked very diligently with the Sunday School and the Children's Division.

From November 1 to December 31, 1965, the Reverend Willard A. Williams served as interim pastor at Lincoln. He was officially appointed pastor on January 1, 1966. Prior to his appointment, he had served as Director of Center City Church activities here in Buffalo. While serving as minister at Lincoln, Rev. Williams actively encouraged modifications in the church's programs to make it more relevant, not only to the congregation, but also to the community at large. He endeavored to improve the organization of the church commissions and clubs. The new office of Black Community Developer was instituted. A library was set up in the church parlor. Renovation and decoration of the sanctuary was completed, with the installation of a new floor as well. A playground was constructed across the street from the education wing of the church. Under his leadership, an annual reception was held for the preparatory class of prospective new members at Lincoln. Rev. Williams left in September 1970 to join the Board of Discipleship, Division of Education of the United Methodist Church located in Nashville, Tennessee.

In October 1970, the Reverend Edmund Millet became Lincoln's fifth pastor. Since his pastorate began, a new parsonage has been purchased on Woodward Avenue. Restoration of the church at a cost of at least \$57,000 has begun. This includes repairs to the outside of the structure, new windows and restoration of the organ.








BLACK COMMUNITY DEVELOPER PROGRAM

The Black Community Developer Program became a reality in September 1971 after a series of meetings and training sessions. It is a community owned communications facility essentially intended to bridge the gap between Blacks and whites through the use of audio and visual media. Plans also call for involvement with the cable television system and the operation of the program's closed circuit system in various areas and projects. This program has been cited as one of the most active in the nation.

Commissions

The Council on Ministries is under the Rev. Sam Williams and is the organization in which ideas are shared, clarified and approved for the vital ministry of our church. In order to perform this ministry, work areas have been organized in the form of six commissions:

The Commission on Social Concerns has recently decided to study ways in which it can be supportive to young people who are in need of jobs. Plans are being made to confer with agencies such as BUILD and the Urban League in order to discover a course of action.

The Commission on Ecumenical Affairs has helped to keep the church informed and involved in the work of Metro, Task Force, The Council of Churches, and other inter-church activities. The Commission on Worship has organized a very efficient order of acolytes and will continue to find ways to improve the worship experience with special reference to the singing.

The Commission on Evangelism — The primary task at the present time is to keep in touch with absent members and to motivate them to become active. The Commission has also pledged to increase the membership to at least 500 and already has moved in this direction. The Sunshine Committee is associated with this group. The committee is charged with the specific duty of bringing fellowship and support to our sick and shut-in members.

The Commission on Stewardship — This group has been working closely with the Finance Committee and plans to use some visual methods to inform and stimulate members about the needs of the church and their stewardship responsibilities.

The Commission on Missions — The work here has been to establish sewing programs for girls and women and recreation for boys with some support from the Model City Agency. The group has also been supportive of the Robert Childs Mallard Memorial Center which works with farm workers of the East Side. At the present time, the Committee is investigating a ministry with blind persons in our community and with young offenders who can be helped by a program through the Office of Crime Control.

The Commission on Education — The particular function has been the work of the Church School. The special concern is the welfare of the senior high department. It is our hope that by innovative programs and cooperation with the Methodist Youth Fellowship, this phase of education will be strengthened.


Tubilee Celebration - Now Thank We All Our God


Our Jubilee celebration was one of prayer and thanksgiving. Never in Lincoln's History has such an event taken place, and we will remember it for years to come.

The week began on October 28, 1973 with the dedication of our new organ during the Sunday morning church service. The strains of "The Lost Chord" rang out over the church, as Joyce Petties, our organist exhibited her skills and the organ's new sounds. Also, an altar was dedicated to the memory of Julius Blazer, and presented by his wife, Bessie.

That evening at 8:00 p.m., our church sanctuary physically swelled with the powerful arrangement of Now Thank We All Our God" by the combinedefforts of the C.Q. Price orchestra and our own Senior Choir, both directed by Mrs. Lauretta Anderson. Then, under the direction of Mr. Price, the band played and the church rocked to such favorites as "When The Saints Go Marching In", "Just A Closer Walk With Thee" and "Roll Jordan Roll". Our Senior Choir alternately sang the late Mrs. Emma J. Horner's arrangements of "My Way Is Cloudy", "On Dere Knees" and Buked and Scorned", to name a few. The men of the choir gave an excellent rendition of "Don't You Compromise". The program was climaxed with a stirring arrangement of "Lift Every Voice and Sing", with choir and orchestra, and a standing ovation for the performers. Truly, this was a moving program.

Williams put together a slide presentation of our history, using music, narration, and pictures borrowed from members of the church and the church records. Some of those old pictures were hilarious and recalled memorable events in our history. It was good to fellowship with Rev. Williams once again.

On the evening of Saturday, November 3, 1973, Lincoln members and friends turned out at the Statler Hotel to a banquet with our former pastor of over 36 years, Rev. William Horner, as guest speaker. Rev. Horner's informal talk was beautiful and nostalgic, and he was given a standing ovation in recognition of his many years of service.

During the course of the evening, fifteen of our members were awarded plaques recognizing their services and contributions since our church's infancy.

Those in attendance at the banquet were able to participate through the universal language of music as they joined in singing such numbers as "Love's Old Sweet Song" and "May The Good Lord Bless and Keep You".

Among the renditions were, "Finale on Nun Dunket" ubilee Theme — "Now Thank We All Our God", Clair DeLune", "Finlandia", "Theme from the Love Story" and "the Baby Elephant Walk." Mrs. Mamie ohnson and Miss Lisa Nicholas played organ and piano duets at the program.
