












Page Hall Annex-1967




Sanford Hall—1937, Remodeled and dedicated in 1984 Moore Hall—Early 1930s and remodeled in the '70s



William H. Hale Student Union— 1960s






SUMMER COMMENCEMENT

RETIREMENT

The Tradition Of Langston University's Annual Retirement Banquet

During the early 1960's another Langston University tradition was started under the administration of Dr. William H. Hale, 10th President of Langston University. He reasoned that a member of the Langston University family who ends an active number of years of service to the University should be publicly honored at the climax of that career.

It should be known by all that the services rendered are endeared to the memory and viability of the institution, for it is through dedication, ability, and productivity that an institution survives. Thus, we have the unbroken tradition of honoring the retired personnel of Langston University.

We have been "Touched By Master Hands"—the hands of master teachers, master educators, master leaders, master workers, and master mentors. Thank you Mrs. Vearneta Burch, Dr. Ada Lois Sipuel Fisher, Dr. Helen Aline Johnson, Dr. Raymond Johnson, Dr. Maurice Love and Dr. Wessylyne Simpson.



DR. HELEN ALINE JOHNSON rendered 31 years of continuous service to her Alma Mater, Langston University. To have served as secretary and/or administrative assistant in the office of each of LU's last six presidents during most of those years suggests more than a record, it sets an unparalled precedence. In her response following the many accolades she received at the banquet, Aline gave, "in a nutshell", a micro-history of the university. At the time of her retirement, she was serving as Registrar.



DR. WESSYLYNE SIMPSON started her outstanding career in higher education as a chemistry instructor at her Alma Mater, Langston University, in 1953. Dr. Simpson, noted for her insistance for excellence, retired as Director of the Division of Education and Behavioral Sciences, Director of Teacher Education, and Certifying Officer for Langston University. She was honored by her sorors in 1987-88 and 1988-89 by being elected to the office of Director of the Midwestern Region of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.



DR. RAYMOND JOHNSON began his teaching career as a college instructor at his Alma Mater, Langston University, in 1956 in the area of Industrial Arts Education. Since that time he has progressed through the academic ranks to Professor in the Department of Technology and Director of Applied Sciences, the position he held at the time of his retirement. A multi-talented person, Ray also served as assistant football coach for a number of years.

BANQUET



DR. ADA LOIS SIPUEL FISHER, an outstanding pioneer in the struggle for equal rights, is honored not only by her university, but her state and nation for her role in integrating the Law School of the University of Oklahoma as documented in the 1948 U.S. Supreme Court ruling in the case of Sipuel v. Oklahoma. Her tenure at her Alma Mater, Langston University, began in 1956 when she was employed as an instructor. She rose through the ranks to professor and Chairperson of the Department of Social Sciences. She retired as Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs.



DR. MAURICE LOVE began his career at LU in 1976. During his eleven year tenure he performed many duties, including membership on the Athletic Council, University Senate and Teacher Education Committee. He was also chairperson of Academic Policies and Director of Minority Institution Science Improvement Program. In 1981 he was named Director of the Division of Arts and Sciences in addition to his chairmanship of the Department of Mathematics, positions he held until his retirement. The diversity of the disciplines within the division mandated strong and flexible leadership. Dr. Love brought to this leadership and teaching a strong commitment.

prominence of the building which symbolizes learning.


Therefore, let this groundbreaking celebration be the initial step which embodies the obligation of each generation to impact its treasures of wisdom and knowledge to the generation following.

Outreach Program

What was generally viewed as a problem turned into a blessing for almost 300 Logan County youths who participated in the six weeks National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) held at Langston University for the first time during the summer of 1988.

Because Logan County was economically depressed, as is most of the rest of the state, it was considered an area with underprivileged children, and thus qualified for the federally funded program. Participants were involved in and received training from qualified instructors in six sports, visited Frontier City, White Water and Arbuckle Wilderness at reduced prices; received one well-balanced snack and free meals each day; were given NYSP T-shirts and a free ticket to all LU sports activities for the coming year. They also had the opportunity to win plaques, awards and free food certificates from fast food establisments in the area.

The program was well supervised with a staff of 28, with seven of them being either high school or college coaches. It was designed for young people to have fun while learning. The director of NYSP was Women's Head Basketball Coach Abron Young.

A PAST



1897

March 12, 1897, the establishment of the Colored Agricultural and Normal University by Oklahoma Territoral House Bill 151 both the University and the town was named after John Mercer Langston (1829-1897).

1898

On September 3, 1898, University opens: the first classes were held in the Presbyterian Church with a faculty that consisted of four persons and the total enrollment of students was 41. President, Inman Page (1898-1915).

1901

Main building, boys dorm and president's home were built. Students began arriving from such places faraway such as Texas, Missouri, Kentucky and Colorado. First two students graduates: J.I. Hazelwood, Langston; Ellen Strong, Guthrie.

1905

Library holdings reach 900

1907

Main building destroyed by fire of undetermined theories.

1909

The construction of Page Hall.

Summer sessions began; August 1915, Isaac Berry McCutcheon, second president and 1916, John M. Marquess, Third President (1916-23).

1926

1927

First Founder's Day Celebration. In the early days the graduation activities lasted almost a week. In, 1927, Langston held its Twentysixth Annual Commencement from Sunday, May 15 to Thursday, May 19. Zachary T. Hubert, Fifth President (1927-31).

New girls' dormitory, accommodating 100, and new boys' dormitory, accommodating 50, constructed.

1932-1935

Two-year Normal School closed. Operates (until 1940) branches at Muskogee, Ardmore, and Tulsa. J.W. Sanford, Seventh President (1935-40). G.L. Harrison, Ninth President (1940-60).

End of free tuition for Oklahoma students

1943

Southwestern Journal begins the first publication.

1946

Campus high school closes.

1948

Accredited by North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools; campus street paved

1949

G. Lamar Harrison Library and new stadium, accommodating 4,000, completed.

1953

Kappa Delta Pi, national educational society, establishes third black-college chapter at Langston.



1955

Public Relations Office opens.

1965

Accredited by National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education

1968-69

All-time high enrollment: 1,336. Special Black Heritage Collection acquired. 1969 recorded the first largest graduation class: 207.

1960

Dr. G. L. Harrison retires after twenty years as president. He was succeeded by Dr. W. H. Hale, first alumnus to return as president. 1972-75

Tolson Collection housed in Page Library Annex. Dr. William Sims served as president 1969-74. Communication Department established. The LU Elementary Lab School closed.

1962

Electronics and technology courses added to curriculum.

1980

Dr. Ernest L. Holloway inaugurated as the Fourteenth President of Langston University, his alma mater.







"THRILLER SHOW"



Golf Tournament




Greek Follies

























Standing Room Only!



the Impact of War in the Western World."



Texas history.




During the 1988 Fall Semester, Langston had the largest student increase among those institutions involved with UCT. In the Spring 1988 Semester, the university had 714 students at UCT and by fall this number jumped to 904.


Division of Business classes held during the day are the fastest growing classes, and are attracting above average students. "For two years in a row Langston University accounting majors have made the highest score on the state CPA exam," comments business instructor Dr. Mike Murphy. "I don't believe any other school has ever done that."

Linda Boles, an accounting clerk of the Metropolitan Tulsa Chamber of Commerce is an accounting major. In 1987 she received the National Collegiate Merit Award from the U.S. Achievement Academy because of her high scholastic abilities in accounting. In April of 1988, she was approved for membership in Outstanding College Students of America. "I have some excellent instructors," she explains modestly when commenting on those awards.

President and Chief Executive Officer for UCT is Dr. Arthur C. MacKinney who came to Tulsa from St. Louis where he served as vice chancellor for academic affairs at the University of Missouri. He said, "UCT is filling a vital need for the City of Tulsa and Langston University will continue to offer quality programs to assist in meeting those needs."


PRESIDENT ERNEST L. HOLLOWAY

Dr. Ernest L. Holloway has followed what some have described as a methodical, careful path, leading, since 1979 after his appointment as president, to major achievements and advancements. Seemingly, he has used an equally methodical pathway since that appointment that appears to be reaping results of "large-scale proportions." to use the words of one longtime observer of the "goings-on" of Langston University.

Things have stabilized under his careful thoughtful leadership that observer stated. The "accomplishments" of the past two years alone of Dr. Holloway seem to confirm the observer's assessment. The establishment of the university's first graduate degree program, a master of science in teacher education, this year is the result of one of his accomplishments. Several years ago, Dr. Holloway's leadership resulted into two new urban centers in the state's two major metropolitan cities, Tulsa and Oklahoma City. Also, two years ago, the school established a scholarship program for Regents Scholars and President's Scholars. Dr. Holloway also speaks with pride concerning the school's program for training nurses; and the health care administration program which trains students to become health-care administrators with compentencies in business management community health, human development and human relations.

The statements above are just the tip of the iceberg as related to President Holloway's accomplishments. He is truly "a man for all seasons."



Margaret Walker

The Dean of black women authors Margaret Walker presented a one-hour program for the students. The visiting artist, first came to the nation's attention with her book of poetry "For My People" which won the Yale Award for Younger Poets in 1942. After 30 years of research and writing in 1966, she won Publisher's Prize as a Houghton Mifflin Literacy Fellowship Novel.

According to the author, "Jubilee" is based on the true story of her great-grandmother, and depicts black life in Georgia during the Civil War and Reconstruction.

Her other books of poetry include "Ballad of the Free," "Prophets for a New Day," and "October Journey." Other books are "How I Wrote Jubilee" and "Poetic Equation: Conversations between Margaret Walker and Nikki Giovanni."

Whereas once many thought strength comes through economics and the military, McCloud said the future will call for human capital.




She said, "Nothing comes to sleepers but a dream and when they wake up, that's gone."











Langston University football program has announced five team players selected to the All-District first and second teams from District IX

The Business Management major also had an impact on kick-off returns. Armstrong made 11 returns for 321 yards, and one touchdown for an average of 29.2 yards per carry.



games, 1013 rebounds, 1067 points, 94 assists, 101 steals, 38 block shots— with three games remaining in her career.







