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


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

## Keynote Speaker VICE ADMIRAL BILL MORAN Chief of Naval Personnel



Vice Admiral Moran, a native of New York, graduated with a bachelor of science degree from the United States Naval Academy in 1981 and a master's degree from the National War College in 2006. He assumed duties as the Navy's 57th chief of naval personnel, Aug. 2, 2013. Serving concurrently as the deputy chief of naval operations (Manpower, Personnel, Training and Education) (N1), he is responsible for the planning and programming of all manpower, personnel, training and education resources for the U.S. Navy. He manages an annual operating budget of \$29 billion and leads more than 26,000 employees engaged in the recruiting, personnel management, training and development of Navy personnel. His responsibilities include overseeing Navy Recruiting Command, Navy Personnel Command, and Naval Education and Training Command.

A P-3 pilot with operational tours spanning both coasts, he commanded Patrol Squadron 46, Patrol and Reconnaissance Wing 2, and served extensively as an instructor pilot in multiple operational tours and two tours with Patrol Squadron 30.





Additional operational tour include staff member for commander, Carrier Group 6 aboard USS Forrestal (CVA 59).

Ashore, he served as assistant Washington placement officer and assistant flag officer detailer in the Bureau of Naval Personnel; executive assistant to Commander, U.S. Pacific Command; deputy director, Navy staff; and executive assistant to the Chief of Naval Operations.

As a flag officer, he served as commander, Patrol and Reconnaissance Group and director, Air Warfare (N98) on the staff of the chief of naval operations.

He is entitled to wear the Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit (five awards), and other various personal, unit and service awards.

## The NROTC at Holy Cross THE UNIT COMMANDER



Before coming to Holy Cross in June 2014 Captain Kemper served as commanding officer of Officer Training Command, Newport on from February 2012 to May 2014, where he was responsible for the training and development of approximately 3100 officers per year in five schools: Officer Candidate School, Officer Development School, Direct Commission Officer Indoctrination Course, Limited Duty Officer/Warrant Officer Indoctrination School, and the Naval Science Institute.

Captain Kemper, a native of Festus, Missouri, graduated from the Missouri University of Science and Technology in 1986 with a Bachelor of Science

degree in Chemical Engineering. He was commissioned in November 1986 following completion of Naval Officer Candidate School in Newport, Rhode Island. His sea-going assignments have included duty aboard both attack and ballistic missile , submarines in the Atlantic and Pacific Fleet: division officer tours aboard USS GLENARD P LIPSCOMB (SSN 685) and USS FINBACK (SSN 670), duty as the Navigator and Engineer Officer onboard USS JAMES K POLK (SSN 645), and assignment as Executive Officer aboard USS NEBRASKA (SSBN 739) (BLUE).

His shore assignments have included duty on the staff of the U.S. JOINT FORCES COMMAND in Norfolk, Virginia, where he served as Maritime Operations Officer, and Navy Personnel Command, where he served as Assistant Director of the Center for Career Development. From April 2005 to June 2006, he was assigned as the Deputy Commander of COMSUBRON SEVENTEEN, where he was responsible for the training and readiness of eleven submarine crews.

He served as Commanding Officer, Naval Submarine Support Center, Bangor from June 2006 to October 2008, providing maintenance, logistics, administrative, legal, medical and religious programs support to over 4,000 Sailors in 22 submarine crews assigned to the PACNORWEST Region. Following his command tour, Captain Kemper served as the Commander Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet Representative at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, where he was responsible directly to the Force Commander for the training and readiness of the propulsion plant and propulsion watchstanders of SUBPAC nuclear submarines and submarine tenders undergoing modernization or overhaul.

Captain Kemper also holds a Master of Science degree in Financial Management from the Naval Postgraduate School, where he was designated a Conrad Scholar and received the 1993 Department of Defense Award for Excellence in Financial Management.

His personal awards include the Legion of Merit (2 awards), Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (3 Awards), Navy Commendation Medal (4 awards), Navy Achievement Medal (5 awards) and various campaign awards.


#### Rev. Joseph T. O'Callahan, S.J., 1905-1964 FATHER O'CALLAHAN AND USS FRANKLIN




In 1938 the Reverend Joseph T. O'Callahan, S.J. came to the College of the Holy Cross to chair the mathematics department. In the summer of 1940 with war raging in Europe, he was commissioned a lieutenant junior grade into the Chaplain Corps of the U.S. Navy, its first Jesuit chaplain. Upon reporting to Pensacola Naval Air Station in November, in addition to his chaplain duties, his duties included teaching. calculus to young naval aviators. Later Father O'Callahan reported to the aircraft carrier USS RANGER and took part in combat operations in the Atlantic and the invasion of North Africa. In the spring of 1944, he was transferred west, eventually reporting to Pearl Harbor Naval Station in December.

On March 2, 1945, Lieutenant Commander O'Callahan boarded the aircraft carrier USS FRANKLIN to assume the duties of the senior chaplain

to more than 3000 Sailors, Marines, aviators and officers. In the early hours of the next morning, the ship weighed anchor for the western Pacific. On March 19, he and his shipmates stepped onto the pages of history.





While conducting combat air operations against the Japanese home islands, FRANKLIN was attacked by a single enemy aircraft. Its bombs set off conflagrations and explosions that were fueled by the carrier's stores of gasoline and munitions. The ship was ravaged for more than twenty-four hours, resulting in over a 1000 casualties including over 800 dead. If the fires and the detonations were not controlled, FRANKLIN would sink with greater loss of life.

From FRANKLIN's bridge, Captain Leslie Gehres observed Father O'Callahan moving about the chaos on the flight deck. The

chaplain was easily recognized by his helmet, emblazoned with a white cross.

He was not only ministering to the injured and dying, he was also organizing, leading and inspiring his dazed and disoriented shipmates to fight the fires and jettison dangerous ordnance that had not yet detonated from the heat. At one point, after receiving a thumbs up from Father O'Callahan on the flight deck, the captain declared to his Marine orderly, "That's the bravest man I ever saw."

For his actions that helped save their ship, Captain Gehres recommended his chaplain for the Medal of Honor. When Father O'Callahan received the award from President Harry Truman in January 1946 he was Commander O'Callahan, the first Navy chaplain to receive that honor.

Father O'Callahan returned to the College to teach theology and philosophy. However, in a few years, the injuries that he suffered on that fateful day forced him to give up classroom teaching. Living on campus, he remained mentally active, serving as a mentor to young Jesuits and writing an account of his Navy service that was published in 1956.

Father O'Callahan died in 1964 at age 58. He was buried with military honors in the Jesuit cemetery. This is one of three places on campus where he is remembered. His headstone is different from the ones of his brother Jesuits. In addition to the traditional Jesuit Latin inscription it is also inscribed with the date and place of his heroic actions and its recognition in the Medal of Honor.

#### USS O'Callahan COMMANDER O'CALLAHAN MEDAL OF HONOR PORTRAIT

In 1965, the U.S. Navy christened a new Garcia class destroyer USS O'CALLAHAN. She was commissioned into the fleet in July 1968 in Boston. Home ported in San Diego CA for twenty years, USS O'CALLAHAN made many deployments to the western Pacific.


Four months prior to the ship's commissioning, the Navy League commissioned the artist Anthony Iarrobino of Marblehead, to do an oil painting of the Medal of Honor recipient. The portrait was presented to the ship's captain and crew at the ship's commissioning. It was displayed on the crews mess deck until the ship was decommissioned in 1988. Later the ship would be designated the honorary flagship of the Navy Chaplain Corps.

When USS O'CALLAHAN was decommissioned many artifacts from the ship were transferred to the Holy Cross NROTC Unit, including the portrait of Commander O'Callahan, Medal of Honor. The portrait is on display just outside of the O'Callahan Room in lower Carlin.

All of the items transferred from ship continue to be accounted for by the NROTC Unit as official U.S. Navy property. These items, including a reproduction of the portrait, are displayed on the unit's quarterdeck in Carlin Hall.



## O'CALLAHAN SCIENCE LIBRARY/SWORDS HALL O'CALLAHAN COLLECTION/CROSSWORKS



The entrance to the O'Callahan Science Library is in the Swords Atrium which is connected to the Integrated Science Complex on Haberlin Road. It is one of several libraries on campus.


When Father O'Callahan was the chairman of the mathematics department at the College he initiated a department library in 1940. However the department offices were scattered among various campus buildings until 1959. That year that department as well as the chemistry and

physics departments moved into the newly opened Haberlin Hall. A science library was established for all departments. It was named for Father O'Callahan a few years before he died in 1964. The library moved to Swords Hall when it opened in 1984.

This year the science library staff and the O'Callahan Society collaborated to refresh and update groupings of photographs, plaques and citations that have been displayed since the library's Haberlin Hall days. The result is a framed collage that places Father O'Callahan on the pages of history [see above].

The Society and the library will establish the O'Callahan Collection, published and unpublished materials that relate to Father O'Callahan. In a variety of formats it includes books, letters, articles, photographs, motion pictures, and commemorative items. The collection will be catalogued on 'CrossWorks', the College's institutional repository, where digital material will be available on line.

## O'Callahan Wardroom CARLIN HALL



The wardroom aboard a U.S. Navy ship is a place where the ship's officers go for meals, recreation and to socialize with fellow officers. Like a ship's quarterdeck, there are traditions and rules of etiquette that are observed in the wardroom. The O'Callahan Room in lower Carlin Hall and across the quadrangle from Stein Hall, serves this purpose and more. It is a place where midshipmen can also become acquainted with those officers from Holy Cross and its NROTC Unit who have distinguished themselves in their service to Navy and Marine Corps and to our country.

Under the direction of Capt Bill Boniface, Unit CO 1994- 1998, the Unit officers and midshipmen engaged in a project to determine and research the backgrounds of Holy Cross and WPI, Navy and Marine Corps alumni who had distinguished themselves in combat. In a September 1997 ceremony, the O'Callahan Room was dedicated and the project results were

unveiled: on three of the wardroom walls, professionally framed and mounted official citations and yearbook pictures were arranged in collages of Medal of Honor, Navy Cross and Silver Star recipients, twenty-three in all. The recipients span World War II through the 1989 action in Panama.

Later the official photographs of sixteen HCNROTC consortium admirals and generals were added to the displays in the wardroom. Their careers span the Korean War to the present day.

The wardroom as it is now constituted actually began its transformation when the NROTC Unit moved from O'Kane Hall in 1988. Items from the small O'Kane wardroom came over to the significantly larger space in Carlin. These included an old pool table and the podium [#4 below] that Father O'Callahan used for Masses in 1945 aboard USS FRANKLIN.

Captain Sam Badgett, Unit CO 1985-1989, arranged for the transfer of several USS O'CALLAHAN quarterdeck items. These were delivered after the ship was decommissioned in 1988. These items included the large wooden and brass lettered sign of the ship's name, the ship's bell and the portrait of CDR O'Callahan, Medal of Honor.

Since 2010 alumni, including several whose photographs and citations are on its walls, have been coming to the O'Callahan Room during reunion weekends. There they have been hosted by our newly commissioned Ensigns and 2nd Lieutenants and the officers our NROTC Unit staff for coffee and conversation. Earlier this year the O'Callahan Society participated with College to upgrade the wardroom. To enhance the room for seminars, the College installed an up to date, ceiling mounted computer video system; the Society funded new sofas, chairs, a large flat panel TV and the recovering of that old pool table.

The O'Callahan Room is a focal point for midshipmen, alumni and guests. It serves to remind all of the sea services traditions associated with the College of the Holy Cross and [as the late Father John Brooks, President Emeritus, said to the O'Callahan Society in 2009] "...its proud NROTC Unit."



# The O'Callahan Society Welcomes Long-Time Board Member to the 2015 Annual Dinner

Captain Thomas Kelley, USN (Retired) '60 Medal of Honor, 1969



For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty in the afternoon while serving as commander of River Assault Division 152 during combat operations against enemy aggressor forces. Lt. Comdr. (then Lt.) Kelley was in charge of a column of 8 river assault craft which were extracting 1 company of U.S. Army infantry troops on the east bank of the Ong Muong Canal in Kien Hoa province, when 1 of the armored troop carriers reported a mechanical failure of a loading ramp. At approximately the

same time, Viet Cong forces opened fire from the opposite bank of the canal. After issuing orders for the crippled troop carrier to raise its ramp manually, and for the remaining boats to form a protective cordon around the disabled craft, Lt. Comdr. Kelley realizing the extreme danger to his column and its inability to clear the ambush site until the crippled unit was repaired, boldly maneuvered the monitor in which he was embarked to the exposed side of the protective cordon in direct line with the enemy's fire, and ordered the monitor to commence firing. Suddenly, an enemy rocket scored a direct hit on the coxswain's flat, the shell penetrating the thick armor plate, and the explosion spraying shrapnel in all directions. Sustaining serious head wounds from the blast, which hurled him to the deck of the monitor, Lt. Cmdr. Kelley disregarded his severe injuries and attempted to continue directing the other boats. Although unable to move from the deck or to speak clearly into the radio, he succeeded in relaying his commands through 1 of his men until the enemy attack was silenced and the boats were able to move to an area of safety. Lt. Comdr. Kellev's brilliant leadership, bold initiative, and resolute determination served to inspire his men and provide the impetus needed to carry out the mission after he was medically evacuated by helicopter. His extraordinary courage under fire and his selfless devotion to duty sustain and enhance the finest traditions of the U.S. Naval Service.







#### THE NAVY HYMN

The "Navy Hymn" is Eternal Father, Strong to Save. The original words were written as a poem in 1860 by William Whiting of Winchester, England, for a student who was about to sail for the United States. The melody, published in 1861, was composed by fellow Englishman, Rev. John Bacchus Dykes, an Episcopalian clergyman. The original words are:

Verse 1: Eternal Father, strong to save,
Whose arm hath bound the restless wave,
Who bidd'st the mighty ocean deep
Its own appointed limits keep;
Oh, hear us when we cry to Thee,
For those in peril on the sea!

Verse 2: O Christ! Whose voice the waters heard
And hushed their raging at Thy word,
Who walked'st on the foaming deep,
And calm amidst its rage didst sleep;
Oh, hear us when we cry to Thee,
For those in peril on the sea!

Verse 3: Most Holy Spirit! Who didst brood
Upon the chaos dark and rude,
And bid its angry tumult cease,
And give, for wild confusion, peace;
Oh, hear us when we cry to Thee,
For those in peril on the sea!

Verse 4: O Trinity of love and power!
Our brethren shield in danger's hour;
From rock and tempest, fire and foe,
Protect them wheresoe'er they go;
Thus evermore shall rise to Thee
Glad hymns of praise from land and sea.
