
Dear Friend & Bro:-



I presume you have returned home by this time and resumed business at the old stand. I need not again express my gratification upon your unanimous re-election. You performed your duties in a highly satisfactory manner and all the delegates showed their hearty appreciation thereof. You have commenced your second term under bright auspices and I am sure you will discharge your duties in such a way as to evoke at the end thereof the "well done" of all your brethren.

As our State Convention will be held during the latter part of this month I am anxious to get a copy of the principal amendments which were made to our Constitution.
