

Domenico Scarlatti - Sonata in A, K. 208

Domenico Scarlatti was an Italian harpsichordist and composer of the Baroque era, though his compositional style is often thought of as more Classical. He best known for his 555 keyboard sonatas, most of which are single-movement works in binary form, as is the case with his *Sonata in A*, *K. 208.* Many of his sonatas translate beautifully on harp, and have been performed and recorded by renowned harpists including Maria Luisa Rayan-Forero, Yolanda Kondonassis and Judy Loman.

Louis Spohr - Fantasie in C minor, Op. 35

Louis Spohr was a German violinist, teacher, conductor, and composer of the late Classical/early Romantic era. Although most of his works are seldom performed today, he was prolific and highly regarded in his time. While he was concertmaster at the court of Gotha, he met and fell in love with his future wife: a young and talented harpist named Dorette Scheidler. Spohr was inspired to write a number of solo and chamber works for harp, including his *Fantasie*, which he dedicated to Dorette.

Arnold Bax - Elegiac Trio

Arnold Bax was an English poet and composer whose musical style combines Romantic and Impressionistic elements. His *Elegiac Trio*, composed in 1916, is a dreamy, reflective single-movement work written as a memorial to those who died in the Easter Rising insurrection in Dublin. The piece is divided into two main sections, each with it's own theme; in the first section, the viola and flute pass the melody back and forth as the harp plays arpeggios underneath. The second theme is introduced by the flute after a brief harp cadenza. After the recapitulation, the trio draws to a close with a subdued tempo and dynamic; a rising four-note figure is repeated in the flute while the harp and viola restate the second theme.

Gabriel Faure - Impromptu, Op. 86

Gabriel Faure was a French composer, organist, pianist and teacher. His music has been described as a link between late Romanticism and early modernism; his early works were inspired by the likes of Chopin and Schumann, and in his later years, he experimented with compositional techniques that were more impressionistic and foreshadowed atonality. Faure wrote six Impromptus, all of which were composed for piano except for the last one: his *Impromptu for Harp* was written in 1904 and is characteristic of his later composition style, which was turbulent and impassioned.

Tyler Hartley began harp lessons at the age of six with Curtis graduate and Atlanta Opera harpist Susan Bennett Brady. She has also studied with Kathleen Bride at the Eastman School of Music and Elizabeth Hainen of the Philadelphia Orchestra. She is currently studying with Atlanta Symphony Orchestra harpist Elisabeth Remy-Johnson at Kennesaw State University.

Tyler currently plays with both the KSU Symphony Orchestra and Wind Ensemble in over a dozen performances a year. In 2012, she performed the *Rondo of the Boieldieu Harp Concerto* as KSU's Concerto Competition winner. In addition, she frequently freelances with local orchestras, wind ensembles, and choral groups, including the Georgia Symphony Orchestra, the North Georgia Symphony Orchestra, Tara Winds, the Athens Choral Society, Atlanta Freedom Bands, and the Atlanta Wind Symphony, amongst others. Tyler has served as principal harpist for the Gwinnett Ballet Theatre Orchestra since 2010. She has also been a member of the Atlanta Symphony Youth Orchestra and the Atlanta Harp Ensemble.

Tyler also enjoys rehearsing and performing as a member of her harp, viola, and flute trio ensemble. Notable recent performances include the Ravel *Sonatine* for KSU's annual Flourish Luncheon and the *Debussy Trio* with Puerto Rico Symphony Orchestra principal flutist Josué Casillas. She looks forward to future scheduled performances of the Bax *Elegiac Trio* in San Diego and Puerto Rico with Johnny and Domenico this summer.

For the past three summers, Tyler has worked as a theory instructor and a counselor for the Young Artist's Harp Seminar. Before she began teaching there, she spent many summers at the seminar as a student, and was winner of the 2008 Concerto Competition with the first movement of the Dittersdorf *Harp Concerto*. Tyler continues to work closely with Susan Brady, receiving coaching and mentoring from her, and working as her Teaching Assistant. Tyler gives private harp lessons in Marietta.

Johnny Bezama-Carvajal, is a performance major at Kennesaw State University. There he studies under Christina Smith, principal flutist of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. During his time at KSU, Johnny has performed for College Band Director's National Association Southern Division Intercollegiate Band, Georgia Music Educator's Association's All College Band, Latin American Association, and has been hired several times to play for GMEA's District 13 All-District Honor Orchestra. Johnny also plays regularly in The KSU Symphony Orchestra and Wind Ensemble.

Johnny has studied composition with Dr. Laurence Sherr, Professor of Music Theory and Composition at KSU, and has gained success in premiering many original compositions, including multiple chamber ensemble works, as well as a large ensemble piece and solo work. The first movement of his *Symphony No.1* was chosen as winner of KSU's 2011 Composition Competition and was premiered by the KSU Symphony Orchestra in 2012.

Johnny has experience teaching flute, clarinet, saxophone, and voice, as well as marching fundamentals at Valdosta High School in his hometown of Valdosta, Georgia. This year, he is a returning guest student conductor of the KSU Concert Band. Johnny also has experience in the choral world, and recently performed at the American Choral Director Association convention in Dallas as a member of the KSU Men's Ensemble.

Domenico Hueso completed his Bachelor of Music degree in performance from Kennesaw State University with Cathy Lynn. Mr. Hueso has studied with Helen Kim, Juan Ramirez, Francisco Caban, David Grimal, Henry Hutchinson, Ramon Negron, and Susanna Han.

Hueso has participated in several music festivals including the Pablo Casals Chamber Music Festival in Prades, France, the Festival International de Huapango in Panuco Mexico, Programa Musica de Camera para Niños, FOSJA in San Juan, Puerto Rico, and the GMEA All College Orchestra 2011 as principal violist and soloist. He has also performed at the Central Conservatory in Beijing, the People's Theatre in Xi'an, and for the Confucius Institute of China. Mr. Hueso has performed in master classes with the Ying Quartet, Eighth Blackbird, Pacifica Quartet, and Chilingirian Quartet, and he has been a finalist in MTNA Chamber music competition.

Along with freelancing and recording in multiple genres, Hueso has been a guest soloist with the rock band Kansas in 2011, for their Collegiate Symphony Tour, and has performed for tribute groups commemorating artists such as Otis Redding. In addition to keeping a rigorous teaching and freelancing schedule, Hueso enjoys improvisation and performing chamber music with his colleagues from the Puerto Rico Symphony.
