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Helen Hwaya Kim, violin made her orchestral debut with the Calgary Philharmonic at the age of six. She has appeared as a soloist with the Boston Pops at Boston's Symphony Hall, as well as with the Milwaukee and Atlanta Symphony Orchestras. Ms. Kim earned her Bachelor and Master's Degree from the Juilliard School where her teachers included Hyo, Kang, Cho-Liang Lin and Dorothy DeLay.

While at Juilliard, she served as Concertmaster of the Juilliard Orchestra and was the winner of the Juilliard Concerto

Competition at both the pre–college and college levels. She is the recipient of more than one hundred national and international awards. She won the prestigious Artists International Competition in New York and, as a result, gave debut recitals at Carnegie Weill Hall and the Aspen Summer Music Festival.

A native of Canada, Ms. Kim has been engaged as soloist by many of Canada's leading orchestras, including the National Arts Center Orchestra, Montreal Metropolitan Orchestra, Vancouver Symphony, McGill Chamber Orchestra, and the Windsor, Regina, Victoria and Prince George Symphonies. She has also appeared as soloist with the DeKalb, New Orleans, Aspen and Banff Festival Orchestras, and with orchestras in the United Kingdom, Germany and Poland. Ms. Kim has toured extensively throughout Canada and the United States, including performances at Alice Tully Hall and the Santa Fe, La Jolla, Highlands-Cashiers, Amelia Island, Zenith and Sitka International Chamber Music Festivals. Ms. Kim currently resides in Atlanta, Georgia, where she served as Assistant and Associate Concertmaster for the Atlanta Symphony for three seasons. She is currently the Assistant Concertmaster of the Atlanta Opera Orchestra and serves as Professor of Violin and Chair of the String Department at Kennesaw State University. Ms. Kim is the recipient of the Dr. John and Linda Cooke faculty award.



Kenn Wagner, violin has been a first violinist and acting assistant concertmaster with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra since 1994, leaving his first position with the New Jersey Symphony of three years. He has also appeared abroad as guest soloist with the Shenzhen Symphony Orchestra in China, and Christ Church Symphony string section in New Zealand. Other solo appearances include New Orleans Symphony, Arlington Symphony, the Wintergreen Music Festival Orchestra,

the Atlanta Community Symphony Orchestra, the Dekalb Symphony, Clark/ Spellman Symphony, Atlanta Philharmonic and the Atlanta Musicians' Orchestra. Chamber music appearances include Leaptrott Trio, Riverside Chamber Players, Atlanta Chamber Players, National Chamber Players, and Kenneth Slowik of the Smithsonian Chamber Players, the Orlando Chamber Soloists at Piccolo Spoleto, and also with members of the Grammy Award winning Cuerteto Latino Americano in Puebla, Mexico. Mr. Wagner has also performed chamber music with faculty members of IU, KSU, GSU, UGA and the Curtis Institute.

Kenn currently serves as associate concertmaster of the Bellingham Music Festival. A graduate of Indiana University, he trained with Joseph Gingold.



Catherine Lynn, viola "Cathy" joined the KSU faculty in 2004. She is Assistant Principal Viola with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. An active chamber musician, Ms. Lynn plays with the Atlanta Chamber Players and the KSU Faculty StringTrio. Ms. Lynn has performed as soloist with the KSU and Georgia Youth Symphony Orchestras and is a coach for the Atlanta Symphony Youth Orchestra. Prior to coming to Atlanta, Cathy was Principal Viola of the Flint Symphony Orchestra in Michigan and a member of the Rosseels String Quartet in residence at the University of Michigan.

Ms. Lynn received her Bachelor of Music from the University of Alabama under the instruction of Patrick Rafferty, and completed her Master of Music and Doctorate of Musical Arts degrees at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor where she studied with Yizhak Schotten and Andrew Jennings. During the summer, she coaches chamber music at the Icicle Creek Music Festival in Leavenworth, Washington, and the local Franklin Pond Chamber Music Festival.



Charae Krueger, cello is principal cellist for the Atlanta Opera Orchestra and the Atlanta Ballet Orchestra. At Kennesaw State University, she is Artist-in-Residence and Lecturer of Cello and performs with the Summit Piano Trio and KSU Faculty String Trio, as well as the Peachtree String Quartet.

Ms. Krueger enjoys chamber music and solo recital work and plays throughout the Southeastern U.S. She is a regular featured artist at The Highlands-Cashiers

Chamber Music Festival in North Carolina, the Grand Teton Music Festival in Wyoming, and the North Georgia Chamber Music Festival. Her solo and chamber music recitals have often been featured on *WABE* radio Atlanta.

Ms. Krueger received her early cello training in Canada at the Regina Conservatory of Music. She went on to study at Brandon University and received her Bachelor of Music performance degree from New England Conservatory in Boston. She also holds an artist diploma from the Longy School of Music in Cambridge, MA.



Robert Henry, **piano** hailed as a "consummate artist -- brilliant, formidable, effortless, and the epitome of control and poise," is an internationally distinguished pianist, performing throughout the world as orchestral soloist, recitalist, and chamber musician. Since winning first prize in four international piano competitions, he has presented solo debuts at Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, and Wigmore Hall. In 2016, he released his third critically acclaimed recording, *As the Songbird Sings: Music of Schubert and Brahms*.

Mr. Henry earned the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Maryland, with additional studies at the Cleveland Institute of Music and the Glinka Conservatory in St. Petersburg, Russia. He is an MTNA Nationally Certified educator and has lectured and performed at universities, conservatories, and festivals worldwide. He has served as recitalist, clinician, and juror for state, regional, and national MTNA conventions and competitions. Robert has been featured in *American Music Teacher, Clavier*, and *Gramophone*.

Mr. Henry is a founding member of the Summit Piano Trio. He is Artistic Director of the Great Performances Concert Series in Highlands, NC, Interim Director of the Atlanta Boy Choir, and Music Director and Organist/ Choirmaster of the Episcopal Church of the Incarnation in Highlands, NC. An International Steinway Artist, Mr. Henry maintains his web-presence at *www.roberthenry.org.*

In 2019, Mr. Henry will present his lecture, "Practicing Like a Pro" at the MTNA National Convention. Mr. Henry is Assistant Professor of Piano and Coordinator of the Piano Department at Kennesaw State University. Mr. Henry is represented by Parker Artists, New York.
