Ben Champion was seduced by music almost from birth. As a toddler he was mesmerized whenever music of any genre was within earshot. As a youth he became fairly proficient as a pianist, then a drummer/percussionist, and later a pop guitarist. In midlife he turned his ear and heart toward composition. Now retired from teaching and performing, he has decided to re-enter the academic environment to further hone his compositional flair. When asked why he chose a career in music he said, "I didn't choose music. Music chose me."

Nicholas A. Felder began composing music at the age of sixteen. Premiered at his graduation ceremony at the Verizon Wireless Amphitheater, Felder wrote "A War for Peace," his first work for large orchestra. He has won numerous competitions including 3rd place in the 2014 Georgia PTA Reflections Contest, 1st place in the 2016 Kennesaw State University Music Composition Contest and was a finalist for the 2017 ASCAP Morton Gould Award, as well as a top ten finalist for the 2018 Juventas New Music Ensemble Call for Scores. Felder enjoys exploring new genres and styles to write for, more recently experimenting with musical theatre, Argentinian Tango and African tribal music.

Felder is currently fulfilling a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Music Composition at Kennesaw State University. He studies with Composer-in-Residence, Dr. Laurence Sherr.

Matthias Kosse is a sophomore composition major at Kennesaw State University. His primary instrument is the piano, although he also has experience playing the violin and clarinet. He plans to become a composer for films, television, and video games when he graduates. He became interested in soundtracks around the age of 8 when he became obsessed with the soundtrack for "Star Wars: Revenge of the Sith." Since then he has become more experienced with the piano and learning soundtracks on the piano from ear, eventually starting to compose music himself. This is the first performance of an original composition of his.

Yazmeen Mayes is a freshman at Kennesaw State University. She attended high school in Loganville, Georgia, and is now pursuing her degree in composition. Though Yazmeen comes from a choral background, this program has introduced her to the vast world of instruments. Nolan Rodack was born in Chicago, IL, and raised in Marietta, Georgia. Nolan was blessed with growing up in a musical family of three older brothers, a mom and a dad. He studied percussion for eight years, middle school through his first year of study at Auburn University, and currently plays double bass for the Kennesaw State University Symphony Orchestra. Nolan's primary instrument is the tenor ukulele, which he studied for eight years. At Auburn University, he co-founded the Auburn University United Ukulele Collaboration where he held the title of President, and taught others ukulele to varying degrees. Currently, Nolan is studying music composition at Kennesaw State University.

Brianna Spottsville, "I started my journey to becoming a music major when I was in 6th grade after I begged my parents to let me play the violin after seeing a group called Nutin' But Stringz on TV. I played the violin for six years and have been playing viola for the past three years. I fell in love with music composition when I was a freshman in high school. I wrote my first piece titled "A Passing Tornado" for strings in just one night. I entered that piece in the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Composition Competition and, much to my disbelief, I received 4th place. After that experience, I knew that composition was something that I wanted/needed to keep doing, which brings me to now as a 2nd year composition major."
