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

### **Curriculum Design Committee**

Minutes of the November 11, 1997 Meeting

The meeting began at 8:45 A.M.

**Minutes**. Minutes from the October 28 and November 4 meetings were approved with minor revisions.

**Input on Curriculum Design**. The chair distributed responses he had received to the CDC's campus-wide solicitation for reactions to the current curriculum and ideas for the new curriculum. CDC members were asked to read these responses for next week's meeting.

**Roundtables**. CDC members were reminded of the need to be in touch with their assigned liaisons so that departments and groups would know to send representatives to relevant roundtables.

CDC members coordinating the first two roundtables informed the committee of the questions that will be addressed by presenters at those sessions.

Committee members discussed topics for other roundtables. The next two will be on "Co-Curricular Programs" (December 2) and "Communication and Interpersonal Skills" (December 9). The committee identified individuals from around campus who would be invited to prepare presentations, although again all members of the community would be welcome to attend and participate. A CDC member will serve as coordinator for each roundtable. The coordinator will work with the team of other CDC members who will be attending the roundtable to develop a list of discussion questions. The coordinator will write to potential presenters to ask them to prepare to address the questions.

A number of additional potential roundtable topics were discussed, but no final decisions were made. These roundtables would not be held until January. Committee members expressed a desire to designate roundtable topics so that members of every academic department on campus would find at least one roundtable to be of particular relevance for their department.

**Meeting Schedule**. The CDC tentatively scheduled a half-day committee meeting over the Winter break (January 5, 9AM-1PM). We will need to schedule meetings for the coming semester, so committee members are asked to bring their calendars and Spring course schedules to the next meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:20AM.

### Group Study Exchange

#### An International Exchange Program for Young Professionals

Applications are being received this month for a cultural exchange sponsored by Rotary district 7450 with **Morocco next May 10 - June 7th**. La Salle faculty and staff are eligible. Some knowledge of French is required. Information for completing the application can be obtained on campus from Tom McCarthy, ext. 1276; 215-884-9925.

### What is Group Study Exchange?

The Group Study Exchange Program of The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International is an educational program that promotes international understanding through organized travel and personal contact. The program provides travel grants for teams of young professional men and women to exchange visits between paired areas in different countries. For four to six weeks, team members study the host country's institutions and ways of life, observe their own professions as practiced abroad, develop personal and professional relationships, and exchange ideas.

### Why should I participate?

Individuals who participate in this valuable, once-in-a-lifetime experience will return home, not only with new perspectives and an enlarged vision, but with fresh ideas and an understanding of a

nation's culture, commerce and government that can be invaluable to a country's, and a company's, future. A Group Study Exchange offers the most unique and rewarding skills-building opportunity and personal growth experience available to young professionals as humanity steps forward to face the challenges of the 21st century. "Probably the most nervous part of our trip was just before going into a host family's home . . . Could they speak English? Could I speak enough Japanese? Would they like me? Would they like me? Would I like them? How would I be treated? But as it turned out, all of my host families treated me like royalty."

### Who is eligible?

A GSE team consists of four non-Rotarian business or professional people and a Rotarian team leader. Applicants must:

- be committed to remaining in the work force well after the exchange;
- be in the early stages of their careers or professions;
- reside in or be employed in the sending Rotary district and also be citizens of the country in which they reside;
- be proficient in the language of the country being visited;
- be personable, articulate, cooperative, exemplary in their work, and enthusiastic about their vocations; and
- seek to gain a maximum educational value from the program, as well as be able to fulfill the rigorous demands of international travel and active participation in an extensive itinerary.

Note: Spouses may not accompany teams. In addition, the following are ineligible: a Rotarian; an employee of a Rotary club, district, other Rotary entity, or Rotary International; any Rotarian's or Rotary employee's spouse, ancestor (parent or grandparent by blood), lineal descendant (child or grandchild by blood and any legally adopted child); or a spouse of a lineal descendant.

### What is provided?

For each team member, The Rotary Foundation provides the most economical round-trip air ticket between the home and host countries. Local Rotarians in the host area provide for meals, lodging and group travel in their district. Each team member is responsible for all personal and incidental expenses incurred before, during and after the study tour.

### What is required of me?

#### *Before* leaving:

Participate in any orientation sessions or group meetings and obtain the necessary documents for traveling.

#### *During* the tour:

- accept the decisions of the Rotarian team leader;
- fulfill any requirements to speak at host district gatherings;
- remain with the group throughout the study tour except when individual activities are planned; and
- maintain standards of behavior which will reflect positively on Rotary and the home country.

#### After returning:

- prepare and submit final reports of the tour as required by the sponsoring district and The Rotary Foundation; and
- speak about your study tour experiences to Rotary clubs and other groups.

### How do I apply?

Contact your local Rotary club. They can provide additional information about application materials, procedures and deadlines. Applications must be made through local Rotary clubs; those sent directly to The Rotary Foundation will not be considered.

### What is Rotary?

Rotary is an international association of business and professional leaders who provide humanitarian service, promote high ethical standards in all vocations, and help build goodwill and peace in the world. With 1.2 million mem-

bers and 28,000 clubs, Rotarians initiate community projects that focus on the most serious issues confronting people around the world: violence, drug abuse, AIDS, hunger, the environment, illiteracy, and the eradication of polio.

BRANCH OUT 97 Dan Rhoton and Lew Clark

Students and youth are apathetic. Today's voters do not care a thing for politics or voting. Most of the people in most communities are more concerned with earning and spending their daily pay than with helping others make their community better.

We at La Salle University discovered something very different. On October 4, 1997, the students of La Salle University organized the second annual "Branch Out Day," a day in which La Salle students, faculty, staff and administrators join with the surrounding community to spend a day working and celebrating together.

We discovered that neither La Salle's students, nor its staff, nor the community surrounding La Salle fits the description that most would give them. We expected approximately 500 members of the La Salle community. Instead, we received almost 1,000 applications. We planned to work at approximately 20 sites throughout North Philadelphia. Instead, we ended up working at over 30 sites all over the city, and even a Christian Brothers school in Camden. We painted over graffiti, played with children, cleaned-up blocks, cleared parks, served the homeless, and generated a lot of laughter, sweat, and smiles.

We hoped that a fraction of the La Salle community would join with the community in a day of service. Almost one-third of the entire La Salle community did so.

Altogether, it was an amazing day, one that refuted every claim to student, youth, adult, or citizen apathy. And all we did was ask.

We asked the President of the University. We asked the students of the University. We asked the surrounding community what they needed to be done. And they all came. In fact, even people we didn't ask came (although they were certainly welcome); the children of the faculty, staff, and other workers at Branch Out day came to work and play with us. We didn't have to beg, plead, or cajole anyone to come to Branch Out Day and improve our community. We simply had to tell them that they were needed.

Why did Branch Out happen? Branch Out is at the core of what we are at La Salle, and service to the community has been part of the Christian Brothers' tradition since the order's inception. More importantly, however, Branch Out happened not because of La Salle or by La Salle. Branch Out happened because La Salle worked with the community, not for or against it. Branch Out happened because we at La Salle bothered to ask -- to ask what was needed, what was wanted, and who was available to help. When we bothered to ask questions, we got answers. When we bothered to ask for help, we got helpers. As soon as we at La Salle started working with the community rather than for the community, Branch Out day became an unprecedented success.

Next time you wonder where all those apathetic students, community members, and citizens are, perhaps you should also wonder one other thing: did you remember to ask?

#### LA SALLE STUDENT EARNS RECOGNITION


Senior Secondary Education/English major Dan Rhoton has recently been in the news. Dan was selected as a national finalist for the Campus Compact Howard R. Swearer Award. This award is recognized as one of the most prestigious awards given to college and university students involved in community outreach efforts.

Dan was also nominated for and won the Pennsylvania Campus Compact Award for Exemplary Volunteer Service. Dan was presented with this award at a ceremony in Harrisburg, PA, in October.

Dan is remembered in many ways at La Salle as he has been an active member of our community over the past four academic years. He has been a Resident Assistant; writer for the *Collegian*; a Writing Fellow, as well as a student Service Coordinator of Second Start, Philadelphia Futures, and Project Appalachia. He has also been an active member of the Chile Service Project, LOCK and FOCUS.

However, Dan has also been an active participant in the larger Philadelphia arena. He was chosen by the Points of Light Foundation to be a delegate to the President's Summit last year, and has been chosen by his neighbors in South Philadelphia to represent them at the Philadelphia Educational Summit. He has also successfully started two 501 (c)3 organizations which reach out to children and youth in Philadelphia.

#### **AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAMS FLOURISH**

The Neighborhood Tutoring Project has gotten off to an incredible start this year. 125 children are tutored twice per week by over 70 La Salle tutors. Most of the children are from this immediate area; some, however, take three or four buses to get here. La Salle students have been the real impetus behind the growth and effectiveness of this program.

The La Salle tutors participated in an extensive two week training program in which they were oriented on a number of issues. These included: diversity; tutoring techniques; math skills; relating to children; and the like. One child who takes three buses to arrive, had been having real problems with math, which was having an effect on her emotional wellbeing. We recently received a call from this child's mother who informed us that her daughter's math grade has gone up a few letter grades. The mother also said that she thought that the tutor had good morals and was serving as a positive role model for her daughter.

In another case, a La Salle tutor has been working with a small child to help him control his anger., This child was acting out a lot and turning to violence. Aside from tutoring the child, the La Salle tutor helps him think of constructive ways to deal with anger and conflict.

Tutors report that the children are becoming excited about learning. Some children come prepared to be tutored with ideas about what and how they want to learn.

The students are mostly in grammar and middle school, however, there are a few high school students. One student, coming on three buses, decided to quit playing football after his coach refused to allow him a more flexible practice schedule, so that he could continue in the tutoring program.

The high level of commitment of the La Salle tutors has been exemplary. Most tutor on a daily basis and go beyond the call of duty by preparing flash cards, doing library research, and socializing with the children on weekends. ### RE: Standard (formerly third class) Mailings - Reminder

Postal regulations require pre-payment for Standard mailings. Anyone planning a standard mailing should notify the Mailroom Supervisor at least two weeks prior to the date that you estimate your mailing will arrive at the Post Office. Quite often our customers incorrectly perceive that unlimited funds are available in postage accounts. In reality, funds are deposited to postal accounts only after we are notified that you will need them.

After being notified, the Mailroom Supervisor will issue a PS 3602N form to you. This form must accompany your mailing to the Post Office and is your authorization to deduct the amount of postage needed to cover the cost of your mailing.

The authorization can be obtained by submitting a completed Postage Requisition (two weeks in advance) to the Mailroom Supervisor stating the # of pieces, weight of each piece, date of the mailing and a sample of the mail piece.

Some departments send a list of mailings that they are planning to do at the beginning of each semester. This works well for them and keeps the Mailroom informed of how much business will be required. If this is something that you could do, we will be glad to work with you in order to avoid any problems and/or delays with your standard mailings.

The Mailroom Services Department will assist you with any questions you may have regarding standard mail or any other type/class of mail. For further information contact Sam Pino at X1039.

#### Making Links Beyond the Classroom Walls



I write to ask for your help.

When the Academic Calendar for 1997-98 was drafted, the due date for Fall Semester grades was set for January 2, 1998. After that date was established, the University published the staff holiday schedule and included January 2 in the Christmas holiday. This meant that the grades due date had to be moved to January 5, 1998.

The Registrar has pointed out that this creates a significant problem in getting grade reports to students in a timely manner. For some students, this can cause problems in registering for the Spring Semester (in-person registration starts on January 5). For other students, for example those whose employer tuition reimbursement depends on receipt of a grade report, our schedule may cause more than a minor inconvenience. More broadly, we do have an obligation to report grades to students as promptly as careful consideration of their work allows.

I have discussed this matter with the Council of Deans and the Executive Committee of the Faculty Senate. They have concurred in this request for your assistance in trying to minimize the time required to get reports sent to our students. Accordingly, I am asking that, wherever possible, you turn in final grade reports on Monday, December 22, 1997. If you cannot be on campus that day but have access to a fax machine, you can send your grade reports to the Registrar's Office at (215) 951-1785.

If you cannot complete grades by December 22, but can complete them anytime before January 5, you can still help by faxing them to the Registrar's Office or bringing them to the Campus Mail Room whenever they are ready. Your ID card will allow you access to the Mail Room lobby where you can put your reports in the campus mail slot.

This is an unusual and unexpected set of circumstances in our calendar. We will be alert to avoid this kind of problem in the future. In the meantime, we will appreciate any help you can give in providing timely grade reports for our students.

I am writing to let you know about La Salle's recent entry into the world of the Model United Nations (MUN) and to ask you to encourage your students to consider joining us for our next competition. We are holding an informational meeting on **Thursday, December 11, 1997, at 12:30 pm (universal free period), in Olney 228 (the Economics Department lounge)**. Please feel free to join us yourself, as well, at this meeting to learn more about MUN and to meet our students who competed recently.

As its name implies, MUN is a simulation of the United Nations. It is a worldwide system of conferences, mostly in the U.S. but also in other countries, where students represent nations and diplomats in debating current global issues over the course of a day or a few days. The 31<sup>st</sup> annual University of Pennsylvania Model United Nations Conference (UPMUNC) was held November 20 to 23. UPMUNC is the world's largest collegiate conference in the fall semester, with nearly 60 colleges and universities from across the U.S. and Canada (including schools like Harvard, MIT, and the University of California at Berkeley). We were proud to be among them for the first time, with support from our Student Activities Funding Board.

Depending on the number of delegates a school sends (a few send more than 50), schools are assigned a country or countries to represent and individual delegates are assigned to committees. To prepare for the conference, students do research on the country they are representing and write position papers on the two or three issues before their respective committees. Awards are given for outstanding delegates and delegations. The experience does wonders for students – helping them develop their critical thinking, communication, and interpersonal skills, their base of knowledge, enthusiasm for learning, etc.

Our team represented Uzbekistan (considered the leader among the five former Soviet Central Asian republics!) and was comprised of four students: Richard Fumey, Annie Hounsokou, Marc Santugini-Repiquet, and Dave Stanoch (lead delegate). We owe a special word of thanks and congratulations to Dave. Having participated in MUN in high school – and earning national recognition – Dave took the initiative to come to us about La Salle getting involved with MUN. He is also to be commended for earning at Penn's MUN one of several second place awards for his leadership and accurate representation of national policy on his committee. We are very proud of Dave and all our team members. They hope to enter a competition once each semester and hope more students will join them.
