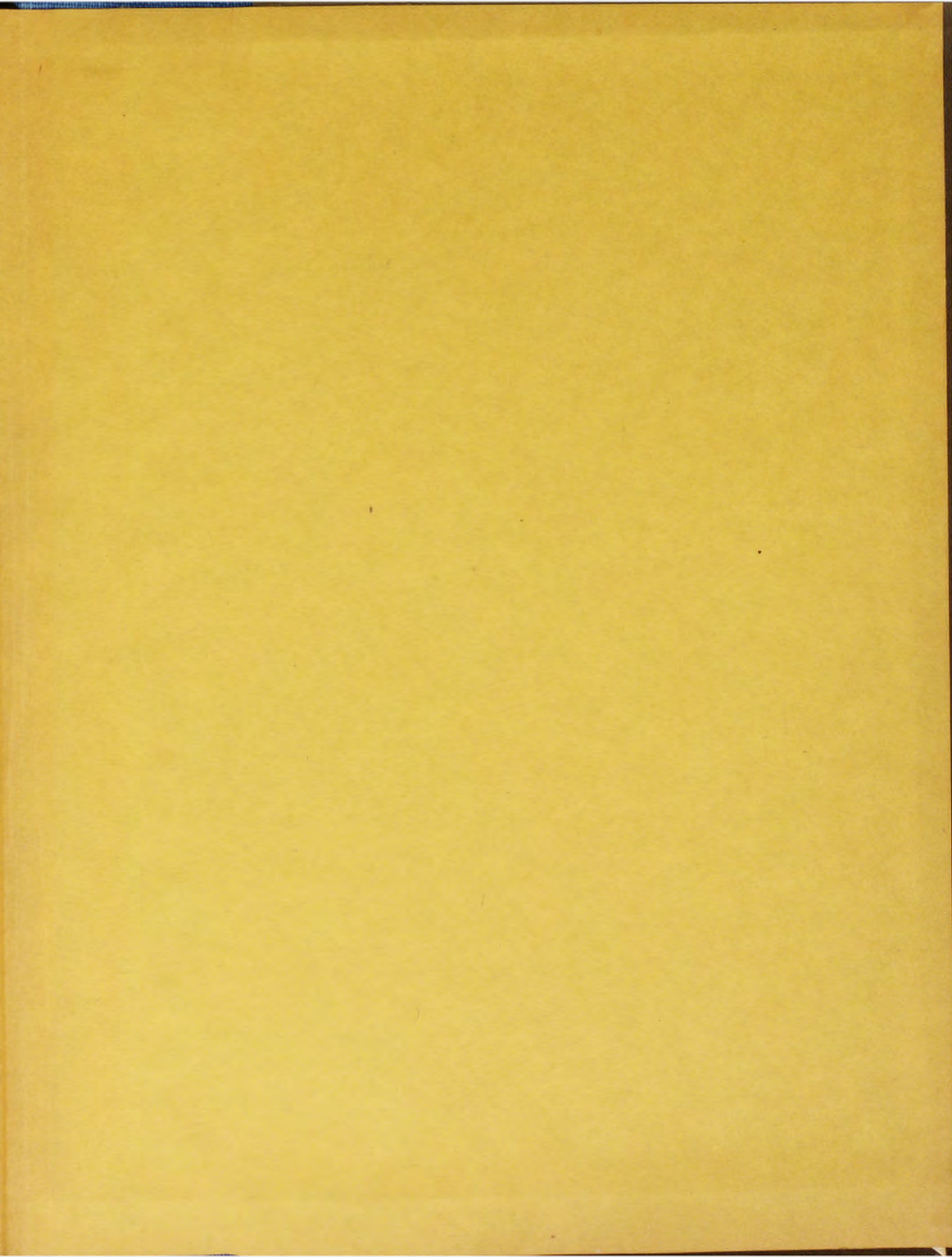

Autumn signals the flurry of registration and the renewed vitality of the clubs. King Football holds sway, and all eyes are turned on the Blue Streaks.



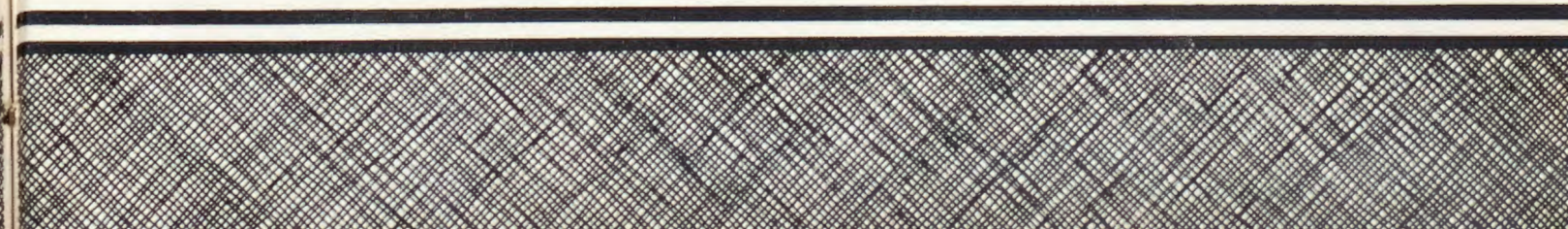
spring...

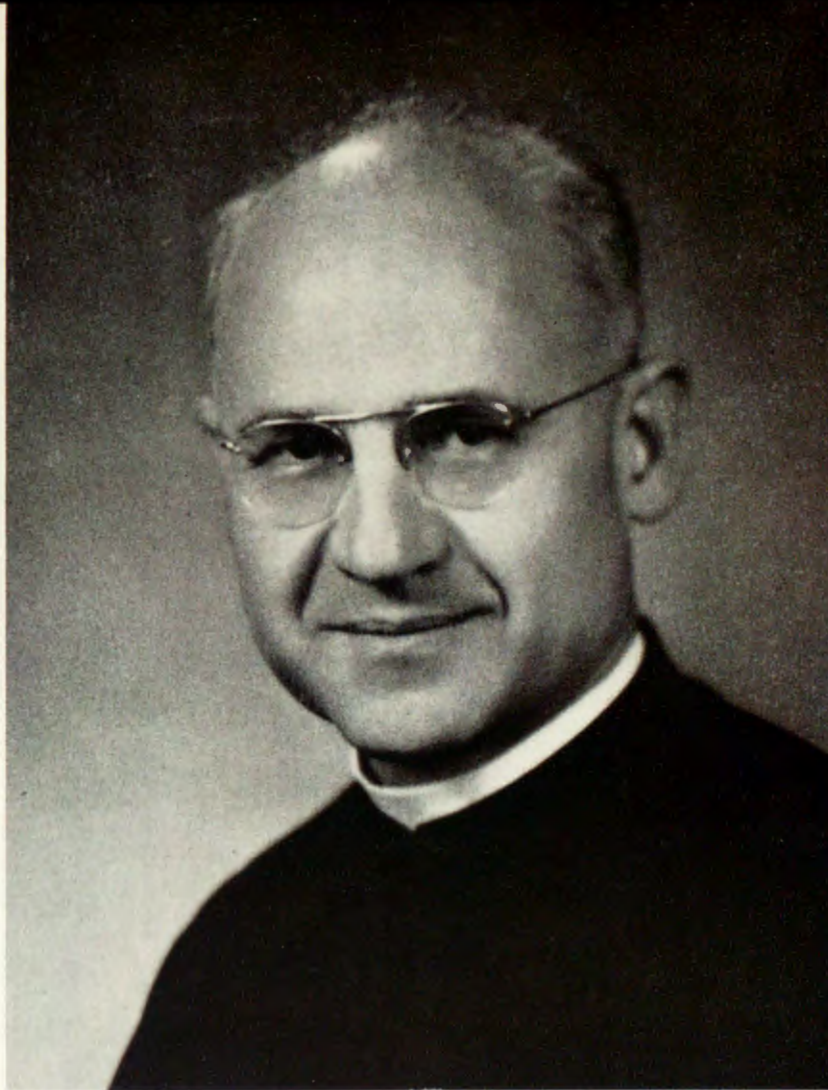

Dr. Graham's death on May 2, concluded 22 years of loyal service to John Carroll. His astute scholarship and unselfish devotion are now part of our University's heritage. May he rest in peace.



During his career at John Carroll University, Hugh B. Graham, A.M., Ph.D., Professor Emeritus of Education, has gained an esteemed position in the Carroll community. His professional colleagues entertain a deep respect for his thorough scholarship, while his former students gratefully recall his abiding concern for their welfare and rights.

Born in County Down, Ireland, Dr. Graham journeyed to Canada in 1916 and eventually settled in the United States. He studied at De LaSalle College, the Royal University, and Queen's University in Ireland and at the University of Chicago and the University of Minnesota in this country.

After his arrival at Carroll in 1930, Dr. Graham served as professor of education, director of the department of education, and director of teaching training. Despite his retirement from professorial duties last year, he still supervises teacher training at the University. That Dr. Graham has been responsible for the professional preparation of more than six hundred secondary school teachers attests not only to his academic skill, but also to his deft handling of human personality.

In addition to holding membership in several professional societies, Dr. Graham has contributed numerous articles to educational, historical and religious periodicals. The author of two volumes on Irish history, he is currently preparing two new books for publication.

Dr. Graham's success in the teaching profession reflects his scholarship, character, and service to school and student. In recognition, therefore, of these qualities, we dedicate the 1952 Carillon to the Irish scholar who has already become a legendary figure at John Carroll.

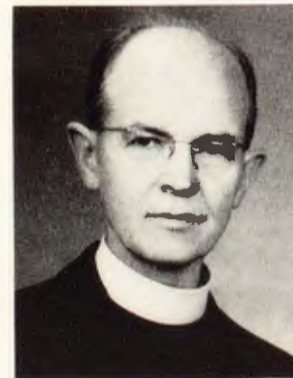

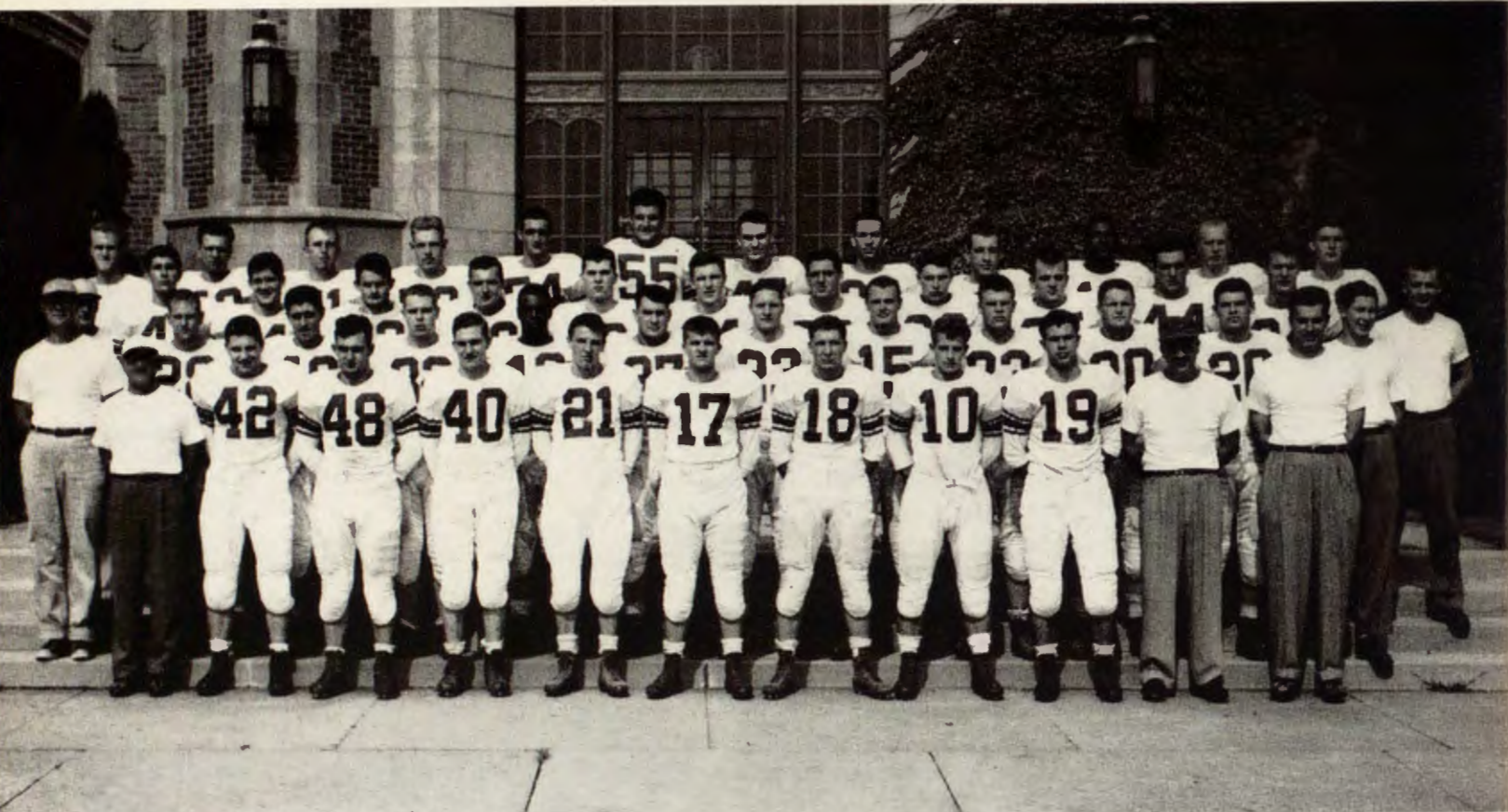

Although their 1951 gridiron record was not impressive, the Blue Streaks, under Head Coach Herb Eisele and his assistants, Bill Belanich, Fred George, and Dan Mormile, showed true championship form in their victories over local foes and thus captured the district crown.

The Streaks began the season with a resounding 24-0 victory over St. Francis College on September 22 at Shaw Stadium. Burrell Shields provided the first-half punch with two touchdowns. In the third period Paul Brubeck scored on an end run, and in the final stanza Paul Schmidt crashed over from the one to close the scoring.

Three costly fumbles plus a sputtering attack led to a 10-6 loss to Youngstown on September 27 at Rayen Stadium in Youngstown. Carroll's lone score came in the third quarter on a 15-yard sprint by Ron Kaminski.

The Streaks next lost 26-12 to Toledo on October 6 in the Glass Bowl. In the closing minutes of the game, Kaminski scored from the three, and Shields skirted right end for the final tally.

Carroll's third straight defeat was administered by St. Bonaventure 20-13 at Shaw Stadium on October 12. Chuck McMillan scooped up a pass in the end zone for the Streaks' first score. The Carroll squad tallied again in the second half on an 18-yard aerial from Tony Ferrante to Joe Minor.

In the Case game at Shaw Stadium on October 20, the Streak eleven clinched a 7-6 victory. After pass interference was ruled against Case on its own eleven, Brubeck swept to pay dirt. George Lyman's conversion proved the winning margin in the struggle.

The following week saw the Streaks meet the Quantico Marines at Cleveland Municipal Stadium in the climax of a three-day civic celebration. The powerful Marine squad gained a 35-15 victory over the stunned Streaks. Sparked by Joe Amata's passing, the Eiseleites came to life in the second half. Shields snared an Amata aerial in the end zone, and Foster Rapier pulled in a Marine lateral and raced over the goal line. John Byrne dumped a Marine back behind the Quantico goal line for a safety.

In the following two contests, Dayton and Xavier, two of the top Ohio elevens, overpowered the floundering Streaks, who succumbed 36-0 and 41-0 to the Flyers and Musketeers respectively.

Undaunted by a week's postponement and a snowy Shaw Stadium field, the Streaks entered their final game against Baldwin-Wallace determined to capture their second straight district title. Early in the first period, Minor snagged a 55-yard touchdown pass from Ferrante. A few plays later, Dick Zoller intercepted a Yellow Jacket pass and scored. Amata's conversion and two safeties by Byrne completed the 17-7 rout.

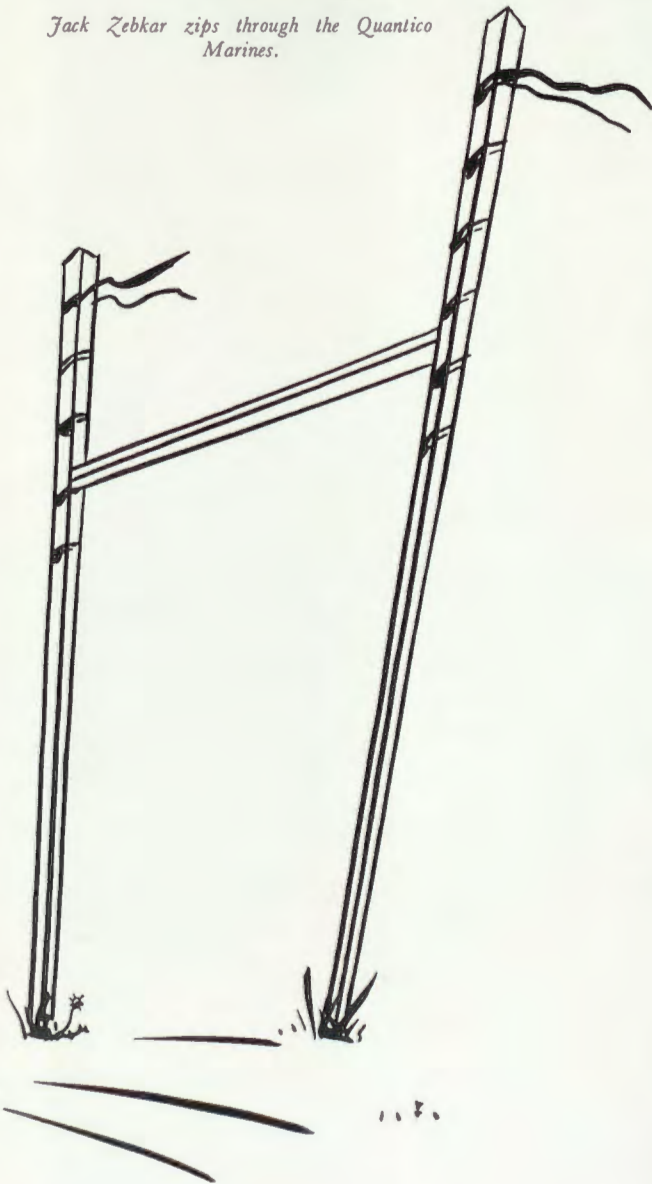

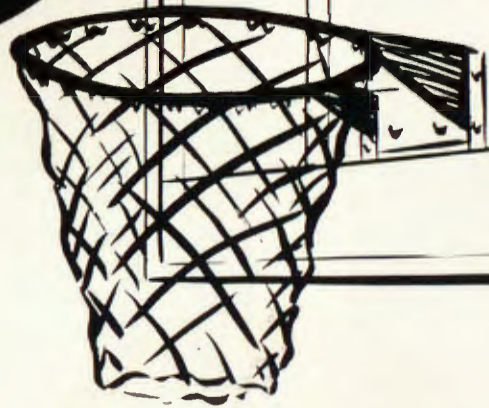

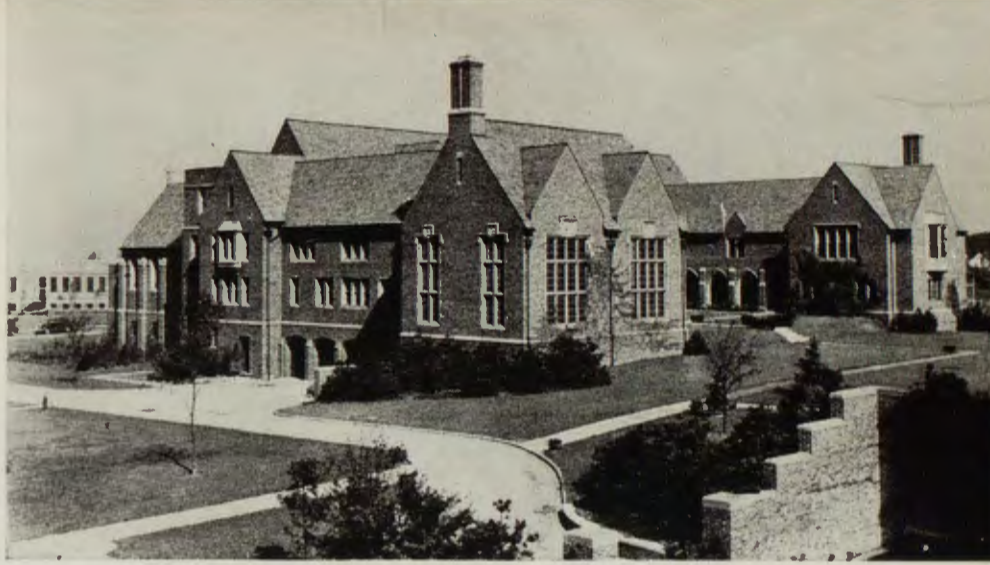

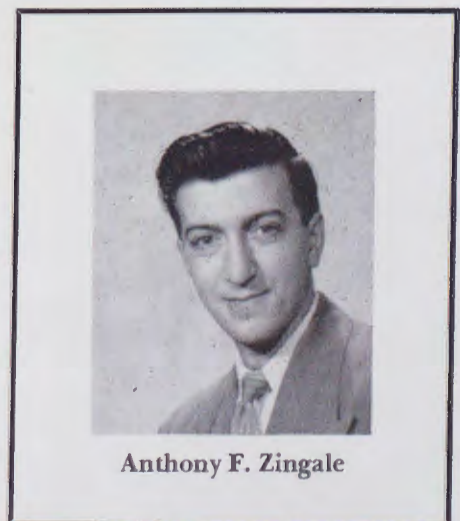

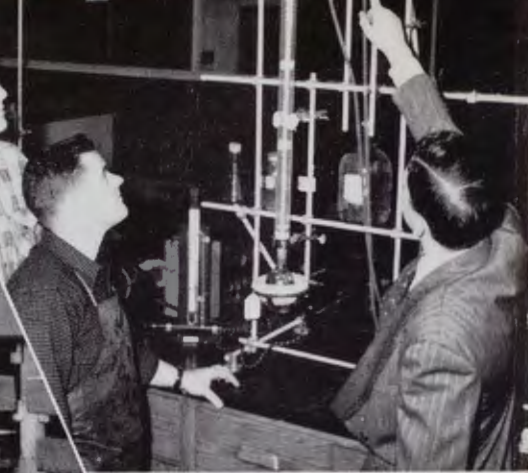

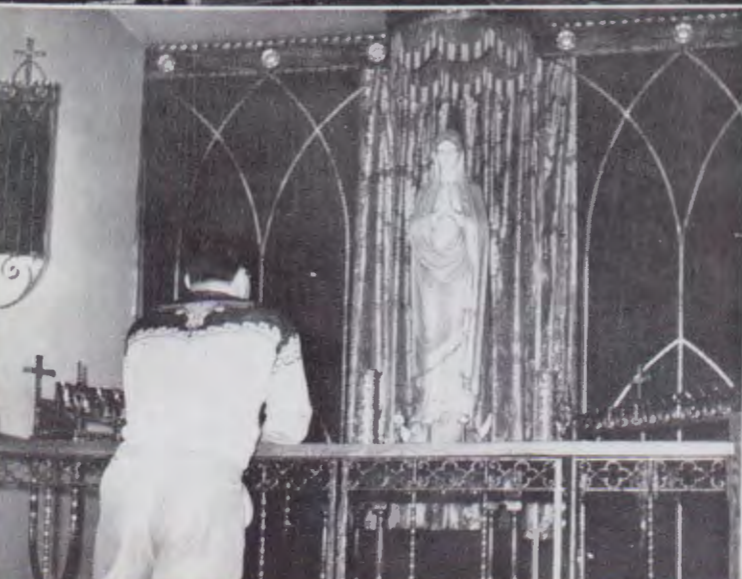
