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
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The 1968 Contemporary Music Festival is another first for the Marshall University Music Department. Because of the new facilities available in the Evelyn Hollberg Smith Music Hall, the Marshall Music Department is able to offer an expanded program of concerts. workshops, and lectures to students and faculty of Marshall and the residents of the surrounding area. Since the education of musicianteachers includes performing and understanding all musical styles and media, concerts by various ensembles are regularly featured. Among these ensembles are the Symphonic Choir, Madrigal Singers, Opera Workshop, Symphonic Band, Faculty Woodwind Quintet and Faculty Baroque Ensemble. However, since we are all products of our own time, the faculty and students of Marshall feel that each of us needs significant involvement and exposure to the music of our times. It is to these ends, the broadening of our perspectives and the deeper understanding of our musical environment, that this 1968 Contemporary Music Festival is dedicated. We hope that the experiences provided by the festival will be of such value to all participants that similar festivals may be planned in the future.

"The Composer in Contemporary American Society"

Karl Kroeger, guest composer

Karl Kroeger, a recipient of a Ford Foundation grant as composerin-residence for the Eugene, Oregon, Public Schools 1964-66, is currently an Assistant professor of Music at Ohio University. Mr. Kroeger has been a teacher in the Nelsom County, Kentucky Public Schools and the Head of the American Music Collection of the New York Public Library. He holds a Master of Music degree in composition and theory from the University of Louisville and the Master of Science degree in Librarianship from the University of Illinois. In addition to the Ford grant, he has won prizes in the Rheta Soslund String Quartet Contest, the University of Kentucky Centennial Composition Contest, and the Willamette University Composition Contest. He was also awarded a fellowship to the MacDowell Colony in 1966 and 1967, and was the first Ford Foundation composer to be hired to remain in the cooperating school system. He has had compositions performed by the Louisville Orchestra, Oklahoma City Symphony, University of Oregon Symphony, Northwestern University Orchestra and the Walden String Quartet among others. His works are published by Tritone Press, Lawson-Gould, and Alexander Broude. Mr. Kroeger's compositions include Dies Sanctificatus, Toccata for clarinet, trombone, and percussion, as well as many works for piano, various ensembles, and orchestra.

The Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Composition Contest

For the first time Zeta Eta Chapter of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, National Music Honorary, is sponsoring a student composition contest. The chapter, by providing performances of the better works submitted and, in addition, a fifty dollar prize to the outstanding composition, is hoping to stimulate interest among the Marshall Students who have the ability to do creative writing in music. The student compositions submitted for consideration were initially screened by a committee of faculty and student members of Phi Mu Alpha and the six finalist pieces are to be performed by student ensembles on The American Music Concert of The Contemporary Music Festival. The first prize winner will be selected by Karl Kroeger, guest composer, and announced at the close of the American Music Concert.
