### SUMMER SCHOOL

TRINITY COLLEGE offers the following courses for its summer school of 1947. Credit is given for these courses—toward a Bachelor's Degree for all—and toward a Master's Degree for some. Although Trinity College does not award the Bachelor's Degree to women, all summer school classes are open to both men and women, and credit can be transferred to other colleges awarding such a degree.

All classes will be held at the indicated hours in classrooms and laboratories on the campus. These buildings are fairly cool even on hottest days.

The summer school of 1947 is divisible into two 5-week periods. One is from June 23 to July 26 and the other is from July 28 to August 30. Some courses extend over the ten weeks and are not divisible. Many courses offer credit for just one period and are followed or preceded by other courses, so that a student may secure credit for either 5-week's period separately if he so desires. All morning courses meet six days a week.

### REGISTRATION

Registration blanks will be sent on request. A student may register in any four half-courses (or in two full courses) for which he is qualified. Not more than one laboratory course may be taken. An additional half-course may be entered with the permission of the Director of the Summer School. Early registration is desirable.

The tuition is at the rate of \$15.00 per semester hour. A small laboratory fee will be charged in laboratory courses. Tuition should be paid in full by June 23. Earlier payment is desired.

#### DORMITORIES

A number of dormitory rooms are available for all young men in attendance at the summer school. Young women will have to live off-campus. Communications concerning dormitory rooms should be addressed to the Comptroller.
