## FRESHMEN WIN.

## Annual Bulletin Board Rush Awarded to 1913.

## Whole College Marches Down Town.

The annual Bulletin Board Rush, which was formerly held in the afternoon was this year held in the evening and the freshman class was victorious, Two fires were built on either side of the Bulletin Board and with the lights from the surrounding rooms afforded illumination enough.
At a few minutes before $6: 30$ o'clock the sophomores packed themselves in front of the Bulletin Board while the freshmen assembled about twenty-five yards away on the campus. At the signal given by Captain Henshaw of the football team the freshmen started at the other class. Just before they reached the walk, four sophomores, two on each end of a rope, ran out and impeded the progress of the rushers somewhat. But the numbers of the freshman class were too much for those of the sophomores and after a struggle of less than a minute, McCreary ' 13 touched the board and was immediately followed by two other members of his class. After this several informal rushes between the two lower classes were held in which the freshmen scored a decided victory.
The sophomores' forces were lead by George T. Bates, the class president, while J. E. McCreary was in charge of the freshmen.

After the rushes the undergraductes assembled on the campus and sang Trinity songs and other campus "harmony."
At 7:15 the drum corps provided by the freshmen appeared and the students formed in lines of four, headed by the seniors. The procession proceeded to the President's house where Doctor and Mrs. Luther were cheered. At the cry of "speech," the President made a brief address of welcome. Professors Gettell and Flynn were also given "Trins" at their respective homes. At the State Capitol the entire college body assembled under the south arch and "My Country 'This of Thee" and "'Neath the Elms" were sung. This last is a custom which has been followed since the days when Trinity was located where the present capitol is.
From the capitol the procession marched up Asylum street where the students did the "serpentine dance." At City Hall Park the students circled about until weary, when all proceeded to Gesmania Hall, where the freshmen offered entertainment for about an hour.

## MEETING OF COLLEGE BODY.

An Enthusiastic Demonstration.

A meeting of the undergraduates was held in Alumni Hall last evening for two purposes, the first of which was to arouse enthasiasm over the coming football season, the second was to hear the annual report of the graduate treasurer of the Athletic Association for the past fiscal year. This report will be found in another column of this issue. Though while the number of undergraduates present was not as large as could be wished, still a good deal of enthusiasm was shown by those who did get there.

President George C. Capen of the Senate presided. The first speaker was Captain Henshaw of the football team, who stated that while many new men would probably play on the team, Trinity should be represented by a strong aggregation this fall on the gridiron. He also said that whoever did make the team would have to have the spirit and will to play their hardest, but suppor. was also needed from the indergraduates. The way to get that spirit was to come out every day and watch practice, but not get in the way of the players, and also to be on the stands, and cheer at every game.
L. A. Stansfield ' 10 , cheer leader, also spoke on the need of better cheering and singing at the games. Last year the cheering was only fair and this year every effort will be made to increase it both in volume and quality.

Professor and Coach Gettell was the next speaker. He said that at present it was impossible to tell how much we would beat Wesleyan or any other team. He urged that the undergraduates should not expect too much of the men at first, as the crude material which would have to be used in the vacancies caused by the graduation of some of the members of last year's team, would not be able to develope the best of team work in the early weeks of the season. What was needed was the right kind of spirit which Trinity is fast getting. Coach Getteil also said that men who had been playing on the scrub should not be discouraged if they don't get into the game on Saturday, but to keep on coming out and thus help perfect a winning 'varsity. A coach will be provided as soon as possible to coach the second eleven.
Mr. John F. Forward read his report next and urged that the men get together and subscribe a sufficient sum to meet the indebtedness as soon as possible. Mr. Forward remarked that he hoped it would not be long before the Athletic Association need not show a deficit at the end of each year. In order to do this it will be necessary to have at least ninety per cent of the undergraduates as members of the association.
C. B. Judge '10 spoke on the need
of every man helping to support the Athletic Association financially.
R. L. Wright ' 10 was the next speaker along the financial lines of atheltics. He said it was every man's duty to pay the five dollars for the terms dues inmediately and not wai until just before the elections, as has often been customary. Wright said it would in nearly all cases be necessary to sustain from some other things in order to subscribe to the association, but it was up to the men to do this and do it at once.
G. C. Capen '10, the association's president, said at present about forty men had joined, which was better than in years past at this time, but at least a hundred more would have to join within the next few weeks or the remainder of the schedule would have to be suspended.
A subscription was then started and after singing a number of Trinity songs the meeting adjourned.

Captain Henshaw and Ramsdell, who scored six touchdowns in the game with Wesleyan last year, seem to be the men for the half-back positions. "Joe" Carroll who has played tackle for two years will probably play fullback. That makes a backfield that it will be hard to beat. H. W. Cook has been playing quarter back and also does the punting. Gildersleeve have been playing these positions for the most part, while Collet, a new man, and Bassford are substituting. The tackle positions will without doubt be filled by C. H. Howell, Breed and Woodbury. The men who have showed up best at guard are Loveland, Breed, W. J. Nelson, Green '11, and McCreary. McElroy, who was kept out of the game by injuries last year, Barney, and Bleecker are all showing up well at center.
The Worcester Tech team is stronger than their team of last year and a good game will be assured for tomorrow.
