
















FINANCIAL SUPPORT & SCHOLARSHIPS

UNO believes you should have as much information as possible in order to make the best decisions about your finances. The resources listed below were created to help you figure out how much your education will cost and how financial aid may help offset those costs.

2016-2017 COST OF ATTENDANCE

The cost of attendance is the estimated full and reasonable cost of completing an academic year as a full-time student and includes tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, and other expenses including personal expenses and transportation. These estimates are conservative by design, and in no way attempt to reflect differences in actual costs incurred by students with differing lifestyle choices.

FINANCIAL AID DISBURSEMENT

Financial Aid generally posts one week before the start of the semester. If you make purchases and would like them to be paid by your financial aid, the charges must be applied prior to your aid posting. Purchases generally take one business day to post to your student account so please plan accordingly.

Parking permits cannot be paid with federal financial aid without your consent. If you would like your parking permit to be paid with your financial aid, please select the option to authorize the university "to apply your Title IV financial aid to all charges appearing on your student account" when accepting your financial aid via MavLINK. If you did not do so when you accepted your aid, you can change this option any time prior to your aid posting.

STUDENT FEES*

University Program and Facilities Fee (UPF)-Flat Fee

All students enrolled for on-campus courses will be charged a flat fee of \$270.99 (for 0 to 6 credit hours) and \$437.34 for (7 or more credit hours). The UPF receipts are divided into two separate funds: Fund A student fees and Fund B student fees.

Technology Fee

The UNO Technology fee is assessed at a rate of \$11.00 per credit hour. This fee provides educational information technology resources to UNO students, and is assessed to all students regardless of residency or campus location. Upon withdrawal from a course, this fee is refundable at the same percentage as tuition.

Student Access and Success Fee

The Student Access and Success Fee funds direct services to students in admissions, registration, and other campus support services. Through these programs, students are provided resources to assist them in being successful in their educational endeavors.

Library Fee

The Library Fee, collected by the NU system and distributed to UNO's Criss Library, is used to pay for collections, services, and spaces benefiting students.

Cultural Enrichment Fee

All students enrolled in on-campus courses are charged a Cultural Enrichment Fee of \$5.00, which provides them with access to cultural events offered by the Theatre, Music, Art, and Writer's Workshop departments at no additional charge. The cultural enrichment fee is charged per semester.

Student Research Fee

The fee is used for the Fund for Scholarly Experience (FUSE), which institutionalizes faculty-mentored scholarly opportunities for undergraduate and graduate students.

STUDENT FEES (CONT'D)

ID Card Fee

The MavCARD/ID card fee is to support the use of MavCARDs on campus and in the community. It is required to access services in a variety of university offices and to attend many university-sponsored events. The revenue from this fee is used to offset the cost of supplies, processing equipment and other operating costs

TUITION DUE DATES

Tuition for the fall, spring, and summer semesters are due in full on the due date.

Fall 2016: September 23 **Spring 2017:** February 23 **Summer 2017:** May 23

Late Payment Fees

Each unpaid billing is subject to late payment fees. A maximum of four late payment fees can be assessed during a single semester. If you have not received your billing statement within five working days of the billing date, please contact the Cashiering and Student Accounts Office. Unpaid balances that remain outstanding will result in the placement of a hold on the account. This hold will prevent future registration and receipt of transcripts. Late payment fee amounts are listed below:

Balances \$100.00—\$999.00: \$25.00 **Balances \$1,000.00 and over:** \$50.00

BENEFITS OF E-BILLS

- > No delay of mail time in receiving your bill.
- > No possibility of bills being lost in the mail.
- > No sensitive data in print format going through the mail.
- **>** E-Bills help save the environment with reduced paper usage and paper waste.
- **>** E-Bill statements in MavLINK allow you to print additional copies at anytime.
- > Prior E-Bill statements for the academic year will be available in an archived listing allowing you to look at and reprint prior statements.
- **>** E-Bills help the university to keep costs competitive.

eCHECK PAYMENT OPTION

Instead of using a debit card that may have a transaction limit, you can pay your account by eCheck. You can simply provide your routing and bank account numbers and have your payment securely drafted directly from your bank account.

BOOKSTORE CHARGES

You are eligible to make UNO Bookstore purchases of up to \$1,500.00 per semester and charge them to your student account. This includes books, supplies, and other items. Simply ask for this payment option at the cashier station when making a purchase. All charges posted to your student account are subject to the same billing terms as your tuition and fees account.

ONLINE PARKING PERMITS

You are eligible to charge your parking permit purchase to your student account and have it billed in the same manner as your tuition and student fees. Permits must be purchased online at **parking.unomaha.edu**.

MAVERICK PAYMENT PLAN

Starting fall of 2016, any student who does not have a past due balance in their MavLINK account can enroll in a tuition payment plan that will break their total tuition and fees into three monthly payments with no interest.

The Maverick Payment plan, which only applies to tuition and fees, will be available for the fall, spring, and summer sessions. Students must re-enroll for the payment plan every semester (a \$20 fee applies with each enrollment).

Deadlines

The sign up deadlines are September 23, February 23, May 23. The payment plan can be setup through your MavLINK account.

Spring: February, March April **Summer:** May, June, July

For your convenience, automatic payments options are available:

- **>** Directly through your bank using a routing number and account number. (This is recommended).
- **>** Debit and credit cards may also be used. Note that there is a 2.7% service charge applied for each payment.

*2015–2016 rates listed. Subject to change. Student fees are generally mandatory and non-refundable. However, Technology Fees and Library Fees are refundable at the same rates as tuition. Distance Education students are not subject to certain fees associated with on-campus courses, but are subject to Distance Education fees. The revenue collected from these fees covers costs of providing student services and maintaining facilities.



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

CAN MY PARENT/GUARDIAN GAIN ACCESS TO MY STUDENT RECORDS?


You might want to share information with your parent/guardian and/or family members. For example, you may want to give your parent/guardian the ability to pay a bill, get an address or view grades. UNO understands this, so a method is available that allows students to provide third party access to this information.

Visit **registrar.unomaha.edu/ferpa**, view Third-Party Access: Guest/Parent Account, then complete an Information Release Form which authorizes UNO to release information to designated person(s).

Up to five parent/guest accounts can be created with unique access options. You can authorize another person, such as a parent or guardian, to view specific types of personal information in the Student Information System (SIS) through a guest account on MavLINK.

The Office of the University Registrar maintains signed consent from students who have chosen to allow the release of non-directory information to parents.





LANGUAGE LEARNING CENTER

The Language Learning Center is a unique language learning center featuring live SCOLA programming from around the world. SCOLA is a nonprofit educational organization that receives and re-transmits television programming from around the world in native languages.

No appointment necessary.

MATH-SCIENCE LEARNING CENTER

Get assistance with academic challenges in math and science through the Math-Science Learning Center. Services include: tutors, supplemental instruction leaders, and study group facilitators. The center offers various study spots, tutorial computers, and study material.

WRITING CENTERS

Services include: choosing a topic, generating and focusing ideas, enhancing your writing style, handling technical details of the document (grammar, format, etc.), understanding different forms of writing, and helping you become a more confident writer. The staff assists with written assignments, application essays, business letters, and other projects. Staff does not write or edit work, but helps you develop skills to enhance your writing and editing abilities.

No appointment necessary.

SPEECH CENTER

Services include: consultation on organization; ceremonial speaking; PowerPoint and group presentations; coaching on verbal and nonverbal communication; audience connection; memorable conclusions; expression; feedback on movement, gestures, eye contact, visual aids, and audience adaptation. To be prepared for your appointment, students should consider bringing notes, outlines, presentation materials, evaluations, and DVDs for recording purposes.

UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA SYSTEM FOUR YEAR GRADUATION GUARANTEE

The four-year guarantee for graduation relies on mutual commitment from the student to follow a list of practical guidelines while attending college and from the university to ensure that required courses or acceptable alternatives are available.

IS GRADUATING IN FOUR YEARS RIGHT FOR YOU?

Of course, not all students are in a position to graduate in four years. Some students may need or prefer to work more hours and attend school parttime, or they may be enrolled in a program that requires more than four years to complete the course work. Others may just choose a different pace or the opportunity to take a wider range of courses that are not directly related to their field of study. This program is designed for those who want to complete their degree program as quickly as possible.

YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES


It's important that students have appropriate high school preparation, pursue a course of study that can be completed in four years, and follow these practices:

- > Register for and complete 15-18 credit hours per semester with passing grades. This will help you stay on track to graduate in four years.
- **>** Select a major early in college and stick with it.
- **>** Work with your academic advisors to develop a four-year plan.
- **>** Sign up early for classes during every semester.
- **>** If you must work, work at a job or internship fewer than 20 hours per week.
- When a required course is not available, notify the department chair as soon as you can.

OUR GUARANTEE

In turn, the university guarantees students will be able to enroll in courses that permit graduation in four years. If that's not possible, the university will provide mutually acceptable alternatives or substitutions.

The Four-Year Graduation Guarantee was approved by the University of Nebraska Board of Regents in 2002. The program recognizes the importance of Nebraska undergraduate students being able to earn their bachelor's or first-professional degrees in a timely fashion.



GENERAL EDUCATION CURRICULUM

The goal of a liberal arts education is to give you a breadth of knowledge and help you develop into a well-rounded student. A liberal arts education serves three functions: teaches you how to think, how to learn, and develops your creativity.

UNIVERSAL REQUIREMENTS

These are universal requirements of all undergraduate students at UNO, regardless of major. In addition, all degree programs require 120 credit hours.





Your NUID is a unique 8-digit number assigned to you during the application process. The NUID Password, managed by TrueYou, is known as your MavLINK Password. Visit **trueyou.nebraska.edu** to manage your information.

NET ID & Password

Your NET ID is a combination of letters using your first and last name and is the user name assigned to you by UNO. You can look it up at look.unomaha.edu. To reset your NET ID password, go to password. unomaha.edu. You will need to know your NUID and NUID password.

BLACKBOARD



- > Under the Financial Aid tab, you can accept or decline financial aid offers and manage guest/parent access, scholarships, summer aid, loan information, and view your to do list.
- > DegreeWorks allows you to view your current progress toward your degree including all courses taken or in progress and courses still needed to complete your degree. You can explore new/additional majors and minors with the Degree Works What-If Audit.

VET SUCCESS ON CAMPUS


















GENDER AND SEXUALITY RESOURCE CENTER

MISSION

The mission of the Gender and Sexuality Resource Center is to foster and promote equity, access, and inclusion for all genders and sexualities through education, resources, advocacy, and activism. This office provides specific programs and services for women, lesbian, gay, bisexual, queer spectrum, trans spectrum, intersex, asexual, non-straight, and gender non-conforming (LGBTQIA+) peoples, and survivors of interpersonal violence in the University of Nebraska at Omaha community.

Additionally, this office advises and supports the missions of the Queer and Trans Services and Women's Resource Center student government agencies, which are immediately next to the Gender and Sexuality Resource Center on the first floor of MBSC.

SAFE SPACE

Creating an environment of inclusion takes more than organizations and support groups. It takes individuals open to learning more about others and themselves and creating a positive and accepting environment.

A "safe space" is a place where students can not only find shelter from harassment, violence, or sexual abuse, but can also feel free to discuss ideas, questions, and concerns for themselves and for others.


PERSONAL COUNSELING

YOU'RE ALREADY A MEMBER

If you are enrolled in at least one credit hour on-campus, a campus recreation membership is included as part of your University Program and Facilities Fees (UPFF). There is no need to purchase a membership separately while taking an on-campus class. A valid membership is determined on a semester basis.

If you are enrolled in an online, remote, research, or thesis class a campus recreation membership would need to be purchased at a rate of \$40/ month or \$150/semester. A purchase is necessary since these classes do not pay the University Program and Facilities Fees (UPFF).

A NATIONAL LEADER IN COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Community engagement at UNO is defined as collaboration between UNO and our local, regional, national, and global communities for the exchange of knowledge and resources. As a metropolitan university, UNO is committed to creating valuable opportunities that are mutually beneficial for students, faculty, staff, and the community.

BARBARA WEITZ COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT CENTER

The Barbara Weitz Community Engagement Center (Weitz CEC) is a one-of-a-kind place where university and community organizations are housed to intentionally collaborate for the benefit of the university and the community. In the Weitz CEC, you will find a number of UNO's signature outreach programs including the Service Learning Academy (SLA), the Office of Civic and Social Responsibility (CSR), and the William Brennan Institute for Labor Studies (WBILS). Throughout the uniquely designed spaces, the Weitz CEC fosters volunteer opportunities, service events, service learning inquiries, service learning projects and events, student jobs and internships, and community events. This special place adds a new venue from which UNO students become civically engaged agents of change.

Office of Civic and Social Responsibility

CSR connects the network of UNO to meaningful service opportunities, while also serving UNO's university partner organizations by posting and sharing service events. CSR programs include the Student Volunteer and Leadership Collaborative (The Collaborative), the Maverick Food Pantry, and the Volunteer Connections Center. CSR welcomes UNO students who are interested in learning more about service.

Service Learning Academy

SLA collaborates with nonprofit organizations, governmental agencies, P-12 faculty, and UNO faculty to combine classroom instruction with meaningful community service projects. Students' learning goes beyond the classroom as they apply their knowledge to real-life situations in the community. UNO offers a variety of courses that incorporate service learning. You can find service learning classes by going to the class search page, and selecting the program option service learning.

OFFICE OF CIVIC & SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

The Office of Civic and Social Responsibility (CSR) is dedicated to developing engaged, civic-minded citizens and leaders of our communities. UNO believes service and engagement are vital components for the educational development of all students and for a sustainable, healthy community.

VOLUNTEER CONNECTIONS CENTER

The Volunteer Connections Center (VCC) helps UNO students find their passion and purpose by finding their "choice" service opportunity or organization. VCC coordinates Volunteer Fairs to show students how nonprofit organizations address community needs, and how volunteers can explore opportunities to make a positive impact. Additionally, the VCC sends out weekly UNO Serve emails that list service opportunities within the community. These service opportunities are also listed on MavSYNC.

SOCIAL ENTREPRENEURSHIP

Students who wish to initiate their own service project receive support from CSR's Seed Projects, which provide a stipend and guidance on how to make your project come to life. CSR also provides support to Clinton Global Initiative University (CGI U) applicants. CGI U connects students from all over the world and helps them become better social innovators and leaders.

MAVERICK FOOD PANTRY

UNO's Maverick Food Pantry contributes to UNO's culture of caring by providing food to those in immediate need and connecting them with resources in the greater Omaha area for long-term support. UNO students, faculty, and staff can anonymously request a food package on MavSYNC and pick up the package in 130 Weitz CEC. Maverick Food Pantry volunteers sort donations, assemble food packages, and assist those picking up packages.

SIGNATURE SERVICE DAYS


Each academic year, UNO sponsors multiple days of service in which volunteers engage in service projects around the community for a day. Signature Service Days have expanded to over sixteen days dedicated to service throughout the academic year. SUSTAINABILITY

UNO integrates sustainability—concern for people, the environment, and fiscal responsibility—into everything that is done. You can take pride in being a part of a community that highly prioritizes sustainable efforts.

RAIN GARDENS

Rain gardens prevent erosion, water pollution, and flooding as well as provide an urban habitat for native butterflies, birds, and beneficial insects. UNO's rain gardens can be found outside of the Welcome Center and Mammel Hall.

SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORTATION

Use your MavCARD as an Omaha Metro Transit bus pass, free of charge. MavRIDE is available 24/7 all year round, as long as the Omaha Metro buses are in operation.

Zincar

A car-sharing program is available on campus for those who do not have a personal vehicle or have commuted to campus via alternative options. UNO has four Zipcars on campus that can be used 24/7 by students over the age of 19, for a minimal fee.

B-Cycle

This unique bike-sharing program allows those who pay the minimal fee to easily ride a B-Cycle bike from one station to another. UNO is home to two B-Cycle stations (outside Milo Bail Student Center & Mammel Hall).

Zimride

Zimride is a social rideshare program specifically designed for the university community. This free program allows students to share rides with others who travel along the same route. Zimride can be used for routine commutes as well as one-time trips. This service uses social profiles to leverage trust among users.

ACADEMICS

UNO offers a number of courses, programs, and concentrations for those interested in sustainability. These include a Sustainability Minor, Bachelor's in General Studies with a Sustainability Concentration, and a Master of Business Administration with a Sustainability Concentration.

SUSTAINABILITY AT UNO

- > Sustainability was identified as one of five priority areas for the university in 2012.
- VINO released the Sustainability Master Plan in 2014, which articulates UNO's sustainability vision and identifies a path to integrate sustainability into all aspects of campus.
- > UNO hired its first ever Sustainability Coordinator in November 2015.
- ➤ In 2014, UNO earned a STARS

 Bronze Rating. STARS, a program of AASHE, is a transparent, self-reported framework for colleges and universities to measure their sustainability efforts.
- > UNO was recognized in the Princeton Review's Guide to 353 Green Colleges (2015).
- UNO has earned the title of a "Tree Campus USA" university, a program sponsored through the Arbor Day Foundation, since 2011.






