



ADMISSION OF PATIENTS

- 1. Applications for the admission of patients should be accompanied by a certificate from some reputable physician, stating the nature and probable duration of the disease, and should be addressed to the Superintendent of the Hospital, New Haven, Conn. In accordance with the regulations of the hospital, the Superintendent, as the representative of the Prudential Committee, arranges the terms of admission according to the circumstances of the case and the accommodation required.
- 2. The nursing is performed by the Connecticut Training School for Nurses.
- 3. The ordinary charge per week for accommodation in the wards is \$7.00, which includes medical and surgical attendance, together with medicine, nursing and washing.
- 4. Private rooms are furnished at \$25.00 or more per week, according to the requirements of the case.
- 5. Persons partly supported by the towns in which they reside and partly by the State appropriation are admitted on an order from the town authorities. Town patients are received at \$5.00 per week.
- 6. Soldiers enrolled on the State quota in the Civil war, or in the quotas of other States if residents of Connecticut at the time of enlistment, and now residents, are admitted as State patients on an order from the executive officer of the Soldiers' Hospital Fund.
- 7. Sailors whose support is provided for from the marine hospital fund are admitted on an order of the Collector of the Port of New Haven.
- 8. Persons carried directly to the hospital from the place of an accident are immediately admitted.
 - 9. A written history of the case should be sent with the patient.
- 10. Insane persons and those suffering from contagious diseases are not admitted.
- 11. Persons suffering from uncomplicated pulmonary tuberculosis are not admitted to the wards.



The changes in the statistical report of this year, as compared with the year 1910, are comparatively slight. The Hospital has been more active, as indicated by the increase in the whole number treated from 2,777 to 2,976. There has been a reduction of 1.1 days in the average length of time per patient, and a slight decrease in the daily average, due in large part to the greater activity in the service. There has also been a slight falling off in the use of the charity funds. There has been a decrease of \$1,171 in the apparent Hospital deficit and of \$3,400.12 in the real deficit, taking into consideration the gain in inventory, which is particularly gratifying in view of a comparatively large expenditure for repairs and improvements which does not appear as a separate item in the statistical table. The cost of food per inmate is less, but the weekly cost is greater because of the smaller daily average.

The electric light and power plant has now been in operation for one entire year, and we are able for the first time to determine the exact amount of saving as a result of its installation. All of the actual expenses of producing light, heat and power for the plant for the years 1910 and 1911 have been estimated and compared, and the result is a saving of \$2,745.90 in the year 1911 over the year 1910. This does not, however, take into consideration the item of depreciation in the extra machinery installed. The saving in the bills for electricity, gas and coal account for the greater part of this. The plant cost in round numbers about \$30,000, and the results justify the judgment of the Directors in paying for this improvement out of the general funds.

During the year we have put into operation the plan of having graduate head nurses in the acute wards. This added expense is justified by the regularity and improvement in the nursing service thereby secured.

During the year the Society has received the following gifts, constituting an addition to the endowment: \$475 from the estate of Mary Sanford; \$1,000 from the estate of Samuel D. Gilbert; \$5,000 from the estate of Evalina J. Jones for the establishment and maintenance of "The Evalina J. Jones Free Bed"; and \$5,000 from Mr. and Mrs. Abner Hendee for the establishment and maintenance of "The Lucius J. Hendee Memorial Free Bed." We are much gratified to receive these substantial additions to our funds.

Since the approval by the Directors of the layout of the proposed new buildings and of the entire hospital grounds, referred to in the last annual report, the General Building Committee have employed Mr. L. W. Robinson of New Haven as supervising architect, and Mr. Frank Miles Day of Philadelphia as consulting architect, and have had prepared sketches and floor plans of a new administration building, a new private ward building adjoining the same, and are at work on sketches and plans for a new general service building, it being considered best in the judgment of the Committee to separate the three services in the future.

The Lion Park property in Allingtown, purchased for the tuberculosis annex, has been greatly improved by draining and by cutting out and trimming the trees in the grove, under the direction of Professor Toumey, director of the Yale Forestry

School, and Mr. Cromie, the city forester, who kindly volunteered their services and exercised general supervision over the work. The buildings in the grove have also been put in condition for use for a Day Camp operated under the supervision of the Visiting Nurses Association. The Day Camp was established on June 1st, and during the summer thirty-six patients were treated, the average length of stay of each patient being thirteen weeks. The summer's experience has demonstrated that the location is admirably adapted for the purpose, and it is believed that the improvements in the grounds and the observation of the methods of carrying on the work will in a large measure quiet the opposition among some of the near neighbors to the use of the grounds for the purpose intended. The Building Committee is at present at work on the layout and plan of the plant for the treatment of advanced cases and is making every effort to secure a model plant for this branch of the work. It is expected that the full realization of the benefits of this magnificent gift of an anonymous donor will not be long deferred.

The joint committee of the Hospital and the City have procured sketches and floor plans of an isolation building which is considered most desirable and suitable for the location. The estimates of cost which have been furnished indicate that a large additional amount will be needed to construct the building as planned, and the alternative is presented of building an inadequate and unsuitable building or raising an additional amount of about \$60,000. The present status of the matter is uncertain, but it will undoubtedly be more economical in the long run to build a larger and more complete building, and an effort is being made by the committee to secure the necessary funds for that purpose.

In view of the above more immediate and pressing necessity, we hesitate to suggest the need of further buildings and equipment, but for the sake of keeping before the members of the Society and the public our most important requirements, we repeat the suggestions of our last year's report, that we need additional operating rooms and operating facilities, a well-

equipped pathological building, a psychopathic pavilion, a convalescent pavilion, and a complete equipment for physical therapy.

During the past year the Board of Lady Visitors have been more than usually active in the interests of the Hospital, and in their annal report have recommended the establishment of a social service department. They have been taking up the work of investigating the situation and needs of patients about to be discharged, have helped many who had no homes to find suitable places to go and suitable employment, and have sought to place children in other institutions and homes. They recommend the extension of this work by supervising to some extent the treatment of discharged patients who are not completely cured and need further attention. It is important that the scope of this work, which has been so well started by the Ladies Committee, should be extended, and the Prudential Committee recommend to the consideration of the Board of Directors, at their next meeting, the employment of a paid social worker.

We thank the administrative officers and employees of the Hospital and Training School and the attending and house staffs for their faithful and efficient services, and many friends of the Hospital for their contributions of money and personal service.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Prudential Committee of the General Hospital Society of Connecticut:

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit the eighty-fifth annual report.

A perusal of the financial and statistical report will prove that the past year has been in many respects the most successful the Hospital has experienced in its history.

During the past year, we have treated a total of 2,976 patients. The total number admitted was 2,557, which is the largest number admitted to the Hospital in any one year. The average length of time spent in the Hospital by each patient has decreased from 22 2/3 days to 21 2/10 days. This decrease has caused the average number of patients to drop from 159 3/10 to 157 14/100 per diem. This condition of affairs, i. e. the decrease in our daily average, is accountable for increase of the weekly cost of patients.

I attribute the decrease in the cost of food per inmate in part of the lower prices in foodstuffs, particularly meats.

In one of our financial reports is a statement showing loss of \$49,720.24 on patients. After subtracting the appropriation of \$10,000.00 allowed us by the State, we are obliged to suffer a net loss on patients of \$39,720.24, which has to be met from the income from our general fund. These figures establish two facts; first, the amount of good and charity accomplished by this Hospital; second, that the amount of the State appropriation of \$10,000.00 is inadequate and is certainly disproportionate as compared to what other smaller hospitals are doing and receiving.

The improvements and repairs have been many and extensive, chief of which are new concrete sidewalks on Howard Avenue

and on Cedar Street; the repairing of our tar walks; the painting of our corridors and wards, the interiors of main building, of chapel, of stable, of power house and laundry, and all roofs; the laying of Battleship linoleum in our two main corridors and repair of floors in wards and corridors.

On account of the limited amount of our funds and number of our Free Beds, we are particularly handicapped in properly maintaining the ideal character of a charitable institution. We have been of assistance to all ward patients, who paid \$7.00 a week, notwithstanding a loss on each one of \$5.72 per week. Thirteen per cent. of our patients were unable to pay the \$7.00 per week and were supported in whole or in part by the Free Beds and Funds. Our Funds and Free Beds ought to be increased to such an extent so as to permit us to treat at least double the number of charitable patients we are now able to provide for.

During the past year we have added to the nursing staff at an expense to the Hospital, three graduate nurses. One is placed in charge of our private room department and the other two in charge of four of our acute wards, namely, 1 East and 1 West, 2 East and 2 West. This change will greatly increase the efficiency in the care of patients. The nurses in training will be greatly benefited in that they will have the advantage of working under the supervision of nurses of long experience.

While much has been done to improve the equipment and physical condition of the Hospital, we are, however, in need of the following additions and changes:

There is growing demand and a need for a Social Service Department, and I would strongly recommend the organization of such a department with a paid worker to direct it.

We need two electric ambulances and an electric truck with all necessary appurtenances. I believe they would prove of undoubted economic advantage as well as decrease the housefly nuisance, which is almost impossible to control where horses are kept. We also need a new and larger sterilizing plant for mattresses, etc. A new fence, either metal or concrete, will prove to be a necessity in the near future.

Our new power, light and heating plant, as well as the new laundry equipment, are working most satisfactorily.

I desire to thank the Prudential Committee for the support and help it has rendered me.

The Board of Visitors and Board of Lady Visitors have accomplished much good, and their kindness is greatly appreciated by the patients and the Hospital management.

I desire to thank Miss Stowe, Superintendent of Nurses, and Mr. Perkins, Chief Clerk, and the chiefs of the several departments and the employees, for their valuable assistance.

All of the many improvements made during the past year, the painting of the wards and corridors, the new electric lighting, and the changes in the boiler room, to mention no others, have greatly added to the internal appearance and the efficiency of the Hospital.

We feel that our citizens should be proud of the splendid work this great institution is doing, and in every way support it to the best of their ability.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LADY VISITORS

FOR THE YEAR 1911

To the Directors of the General Hospital Society of Connecticut:

GENTLEMEN:—In submitting our annual report, we feel there is much to commend in the management of the Hospital and care of the patients. But we also have something definite to recommend.


During the year we have come into a much more personal touch with the patients than ever before, by doing in a small way what has been called in general terms, "social service." That is: by questioning and investigating, we have tried to learn about the patients and their real needs. In many cases, we have greatly aided them by finding homes and employment for some who had no place to go, on leaving the Hospital-by gaining extensions of leaves of absence from work—by placing children in other institutions and homes—by putting cases into the hands of proper organizations (relief or otherwise)—and many times by bringing relief to worried minds by simply a little interest and investigation. Some cases have required only a little time, but others have meant even several days' work. Inasmuch as it is really impossible that the large amount of this sort of work that presents itself in an institution of this kind be done by volunteer workers, who change from month to month, and inasmuch as the need and necessity for such work has become more and more evident to us working at the Hospital, a motion has been made and carried that in our annual report to the Board of Directors we recommend that a paid social worker be procured for this Hospital.

Also during the year, we have often felt that we might perhaps work more effectively if there were more ladies on the Board. The growth in the number of patients, and the increased interest of the visitors in the many cases, beyond there being so many besides to visit, has made us wish to enlarge our Board. And a motion was made and carried that we ask your permission to increase our membership to thirty.

One of the most reiterated complaints we hear is in regard to the confinement of the Gifford patients to the wards. They are, many of them, wheel-chair convalescents. As this is the only home or environment they have, we feel very strongly that they should have some outlook besides the ward full of patients, some of them very ill at times. Since there is no convalescents' pavilion, we wish they might have the use of the halls, outside their respective wards, and that the Gifford 1 patients, who are able, be allowed on the lawns, during the open-air season.

TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES

PROSPECTUS

The Committee of the Training School for Nurses has an arrangement with the Authorities of the New Haven Hospital for training women desirous of becoming professional nurses. The Hospital accommodates over 225 patients. Applications for the course of instruction should be made to the superintendent of nurses, and if approved by the executive committee the applicant will be accepted as a candidate. The applicant must be over twenty-one and under thirty-five years of age; and must present a certificate from a clergyman as to good moral character and from a physician as to health. A personal letter should accompany the application, giving briefly a history of her life for the past few years and her reasons and motives for desiring the education of a nurse. If such papers are satisfactory, the applicant will be received for three months' probation, and board, laundry, and a room in the Nurses' Home will be provided.

The course of training is three years. The first three months are occupied in preliminary training under the direction of an instructor, who gives demonstrations, quizzes and tests. After the first three months an allowance of \$230 for the entire period will be given; \$4.00 per month the first year, \$5.00 per month the second year, \$7.00 per month the third year and \$50.00 upon graduation. This sum is in no way intended as wages, the course of instruction being considered ample remuneration for services. Uniform dresses will be furnished from the time the probationer is accepted. The allowance is given to supply text-books and whatever may be necessary

to keep the nurse neat and tidy in dress during the three years in training. The last six months she will be expected to take such positions as the committee may assign her, either in the Hospital or in outside practice.

Nurses will be under the authority of the superintendent of nursing, and subject to the rules of the Hospital. The superintendent will have full power to decide as to their fitness for the work and the propriety of retaining or dismissing them within the three months of trial. They will receive a thorough practical training in the medical and surgical wards for men and women, and in the private ward, which especially fits them for work in private houses. Positions may be found for those nurses who prefer institutional work. A system is now in operation for the more direct oversight of the work of the nurses. The supervisors of the wards are experienced graduate nurses who give careful personal attention to each pupil nurse in their wards. A good obstetrical training is obtained in the maternity department, each nurse having the entire care of at least six cases. In the Farnam operating building each nurse is on duty from four to six weeks. A professional teacher from New York gives a course of instruction in massage and electrical treatment. A course of three months' training in the Manhattan Eye and Ear Hospital is now arranged for those who wish to fit themselves as school nurses, also a period of six weeks in training and practice in visiting nursing under the direction of the Visiting Nurse Association.

The probationers upon entering the School come immediately under the personal supervision of one of the assistant superintendents, who gives instruction in details and methods of routine work; care of utensils; preparation of the simpler treatment and surgical supplies; the arranging of trays and serving of foods; dusting and cleaning; ventilation of rooms for the sick; and in general such teaching as will prepare them to begin the care of patients. A practical dietitian is employed who gives instruction both by theory and practice in invalid cookery, which includes, besides broths, gruels and cereals, foods

required by those returning to health, and the special diets necessary in different diseases.

An excellent course of lectures is given by the members of the Hospital staff and other well-known medical educators connected with Yale University. Text-book and bedside instruction with frequent demonstrations are given by the superintendent and her assistants. Head nurses in the various wards assist in bedside instruction.

The day nurses are on duty from 7 A. M. to 8 P. M., but are allowed for rest and recreation one half day each week, four hours on Sunday, and two hours on all other days. An entire day is occasionally granted. Vacations of two weeks each are given in the first and second years and of three weeks in the third year.

Extreme care will be taken in the selection of nurses; only those best fitted for the work will be retained. Nurses will be dismissed at any time in case of misconduct or inefficiency, with the approval of the Committee of the Training School. When the full term is completed and examinations satisfactorily passed, a diploma and a badge of the School will be given.
