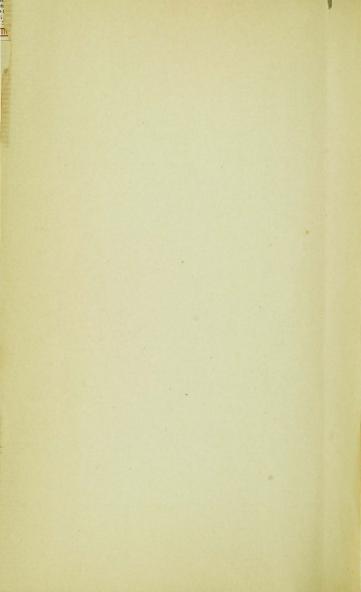

# ADMISSION OF PATIENTS

- 1. Applications for the admission of patients should be accompanied by a certificate from some respectable physician, stating the nature and probable duration of the disease, and should be addressed to the Superintendent of the Hospital, New Haven, Conn. In accordance with the regulations of the hospital, the Superintendent, as the representative of the Prudential Committee, arranges the terms of admission according to the circumstances of the case and the accommodation required.
- The nursing is performed by the Connecticut Training School for Nurses.
- 3. The ordinary charge per week for accommodation in the wards is \$7.00, which includes medical and surgical attendance, together with medicine, nursing and washing.
- 4. The price of private rooms may be obtained by applying to the superintendent.
- 5. Persons partly supported by the towns in which they reside and partly by the State appropriations, are admitted on an order from the town authorities. Town patients are received at \$5.00 per week.
- 6. Soldiers enrolled on the State quota in the late war, or in the quotas of other States if residents of Connecticut at the time of enlistment, and now residents, are admitted as State patients on an order from the executive officer of the Soldiers' Hospital Board.
- Sailors whose support is provided for from the marine hospital fund are admitted on the order of the Collector of the Port of New Haven.
- 8. Persons carried directly to the hospital from the place of an accident are immediately admitted.
  - 9. A written history of the case should be sent with the patient.
- Insane persons and those suffering from contagious diseases are not admitted.

The Board of Directors has the honor to present herewith to the General Hospital Society of Connecticut its seventy-first annual report, as prepared by the Prudential Committee.

It will be observed that the number of patients treated was the largest number which has been reached in any year for twenty years. It should be observed, also, that the number of deaths shows a decrease of five, and the number of those discharged an increase of twenty-one. Of those discharged five hundred and seventy-two were discharged cured; two hundred and seventy-two improved, and fifty-eight unimproved. This is, on the whole, an exhibit favorable to the Hospital, while it uncovers a year of active service.

Of the whole number under treatment, seven hundred and thirty-three were males, and four hundred and twenty-one were females. Of the twenty-eight births five were males and twenty-three were females. There were also two still births, not included in the list of deaths. Other statistics are given in the Superintendent's Report, which need not be introduced here, as his report is herewith transmitted.

The item in the above statement which will excite most attention is the exceptionally large deficit, showing an increase, as compared with last year, in spite of the addition of nearly five hundred dollars to current receipts, of \$3,352.16. So large an increase in expenditures requires of your Committee a full explanation. We therefore submit the following facts:

The increase in the daily average of patients is six and fourtenths; and the increase in the cost of supporting the patients has been eighteen and a half cents per week. This increased cost has been partly due to the addition of two to the staff of attendants, a head night-nurse, and another orderly for service in Farnam ward and on the ambulance. The first was at the urgent request of the Connecticut Training School for Nurses, and the other at the repeated and most urgent request of the Attending Surgeon, it having been represented to your Committee by the latter that the coming of an orderly from another ward into the Farnam ward, and his passing freely between the two, was disadvantageous to the condition of the Farnam ward; and at the same time such service was insufficient. This increase of our expenses was regretted by your Committee, but they felt constrained to consent to it.

In the second place, our insurance policies expired, and we had to pay the premium for renewal. Moreover, the companies

demanded that the Society either become a co-insurer with them or pay an increased premium. After much conference and correspondence we judged that the Hospital Society should not become a co-insurer, even if it had to meet the demand for higher premium. We asked for a lower valuation; for a lower rate, for a change in our policies. We finally substituted for our group of policies on separate buildings, a blanket policy on our whole plant with the exception of some detached buildings, and paid for five years insurance the premium of \$954.18, or less than \$200 per annum. But this premium was a heavy item in this year's accounts.

Another such item is an increased expenditure in Repairs and Improvements. The increase under this head, as compared with the previous year, is \$935.17, explained as follows: It became apparent to your Committee in 1896 that the plumbing in the west wing of the Congress Avenue building required to be renewed, and they went so far as to contract with the lowest responsible bidder for the work. But the necessity arising for installing a disinfecting apparatus which the Board of Directors ordered, your Committee ventured to ask the contractor to postpone the work for a few months, and he generously consented. But in the spring of 1897 it was done and cost \$664.40. The decay of floor timbers in our Laundry necessitated a further outlay of \$140, and a notification by the public authority to repair the Congress Avenue sidewalk of \$86.82. In none of these instances did the Committee overpass their obvious duty.

The serious illness of our office-clerk for several weeks imposed upon us the expense of additional help in the office, and this increased the outlay for salaries and wages.

Water cost us \$109 more than the previous year, and ice \$121.20 more. The Hygeia Co., which has supplied us hitherto at a lump sum per annum, has retired from that arrangement, and charges us by the hundred pounds. By reason of the very active service in 1897 the expenditure for medicines, instruments and surgical dressings shows an increase of \$484.42. From the advance in the prices of food in the latter part of the year, and the exceptionally large orders of meat and eggs by the physicians, the cost of food has increased as

compared with the previous year by \$1,463.36. The demand for meat has been increased by 7,955½ pounds, costing \$835.59, and for eggs by 2,080 dozen, costing \$544.83. Fuel has cost us \$451.81 more. To recapitulate the increased expenditures that have produced the large deficit are:

This amount more than covers the increase of deficit, even if there be added to the latter the increase of our current receipts.

Mention should be made in this connection of extensive repairs which have been made in the Gifford Building, and at the expense of the income of the Gifford fund, as provided in Mrs. Gifford's bequest, the cost of which does not appear in the current expense account. It was found necessary to make these repairs in the spring of 1897. The ceiling of the men's ward, and the adjoining rooms, which was of adamant plaster, was found to be in an unsafe condition, threatening to fall. It was replaced by metallic ceilings at a cost of \$335.04. We also took the opportunity, while the ward was vacated, to paint the walls, varnish the woodwork, and otherwise renovate it. besides re-covering the sun-room awnings, etc. The total outlay was \$704.08. It is extremely desirable that in another year the second floor of the building be treated as the first has been in this year, and that the woodwork on the outside of the building be painted. This will put the building as a whole in excellent order.

Before passing from the explanation of our deficit by our extraordinary expenditures, a large part of which will not occur in the coming year, it should be added that other expense accounts, such as "furniture and crockery," "barn and farm expenses," "boilers, machinery and tools," "laundry supplies," etc., show a noteworthy decrease.

The deficit has been met, as usual, from other resources than

current receipts, and the balance on hand and in bank after paying all bills is \$6,030.12. Of this \$3,000 is the legacy of the late Eli Whitney, and \$180 the uninvested portion of the gifts of Mrs. Leavenworth and her son, leaving \$2,850.12 in the general fund available for current expenses. This includes the recent Hospital Sunday collections, so far as they have been paid in, but probably not the whole of them, as they are not usually paid in so early in the year.

During the autumn of 1897 a complaint was made by the Connecticut Training School for Nurses that our laundry work was not satisfactory, that the nurses' garments were injured in washing, etc. In response, careful investigations were made, including the making a record of the condition of every piece that went into the laundry, and of the condition of it when it came out, and this for some weeks. The result of our investigations was a conviction that the damage done in the laundry was overestimated; that some injuries actually incurred by the garments or articles of bed-linen, etc., were due to other causes; but that there was some ground of complaint; and further that the laundry apparatus is actually inadequate to the demands made unon it. We have accordingly made careful estimates to ascertain what changes in or additions to

our machinery are necessary, and at what cost they can be supplied. But no actual expenditure has been made. We find that an additional washer is needed, and a large mangle. For the cost the following estimate has been given us by a responsible party.

With this new apparatus no more labor will be required than at present, much better results will be reached, and the necessity of evening, or night work, which has been required to a considerable extent, during the latter half of the year particularly, will be averted. We think this improvement extremely desirable, but have not seen the way to meet the expense of making it.

We think it extremely desirable, also, that in the near future the plumbing of the east wing of the Congress Ave. building be renewed, in a measure corresponding to the work done last year on the west wing. Proposals have been made to do the plumber's work for \$390.00. The joiner's and mason's work would cost in addition about \$450.00. This would be a much needed improvement.

There is a great demand for more private rooms. There have been many weeks during the past year when we have been unable to meet the demand with our present number, and have had a waiting list of applicants.

We are still suffering from insufficient accommodation for the kitchen work, and for the table-service of the Nurses. This is a need increasing with every year. Either a new administration building, or an annex to the present one, for the above purposes, must soon be had, or the situation becomes extremely disadvantageous.

It is hardly needful to reiterate our plea for a new Maternity ward, strongly as we feel it. The fund for that purpose is still insufficient to warrant our beginning to build it, but we live in the hope that the means will be furnished. Complaints have been made to some extent by patients, and emphasized by the visitors, of disturbance of the desirable quietness of the Hospital by the noise of those passing through the corridors. We have recently contracted for the supply of one of the principal corridors with a rubber mat, running the length of it, and desire to supply the others with the same as soon as our means will permit.

In June last Dr. Percy D. Littlejohn, a graduate of the last class in the Yale Medical School and a licensed pharmacist, became our Apothecary; succeeding Mr. A. C. Robertson, who resigned to take another position after an intelligent and faithful service of nearly six years.

As in former years, we have been indebted to generous friends of the Hospital for many kind attentions and generous gifts in aid of our work. Among these should be mentioned the ministers of the city who have conducted religious services in the Chapel every Sunday evening. Also the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor of Calvary Baptist Church, which has sent a quartette every Sunday afternoon to sing hymns in the different wards, greatly to the comfort of those confined to their beds of weariness and pain.

We are glad to acknowledge our further indebtedness to our President, Gen. S. E. Merwin, who, as in former years, has had the grounds ornamented with flowering plants. Also to Miss Rose Porter and other ladies associated with her, for continued regular instructions given to the invalid children by a Kindergarten Teacher. Also to the Yale Glee and Banjo Clubs for an extremely pleasing concert given in the Chapel last Spring at the suggestion of Dr. W. J. Sheehan. Also to the Hospital Aid Society for supplying one hundred and sixty-two garments; to the Needlework Guild, Mrs. Mary T. Gridley president, for supplying three hundred and nineteen garments; to "Our Society," Mrs. F. B. Dexter president, for supplying ninetyeight garments. Also to the kind friend who for the seventh year provided a Steamboat Excursion for about one hundred and twenty patients, nurses and attendants, and on the same day, refreshments for those remaining in the Hospital because unable to go. Also to the many donors, a full list of whose donations will be found in the Appendix.

Your Committee take pleasure in recognizing the fidelity and diligence of the members of the Medical Staff; the faithful and most efficient service of the Superintendent of the Hospital and of the Superintendent of the Training School for Nurses, with her corps of assistants, whose most exacting duties have been performed to our satisfaction in all circumstances. Nor would we fail to mention the House Staff, whose indispensable services contribute so much to the comfort and the usefulness of the Institution.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

NEW HAVEN, CONN., Jan. 19, 1898.

To the Prudential Committee of the General Hospital Society of Connecticut:

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit the seventy-first annual report of receipts and disbursements, number of patients treated in the hospital, their condition at time of discharge, and other items of information and interest connected with the business of the year 1897.

The number of patients remaining in the hospital December 31st, 1896, was 115—68 males and 47 females; admitted during the year 1897, 1039—665 males and 374 females; making a total of 1154 under treatment. Of this number, 572 were discharged cured, 272 improved, 58 unimproved, 139 died, and 113 remained under treatment December 31st, 1897. There were 28 births—5 males and 23 females; also 2 still-births, which are not included in the number of deaths.

The whole number of weeks occupied was  $6173\frac{5}{4}$ , of which  $1899\frac{3}{4}$  were occupied by town patients receiving the benefit of State appropriation at the rate of \$2.63 per week. The average residence of each patient was  $5\frac{1}{4}$  weeks. Deducting the patients supported by the Marett and Gifford funds, the greater portion of whom were inmates of the Home for Incurables, the average residence of the remainder was  $4\frac{3}{10}$  weeks.

The patients admitted came from 72 different towns and villages in this State, and from 15 other States and countries; 708 were residents of the town of New Haven.

The largest number of patients any one day was 137; the smallest number 101; the daily average  $118\frac{4}{10}$ ; the attendants, and other inmates not patients, averaged  $99\frac{9}{10}$ ; making a total of  $218\frac{3}{10}$ ; of these  $41\frac{5}{10}$  were nurses (with matron and maid) of the Training School.

The Charity funds furnished support and treatment, wholly or in part, as follows:

The ambulance responded to 277 calls during the year.

The current receipts, less amount refunded to patients, were \$47,138.73; the current expenses were \$56,441.46; excess of expenses over receipts, \$9,302.73.

The average cost of supporting each patient in the hospital was \$8.95 $\frac{1}{2}$  per week; the daily average cost of food for all the inmates of the hospital was  $30\frac{3}{4}$  cts. These items are made up as follows:

The Marett, Gifford, and English Funds are Charity Funds, and the income can only be used for the support of poor patients. There seems to be a general impression that these funds have made the Hospital rich, and that it does not need more money. This impression is an erroneous one. The funds mentioned are a very great help to the institution in carrying on its strictly charitable work, but there still remains each year the same failure of receipts to meet expenses, due to the fact that so-called self-paying, town, and state patients do not pay the cost of their support.

With regard to the Free Beds, it must be borne in mind that the income from the endowment of each bed (\$5,000) is not sufficient to support a patient continuously throughout the year.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF VISITORS

To the Directors of the General Hospital Society of Connecticut:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Visitors in making their report for 1897 feel that, with existing financial conditions, it is useless to again emphasize what has been so constantly reiterated by this Board: the need of more adequate kitchen facilities and the immediate need of elevators in the shafts that already exist. There is one much needed improvement, however, which could be added at so little expense, that we are constrained to ask that it be adopted at some early period. We refer to rubber mattings in the alleys of the wards and in the general halls. There is considerable complaint from patients to the effect that they are disturbed and irritated by the noise of passing footsteps. This could be easily obviated by mattings, similar to those in use in other well appointed institutions.

So far as the general conduct of the Hospital is concerned, we have, on the whole, only words of commendation. The Superintendent and his staff are conscientious in their work and fulfil their duties faithfully. The House Surgeons render excellent assistance and deserve mention here. There is very little complaint from patients, and the nurses, under the direction of Miss Henry, are faithful to their obligations and sympathetic and kind. The Board would also add its commendation of the work of the Housekeeper, Mrs. Wiley, who with very inadequate facilities has rendered excellent service.

On the whole, we are gratified that the condition of both management and service grows better from year to year, and we hope that the much needed improvements may be realized in the near future.

The Hospital distinctly needs generous aid to raise the facilities of the effective departments of administration and housekeeping to a plane in keeping with

## TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES

The Training School for Nurses has been established for twenty-four years. At first the number of pupils was limited to six: within two years it was increased to eleven, then to fourteen, and these not being sufficient to meet the many demands for special and continuous attention which critical cases required, the Prudential Committee raised the number to seventeen in 1880, to nineteen in 1882, and to twenty-three in 1883. In 1884, the number was made to depend upon the number of patients in the hospital, and averaged during the past year with the head nurse and assistant 41.5. The pupils remain in the school for two years, pursuing their studies and daily routine of work under the charge of the superintendent of nursing. Each nurse is assigned to one ward or department for several weeks, and in the course of a year has studied surgical, medical and obstetrical nursing, and also the preparation of special dishes suitable for invalids and convalescents. Symptom records are kept, to enable the physician to ascertain the varied phases of disease, since he last saw his patient.

At the close of the term of study in the hospital the nurse has a vacation of one month, and then returns to take for eight months such cases of private practice and missionary nursing as shall be assigned her. Her home is in the hospital, when her services are not called for elsewhere, and the school pays the board of all the nurses there in excess of the number allowed.

The hospital authorities appreciate most highly the advantages of having this school established here. Those who enter it either have a special gift for nursing, or with a true spirit of self-sacrifice have devoted themselves to the noble work of ministering to others; consequently the duties of the department are performed more faithfully and more skillfully than in former years, when it was thought that strength was the only requisite in a nurse.

Those wishing to receive this course of instruction must apply to the Secretary of the School, when, if approved by the executive committee, they will be accepted as pupils in the hospital. The candidates must be over twenty-three and under thirty-five years of age, and present a certificate from a clergy-man and physician as to their good moral character and sound health. They will be received for one month on probation and without compensation.

Information concerning the school will be furnished by the President or other members of the executive committee.

Pupils are received from any State.

Application for admission should be made as early as possible to the Secretary, Miss Emily Betts, No. 3 Hillhouse avenue, New Haven.

Physicians or others, in any part of the State, desiring to secure the services of trained nurses for men or women, medical or surgical patients, should apply by telegraph, telephone or letter, stating the nature of the case, to the Superintendent of Nursing, New Haven Hospital.

The price per week for services of a trained nurse is \$12 in and \$15 out of the State,\* unless two members of the family are ill at the same time, when there will be a slight additional charge. It cannot be too strongly impressed upon the public that it is more economical and safer for the patient to employ a reliable nurse, than to indulge in a natural but misplaced sentiment which sacrifices the strength of an entire family in the care of one invalid member.
