Professor Anthony V. Baker came to our faculty in the fall of 2000 from a distinguished background in law practice, Christian alternative dispute resolution, and legal education. As an undergraduate at Duke University, he held that institution's most prestigious scholarship, the Angier B. Duke. He received his J.D. degree from the University of North Carolina, and an LL.M. degree from the University of Wisconsin. Following the receipt of his LL.M. degree, he taught in the law school at Pepperdine University.

In the fall semester, 2000, Professor Baker taught Criminal Law and a seminar entitled Constitutional History: The Roots of Civil Rights, 1770-1900. This spring he will be teaching Criminal Procedure and Law in American History. His teaching receives the highest praise.
