Jennifer Cable has performed throughout the United States and Europe in solo repertoire ranging from the Renaissance through the 20th Century. In addition to opera and oratorio, Cable has sung with many chamber music ensembles, including Tragicomedia, Musica Nova, the Kennedy Center Chamber Players, the Richmond Chamber Players and Currents. She is a founding member and regular artist with Affetti Musicali, an early music ensemble well known to Richmond audiences, and has made several solo appearances with the Richmond Symphony Orchestra.

Cable's undergraduate study at Oberlin College was followed by graduate work at the Eastman School of Music where she earned a Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts and was awarded Performer's Certificates in both Opera and Vocal Performance. She has attended the Aspen Music Festival, the Akademie für Alte Musik in Bremen, Germany, the International Institute for Chamber Music in Munich, the Aldeburgh Festival and the Britten-Pears School in Aldeburgh, England, and the Franz Schubert Institute in Vienna. On the faculty of the University of Richmond, Cable is an Associate Professor of Music and the director of the vocal program. She is currently studying voice with Marlena Malas in New York City and has recorded for Word Records and the Contemporary Record Society.

Ulysses Kirksey, Baroque cello, is in his twelfth year as conductor of the Petersburg Symphony Orchestra. He joined the symphony in 1980, became assistant conductor in 1986, and conductor in 1989, succeeding the late Dr. F. Nathaniel Gatlin.

Kirksey was born in Richmond and began his music studies at the Manhattan School of Music in New York City. He earned both bachelor's and master's degrees in music as a cello major and studied conducting and orchestral works with Aton Coppola, Nicolas Flagello, and Lucas Foss.

After spending several years playing in various types of ensembles in the United States and Europe, Kirksey returned to Richmond and became a member of the Richmond Chamber Players, appearing as principal cellist in many of their concerts.

In addition to conducting in Petersburg, Kirksey is active in widely divergent areas of performing. He plays modern cello, the Baroque cello, and theviola da gamba. He is a member of the Williamsburg Symphonia, and conducted the Symphonia Youth Concerts in the fall of 1993 and 1994, He is now in his thirteenth year as a member of

the Governor's Music in Colonial Williamsburg, which recently recorded music that was part of Thomas Jefferson's library; some of these recordings have been aired on National Public Radio. He is a member of the Viola da Gamba Society of America.

Kirksey also performs in period ensembles in Richmond and Norfolk and is frequently asked to conduct festival youth orchestras in the counties surrounding Richmond.

Kenneth Merrill, harpsichord, is currently on the coaching faculty of the Juilliard Vocal Arts Department, where he often acts as musical director of productions of the Juilliard Opera Center and the Juilliard Opera Theater. He is also on the faculty of the Manhattan School of Music, where he teaches song repertoire, accompanying and vocal-instrumental ensemble. He has been associated with the Aspen Music Festival since 1980, acting as head coach in charge of musical preparation of the Aspen Opera Theater Center, led by Director Edward Berkeley. In 1998, he also began an association with the Chautauqua Institution Voice Program led by Marlena Malas.

As a conductor of opera, he has led productions of works by Britten, Mozart, Handel, Monteverdi, Cavalli, and Rossini. As pianist he has appeared in concert with such artists as Gérard Souzay, Anna Moffo, Robert Merrill, Eleanor Steber, James King, Paul Groves, Charlotte Hellekant, Faith Esham, Ruth Golden, and Jeanette Thompson. He has recently begun an association with Regina Resnik Presents, which presents recitals built around specific composers or themes and accompanied with narration by Mme. Resnik.

As harpsichordist and organist, he has appeared in many concerts of early music, particularly with the Baroque ensemble Affetti Musicali, which he helped to found in 1992. He has performed continuo in nearly all the operas of Mozart and Rossini and in many of those of Handel.

A native Arkansas, Mr. Merrill received his Bachelor of Music from the University of Arkansas and his Master of Music from the Juilliard School.
