Dulles Tells U.S. President FBI Should Increase Activity; Search Continues in Mississippi

WASHINGTON, June, 27, (AP).—

ALLEN Dulles recommended Friday that the Federal Bureau of Investigation step up its role against "tarheel activity" in Mississippi. A few hours later the FBI reported the arrest of three white Mississippians on charges of threatening civil rights workers.

After reporting to President Johnson on his special mission to Mississippi, the former director of the Central Intelligence Agency told White House reporters his principal recommendation was that the FBI play an expanded part, working with state and local authorities, to "control and prosecute terroristic activities."

Dulles was sent to Mississippi as Johnson's personal emissary after the disappearance of three civil rights workers last Sunday. An FBI spokesman said the cases are not connected.

The men arrested were charged with interfering with and threatening two white civil rights workers were distributing leaflets about a voter registration meeting to be held at a Negro school.

Meanwhile Governor Paul Johnson, arriving in Philadelphia, Miss, Friday said he would appeal to landowners in this red hill country to help search for clues in the baffling disappearance of three civil rights workers.

The governor expressed confidence that the trio—missing since Sunday night—would be found. But he added, "I don't know how long it will take—it might not be in my lifetime."

Johnson arrived here shortly after the state highway patrol said the station wagon used by the trio was gutted by fire at least 12 hours after their disappearance.

Johnson, after a briefing by search leaders said he would make an appeal over the local radio stations to all landowners in the listening area to search their own farms in hopes of turning up a clue.

Asked if he thought the missing trio was still in Mississippi, he said "that of course is a possibility. They could be in Cuba. That, too, is a possibility."

The charred vehicle used by the trio was found in a swampy thicket northeast of Philadelphia Tuesday.

Gwin Cole, the patrol's chief inspector at the search scene, said the station wagon was driven to the point where it was found and burned between 11 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday.

Cole said two persons told the patrol they had driven past the spot at 11 a.m. Monday and the station wagon had not been there then.

At 5 p.m. that same day, Choctaw Indians stripped two hubcaps from the station wagon, Cole said. The Indians said the vehicle was still smoking.

These developments came as search parties poked grimly through Indian country south of here for the missing youths—Michael Schwerner, 24, and Handy Goodman, 21, both of New York City, and James Chaney, 22, a Meridian Negro.

Aldo Moro Resigns As Italian Premier

ROME, June 27. (Reuter).—Signor Aldo Moro's six "months old Italian centre" left coalition last night resigned after a surprise defeat to private schools.

A spokesman for President Antonio Segni said the President at a meeting with Signor Moro last night accepted the government's resignation. He asked the government to stay in office temporarily to attend the current business.

The cabinet announced earlier it was resigning so as to allow "a clarification of the political situation."

An official communique said the decision was reached after discussing last night's assembly vote.

USSR Turning Over Missile Operation To Cuban Forces

WASHINGTON, June 27, (AP).—The Soviet government is now in process of turning over of the 24-base anti-aircraft missile system in Cuba to the Cuban armed forces of Premier Fidel Castro, according to the best information available to officials here.

Indications are that the central command set up for the missile sites is still in control of Soviet officers.

The turnover of operations to Cubans was reported to have occurred at the bases scattered around as the Soviets moved toward completion of the withdrawal of their troops from Cuba.

He was accompanied by the President of the Afghan National Assembly, the Minister of Interior, the Minister of Mines and Industries and the Governors of Kapisa and Perwan provinces.

After spending the night at the Club of the Textile Co. at Sherkhankhail, His Majesty returned to Kabul yesterday evening.

Greece Willing To Discuss Cyprus Crisis With Turkey On Representative Level

GREEK Foreign Minister Stavros Costopoulos said Friday night Greece was willing to discuss the Cyprus question with Turkey and Britain "on the level of representative" and in the presence of the U.N. mediator for Cyprus, Sakari S. Tuomioja of island.

Yugoslavia-Polish Views On Principle Issues Very Close

WARSAW, June 27, (Reuter).—President Tito of Yugoslavia who yesterday had lengthy talks with the Polish Communist Party Leadership last night said that the views of both states on principal problems were "very close—but not identical."

He was proposing a toast to Polish President Aleksander Zawadzki at a state reception last night organised in his honour.

Earlier yesterday Tito and the Polish party leaders headed by Wladyslaw Gomulka spent many hours in private consultations which dealt primarily with the Sino-Soviet dispute.

Poland now supports a world conference to discuss China's policy but Yugoslavia, despite pressure from Moscow, has not announced its backing.

Last night President Tito criticized Chinese policies.

Later last night the Marshal and his group left Warsaw by train for a tour of provincial areas starting in Krakow, Southern Poland.

Border Marking Team Leader Leaves For Peking



Kabul, June 27.—Mr. Sultan Mahmud Ghazi, Chief of the Afghan Air Authority and leader of the Afghan delegation to the Sino-Afghan Border Commission, left Kabul for Peking on Thursday. Members of the Afghan delegation have already left for Pamir on June 19th.

Mr. Ghazi is accompanied on this trip by Mr. Amir Ahmad, Chief of Cartography, Mr. Ghulam Rasool and Mr. Ghulam Hazrat, as advisors and Mr. Mohammad Anwar Bashar, representative of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

The Delegation is expected to start the work of demarcating the boundary line on July 6th after preliminary discussions in Peking.

Mr. Ghazi and his companions were seen off at the airport by certain officials of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Charge d'Affaires together with officials of the Embassy of the People's Republic of China in Kabul.

Costopoulos, as he had spoken with Tuomioja during the day, told reporters he understood the mediator would establish an office in Geneva and he had agreed to send a greek representative to talk with him there.

But he said Greece could not enter into Cyprus talks with Turkey on a higher level because the positions of the two countries on the question were so different.

He answered the reporters' questions at a reception at Greek delegation headquarters in New York given by the head of the delegation Ambassador Dimitri S. Bitsios.

Another guest, Cypriot Foreign Minister Spyros Kyrianiou, said he too had heard that Tuomioja, lately in Nicosia and New York had decided to settle in Geneva. But he said government would not send a representative there "for the time being."

Costopoulos came to New York Friday morning with Greek Prime Minister George Papandreou after two days of Cyprus talks in Washington with President Johnson, who had held similar talks in the two previous days with Turkish Prime Minister Ismet Inonu.

Indications were that Johnson suggested direct Greece-Turkish negotiations on Cyprus but Greece would not agree to them.

Costopoulos said his government believed the field should be left to the U.N. mediator and Johnson agreed in principle with him.

Papandreou and Costopoulos were guests of honour at the reception. But Papandreou did not appear there or earlier at the council on foreign relations, where he had been scheduled to speak.

Costopoulos explained that the Prime Minister was very tired and had to see U.S. Under-Secretary of State George Ball at his hotel half hour after the reception began.

Water Supply Survey To Be Started Soon For Three Cities

KABUL, June 27.—The Agreement on surveying Kandahar, Herat and Mazar-i-Sharif was signed by the Department of Land and Water Resources and the United States Agency for International Development at the Ministry of Planning in Kabul Wednesday afternoon.

The USAID will provide a sum of \$200,000 to implement the provisions of these agreement.

The agreement is designed to facilitate the preparation of water-supply projects in these towns by carrying out exploratory drilling, planning networks of water-mains and setting up establishments needed to maintain water-supply facilities.

The agreement was signed on behalf of Afghanistan by Engineer Mir Akbar Reza, Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Chief of the Department of Land and Water Resources, and by Mr. Hubbell, Deputy Director of USAID in Kabul on behalf of the United States government.

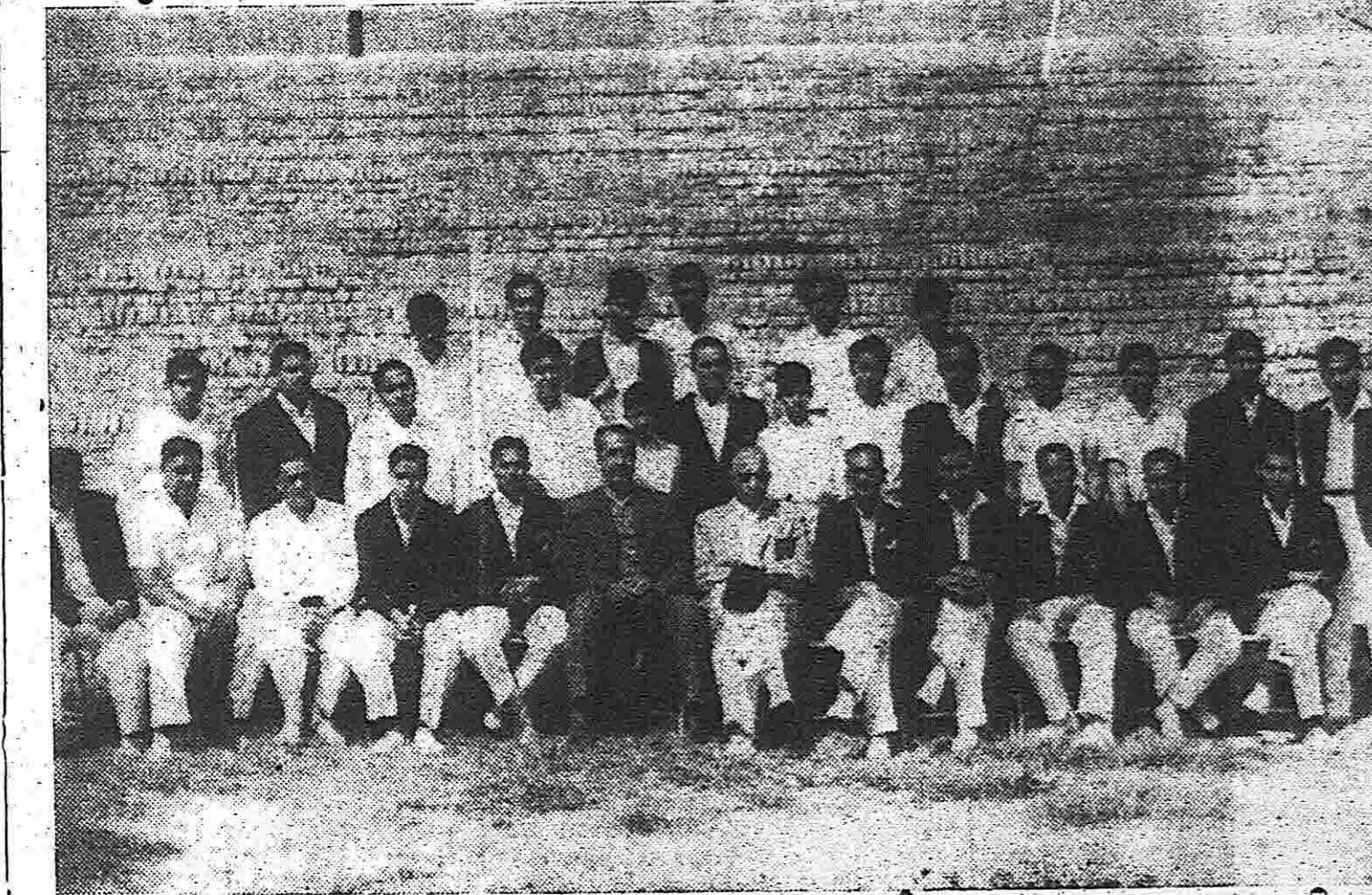

Detailed Contours Shown In New Map Of Moon's Surface

WASHINGTON, June 27.—The United States has produced the first detailed contour map of the visible portion of the moon's surface. The new map was displayed Tuesday by officials of the U.S. Army Map Service. It was prepared to aid astronauts and scientists in lunar orientation and research in anticipation of future landings on the moon.

Produced in co-operation with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), the colour map lists more than 5,000 of the moon's surface features.

Officials said the map was prepared from carefully selected lunar photographs from Pic Du Midi Observatory in France and Lick Observatory at Mount Hamilton, California. The highly detailed map will be used in a lunar orbit and landing approach simulator device now under development at the NASA Research Centre at Hampton, Virginia.

Compiled on a scale of one to five million (one inch equalling five million inches), the new map is expected to be replaced next year by one now being prepared on a scale of one to two million, map officials said.

(Contd. from page 2) for a powerful consistent administration. At the forthcoming LDP presidential election, to be participated in by the party's 289 Lower and 146 Upper-House members plus 46 Upper-House Delegates a successful candidate should command a simple majority of 241 votes.

The incumbent Prime Minister is generally believed as the strongest, to be closely followed by Sato who heads the biggest faction in the party. Sato's success will be ensured if and when Fujiyama, just before the voting, cancels his candidacy and throws his support behind him against Ikeda.

Possibilities Mentioned The only possibility for Fujiyama, popular among the general public, though relatively a new comer into politics, to be elected will be if none of the three get a majority in the first voting and Ikeda, taking the result as "non-confidence" of the party members against him, steps out of the second voting.

Then, Fujiyama may reasonably count on the support of the anti-Sato forces among the electors. Due to his remarkable sharpness of mind, Sato has many fervent followers as well as opponents within the LDP.

USSR, Sweden Ask Further Relaxation Of World Tensions

STOCKHOLM, June 27, (Reuter).—A joint Soviet-Swedish communiqué has been issued here.

The communiqué says that the chairman of the council of ministers of the USSR, N. S. Khrushchev had talks with Prime Minister Tage Erlander and other members of the Swedish government.

In the course of the talks which were marked by a sincere and friendly atmosphere, the communiqué points out, a number of questions of international situation as well as important question of the relations between the USSR and Sweden were discussed.

It has noted with satisfaction that certain relaxation of tensions was in evidence in international situation after the conclusion in Moscow last year of the treaty on banning nuclear weapon tests in the atmosphere, in outer space and under water. Other measures, specifically, the agreement on non-orbiting space vehicles with nuclear weapons on board and the decision of the Soviet Union and Britain on cutting the output of fissionable materials for military purposes contributed to the improvement of the international climate. Other measures aimed at strengthening the tendency towards relaxation of tensions were also discussed. The importance of finding a peaceful and durable settlement of the European security problem was emphasised.

The sides unanimously agreed that, particularly in the conditions created by modern war technology, states must refrain from the use of force or the threat of force in settling various disputes. Both sides stressed the important role of the United Nations as an instrument of peace. It is necessary to continue supporting and strengthening the efficiency of this world organisation.

In the course of the talks on disarmament identity of views was achieved concerning the need to continue the efforts to assure the reduction of armaments and to advance further to the goal to which all must aspire, namely to general and complete disarmament under necessary international control.

Hope was expected that the talks at the 18-nation committee in Geneva would contribute to the realisation of concrete disarmament measures and that it would be possible to bring practical realisation of disarmament. The Soviet Union and Sweden, as member states of the 18-nation committee pledged to make efforts, to the extent to which it depends on each side, for the discussion of the disarmament question to yield practical result. Both sides stressed the importance of preventing by means of international agreements the further spread of the nuclear weapon.

In the course of the talks it was noted that both the Soviet Union and Sweden seek to consolidate peaceful co-existence and peaceful co-operation between countries with different social systems. Satisfaction was expressed over the fact that Soviet-Swedish relations were marked by good-neighbourship and were developing in a favourable direction. Both sides expressed the desire to continue to develop and strengthen friendly links between the USSR and Sweden.

The Soviet side declared that it highly appreciated Sweden policy of neutrality and considered that this policy constituted a major contribution to tranquillity and stability in northern Europe. The Soviet Union and Sweden reaffirmed their striving to promote in every way solutions that could help ease tension and strengthen peace in Europe.

Tshombe In Leopoldville Tells Congolese To Reconcile And Bury Differences

LEOPOLDVILLE, Congo, June 27, (AP).—**CRIS** of "save the Congo" greeted "Kataga ex-President Moise Tshombe Friday night as he urged warring Congolese politicians to bury the hatchet.

"I am convinced that a total and sincere reconciliation of all Congolese is the only chance of saving this country from misery and anarchy," Tshombe said.

It was his first public utterance since he stepped on to Congolese soil Friday just before dawn, after slightly more than a year of self-imposed exile in Madrid.

Tshombe flung his hands above his head and his face broke into a broad grin as hundreds of cheering Congolese chanted his name and clapped widely.

He demanded the release of all political prisoners and reconciliation between the Leopoldville authorities and rebel leaders Pierre Mulele and Gaston Oumialot.

He called for the return of Stanleyville's breakaway government Chief Antoine Gizenga, who has been held on a swampy island in the mouth of the Congo river ever since his regime collapsed in January 1962.

"Gizenga, Mulele and all the Congo's sons must be reconciled," Tshombe said.

Policemen drove a flying wedge through the cheering crowd to let Tshombe reach the doorway of the restaurant of Leopoldville's zoo, where Tshombe had hastily summoned news men and his supporters.

Tshombe said his sudden return had been made necessary by the evolution of the Congo's political situation.

He thanked the Leopoldville authorities for their "brotherly" greeting and said his talks with political leaders here was the determining factor when he decided his line of conduct.

Tshombe had been driven straight to the residence of Premier Cyrille Adoula, who conferred with him for more than three hours.

Later the Katanga leader called on President Joseph Kasavubu. The Congo's government has lodged him in a guest house next door to Adoula's riverside home and provided him with an official limousine.

Large Jira Held By Afridis At Bagh

KABUL, June 27.—A report from Tirah in Northern Independent Pakhtunistan says that a large jirga of Afridi divines, elders, chieftains and tribesmen was recently held under the chairmanship of Mr. Shaista Gul Khan at Bagh.

Speakers at the meeting reaffirmed Pakhtunistan's freedom and territorial integrity and said that to win the right of self-determination was the first and foremost aim of the people of Pakhtunistan. The jirga, pursuant to its decisions in the past, urged government of Pakistan to desist from further intervention in Independent Pakhtunistan, especially in Afridi territory.

Home News In Brief

KABUL, June 27.—A Soviet Delegation sent to set the plant for manufacturing prefabricated houses in operation and to build homes has arrived in Kabul. The leader and members of the Soviet delegation met with the Minister of Public Works and the Minister of Planning. Mr. Yaftali introduced to the Soviet Delegation Mr. Farhung, the Deputy Minister of Planning and leader of the Afghan delegation as well as its members.

Talks between the two delegations will begin soon.

KABUL, June 27.—Dr. Bratt Ambassador of Sweden at the Court of Kabul paid a courtesy call on Mr. Mohammad Sarwar Omer, the Minister of Commerce on Thursday morning. Viet Cong Blow Explosives In Saigon Killing Three; 2 Americans Are Injured

SAIGON, June 27, (Reuter).—**THREE** explosions occurred in Saigon within 15 minutes this afternoon, killing three people and wounding eight including two Americans.

In downtown Saigon a pile of captured Viet Cong explosives blew up in the Central Intelligence Headquarters and heavily damaged two buildings but the only casualties were two slightly wounded.

Chemicals caught fire while being unloaded from a truck for analysis and all personnel were evacuated from nearby buildings before the blast occurred.

The blast rocked the entire city and police immediately threw a cordon along the waterfront as thousands tried to enter the area.

At about the same time at Saigon airport a plastic charge, apparently planted by the Viet Cong, slightly hurt two Americans about to board a plane to return home.

Both Americans were treated on the spot for minor cuts and boarded the plane.

Four suspects were reported arrested. The third explosion was in suburb of Saigon when a man in uniform tossed a grenade into a house killing three Vietnamese children and injuring four others.
