DAYTON, Ohio, April 9, 1976 --- Three members of the University of Dayton community will celebrate their golden jubilee in the Society of Mary on May 2 when Brothers William M. Busch, Frank Deibel and Russell Joly mark their fiftieth anniversaries as Marinists. A special anniversary Mass in the University Chapel will highlight the occasion.

WILLIAM M. BUSCH, S.M.

Brother Busch served as Treasurer of the University for eighteen years, retiring in 1968. Prior to this he taught at high schools in Detroit; Cleveland; Hamilton, (O.); Sioux City; Dayton; Brooklyn, N.Y.; and Covington, Ky. At the Covington school he was principal, and at Trinity High in Brooklyn he was vice-principal.

Brother Busch is the author of a book published in 1938 by the American Automobile Association of Washington, D.C., "Driver Education and Training." From 1938 to 1942 he was manager of UD's bookstore.

He holds a Master's degree in Education Administration, Bachelor's degrees in chemistry and mathematics, and an accounting associate degree.

FRANK DEIBEL, S.M.

Brother Frank Deibel, long associated with the University library, is a member of the Society's small group of sailing enthusiasts at the Marianist center Indian Lake, Ohio.

Decoupage is another avocation, in addition to cycling, swimming and fishing.

He is currently updating "Hallowed Memories," a history of the local province of Mary to 1953 by Brother Knust.

He spends several days a week at Mt. St. John Press, where he works on photos for the offset press.

Receiving his B.A. in 1929 from UD, he also attended Western Reserve University where he received a B.S. in library science in 1943.

Brother Frank originated "Marygraphs" - which are similar to crossword puzzles but with a Marianist theme. They appeared in the Marianist Magazine.

Although he has nephews and nieces, Brother Frank's only living close relative is a sister in Columbus.

RUSSELL JOLY, S.M.

For Brother Russel Joly, 1926 marked the beginning of a career in biology that led him into cancer research, the study of plant hormones, and a teaching career that included Cathedral Latin High School in Cleveland, Purcell in Cincinnati, North Central in Pittsburgh, the University of Chicago, Trinity College in Sioux City, Iowa, and the University of Dayton.

His pollen studies appeared in the New York Times. His cancer studies were done with the prestigious scientific group known as the Institutum Divi Thoma (Institute of St. Thomas). His research into the metabolism of ordinary yeast was part of his cancer research. His experiments in plant hormones were done with the late Dr. William Beck, an internationally famous biologist at the University of Dayton.

Brother Joly, a 1923 graduate, is a native of Detroit. He also studied at the Universities of Pittsburgh and Chicago.

When interviewed, Brother Joly was typically close to his microscope, where he was inspecting an unusual organism known as a "water bear" (hysibius). Although microscopic in size, a look through the microscope revealed that it had many of the features of a large animal, including feet with claws.

Brother Joly had taught at high schools in Cincinnati and Cleveland, in addition to other schools before coming to UD.
