

TO THE HONORABLE WILLIAM LEXTALL Efq; Speaker of the Honorable House of Commons.



Efides the Generall account, I have already given, by one of my fervants whom I tent up to London yeflerday, I thought fit to fend this beater Mr. Beles, who may more particularly informe you. Concerning the abundant goodneffe of God to this army, and the whole Kingdome in the late victory, obtained at Nafeby Field: The whole body of their foote taken and flaine, fuch a lift of the prelioners.

could be made up in this fhort time I have fent, the horfe all quitted the field, and were purfied within three miles of Leiceffer : their Ammunition, Ordnance, and carriages all taken, among which there were, two Demy Cannons, a whole Culverin and a Morter peece befides leffer peeces : We intend to move to Leiceffer, as ioone as we have taken Order with our prifoners, and wounded men : all that I defire, is, that the honour of this great never to be forgotten mercy, may be given to God in an extraordinary day of thanksgiveing ; And that it may be improved to the good of his Church, and this kingdome : which fhall be faithfully endevoured by, Sir

Sir this is none other but the hand of God, and to him alone belongs the Glory, wherein none are to thare with hims, the Generall ferved you with all faithfullneffe and housenr, and the best commendations I can give him in , that I dare fay he attributes all to God, and would rather perift then affumme to himfelfe, which is an himeft and a thrining way, and yet as much for branery may be given to him in this adion, as to a man. Honeft menserved you faith ully in this action, Sir they are trusty, I befeech you in the name of God not to discourage them, Iwill this action may beget thankefullnesse, and humility in all that are concerned in it, he that venters his life for the liberty of his Country I will be irust God for the liberty of his conscience, and you for the liberty he fights for, in this he refts who is, moß shiplute as yet obtained. the

was God our Strength, theirs Queene Mary, our forlorne hopes began the p ay whiles both fides labour'd for the hill and wind, which in conclusion was as it were equally devided, out forforne hope gaue back, and their right wing of Horie fell upon our left with fuch gallantry that ours were immediately routed, aboue a thousand ran a long with them, but fuch was the courage and diligence of the right wing back't with the Foote, that they not onely beat back the enemy from their Traine, but fell in with their Foot and after two houres dispute won all the field-perces (of which fome are Cannon) most of their Badgage, Morter-peices, Boates, nine thousand Armes much powder and match, &c. And nigh foure thousand priloners, their number was about twelve thousand, fome fix hundered flaine, many Commanders of note, of ours not aboue one hundered, our Horfe are still in pursuite and have taken many of theirs, the Sanderd is ours, the Kings Wagon and many Ladies. God Almighty give us thankefull hearts for this great Victory, the most absolute as yet obtained, the Generall, Lieutenant-Generall Cronswell, and Major Generall Skippon / who is that in the fide, but not dangerous) did beyond expression gallantly, so did all our other Commanders and Souldiers, we have loft but two Captaines, though this come late, be pleafed to accept it from,

And that Mr. Marshall and Mr. Vines be befired in Breach at Christ Church before the Parliament. And that the Lord Major, Aldermen and Common Councell doe meet the Parliament there. And it is further Ordered, That Friday being the feaben and twentieth of this instant lune be like wife fet a part for a Publique day of Chankfgis bing for this bidop in all the Churches and Chappets in the leverall Counties of the Kingdome under the power of the Parliament.
