To develop a bond among these minority students and provide service to the African American community as a whole, the Greek letter organizations were founded. These organizations include- Alpha Kappa Alpha, Alpha Phi Alpha, Delta Sigma Theta, Kappa Alpha Psi, Omega Psi Phi, Phi Beta Sigma, Sigma Gamma Rho, and Zeta Phi Beta.

Recently a Black Greek Forum washeld to adress the issues related to these organizations role on campus as well as the greater community today.

The forum began with an introduction from Mr. Timothy Spraggins, Director of African American Student Affairs. Spraggins stressed that the eight recognized Black Greek Letter Organizations have a "commomground and commonality" among them. He suggested that once you get past the color of the shirts or paraphenalia you can find a common purpose among them.

This "commonality" was echoed by the members of the organizations represented. Along with the ideal that being member of a sorority or fraternity requires a significant amount of time and effort.


FACULTY HIGHLIGHTS

As an Assistant Director and Coordinator, Kathleen Henderson does programs for not only African Americans but Latin Americans, commuters, and students with disabilities as well. She works as both the primary person in charge as well as with program advisors to organize different programs. The programs she creates for the University allows multicultural activities to be open to the entire campus and not just to the aforementioned groups. Some of these types of activities include Black History month, Latin American Awareness month, and the Martin Luther King, Jr. Breakfast. Her primary focus, though, is to help students realize their potential here at UD.

Although she is very busy at UD, she still takes time for herself. She enjoys listening to music, reading, shopping, going to the movies and her extended family. She is also an active member of Wayman A.M.E. church. Overall, she enjoys working with people and life in general.



It is an urban love story full of the danger of the streets, the passion of young love, the defiance of a younger brother, and the hope of a couple that has fallen in love.

"Jason's Lyric" relays the story of Jason, portrayed by Allen Payne, as a young African American male who is coming of age. Jason is a different kind of hero. He places his family's well being ahead of his own - as he works long hours in a television shop to support them. It is while working that he meets Lyric (Jada Pinkett), a young sister who will eventually change his life.

Yet Jason's somewhat volatile relationship with his brother Josh (Bokeem Woodbine), and his undying devotion to his mother (Lisa Carson), sometimes conflict with his growing love for Lyric. It is this conflict of interest that connects the storyline and eventually concludes it.

In the midst of the ever twisting plot - there is excellent acting from a

multifaceted group of entertainers. Jada Pinkett and Allen Payne are tremendous as the movies central characters; while there are some surprise performances by comedian Eddie Griffin, Naughty By Nature's Treach as Lyric's older brother, as well as a brief but outstanding performance by Forest Whittaker as Mad Dog, Jason's father.

"Jason's Lyric" is a riveting romance that dares to show an urban tale of love and courage. It echoes the message that it takes courage to put your foot down and get what you want out of life. It is this courage that allows for the danger, passion, defiance, and hope that is a constant force in Jason' Lyric. PUZZLE


