
## **HOMICIDE IN CALIFORNIA, 1983**

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## a message from the Attorney General . . . .

Homicide in California, 1983 provides a comprehensive look at the crime of homicide, its victims, and those arrested and prosecuted for the crime. Added features of this year's annual report are national and international homicide rates and a special analysis of the relationship between victim and offender.

Homicide crimes have decreased 22.5 percent during the past three years (from 3,405 in 1980 to 2,640 in 1983). It is difficult to define an exact reason for short-term homicide trends; however, shifts in the economy, demography, incapacitation of violent offenders, and other social influences and responses are all contributing factors. Our optimism should be tempered by the fact that a ten-year increase (from 1,355 in 1970 to 3,405 in 1980) preceded the current downward trend.

Geographically, the average homicide rate is higher in the more populated counties than in less populated counties (12.2 versus 6.3). This correlation between county population and the number of homicides reflects the impact of urban environmental stress.

In only 3 out of 10 homicide cases were the victim and offender strangers to each other. The weapons used most often in homicides were firearms and knives, 54.5 and 25.1 percent, respectively. The homicide rate for male victims was more than three times that of female victims. The rate for black victims was almost seven times that of white victims and more than twice the rate of Hispanic victims.

Of 3,440 dispositions of adults arrested for murder, 22.3 percent were released by law enforcement or prosecutors and 17.3 percent were dismissed or acquitted in the courts. Of the 2,078 convictions, 28.3 percent were convicted of murder and 71.7 percent were convicted of other offenses.

Of the 588 convictions for murder, the death penalty sentence was given to 34 individuals. Thus, only 1.0 percent of all murder arrest dispositions result in the death penalty, reflecting a highly deliberative and prudent criminal justice process.

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## INTRODUCTION

Homicide in California, 1983 provides an annual overview of the crime of homicide and its victims. information on persons arrested for murder, and the system's response by type of disposition and sentence given. Homicide data are monitored on an annual basis to detect significant year-to-year changes and to provide information on special interest topics such as national and international homicide data.

The major sections of the report are:

- The Crime and Its Victims
- Arrests for Murder
- Dispositions of Adults Arrested for Murder

Most data presented were obtained from three independently compiled Bureau of Criminal Statistics (BCS) data bases: the Automated Homicide File for data pertaining to both willful and justifiable homicides; the Monthly Arrest and Citation Register for data relevant to the characteristics of persons arrested for murder; and the Offender-Based Transaction Statistics for information on types of dispositions, sentences, and death penalty cases. The reader is cautioned against comparing data from the three independent data bases.

Trend data are shown from 1974, when the Automated Homicide File was established. Prior to this time, data on homicide variables were not available for analysis or comparison.

The analysis of race/ethnic data must be considered in light of the subjectivity of the labeling process and recent classification changes, such as those of the U.S. Bureau of the Census (1980).

Included in this year's report is a section displaying national and international homicide data for 1980. While these data are not meant to be used as a basis for comparisons between states or nations, they are provided for your general information.

In an effort to reduce the incidence of unknown homicide crime data, BCS implemented procedures to deal with incomplete records. The result of this effort, as measured from 1980, has been a substantial decrease in the amount of unknown data. A number of changes in the frequency distributions. of certain variables did occur. However, despite the changes, essential relationships between the categories of these variables, for the most part, did not change,

A special project was carried out to further clear up unknowns in the 1980, 1981, and 1982 data. The result of this follow-up study on the relationship of the victim to the offender is shown on page 42.

This publication relies principally on charts to convey essential facts about homicide in California. These charts refer to and are based on tables presented in the Data Section at the back of the report. The Data Section contains raw and "analyzed" data tables. For any given variable, the raw data table shows the frequency count of each category, including that of "unknown." When, for purposes of analysis, unknown data are removed and categories are combined, the table becomes an analyzed data table. Analyzed data tables are the source tables for all charts in the report.

## **HIGHLIGHTS**



## CRIMES

- From 1980 to 1983, the number of willful homicides decreased from 3,405 to 2,640; the rate decreased from 14.3 to 10.5.
- More victims were killed at their places of residence than at other locations (37.7 percent).
- More victims were killed by firearms than by all other types of weapons combined (54.5 percent).

## **ARRESTS**

- From 1982 to 1983, the murder arrest rate decreased 5.8 percent.
- In 1983, of the 3,397 arrestees for murder, 88.7 percent were male.

## DISPOSITIONS

Of the 3,440 persons arrested for murder and disposed of in 1983:

- 17.1 percent were convicted of murder.
- 43.3 percent were convicted of other offenses.
- 39.6 percent were released, dismissed, or acquitted.

## **DEATH PENALTY**

■ 34 persons convicted of first degree murder were sentenced to death.

## PEACE OFFICERS KILLED

■ In 1983, 9 peace officers were killed in the line of duty.

## JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDES

- The most frequent contributing circumstance for a justifiable homicide by a peace officer was that of a felon attacking a peace officer (39.7 percent).
- The most frequent contributing circumstance for a justifiable homicide by a private citizen was in the commission of a crime (76.2 percent).

## **FOLLOW-UP STUDY**

The follow-up study of 1980, 1981, and 1982 homicide cases revealed that:

- The most frequent relationship of victims to offenders remained the friend or acquaintance category (44.7 percent).
- The stranger category increased from 10.1 percent in the initial study to 27.8 percent in the follow-up study.

#### NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL HOMICIDES

- California reported a homicide rate of 14.5.
- The United States reported a homicide rate of 10.2.



## WILLFUL HOMICIDE - The Crime and Its Victims

The crime of willful homicide is defined by the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program of the Federal Bureau of Investigation as the "willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another." Attempted murder, justifiable homicide, manslaughter by negligence, and suicide are excluded. The data presented in this section of the report coincide with that definition, and were obtained almost exclusively from the Automated Homicide File. Other data sources are indicated in the footnotes of the appropriate tables.

## From 1982 to 1983:

- The number of willful homicides decreased from 2,778 to 2,640.
- The willful homicide rate per 100,000 population decreased 6.2 percent (11.2 to 10.5).


#### From 1974 to 1983:

- The number of willful homicides increased from 1,970 to 2,640.
- The willful homicide rate per 100,000 population increased 12.9 percent (9.3 to 10.5).

For purposes of comparison, similar increases in the rates of other violent crimes during this period were as follows:

- Forcible rape 19.7 percent.
- Robbery 36.9 percent.
- Aggravated assault 22.9 percent.


# CHART 1. VIOLENT CRIMES Percent Increase in Rate per 100,000 Population from 1974 to 1983







When willful homicide victims were analyzed by sex, it was found that:

- In 1983, 77.8 percent were male and 22.2 percent were female.
  - For each year, 1974—1983, the larger proportion of homicide victims were male (from 73.6 to 79.6 percent). ▶


When willful homicide victims were analyzed by race/ethnic group, it was found that:

- In 1983, 37.0 percent were white (not Hispanic), 31.3 percent were Hispanic, 27.6 percent were black, and 4.1 percent were of "all other" race/ethnic groups combined.
  - For each year, 1974—1983, proportionately more homicide victims were classified white (not Hispanic). During this period (most notably 1977 through 1979), this proportion has tended to decrease while the proportion of those classified as Hispanic has tended to increase.

When willful homicide victims were analyzed by age, it was found that:

- In 1983, 33.6 percent were 0—24 years, 38.3 percent were 25—39 years, and 28.2 percent were 40 years of age or older.
  - For each year, 1974—1983, the smallest proportion of homicide victims were 40 years of age and older. ▶
  - Since 1978, the largest proportion of homicide victims were 25–39 years of age. ▶






# CHART 4 WILLFUL HOMICIDE CRIMES, 1983 Sex of Victim by Known Race/Ethnic Group


When sex of victim was analyzed by race/ethnic group, it was found that:

- Proportionately, more Hispanic homicide victims were male than were either white (not Hispanic) or black homicide victims (88.6 versus 66.0 and 82.2 percent, respectively).
- Proportionately, more white (not Hispanic)
   homicide victims were female than were either
   Hispanic or black homicide victims (34.0 versus 11.4 and 17.8 percent, respectively).

When known age of victim was analyzed by race/ ethnic group, it was found that:

- Proportionately, fewer white (not Hispanic) homicide victims were 24 years of age or younger than were either Hispanic or black homicide victims (23.3 versus 42.4 and 38.2 percent, respectively).
- Proportionately, more white (not Hispanic) homicide victims were 40 years of age or older than were either Hispanic or black homicide victims (42.9 versus 17.5 and 20.7 percent, respectively).


The willful homicide rate in 1983 was 10.5 per 100,000 population. Chart 6 shows willful homicide rates per 100,000 population for subgroups of victims classified by sex, race/ethnic group, and age.

## In 1983:

- Males were more than three times as likely as females to be homicide victims (16.5 versus 4.6).
- Blacks were more than twice as likely as Hispanics and almost seven times as likely as whites (not Hispanic) to be homicide victims (38.6 versus 17.1 and 5.8, respectively).
- Persons 25—39 years of age were almost twice as likely to be homicide victims as were either younger or older persons (16.1 versus 8.8 and 8.4, respectively).




CHART 7 WILLFUL HOMICIDE CRIMES, 1983 Known Relationship of Victim to Offender

When 1983 willful homicide crimes were analyzed by known relationship of the victim to the offender, it was found that:


- 46.4 percent of the victims were friends or acquaintances of offenders.
- 30.5 percent of the victims were strangers to offenders.
- 6.9 percent of the victims were spouses of offenders.
- 6.7 percent of the victims were gang members.
- 5.4 percent of the victims were parents or children of offenders.
- 3.9 percent of the relationships of victim to offender were classified as "all other."

Additional victim/offender relationship data are provided in "Follow-Up Study on Unknowns," page 42.

When known relationship of the victim to the offender was analyzed by sex, it was found that:

- The female victim was much more likely than the male victim to be the spouse of the offender (21.2 versus 2.9 percent).
- The female victim was much more likely than the male victim to be the parent or child of the offender (11.1 versus 3.9 percent).
- The male victim was much more likely than the female victim to be a gang member (8.2 versus 1.4 percent).
- The male victim was more likely than the female victim to be a friend or acquaintance of the offender (49.4 versus 35.8 percent).

When known relationship of the victim to the offender was analyzed by race/ethnic group, it was found that:

- For each race/ethnic group, the homicide victim was most likely to be a friend or acquaintance of the offender. This relationship was most pronounced in the case of blacks (52.1 percent).
- The white (not Hispanic) victim was much less likely to be a gang member than the Hispanic or black victim (.7 versus 12.2 and 8.9 percent, respectively).
- The Hispanic victim was less likely to be the spouse, parent, or child of the offender than either the white (not Hispanic) or black victim (6.9 versus 18.6 and 10.4 percent, respectively).
- The black victim was less likely to be a stranger to the offender than the white (not Hispanic) or Hispanic victim (24.4 versus 34.7 and 31.1 percent, respectively).

Average Homicide Rate per 100,000 Population to Size of County



When 1983 willful homicide crimes were analyzed by known month of incident, it was found that:

- More homicides occurred in the last six months than in the first six months (52.3 versus 47.7 percent).
- This relationship was found to exist each year since 1974 (Chart 12).

This suggests a seasonal pattern in willful homicide crimes in which more persons are killed in the last six months than in the first six months of the year.






CHART 12

## CHART 13 WILLFUL HOMICIDE CRIMES, 1983



When 1983 willful homicide crimes were analyzed by known day of incident and race/ethnic group of victim, it was found that:

- Most willful homicides occurred on Saturday and Sunday (19.8 and 18.5 percent, respectively).
- Proportionately, more Hispanic victims than white (not Hispanic) or black victims were killed on Saturday and Sunday combined (50.5 versus 31.4 and 32.7 percent, respectively).



When known day of incident was analyzed by sex of victim, it was found that:

Females were more likely than males to have been killed on weekdays (71.8 versus 59.0 percent), while males were more likely than females to have been killed on weekends (41.0 versus 28.2 percent).


When 1983 willful homicide crimes were analyzed by known location of incident and sex of victim, it was found that:

- 37.7 percent of homicide victims were killed at their places of residence.
- Proportionately, many more female than male homicide victims were killed at their places of residence (61,8 versus 30,8 percent).

## And,

- 24.5 percent of homicides occurred on streets or sidewalks.
- Proportionately, many more male than female homicide victims were killed on streets or sidewalks (29.2 versus 8.5 percent).

## CHART 16 WILLFUL HOMICIDE CRIMES, 1983 Known Location of Homicide by Sex of Victim



## **CHART 17 WILLFUL HOMICIDE CRIMES, 1983** Known Location of Homicide by Race/Ethnic Group of Victim



> When willful homicide crimes were analyzed by race/ethnic group of victim and known location of incident, it was found that:

- Proportionately, more white (not Hispanic) than Hispanic or black victims were killed at their places of residence (49.9 versus 24.5 and 38.0 percent, respectively).
- Proportionately, fewer white (not Hispanic) than Hispanic or black victims were killed on streets or sidewalks (14.0 versus 31.9 and 31.7 percent, respectively).

Known Type of Weapon





When 1983 willful homicides were analyzed by known type of weapon used, it was found that:

- 54.5 percent resulted from the use of firearms
- 25.1 percent resulted from the use of knives.
- 7.5 percent resulted from the use of blunt objects.
- 7.6 percent resulted from the use of personal weapons (hands, fists, feet, etc.).
- 2.2 percent resulted from the use of ropes.
- 3.1 percent resulted from the use of weapons grouped in the "all other" category.




## CHART 19 WILLFUL HØMICIDE CRIMES, 1983 Known Type of Weapon by Sex of Victim

## CHART 20 WILLFUL HOMICIDE CRIMES, 1983 Known Type of Weapon by Race/Ethnic Group of Victim



When known type of weapon used was analyzed by sex and race/ethnic group of the homicide victim, it was found that:

- Regardless of sex or race/ethnic group, the victim was most likely to have been killed by a firearm.
- The proportion of males killed by firearms was greater than that of females (58.1 versus 41.8 percent).
- The proportion of females killed by personal weapons (hands, fists, feet, etc.) was much greater than that of males (15.6 versus 5.4 percent).
- Proportionately, more white (not Hispanic) victims were killed by personal weapons than were Hispanics or blacks (11.6 versus 5.0 and 6.2 percent, respectively).
- Proportionately, more Hispanic and black victims were killed by firearms than were white (not Hispanic) victims (58.7 and 62.2 versus 44.7 percent, respectively).

# CHART 21 WILLFUL HOMICIDE CRIMES, 1983 Known Contributing Circumstance





nen 1983 willful homicide crimes were analyzed known contributing circumstance, it was found at:

- 58.7 percent were associated with arguments.
- 17.2 percent were associated with robbery.
- 2.0 percent were associated with burglary.
- 3.0 percent were sex-related.
- 19.0 percent were associated with "all other" contributing circumstances.



## CHART 22 WILLFUL HOMICIDE CRIMES, 1983 Known Contributing Circumstance by Sex of Victim



When willful homicide crimes were analyzed by known contributing circumstance and sex of victim, it was found that:

- Males were more likely than females to have been victims of homicides in which the contributing circumstance was the crime of robbery (18.8 versus 11.7 percent).
- Females were much more likely than males to have been victims of homicides in which the contributing circumstance was the crime of burglary (5.3 versus 1.1 percent).
- Females were much more likely than males to have been victims of homicides in which the contributing circumstance was a sex-related crime (11.2 versus .7 percent).

# CHART 23 WILLFUL HOMICIDE CRIMES, 1983 Known Contributing Circumstance by Race/Ethnic Group of Victim





When willful homicide crimes were analyzed by known contributing circumstance and race/ethnic group of the victim, it was found that:

- For each race/ethnic group shown, the circumstance which most contributed to homicides was an argument.
- White (not Hispanic) victims were much more likely than either Hispanics or blacks to have been victims of homicides in which the contributing circumstance was either a robbery, burglary, or sex-related crime (30.6 versus 15.3 and 19.2 percent, respectively).
- Whites (not Hispanic) were less likely than either Hispanics or blacks to have been victims of homicides in which the contributing circumstance was gang-related (.5 versus 11.8 and 8.4 percent, respectively).

When willful homicide crimes were analyzed by known contributing circumstance and known age of victim, it was found that:

- Of the 111 victims 0—14 years of age, 47.7 percent of the homicides were the results of child abuse. This finding was even more pronounced for the 0—4 year age group in which 70.0 percent of the deaths resulted from child abuse (Table 44.)
- Of the 239 victims in the 15-19 year age group, 29.3 percent of the homicides resulted from gang-related circumstances.
- Of the 1,867 victims in the 20—69 year age group 64.7 percent of the homicides resulted from arguments.
- Of the 95 victims 70 years of age and older, the contributing circumstance was rape, robbery, or burglary in 64.2 percent of the homicides (5.3, 42.1, and 16.8 percent, respectively).





## ARRESTS FOR MURDER

This section of the report is concerned with arrests for murder in 1983. Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought.


Data pertaining to reported arrests for murder were obtained from the Monthly Arrest and Citation Register (Arrest Register). The Arrest Register contains information on all arrests made in 1983, as reported to BCS by California law enforcement agencies.

Data which follow pertain to personal characteristics (sex, race/ethnic group, and age) of those arrested for murder in 1983, and to the manner in which these characteristics relate to one another; for example, the distribution of age of arrestee as a function of race.




## CHART 25 ARRESTS FOR MURDER, 1983 Sex, Juvenile-Adult, Race/Ethnic Group, and Age of Arrestee

- 88.7 percent were male.
- 11.3 percent were female.

- 8.3 percent were juvenile.





#### AGE OF ARRESTEE BY RACE/ETHNIC GROUP



When sex of arrestees for murder in 1983 was analyzed by race/ethnic group, it was found that:

■ The ratio of male to female arrestees was much greater for Hispanic than for either white (not Hispanic) or black arrestees (15 to 1 versus 5 to 1 and 7 to 1, respectively).


When age of arrestees for murder was analyzed by race/ethnic group, it was found that:

- Proportionately, fewer white (not Hispanic) arrestees were under 25 years of age than were Hispanic or black arrestees (33.2 versus 59.0 and 46.1 percent, respectively).
- Conversely, proportionately more white (not Hispanic) arrestees were 25 years of age or older than were Hispanic or black arrestees (66.8 versus 41.0 and 53.9 percent, respectively).

When juvenile and adult arrestees for murder were analyzed by race/ethnic group, it was found that:

- The proportion of Hispanic juvenile arrestees was greater than the proportion of Hispanic adult arrestees (44.1 versus 30.9 percent).
- Conversely, the proportion of white (not Hispanic) and black arrestees was less for juveniles than for adults (18.5 and 33.8 versus 26.3 and 39.4 percent, respectively).

## DISPOSITIONS



## DISPOSITIONS OF ADULTS ARRESTED FOR MURDER

This section of the report describes the dispositions made during 1983 of adults arrested for murder, regardless of the year of arrest. Data were obtained from the Offender-Based Transaction Statistics (OBTS) system.

OBTS system data are compiled from information collected on the JUS8715 Disposition of Arrest and Court Action form. It is estimated that JUS 8715 forms were received for about 70 percent of all adult felony arrests which received a final disposition in 1983. Despite underreporting, it is believed that these dispositions are generally descriptive of those adult felony arrestees processed through the criminal justice system.

There were 34 persons sentenced to death in 1983. They were included in the "prison" category when type of sentence was related to convicted offense. Specific information pertaining to these persons was also obtained from the OBTS system and is presented in the Death Penalty Section on page 34.


Analysis of OBTS information involves:

- The relationship between type of disposition (release, dismissal or acquittal, and conviction) and the personal characteristics of the arrestee.
- The relationship between type of disposition (dismissal or acquittal, and conviction) and the personal characteristics of those arrestees against whom complaints were granted.
- The relationship between convicted offense (murder and "other" offenses, such as manslaughter, felony assault, and robbery) and the personal characteristics of the convicted arrestee.
- The relationship between type of sentence received and the convicted offense of the arrestee.

The analysis of race/ethnic data (particularly for Hispanics) must be considered in light of the subjectivity of the labeling process.


Analysis of 1983 dispositions of adults arrested for murder showed that:

- 22.3 percent were released by the police or had complaints against them denied.
- 17.3 percent were dismissed or acquitted.
- 60.4 percent were convicted.

When these dispositions were analyzed by sex, race/ethnic group, and age, it was found that:

- Relatively more males than females were convicted (62.0 versus 47.1 percent).
- Proportionately, more females than males were released and dismissed or acquitted (53.0 versus 37.9 percent).
- Relatively more whites (not Hispanic) than Hispanics or blacks were convicted (67.1 versus 56.9 and 57.2 percent, respectively).


Analysis of 1983 dispositions of adults arrested for murder in which complaints had been granted showed that:

- 22.2 percent were dismissed or acquitted.
- 77.8 percent were convicted.

When these dispositions were analyzed by sex and race/ethnic group, it was found that:


- Proportionately, more males than females were convicted (79.2 versus 65.4 percent).
- Proportionately, more whites (not Hispanic) were convicted than were Hispanics or blacks (80.5 versus 78.0 and 75.0 percent, respectively).


Of those adults arrested for murder who were convicted in 1983, it was found that:

- 28.3 percent were convicted of murder.
- 71.7 percent were convicted of lesser crimes. such as manslaughter, felony assault, and robbery.

When these dispositions were analyzed by sex. race/ethnic group, and age, it was found that:


- Considerably more males than females were convicted of murder (29.5 versus 14.8 percent).
- More whites (not Hispanic) were convicted of murder than either Hispanics or blacks (32.2 versus 24.1 and 27.8 percent, respectively).
- Convictions for murder varied inversely with age. Of those in the youngest age group (under 20 years of age), 35.7 percent were convicted of murder and of those in the oldest age group (40 years of age and over), 20.9 percent were convicted of murder.

Analysis of type of sentence received by adults arrested for murder and convicted in 1983 showed that:

Proportionately, more of those convicted of murder were sentenced to prison or to the Youth Authority than were those convicted of lesser offenses (98.8 versus 56.1 percent).<sup>1</sup>

#### **DEATH PENALTY CASES**

This section presents information on those persons sentenced to death in California superior courts in 1983. Death penalty cases were extracted from the 1983 Offender-Based Transaction Statistics (OBTS) system.

The death penalty in California was ruled unconstitutional by the California Supreme Court in February 1972. This was followed by a public vote and the reinstatement of the death penalty in January 1974. The death penalty was subsequently declared unconstitutional by the California Supreme Court in December 1976 and by virtue of a veto override in August 1977, new legislation was adopted that reinstated the death penalty in California.

By public vote on November 7, 1978, additional criteria were added to the circumstances by which a person could be sentenced to death. The criteria currently specified by Penal Code Section 190.2 are as follows:

- 1. Intentional murder for financial gain.
- 2. Previously convicted of murder in the first or second degree.
- Multiple convictions for first or second degree murder.
- 4. Murder perpetrated by means of destructive device, bomb, or explosive.

- 5. Murder to prevent arrest or to effect escape from custody.
- 6. Murder of a peace officer or fireman engaged in the performance of his/her duties.
- 7. Murder of a witness to prevent testimony or in retaliation for testimony given.
- 8. Murder of an elected or appointed official, judge, or prosecutor in retaliation for performance of his/her official duties.
- 9. Murder by ambush.
- Murder because of the victim's race, color, religion, nationality, or country of origin.
- 11. Murder involving torture.
- 12. Murder by poison.
- 13. Murder during the commission of: a) robbery, b) kidnapping, c) rape, d) lewd or lascivious act upon a child under the age of 14, e) oral copulation or sodomy in violation of Penal Code Sections 286 and 288a, f) burglary, g) arson, and h) train wrecking.

California Supreme Court decisions in 1983 and 1984 have affected the special circumstances pertaining to murder during the commission of another crime. The issue is complex and the effect on current death row inmates is not clear.

During 1983, 34 persons convicted of first degree murder were sentenced to death. The sex, race/ ethnic group, age, and sentencing county of those sentenced to death are presented in Table 2.

Of the 34 defendants sentenced to death in 1983:

- All were male.
- 18 were white (not Hispanic).
- 5 were Hispanic.
- 10 were black.
- 1 was of another race/ethnic group.

■ The median age was 30.7 years.

And,

■ Los Angeles County sentenced the largest number (7).

### PEACE OFFICERS KILLED IN THE LINE OF DUTY

A topic of special interest is that of peace officers killed in the line of duty. Data pertaining to peace officers were obtained from the Automated Homicide File,

From 1974–1983, 95 peace officers were killed in the line of duty. Analysis of the data in Table 3 showed that:

- The average annual number of peace officers killed was 9.5. In 1983, the number was 9.
- The number of peace officers killed in the past five years (1979-1983) was 20.8 percent less than that of the previous five years (42 versus 53).

In 1983, all nine of the peace officers killed in the line of duty were male.

With respect to type of weapon used to kill peace officers in 1983:

Eight peace officers were killed by firearms – six by handguns, one by a rifle, and one by a shotgun.




#### **JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDES**

A justifiable homicide is defined by the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program as the killing of a felon by a private citizen or a peace officer during the commission of a felony. Justifiable homicides are sometimes referred to as excusable or noncriminal homicides. The California Penal Code defines killing in self-defense as justifiable homicide, whereas the national UCR Program does not. Therefore, for the most part, self-defense cases are treated as willful rather than justifiable homicides.


In 1983, when justifiable homicides committed by peace officers and by private citizens were analyzed by sex, known race/ethnic group, and known age, it was found that:

- Most felons killed by peace officers and private citizens were male (97.4 and 98.8 percent, respectively).
- Proportionately, more felons killed by peace officers were white (not Hispanic) than were felons killed by private citizens (39.7 versus 25.0 percent).
- Proportionately, fewer felons killed by peace officers were black than were felons killed by private citizens (28.8 versus 48.8 percent).
- Most felons killed by peace officers were 20—29 and 30—39 years of age (38.5 percent each).
- Most felons killed by private citizens were 20-29 years of age (50.0 percent).

In 1983, when justifiable homicides were analyzed by known location, it was found that:

- The location where felons were most frequently killed by peace officers was a street or sidewalk (53.8 percent).
- The location where felons were most frequently killed by private citizens was the citizen's residence (36.9 percent).


In 1983, analysis of type of weapon used in justifiable homicides by peace officers and private citizens showed that:

- Felons were most frequently killed by handguns, both by peace officers and private citizens (70.5 and 67.9 percent, respectively).
- Proportionately, shotguns were used more frequently in the killing of felons by peace officers than by private citizens (21.8 versus 10.7 percent).
- Knives were used in 10.7 percent of the killing of felons by private citizens.

#### BY PRIVATE CITIZEN





- For justifiable homicides by peace officers in 1983, the most frequent contributing circumstance was the attacking of a peace officer by a felon (39.7 percent).
- For justifiable homicides by private citizens in 1983, the most frequent contributing circumstance was that of the felony being killed in the commission of a crime (76.2 percent).



#### FOLLOW-UP STUDY OF UNKNOWNS

Prior publications have used data from homicide files known to contain an extremely large number of "unknowns" in certain categories. This was due to certain key elements not being available at the required time of statistical reporting. Some facts of the case are not established until exhaustive investigations have been completed. For example, the relationship of the victim to the offender often remains unknown for some time, especially if the offender is a complete stranger.

It has been theorized that if the "unknowns" were known, some shifts might occur in the data distribution. To test the theory, a project was carried out to follow up on 1980, 1981, and 1982 homicide cases and identify data elements previously unavailable.

The results of this follow-up study revealed that:


- The friend/acquaintance category remained the most frequent relationship of victim to offender (24.3 to 44.7 percent).
- The stranger category increased dramatically from 10.1 to 27.8 percent.
- Unknown relationship data dropped from 49.5 to 6.5 percent.





# NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL HOMICIDE DATA

The most recent international homicide data available were provided by the International Criminal Police Organization (Interpol) in their 1979—1980 publication. The 1980 national data were extracted from the FBI's publication, *Crime in the United States*, 1980. Both sources note that care should be exercised when using the data. Realizing that many limitations do exist (see notes on Tables 75 and 76), it is still interesting to note that in 1980:

#### Nationally,

- The median homicide rate was 8.6.
- The homicide rates ranged from South Dakota with .7 to the District of Columbia with 31.5. The national homicide rate was 10.2.
- California reported a homicide rate of 14.5.

#### Internationally,

- The median homicide rate was 2.3.
- The largest homicide rate among the reporting countries was 74.0 from Lesotho (a country in Southeast Africa), followed by Lebanon with an 18.5 rate. The lowest rate was reported by Ireland (.6).
- The homicide rate for the United States was 10.2.
