

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INTRODUCTION

The bipartisan Assembly Task Force on Defense Conversion was created in March 1993. The mission of the 23-member Task Force is to maximize federal defense conversion funding for California and to assist communities in the defense conversion process. Since March 1993, Task Force members have worked toward accomplishing this mission through a variety of activities, which includes:

- Establishing a hotline for assistance on available federal and state grants and other defense conversion-related activities;
- Conducting regional hearings in the Bay Area and Southern California to identify barriers to federal and state assistance in defense conversion;
- Providing the Congressional Task Force on Defense Reinvestment and Economic Development with suggested federal legislation to remove the barriers to defense conversion;
- Conducting special hearings on base facility reuse and defense worker retraining opportunities through Task Force working groups (worker retraining, community adjustment, and defense industry adjustment);
- Convening workshops on base reuse planning, toxic cleanup, and economic development for California communities affected by scheduled base closures; and
- Introducing legislation, which was signed into law, to assist communities in the military base reuse and defense conversion process.

STATE RESOURCES

STATE AGENCIES

A. CALIFORNIA EMPLOYMENT DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

To offer various services, including: Job Service, "Experience Unlimited" Job Clubs, Veterans Employment Program, Job Training Partnership Act, Dislocated Worker Program, Unemployment Insurance Program, and California Training Benefits Program.

B. CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY

To provide information and monitor the remediation of toxic contamination at military bases through the Department of Toxic Substances Control (Office of Military Facilities) and State Water Resources Control Board.

C. CALIFORNIA HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

To finance housing rehabilitation, public facilities, and economic and community development projects.

D. CALIFORNIA TRADE AND COMMERCE AGENCY

To coordinate the activities of the Defense Conversion Council and to provide economic and business development programs.

To administer programs for small businesses needing financing for various types of pollution-control equipment and facilities.

J. URBAN WATERFRONT AREA RESTORATION FINANCING AUTHORITY/COASTAL CONSERVANCY

To authorize state-issued revenue bonds for waterfront renewal projects in metropolitan areas.

To assist individuals in obtaining expertise and resources at 20 strategically located campuses to solve technical problems and prepare grant proposals. CSU Hayward's Center for New Venture Alliance coordinates workshops and seminars on economic/defense conversion and provides technical assistance to new and emerging businesses.

M. UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA

To provide: (1) undergraduate and graduate degree programs that prepare people for high-technology jobs; (2) research programs covering advanced technologies, manufacturing, business, health, the environment and human resources that contribute to technology development and the transfer of technology to the commercial sector; (3) public service activities related to agriculture, small- and medium-sized businesses and upgrading the skills of professionals; and (4) programs organized specifically to respond to the needs of local communities affected by base closure and defense conversion.

OTHER RESOURCES

A. ARMS CONTROL RESEARCH CENTER

A nonprofit public interest organization concerned with the impacts of wars and militaries on the environment, economy, and international security.

SELECTED BILLS RELATED TO DEFENSE CONVERSION² 1993 and 1994

SENATE

S. 4 (Hollings) - National Competitiveness Act of 1993

Increases U.S. competitiveness worldwide by promoting the expansion of American technology. It increases support for the Commerce Department's National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST), expands NIST's advanced technology program, forms an Office of Technology Monitoring and Competitive Assessment, and encourages industry-wide cooperation in software development.

Incorporated into H.R. 820 on 03/16/94.

S. 251 (Pell) - Job Training and Partnership Act Amendment

Amends the Job Training Partnership Act to improve the Defense Conversion Adjustment Program, and for other purposes.

Referred to Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

S. 319 (Wofford) - Recommendations on Base Closing Outside the U.S.

Requires the Secretary of Defense and the Defense Base Closure Realignment Commission to make recommendations in 1993 and 1995 for the termination and reduction of United States military operations at military installations outside the United States.

Referred to the Senate Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

S. 365 (Feinstein) - Conveyance of Real Property at Fort Ord to University of California and California State University

Directs the Secretary of Defense to convey to the University of California and the California State University certain surplus real property at Fort Ord, California.

Referred to Senate Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

S. 395 (Lieberman) - Diversification of Defense Laboratories

Establishes a program for the diversification of activities of certain federal laboratories.

Referred to Senate Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

S. 415 (Boren) - Boot Camp Prison Act of 1993

Authorizes 10 Federal boot camps, with each one serving around 200-300 inmates and all located on closed military bases.

Referred to Senate Committee on the Judiciary. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

S. 419 (Danforth) - Aeronautical Technology Consortium Act of 1993

Provides for enhanced cooperation between the Federal Government and U.S. commercial aircraft industry in aeronautical technology research, development, and commercialization, and for other purposes.

Referred to the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation. Expected to have support of Clinton administration.

S. 473 (Johnston) - Department of Energy National Competitiveness Technology Partnership Act of 1993

Promotes the industrial competitiveness and economic growth of the U.S. by strengthening the linkages between Department of Energy laboratories and the private sector and by supporting the development and application of technologies critical to the economic, scientific and technological competitiveness of the U.S., and for other purposes.

Joint referral to various House committees on 05/02/94. Report filed by House Committee on Energy and Commerce (H. Report 103-611, pt.1).

S. 614 (Domenici) - Commission on the Dual-Use Application of Facilities and Resources at White Sands Missile Range Act

Establishes a commission on the commercial application of certain defense-related facilities, equipment, processes, and technologies.

Referred to Senate Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

S. 660 (Riegle) - Preparation of Community Economic Adjustment Plans Before the Closure of a Military Base

- Prohibits the Secretary of Defense from closing or realigning a military installation under a base closure law until a community economic adjustment plan is prepared.
- Outlines provisions concerning plan preparation and requirements.

Referred to Senate Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

S. 839 (Hollings) - High-Speed Ground Transportation Development Act of 1993

Identifies potential high-speed rail corridors and develops a master plan for implementing a network of high-speed transportation.

Report filed by Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation on 11/23/93.

S. 850 (Boxer) - Economic Conversion Clearinghouse Act

- Establishes within the Department of Commerce the Office of Economic Conversion Information to: (1) serve as a central information clearinghouse on economic adjustment and defense conversion; and (2) aid persons in applying for grants.
- Establishes the Interagency Economic Conversion Information Coordinating Committee to advise and assist the Office.

Referred to Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

S. 978 (Baucus) - National Environmental Technology Act of 1994

Establishes a National Environmental Technology Panel to develop programs to encourage development of environmentally safe technology.

Joint referral to House Committees on Science, Space and Technology and Energy and Commerce on 06/13/94.

S. 1056 (Feinstein) - Allocation of Defense Conversion Funds on the Basis of Job Losses

Requires that defense reinvestment and economic growth funds be allocated among communities on the basis of the relative levels of reductions in employment experienced in such communities as a result of defense spending reductions or the closure or realignment of military installations.

Referred to Senate Committee on Governmental Affairs on 05/27/93. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

S. 1254 (Nunn) - Military Construction Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1994

Includes funding for construction projects at locations selected for closure and realignment by the 1993 independent commission. Uses the sale of bases for the continuing environmental cleanup and management on other bases slated for closure or realignment.

This measure was incorporated into the overall defense authorization bill (S.1298). There will be no further action on this bill.

S. 1298 (Nunn) - National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1994

Authorizes appropriations for fiscal year 1994 for military activities of the Department of Defense, for military construction, and for defense programs of the Department of Energy, to prescribe personnel strengths for the Armed Forces, and for other purposes.

The measure was incorporated into the House defense authorization bill (H.R. 2401). No further action is expected on the bill.

S. 1337 (Nunn) - National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1994

Authorizes appropriations for fiscal year 1994 for military activities of the Department of Defense to prescribe personnel strengths for the Armed Forces, and for other purposes. Part of the provisions were amended into S. 1298.

No further action is expected on this bill.

S. 1338 (Nunn) - Military Construction Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1994

Authorizes appropriations for fiscal year 1994 for military construction, and for other purposes.

No further action is expected on this bill.

S. 1551 (DeConcini) - Military Fairway Fairness Act of 1993

Opens Department of Defense golf courses to the general public and charges fees to raise revenue for the purposes of deficit reduction.

Referred to Senate Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

S. 1830 (Feinstein) - Small Business Defense Conversion Guaranteed Loan Act of 1994

Authorizes the Small Business Administration to make up to \$4 billion in guaranteed loans in fiscal year 1995 to individuals, businesses, and communities that face economic hardships from closure of nearby military facilities.

Placed on Senate Legislative Calendar on 06/14/94.

S. 1951 (Moynihan) - The Reemployment Act of 1994

Establishes a comprehensive system of reemployment services, training and income support for permanently laid off workers; facilitates the establishment of one-stop career centers to serve as a common point of access to employment, education and training information and services; develops an effective national labor market information system; and for other purposes.

Public hearing recessed by Senate Committee on Finance on 05/26/94.

S. 1964 (Metzenbaum) - Reemployment and Retraining Act

Addresses the need for retraining and reemploying Americans through a provision of \$4,750 per year for training programs that workers could select themselves.

Hearings adjourned by Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources on 05/12/94.

S. 2058 (Nunn) - Military Construction Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1995

Includes construction projects resulting from base realignment and closure actions.

Referred to Senate Committee on Armed Services. Panel will begin marking up the bill around 05/16/94.

S. 2059 (Nunn) - National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1995

Authorizes appropriations for fiscal year 1995 for military activities of the Department of Defense, to prescribe military personnel strengths for fiscal year 1995, and for other purposes.

Senate Armed Services Committee reported the bill out on 06/10/94.

S. 2182 (Nunn) - National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1995

Authorizes appropriations for fiscal year 1995 for military activities of the Defense Department, for military construction, and for defense programs of the Department of Energy.

In the House on 07/25/94.

S. Con. Res. 15 (Feinstein) - Resolution Directing the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission to Assess Economic Impact

Urges that the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission take into greater consideration the economic impact to the various communities that depend upon those bases for their livelihood.

Referred to Senate Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

H.R. 41 (Gejdenson) - Invest in America Act

Authorizes the President to seek the recoupment of defense expenditures abroad and to authorize the use of expenditures recouped for domestic investment projects.

Joint referral to various House committees. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 202 (Jacobs) - Protection of Certain Historic and Natural Resources During Realignment of Military Installations

Requires the Secretary of Defense to protect areas of exceptional natural or historic character during the process of closing ar realigning a military installation.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 344 (Schumer) - Exports of Dual Use Items to Terrorist Countries, Prohibition

Prohibits exports of dual-use items to countries that have repeatedly supported terrorist acts. The term "dual-use" refers to technology which has both military and civilian applications.

Referred to House Committee on Foreign Affairs on 01/05/93.

H.R. 530 (Panetta) - Military Medical Facility Closure

Conditions the closure of a military medical facility in the U.S. or a reduction in the level of care provided at a military medical facility in the U.S. upon a determination by the Secretary of Defense and the Secretary of the military department concerned that the closure or reduction is cost effective for the Federal Government.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 820 (Valentine) - National Competitiveness Act of 1994

Amends the Stevenson-Wydler Technology Innovation Act of 1980 to enhance manufacturing technology development and transfer; to authorize appropriations for the Technology Administration of the Department of Commerce, including the National Institute of Standards and Technology; and for other purposes.

Returned to the House from the Senate with amendments on 03/17/94. Substitute or additional conferees appointed on 07/25/94.

H.R. 841 (Kennelly) - Defense Economic Reinvestment Act of 1993

Establishes economic conversion programs in the Department of Defense to assist communities, businesses, and workers adversely affected by reductions in defense contracts and spending and closures of military installations, and to provide an additional credit against federal unemployment tax for states with reemployment assistance programs.

Referred to various House committees. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 995 (Montgomery) - Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act of 1993

Improves reemployment rights and benefits of veterans and other benefits of employment of certain members of the uniformed services, and for other purposes.

Returned to the House from the Senate, with Senate amendments, on 11/09/93.

H.R. 1027 (Waters) - Internal Revenue Code of 1986 Amendment

Amends the Internal Revenue Code to establish a defense contractor conversion investment tax credit

Referred to House Committee on Ways and Means. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 1203 (Regula) - Jobs Preservation Act of 1993

- Authorizes the Secretary of Defense to use members of the Armed Forces as advisors and instructors at correctional facilities of states and local governments. The correctional facilities would be operated as a military-style boot camp.
- Transfers excess defense property, including property from military installations scheduled for closure, to the state or local government in which the installation is located for use as a correctional facility.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services on 03/03/93.

H.R. 1259 (Lantos) - Defense Industrial Stabilization & Community Transition Act of 1993

Provides for economic conversion and diversification of industries in the defense industrial base of the United States that are adversely affected by significant reductions in defense spending.

Referred to various House committees. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 1260 (Lewis) - National Aeronautical Research and Competitiveness Act of 1993

Provides for the establishment of a joint aeronautical research and development program between the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Department of Defense, and other purposes.

Referred to House committees on Armed Services and Science, Space and Technology. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 1269 (Snowe) - Comprehensive Base Closure Reform and Recovery Act of 1993

Establishes a comprehensive recovery program for communities, businesses, and workers adversely affected by the closure or realignment of military installations.

Parts of this measure incorporated into H.R. 2401 on 09/13/93. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 1294 (Molinari) - Closed Military Bases Designated as Enterprise Zones

Designates military installations selected for closure or realignment under base closure law, and the communities within which such military installations are located, as enterprise zones for purposes of Title VII of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1987 and as redevelopment areas for purposes of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965.

Joint referral to various House committees. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 1321 (Hom) - Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990 Amendments

Amends the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990 to require the Secretary of Defense and the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission to consider military installations outside the United States for closure and realignment in addition to military installations inside the United States.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 1323 (Pelosi) - National Economic Conversion and Environmental Restoration Act of 1993

Authorizes the Secretary of Labor to make demonstration grants to institutions of higher education to provide education and training in environmental restoration to displaced defense workers and young adults.

Incorporated in H.R. 2401.

H.R. 1378 (Sisisky) - Armed Forces, Title 10 U.S.C., Amendment (Public Law 103-35, approved 5/31/93)

Revises the applicability of qualification requirements for certain acquisition workforce positions in the Department of Defense, to make necessary technical corrections, and to facilitate real property repairs at military installations and minor military construction during fiscal year 1993.

H.R. 1402 (Gibbons) - Shipbuilding Trade Reform Act of 1993

Imposes financial or other sanctions on foreign ships whose home countries provide subsidies to shipbuilders in order to provide fair trade for the U.S. shipbuilding and repair industry.

Cleared for House Committee on Ways and Means on 11/09/93.

H.R. 1432 (Brown) - Department of Energy Laboratory Technology Act of 1993

Establishes missions for Department of Energy research and development laboratories, provides for the evaluation of laboratory effectiveness in accomplishing such missions, reorganizes and consolidates Department of Energy technology transfer activities, and other purposes.

Report filed by House Committee on Science, Space and Technology (H. Rept. 103-484, Pt. 2) on 05/19/94.

H.R. 1776 (DeLauro) - Defense Industrial Diversification and Community Assistance Act

Facilitates and assists in the economic adjustment and industrial diversification of defense industries, defense-dependent communities, and defense workers that are adversely affected by the termination or reduction of defense spending or defense-related contracts.

Referred to various House committees. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 1850 (DeLauro) - University-Industry Technology Development

Provides incentives for universities to develop effective technologydevelopment and technology-transfer programs, and to enter into partnership with businesses, in coordination with state and local governments, to develop technologies and processes critical to meeting specific national goals and promoting long-term vitality of local communities.

Referred to various House committees. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 1880 (Bacchus) - Defense Workers Economic Reinvestment Act of 1993

Seeks to mitigate the adverse effects on defense contractors and defense workers of reductions in defense spending.

Establishes an Office of Training Oversight and Administration to coordinate and oversee the retraining, placement, and other transition assistance for eligible defense workers.

Referred to various House committees. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 1957 (Burton) - Transfer of Property at Military Installations

Amends the base closure laws to require the Secretary of Defense to transfer real property and facilities at military installations being closed or realigned to states and other entities that agree to convert the property and facilities into correctional facilities for youthful offenders to be operated as military-style boot camps, and to require the Secretary to develop a program to promote the expanded use of such correctional facilities.

Referred to House committees on Armed Services and Judiciary. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 1958 (Clyburn) - Tax Incentives for Areas Affected by Base Closings

Amends the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to provide tax incentives with respect to enterprise zones and areas affected by military base closings or reductions in military base employment.

Referred to House Committee on Ways and Means. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2010 (Martinez) - National and Community Service Trust Act of 1993

Amends the National and Community Service Act of 1990 to establish a Corporation for National Service, enhance opportunities for national service, and provide national service educational awards to persons participating in such service, and other purposes.

Public Law 103-82 (107 Stat. 785), approved 09/21/93.

H.R. 2040 (Skeen) - Commission on Commercial Application

Establishes a commission on the commercial application of certain defense-related facilities, equipment, processes, and technologies.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2064 (Harman) - Defense Reinvestment and High-Tech Job Creation

Amends the Internal Revenue Code to allow a tax credit for defense conversion equal to the defense conversion employment credit (10% of wages paid by an employer) and the defense conversion investment credit (applicable percentage of a qualified business investment).

Makes qualified excess defense conversion property eligible for the straight-line depreciation method and classifies it as five-year depreciable property.

Referred to House Committee on Ways and Means. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2200 (Brown) - National Aeronautics and Space Administration Authorization Act

Authorizes appropriations to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration for research and development, space flight, control, and data communications, construction of facilities, research and program management, and inspector general, and for other purposes.

Received in the Senate, after passage in the House. Referred to Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation on 08/02/93.

H.R. 2237 (Boehlert) - Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act Amendment

Amends the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990 to require that testimony before the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission be given under oath.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2306 (Condit) - Using Military Bases as Prison Facilities

Provides for federal incarceration of undocumented criminal aliens and the transfer of closed military bases to the Justice Department for use as prison facilities for the incarceration of criminal aliens.

Referred to House committees on Judiciary and Armed Services. Judiciary's subcommittee hearing postponed on 11/19/93. No new date set.

H.R. 2392 (Zeliff) - Economic Resurgence and Jobs for America Act

Amends the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to reinstate a 5% investment tax credit, to reduce capital gains taxes, to provide certain tax incentives for investments on closed defense bases, and to provide for the use of certain defense funds for the provision of services to certain displaced defense workers receiving assistance under the Job Training Partnership Act.

Referred to House committees on Ways and Means, Education and Labor, and Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2401 (Dellums) - National Defense Authorization Act of 1994, Defense Conversion, Reinvestment, and Transition Assistance Amendments of 1993, National Shipbuilding and Shipyard Conversion Act of 1993...

Authorizes appropriations for fiscal year 1994 for military activities of the Department of Defense, for military construction, and for defense programs of

the Department of Defense to prescribe personnel strengths and for other purposes.

Public Law 103-160 (107 Stat. 1547), approved 11/30/93.

H.R. 2442 (Wise) - Economic Development Administration Reauthorization Act of 1993

Reauthorizes appropriations under the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965, as amended, to revise administrative provisions of the Act to improve the authority of the Secretary of Commerce to administer grant programs, and for other purposes.

Received in the Senate, after passage in the House, and referred to Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works on 05/16/94.

H.R. 2446 (Hefner) - Military Construction Appropriations Act, 1994 [Public Law 103-110 (107 Stat. 1037), approved 10/21/93]

Makes appropriations for military construction for the Department of Defense for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1994, including \$1.144 billion for the base realignment and closure accounts.

H.R. 2453 (Machtley) - Internal Revenue Code Amendment of 1986 Amendment

Amends the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to provide tax incentives to encourage the conversion of the defense industry to commercial endeavors, and for other purposes.

Referred to House Committee on Ways and Means. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2474 (Horn) - Training of Defense Personnel in Law Enforcement

Amends Title 10, United States Code, to establish a program to assist members of the Armed Forces who are involuntarily separated from active duty to obtain training and employment as law enforcement officers.

Parts of this measure incorporated into H.R. 2401.

H.R. 2498 (Goodling) - Defense Diversification and Community Adjustment Act of 1993

Seeks to assist community, business, and worker readjustment required as a result of the closure of military installations and reductions in defense spending, and other purposes.

Establishes a new Assistant Secretary for Economic Adjustment within the Department of Defense.

Referred to various House Committees. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2519 (Smith, Neal) - Department of Commerce Appropriations Act, 1994 [Public Law 103-121 (107 Stat. 1153), approved 10/27/93]

Provides \$23.3 billion in fiscal year 1994 for the Commerce, Justice and State departments, the Judiciary Branch and related agencies, including \$226 million for core research programs of the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST), \$232.5 million for external research programs of NIST, \$322 million for Economic Development Assistance Programs, and \$196 million to guarantee \$8.3 billion worth of small business loans.

H.R. 2547 (Studds) - National Shipbuilding and Conversion Act of 1993

Seeks to improve the economy of the United States (U.S.) and promote the national security interests of the U.S. by establishing a National Shipbuilding Initiative to provide support for the U.S. shipbuilding industry in order to assist that industry in regaining a significant share of the world commercial shipbuilding market, and other purposes.

Report filed by House Committee in Merchant Marine and Fisheries (H. Report 103-420, Pt. 1) on 02/09/94. Parts of this measure incorporated into H.R. 2401.

H.R. 2560 (Fazio) - Demonstration of Electric Vehicles and Infrastructure Development

Establishes a program in the Department of Defense to promote and demonstrate electric vehicles and infrastructure development for military and civilian use.

Referred to House committees on Armed Services and Science, Space and Technology. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2719 (Fazio) - Defense Reuse Community Partnership Act

Provides for the use of an independent site manager, selected by the Secretary of Defense in consultation with local governments and residents of communities adversely affected by base closures, to perform management functions in connection with the closure or realignment of military installations.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2791 (Stupak) - Community Reinvestment and Recovery Act

Establishes a grant program to return a portion of the savings realized by the Department of Defense as a result of the closure or realignment of a military

installation to the communities in which the installation is located to assist in the economic recovery and adjustment of these communities.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2825 (Convers) - Training for Future Jobs Act of 1993

Seeks to demonstrate the economy and efficiency of centralizing federal job training programs. Establishes a Job Training Council to provide grants to nonprofit organizations for retraining displaced workers and nonprofit education telecommunications organizations to pay the federal share of the cost of telecommunications materials and services for use in local vocational and technical education schools and colleges.

Referred to House Committee on Education and Labor on 08/02/93. No markup or hearings have been scheduled as yet.

H.R. 2831 (Schenk) - Economic Conversion Clearinghouse Act

Establishes the Office of Economic Conversion Information within the Department of Commerce, and other purposes.

Joint referral to House Committees on Energy and Commerce and Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2875 (Richardson) - Department of Energy National Competitiveness Technology Partnership Act of 1993

Promotes the industrial competitiveness and economic growth of the U.S. by strengthening the linkages between the laboratories of the Department of Energy and the private sector and by supporting the development and application of technologies critical to the economic, scientific, and technological competitiveness of the U.S., and for other purposes.

Referred to various House committees. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 2962 (Lantos) - Federal Employee Base Closure Retirement Act

Modifies the early-retirement reduction provisions with respect to certain Federal employees who are separated from service due to a base closure under Title II of the Defense Authorization Amendments and Base Closure and Realignment Act, and for other purposes.

Referred to House Committee on Post Office and Civil Service. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94

H.R. 3116 (Murtha) - Department of Defense Appropriations Act, 1994 [Public Law 103-139 (107 Stat. 1418), approved 11/11/93]

Makes appropriations for the Department of Defense for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1994, and for other purposes, including \$624 million for dual use technologies.

H.R. 3258 (Lowey) - State Boot Camp Provision

Assists States in establishing and increasing the utilization of boot camp prisons.

Referred to House Committee on the Judiciary. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 3283 (Kleczka) - Military Fairway Fairness Act of 1993

Allows the general public to use any golf course equipped, owned, operated, or maintained at a facility or installation of the Department of Defense (DoD). Ten percent of any gross revenues generated during the fiscal year from the operation of the golf course may be maintained by DoD.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 3336 (Livingston) - Crimes and Criminal Procedure, Title 18, U.S.C., Amendment

Converts three military installation to be closed under the base closure laws into federal prison facilities which are capable of incarcerating people convicted of a third violent felony for mandatory life imprisonment.

Incorporated into H.R. 4092 on 04/14/94, which the House later passed.

H.R. 3381 (Brewster) - Utilities Preference for Military Installation

Provides for continued sale of power by Federal power marketing agencies to preference entities using power at military installations selected for closure. Requires that power be sold to such preference entities for at least ten years beginning after the bill's enactment to promote economic development at military installations pending closure.

Referred to House Committee on Natural Resources. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 3383 (Ackerman) - Armed Forces, Title 10 U.S.C., Amendment

Establishes a program to place members of the Armed Forces who are involuntarily separated from the duty in employment positions as law enforcement officers.

Referred to the House Committee on Armed Services and the Committee on Judiciary. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 3511 (Natcher) - Fiscal Year 1994 Rescission Act

Cuts roughly \$2.5 billion from fiscal year 1994 expenditures, including \$29 million from the Economic Development Administration, \$50 million from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and \$10 million from the National Science Foundation.

Incorporated into H.R. 3400 on 11/22/93 and H.R. 3759 on 02/03/94.

H.R. 3630 (Coyne) - Public Finance and Infrastructure Investment Act of 1993

Establishes a distressed community economic development bond that would be targeted toward communities suffering from population loss, job loss, slow growth, or military base closings.

Referred to House Committee on Ways and Means. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 3675 (Nadler) - Defense Alternative Use Committee Act

Establishes alternate use committees at defense facilities to evaluate the defense facility assets and assist in the economic adjustment of communities, industries, and workers as a result of reductions or realignments in defense spending.

Referred to various House committees on 11/22/93. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 3736 (Andrews) - Worforce Education Act of 1994

Authorizes the Secretary of Labor to conduct a study on the feasibility of consolidating such federal dislocated worker programs under the Job Training Partnership Act as the defense conversion adjustment program, diversification program, clean air employment transition assistance program, and trade adjustment assistance program.

Referred to various House committee. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 3759 (Natcher) - Emergency Supplemental Appropriations Act of 1994 [Public Law 103-211 (108 Stat. 3), approved 2/12/94]

Provides \$10.019 billion in emergency funds to help victims of the California earthquake and \$1.041 billion in supplemental appropriations, while rescinding \$3.2 billion to help offset the added spending. Rescinds \$601.2 million from the Defense Department's military construction budget, including \$507.6 million in cuts to the Base Realignment and Closure Account.

H.R. 4026 (Dixon) - Small Business Defense Conversion Loan Guarantee Act of 1994

Authorizes appropriations for deferred participation loans to small business concerns detrimentally affected by defense reductions, and for other purposes.

Referred to House Committee on Small Business. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4040 (Rostenkowski) - Reemployment Act of 1994

Establishes a comprehensive system of reemployment services, training, and income support for permanently laid off workers and facilitates the establishment of one-stop career centers to serve as a common point of access to employment, education and training information systems, and for other purposes.

In the House. Cleared for full committee by Human Resources Subcommittee on 07/22/94.

H.R. 4050 (Ford) - Reemployment Act of 1994

Establishes a comprehensive system of reemployment services, training, and income support for permanently laid off workers; facilitates the establishment of one-stop career centers to serve as a common point of access to employment, education and training information and services; develops an effective national labor market information systems; and for other purposes.

Referred to House Committee on Education and Labor on 03/16/94. Public hearing held by Labor-Management Relations Subcommittee on 05/25/94. Public hearing held by Postsecondary Education and Training Subcommittee on 06/08/94

H.R. 4174 (Machtley) - Small Business Defense Conversion Guaranteed Loan Act of 1994

Authorizes appropriations for deferred participation loans to small business concerns detrimentally affected by defense reductions, and for other purposes.

Referred to House Committee on Small Business on 04/12/94. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4182 (Condit) - Transfer of Air Emission Credits, Provision

Requires the transfer of air emission credits attributable to the closure of a military installation to the redevelopment authority established for that installation.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services and Committee on Energy and Commerce. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4203 (Mineta) - The Aviation Investment Act of 1994

Directs the Secretary of Transportation to designate one or more military airports to receive grants to operate, maintain, and repair airport facilities during the transition to civil operations.

Referred to House committees on Public Works and Transportation and Ways and Means. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4240 (Machtley) - Defense Conversion Programs, Provision

Ensures that defense conversion, reinvestment, and transition assistance programs of the Department of Defense are directed primarily toward those states, and areas within those states, that have experienced the greatest number of job losses as a result of reductions in defense spending or the closure or realignment of military installations.

Referred to House Committee on Education and Labor and Committee on Armed Services on 04/18/94. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4251 (Klink) - Conveyance of Certain Military Equipment to Educational Institutions, Authorization

Authorizes the Secretary of Defense to transfer certain excess equipment to nonprofit educational institutions and training schools, if the facilities prove they would use the equipment for the betterment of national defense.

Incorporated as an amendment into H.R. 4301 on 05/28/94.

H.R. 4267 (Kanjorski) - Economic Development Reauthorization Act of 1994

Reauthorizes economic development programs under the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965 for fiscal years 1994 and 1995.

Referred to various House committees. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4301 (Dellums) - National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1995

Authorizes appropriations for fiscal year 1995 for military activities of the Department of Defense and prescribes military personnel strengths for fiscal year 1995, and for other purposes.

This measure incorporated into a different measure (S. 2182) on 07/25/94.

H.R. 4302 (McCurdy) - Military Construction Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1995

Authorizes \$2.4 billion for construction associated with base closure, \$2.18 billion for Defense Environmental Restoration Account, \$2 billion for environmental compliance, and other purposes.

Bill approved by the House Armed Services Committee on 05/05/94.

H.R. 4309 (Hamburg) - Local Hiring Preference for Certain Defense Contracts and Subcontracts

Requires a local hiring preference for certain defense contracts and subcontracts performed in or near labor surplus areas and closing military bases.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4407 (Goodling) - Consolidated and Reformed Education, Employment, and Retraining Systems Act

- Establishes a comprehensive and efficient workforce preparation and development system in the U.S., and for other purposes.
- Streamlines 86 federal workforce preparation programs into seven state block grant program areas: (1) Adult Education and Literacy; (2) Vocational Educational; (3) Vocational Rehabilitation; (4) Adult Employment and Training; (5) Youth Employment and Training; (6) Migrant and seasonal farmworkers employment and training; and (7) Native American Employment and Training.

Referred to House Committee on Education and Labor. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4411 (Klink) - National Environmental Training and Employment Act 1994

Establishes national programs to provide for environmental response training and employment.

Referred to House committees on Energy and Commerce and Education and Labor. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4638 (Stowe) - Administration of Defense Economic Conversion, Consolidation

Consolidates the administration of defense economic conversion activities in the Executive Ofice of the President. Establishes a Special Assistant to the President for Economic and Defense Conversion who would be responsible for coordinating all defense conversion, reinvestment, and transition assistance programs over a five-year period.

Referred to House Committee on Government Operations. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4639 (Snowe) - Internal Revenue Code of 1986, Amendment

Amends the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to provide tax incentives relating to the closure, realignment, or downsizing of military installations.

Referred to House Committee on Ways and Means. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4644 (Snowe) - Defense Economic Adjustment, Diversification, Conversion, and Stabilization Act of 1990, Amendment

Gives priority in the provision of community economic adjustment assistance to those communities most seriously affected by reductions in defense spending, the completion, cancellation, or termination of defense contracts, or the closure or realignment of military installations.

Referred to various House committees. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

H.R. 4650 (Murtha) - Department of Defense Appropriations Act, 1995

Appropriates \$243.6 billion in spending for 1995. The amount is \$846 million less than what President Clinton requested.

The House approved the bill on 06/29/94, by a vote of 330-to-91. In the Senate. Cleared for full committee on 07/25/94.

H. Con. Res. 60 (Fazio) - Resolution Concerning the Recommendations of the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission

Expresses the sense of Congress regarding emphasis that the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission should place on the economic impact of military installation closure on affected communities in recommending such installations for closuring during the 1993 base closure process.

Referred to House Committee on Armed Services. No action scheduled as of 07/22/94.

STATE LEGISLATION

SELECTED BILLS RELATED TO DEFENSE CONVERSION 1994

ASSEMBLY

ABX1 2 (Baca) - Economic Development Centers

- Authorizes the board of supervisors of a county to designate the premises of a closed federal military base as an economic development center.
- Requires the California Environmental Protection Agency, Trade and Commerce Agency, and Office of Planning and Research to assist a county in establishing an economic development center by specified means.
- Provides for expediting the review and permit process, accelerating remediation on any land contamination, and evaluating the need for, and facilitating asbestos removal.
- Requires a pilot program to be established at a center for comprehensive family services, including health and social services.
- Requires the Employment Development Department to assist a center in the screening and selection of employees and to provide other specified assistance.
- Requires the State Department of Education to provide for upgrade of the child care center at an economic development center to bring it into compliance with existing state licensing requirements.
- Sets forth specific requirements for provision of child care and development services, including after school care.
- Authorizes the Public Utilities Commission to apply incentives to benefit industries and business entities located within the economic development center at Norton Air Force Base until January 1, 1999.

Referred to Senate Appropriations; hearing canceled at request of author.

ABX1 4 (Baca) - Economic Development: Norton Air Force Base

- Extends the date for the Employment Training Panel to allocate \$10,000,000 to fund special employment training in response to the establishment of a federal Defense Finance and Accounting Services facility at Norton Air Force Base, if it is the selected site, from December 31, 1993, to February 1, 1995.
- Extends the date for the Trade and Commerce Agency to allocate \$1,500,000 to the Inland Valley Development Agency to provide funds to rehabilitate facilities to be used by the federal Defense Finance and Accounting Services facility at Norton Air Force Base, if it is the selected site, from February 1, 1994, to February 1, 1995.

Re-referred to Senate Appropriations, hearing date 08/08/94.

ABX1 5 (Baca) - Military Facilities Reuse Bond Act (Same as AB 2833.)

AB 638 (W. Brown) - Local Infrastructure: State Bonds

- Enacts a framework for the Brown-Peace Local Infrastructure Bond Act of 1994 which authorizes the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$200,000,000 for purposes of financing a specified local infrastructure finance program.
- Provides that: (1) no fund would be created; (2) no bonds would be issued or sold pursuant to its provisions; (3) no appropriation would be made for any purposes of the bill; (4) no portion of the bill would be submitted to the voters; and (5) no debt or liability of the state would be created by the bill.

Re-referred to Senate Appropriations; hearing date 07/07/94.

AB 783 (Chapter 53, Statutes of 1994) - Expenditures for Economic Development

- Requires the Public Utilities Commission to extend incentives to encourage economic development to include recycling market development zones.
- Authorizes the board of a municipal utility district to engage in programs to encourage economic development that benefits its ratepayers.

Chaptered.

AB 1495 (Chapter 94, Statutes of 1994) - Economic Development and Infrastructure

• Enacts the Bergeson-Peace Infrastructure Bank Act that would create the California Infrastructure Bank within the California Housing Finance Agency.

which would be renamed the California Housing and Infrastructure Finance Agency.

- Creates within the State Treasury the California Infrastructure Bank Fund which shall include a Sponsor Revenue Bond Account, a Participating Party Revenue Bond Account, a Grant Account, a Bond Guarantee Trust Account, and a State Infrastructure Revolving Account, and which would be continuously appropriated for purposes of the act.
- Creates the California Infrastructure Guarantee Trust Fund which would be continuously appropriated to insure accounts within the infrastructure bank fund would be available for administration only upon appropriation by the Legislature.
- Ensures that the bill would not become operative until the Legislature receives written notice from the Governor that sufficient funds are currently available to implement the bill's provisions.

Chaptered.

AB 2010 (Brulte) - Redevelopment Agencies

Prohibits redevelopment agency funds from being used to finance: (1) an action brought against a public agency that does not have jurisdiction to conduct its governmental activites within the redevelopment agency's jurisdiction; and (2) an action which involves property or other matters outside the redevelopment agency's jurisdictional boundaries.

Referred to Senate Local Government; hearing postponed by Committee on 07/07/94.

AB 2576 (Baca) - Public Utilities: Economic Development

- Requires the Public Utilities Commission to authorize rate discounts to industries or business entities that are located or that will locate within the boundaries of enterprise zones or economic incentive areas.
- Allows the Commission to apply the incentives to attract a federal Department of Defense Finance and Accounting Service Center at the existing site of Norton Air Force Base, if selected.
- Allows discounts only to industries or business entities that agree to maintain their facilities in this state for a minimum of five years from the date of commencement of the discount.

Re-referred to Senate Appropriations; hearing date 08/08/94.

AB 2604 (Napolitano) - Enterprise Zones

- Requires the Trade and Commerce Agency to designate five additional enterprise zones that meet prescribed criteria by December 31, 1995.
- Includes a criterion that the area within the proposed zone must be significantly and disproportionately adversely affected by the closure of military bases or a decline in defense-related industries, including aerospace and defense electronics.

Referred to Assembly Utilities and Commerce; Joint Rule 61 suspended 04/25/94.

AB 2775 (Archie-Hudson) - Education and Workforce Development

- Establishes the California Council on Education and Workforce Development.
- Requires the council to determine the most appropriate methods for achieving the specified goals relating to employment training and education.
- Requires the council to develop and implement the California Master Plan for Workforce Training and Preparation.

Referred to Senate Education; hearing postponed by committee.

AB 2833 (Baca) - Military Facilities Reuse Bond Act

- Authorizes the issuance of a \$900,000,000 general obligation bond for the purpose of funding a specified military facilities reuse financing program.
- Creates the Military Facilities Reuse Fund under the direction and control of the Defense Conversion Council, which shall be available upon appropriation by the Legislature to aid decommissioned military facilities and may be used to upgrade existing infrastructure.
- Designates as members of the Military Facilities Reuse Finance Committee: the Controller, the Treasurer, the Director of Finance, and the Chairperson of the Defense Conversion Council.
- States that this is an urgency statute which shall take effect immediately in order for the bond measure to be considered by the voters in a 1994 statewide election.

Assembly Third Reading on 08/08/94.

AB 3014 (Chapter 209, Statutes of 1994) - California Spaceport Authority

- Requires the California Spaceport Authority to be designated as the primary advocate in support of commercial space businesses and actions affecting the development of commercial space business by state agencies.
- Requires the Authority to coordinate with regional technology alliances in the development of commercial space businesses to achieve the optimum utilization of defense conversion and other federal and state grant funds.

Chaptered.

AB 3178 (McPherson) - Retention of Air Emission Reduction Credits for Base Reuse

- Requires regional air quality districts to work with the military to quantify and preserve air emission credits, to be made available for base reuse.
- Directs air districts to be responsible for creation of air emission credits, if the military does not apply for credits and to use the fully operational base, rather than the closed base, as the baseline for establishing emission reduction credits.
- Requires air districts to notify each local agency whose jurisdiction includes portions of the base or areas adjacent to the base prior to taking any action affecting air emission reductions for closing military base.

Re-referred to Assembly Natural Resources; hearing canceled at request of author on 04/19/94.

AB 3204 (Cannella) - Retention of Air Emission Reduction Credits for Base Reuse

- Allows a base reuse commission to apply to a local air district to register any emission reductions related to the termination of military operations at a military base within four years from the date the base is scheduled for closure.
- Requires the air pollution control district to collect specified fees from the end user of the air emission credits, rather than the base reuse commission.

Re-referred to Senate Appropriations to consent calendar; hearing date 08/08/94.

AB 3755 (Honeycutt) - Single Local Reuse Authority

- Establishes responsibility within the Defense Conversion Council for ongoing oversight of base reuse issues.
- Establishes a means of recognizing a single local base reuse authority for each closing base.

Re-referred to Senate Appropriations; hearing date 08/08/94.

AB 3759 (Gotch) - Military Base Reuse Authority Act

- Authorizes counties and cities located wholly or partly within the boundaries of a military base to establish a military base reuse authority to prepare, adopt, finance, and implement a plan for base reuse.
- Requires that the authority be governed by a board consisting of one member from each county and city within the territory of the military base.
- Authorizes the board to acquire and dispose of existing real property and facilities within the territory of the military base; to plan, finance, and construct new public capital facilities within the territory; to levy assessments, reassessments, special taxes, or development fees; and to issues bonds to finance projects.
- Determines that the authority will cease to exist when the board determines that 80 percent of the territory of the military base that is designated for development or reuse has been developed or reused in a manner consistent with the base reuse plan, or 20 years after the creation of the authority, whichever occurs first.

Referred to Senate Local Government; hearing canceled at request of the author on 07/07/94.

AB 3768 (O'Connell) - Community College Curriculum in Space Operations

- Requires the Allan Hancock Joint Community College District in the Santa Maria and Lompoc area of Santa Barbara County to develop a comprehensive curriculum in commercial space operations leading to an associate degree.
- Appropriates \$50,000 from a specified item of the Budget Act of 1993 to the Allan Hancock Joint Community College District for purposes of the bill.

Referred to Assembly Higher Education; hearing canceled at request of the author.

AB 3769 (Weggeland/Presley) - Base Redevelopment

- Authorizes the March Joint Powers Authority, which is composed of the County of Riverside, City of riverside, City of Moreno Valley, and City of Perris, to establish the March Joint Powers Redevelopment Agency and authorizes the Agency to engage in redevelopment activites.
- Defines "blight" for the purposes of the bill and specifies the limitations on the redevelopment plan for the area, particularly with respect to the funding of the redevelopment project, use of funds, and other programs that the agency finds necessary to promote redevelopment of the project area.

Provides that, because of the unique circumstances with regard to the particular condition of blight intrinsic to the realignment of March Air Force Base, a general statute cannot be made applicable, and a specifical statute is, therefore, necessary.

Re-referred to Senate Local Government; hearing date 07/07/94.

AB 3774 (V. Brown) - Environmental Quality: Environmental Impact Reports

Allows the lead agency to use an environmental impact statement prepared pursuant to federal law as the environmental impact report for a project involving, or resulting from, a federal military base or reservation closure if specified conditions are met.

Re-referred to Senate Appropriations; hearing date 08/08/94.

AB 3799 (Lee) - Defense Conversion Grants

- Specifies a procedure for the evaluation of applications for state matching funds available under the program.
- Requires the Trade and Commerce Agency to adopt state matching grant criteria that favor proposals meeting specified objectives and standards that are at least as stringent as federal criteria.

Re-referred to Senate Appropriations; hearing date 08/08/94.

AB 3821 (Connolly) - Preparation for Base Closure and Realignment 1995

- Directs the Defense Conversion Council (DCC) to prepare and implement a plan to minimize the number of California bases that are to be closed in the 1995 round.
- Directs the DCC to assist local government in developing technical and economic data for presentations before the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission in 1995.

Senate Third Reading on 07/07/94.

ACR 99 (Conroy) - Southern California Veterans Homes

Requests the Governor to pursue the use of three military bases as possible sites for southern California veterans homes.

Referred to Assembly Governmental Organization; hearing canceled at request of author.

AJR 16 (Resolution Chapter 17, Statutes of 1994) - Defense Conversion to a California State University Campus

Asks the President and Congress to enact legislation to appropriate \$100,000,000 to convert a portion of Fort Ord to a California State University Campus.

AJR 62 (Harvey) - Conversion of Closed Military Bases to State Prisons

Asks the President and Congress to allow California, upon local approval, to convert closed military bases to state prisons.

Referred to Senate Judiciary; hearing date 08/09/94.

AJR 64 (Res. Chapter 23, Statutes of 1994) - NASA /Ames Wind Tunnel Project

Asks the President and Congress of the United States to select as the site for the proposed National Wind Tunnel Complex the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA)/Ames Research Center in Silicon Valley.

Chaptered.

SENATE

SB 354 (Ayala) - Environmental Quality: Federal Military Installations

- Exempts from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) the decommission-ing, closure, and reuse activities associated with federal military installations for which an environmental impact statement has been adequately prepared pursuant to federal law, with regard to any potential significant effects on the environment.
- Applies CEQA with regard to any potential significant effect on the environment of the activity that is not adequately addressed in the environmental impact statement.

Assembly Consent Calendar; file date 08/08/94.

SB 899 (Chapter 64, Statutes of 1994) - Fort Ord Reuse Authority

Authorizes specified local agencies in Monterey County to establish the Fort Ord Reuse Authority to prepare, adopt, finance, and implement a plan for the future use and development of the territory occupied by the Fort Ord military base in Monterey County.

- Authorizes a 13-member board to acquire and dispose of existing real property and facilities within the territory of Fort Ord; to plan, finance, and construct new public capital facilities within that territory; to levy assessments, reassessments, special taxes, or development fees; and to issue bonds to finance projects.
- Authorizes the board to enter into contracts to mitigate the impacts of the reuse of Fort Ord on rare and endangered species of flora and fauna, and to study, evaluate, and recommend cleanup of toxic and explosive substances within the territory.
- Requires each agency represented by a board member to contribute annually to the authority a specified amount.
- Authorizes the board and member agencies to provide by contract for the transfer to the board or between member agencies of revenues available from sales tax, property tax, or other sources to help finance the cost of paying for services or capital facilities to serve or enhance the development of Fort Ord.
- Makes the bill inoperative when the board determines that 80% of the territory of Fort Ord that is designated for development or reuse has been developed or reused in a manner consistent with the plan, or June 30, 2014, whichever occurs first, and would be repealed on January 1, 2015.

Chaptered.

SB 900 (Chapter 87, Statutes of 1994) - Fort Ord: Redevelopment

Revises the definition of "redevelopment authority" found in the recently enacted legislation establishing the Fort Ord Reuse Authority to state that the University of California and the California State University are redevelopment agencies solely for transferring Fort Ord property.

Chaptered.

SB 1035 (Thompson) - Mare Island Redevelopment Project Area

- Adds to the Community Redevelopment Law (CRL) provisions establishing a Mare Island Redevelopment Project Area in the territory included within the Mare Island Naval Shipyard.
- Specifies the purposes of the project areas, exempts the project area from specified requirements of the CRL, and requires the redevelopment agency of the City of Vallejo to take specified actions with regard to the establishment and fiscal affairs of the project area.

Requires the city to adopt a housing element before adopting a redevelopment plan.

Referred to Assembly Ways and Means; hearing date 08/10/94.

SB 1257 (Chapter 34, Statutes of 1994) - Defense Installations: Conversion to Nonmilitary Uses

- Requires the Secretary for Environmental Protection, in coordination with appropriate federal, state, and local agencies, to expand one-stop permit programs to provide for development of defense installations converted to nonmilitary use.
- Authorizes a local agency to charge a fee, in addition to any fees charged for permits, to defray costs.

Chaptered.

SB 1266 (Ayala) - Military Facility Conversion to Civilian Uses

Declares that it is the intent of the legislature to facilitate review and approval of redevelopment projects relating to conversion of military facilities to civilian uses.

Referred to Senate Local Government on 01/06/94.

SB 1305 (Ayala) - Defense Installations: Conversion to Nonmilitary Uses

- Requires the issuance, by a state agency designated by the Governor, of a master permit, valid for five years, for the use of a defense installation converted to nonmilitary use.
- Provides for the master permit to supersede all state and local permits that would otherwise be required but would, nevertheless, require that the governing body of the county or city having jurisdiction over the territory affected approve, by a minimum of 80% of the vote, the issuance of the master permit before it may be granted.

Referred to Senate Governmental Organization on 01/27/94.

SB 1327 (Johnston) - Job Training

Allows the Employment Training Panel to allocate up to 10 percent of the annually available training funds for the purpose of funding special employment training projects, which include supporting efforts that address the training and employment of workers affected by defense industry cutbacks and military base closures.

Referred to Assembly Ways and Means; hearing 08/10/94.

SB 1369 (Ayala) - Public Utilities: Economic Development

Authorizes the Public Utilities Commission to apply incentives to attract a federal Defense Finance and Accounting Service Center at the existing military base site of Norton Air Force Base in San Bernardino County.

Referred to Senate Energy and Public Utilities.

<u>SB 1421 (Rogers) - Income Tax and Bank and Corporation Tax Deductions: Defense-</u> Related Facilities

Allows a taxpayer to treat the cost of specified property that is acquired by purchase and constructed to facilitate diversification, conversion, dual use, or commercialization of property owned by an aerospace or defense firm, as an expense that is not chargeable to capital account and to deduct the cost on a pro-rata basis over 3 specified taxable or income years.

Returned to Secretary of Senate pursuant to Joint Rule 62(a) on 06/22/94.

SB 1425 (Mello) - California State University, Monterey Bay

- Sets forth legislative findings and declarations concerning the acquisition of property at the site of Fort Ord in Monterey County for the purpose of developing and opening a campus of the California State University at that location.
- Adds the campus of the California State University, Monterey Bay, to the Education Code.

Re-referred to Assembly Ways and Means; hearing date 08/10/94.

SB 1593 (Rosenthal and Leonard) - Advanced Transportation Technology

Appropriates \$1,000,000 of Petroleum Violation Escrow Account funds to the Trade and Commerce Agency to make grants to CALSTART to: (1) provide services to California advanced transportation technology companies; (2) develop a business incubator for startup advanced transportation technology firms; and (3) develop and manage an advanced transportation technology assistance center to utilize California's defense and aerospace firms in building high technology components for use in advanced transportation systems.

Re-referred to Ways and Means on 07/06/94.

SB 1598 (Mello) - Community Facilities Districts

- Permits a community facilities district to include territory owned by the federal government that is expected to be transferred to a nonfederal entity in the future.
- Provides that any special tax levied for a district that includes federally-owned territory shall not take effect until the territory is transferred to a nonfederal entity.

In Senate - to Unfinished Business on 07/07/94.

SB 1599 (Mello) - Improvement Districts

- Permits an improvement district to include territory owned by the federal government that is expected to be transferred to a non-federal entity in the future.
- Provides that the assessment levied for a district that includes federally-owned territory shall not take effect until the territory is transferred to a non-federal entity.

In Senate - to Unfinished Business on 07/07/94.

SB 1600 (Mello) - Redevelopment: Fort Ord Redevelopment Project Area

Authorizes the establishment of a redevelopment project area within the boundaries of the territory of the County of Monterey occupied by Fort Ord as of January 1, 1993.

Referred to Assembly Housing and Community Development. Hearing cancelled at the request of author.

SB 1646 (Rogers) - Military Personnel: Employment and Driver's Licenses

- Requires rules and regulations of boards provided for in the Business and Professions Code to provide for methods of evaluating education, training, and experience obtained in the armed services, if applicable to the requirements of the business, occupation, or professions regulated.
- Maintains that it is state policy to make every reasonable effort to assist persons who leave active duty with the military in obtaining employment in the civilian work force with outreach programs, including job seminars and job fairs at military bases.
- Specifies that it is state policy to recognize training and experience that individuals gain while in the military.

Requires the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV), in conjunction with military services, to develop policies to assist persons who are leaving active duty to obtain commercial drivers' licenses and prohibits policies developed by DMV and the military from waiving any requisites, fees, or examinations required by law for a commercial drivers' licenses.

Referred to Assembly Ways and Means; hearing date 08/17/94.

SB 1680 (Marks) - School Finance: Federal Military Base Closures

Provides a supplemental apportionment to certain school districts that previously received federal assistance, but where federal assistance has been reduced or eliminated because the number of pupils enrolled in the districts decreased, as a result of federal military base closures.

Referred to Senate Education. Hearing canceled at request of author on 04/18/94.

SB 1872 (Mello) - Local Government Reorganization

Exempts any local government reorganization proceeding to detach territory that was part of a military base on January 1, 1993 from the requirement to terminate if a resolution or written protest against the reorganization is filed by the city in a timely manner.

In Senate - to Unfinished business on 07/07/94.

SB 1925 (Thompson and Hughes) - Public Employees' Retirement Law: Former Federal Base Closure Employees Employed By Contracting Agencies

Authorizes contracting agencies that have employed former federal employees whose jobs were lost as a direct result of the closure of military installations in California to authorize those employees to receive public service credit for their federal service under specified conditions.

Re-referred to Assembly Ways and Means on 07/06/94.

SB 1971 (Bergeson) - CEQA and Base Closure

- Specifies that the baseline for the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) review may be the conditions on the base at the time the closure decision was made (i.e., a fully active base) rather than after the base closes (i.e., vacant, unused land).
- Allows projects, which are suggested after a base reuse Environmental Impact Report (EIR) has been prepared, to bypass preparation of a separate EIR, unless the lead agency determines the project will have a significant effect on the environment.

Referred to Assembly Natural Resources; reconsideration granted.

SCA 31 (Rogers) - Property Taxation Exemptions: New Construction for Aerospace and Defense Firms

- Permits the Legislature to exempt real property owned by an aerospace or defense firm from property taxation for the period that the property is vacant or idle as a result of cancellation or completion of a contract.
- Excludes from the term "newly constructed" any improvement to an aerospace or defense facility by an aerospace or defense firm to increase capability for diversification, conversion, dual use, or commercialization of the facility as it applies to property taxes on real property.

Referred to Senate Revenue and Taxation.

SCR 7 (Roberti) - Defense Conversion Council

Limits the existence of the Defense Conversion Council to January 1, 1998.

Senate inactive file.
