Formation and Beginnings

- On August 9, 2014, eighteen-year-old Michael Brown was killed by then police officer Darren Wilson in the St. Louis suburb of Ferguson, Missouri, which sparked a variety of responses including memorials, community meetings, protests, and rallies which dominated the local and national media.
- Later in August, with the direction from Washington University Librarian, Jeffrey Trzeciak, the Documenting Ferguson Team was formed to capture history as it happened.
- Participants were using social media and mobile devices to organize events as well as document them. The team needed to find a way to collect and preserve born digital files captured on these types of temporal media.
