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Virus Prevention and You

Computer users are encouraged to follow safety precautions to avoid viruses on their computers. Make sure that there is anti-virus protection software on your computer (e.g. McAfee). Also, verify that the anti-virus software is active and set to automatically check for viruses regularly. There are many new viruses found each month, so this is an important safety check.

Some tips to avoid viruses are: **First**, do not open any files attached to e-mail from an unknown source. **Next**, do not open any e-mail attachments if the subject line is questionable or unexpected. Do not open any e-mail attachments unless you know what it is, even if it appears to be from someone you know. Some viruses can spread through e-mail. It is always better to be safe than sorry and confirm that the person really sent the message.

Another way to avoid viruses is to delete all chain e-mails and junk mail. Do not forward or reply to any of them. These e-mails are intrusive and clog the network. Never open e-mails with two extensions (e.g., 'filename.bmp.pif' or 'filename.doc.bat'). Don't open any e-mails with the extensions .exe, .bat, or .pif. These are only examples, but there are many forms of this virus out there. If you do download files from the Internet, use extreme caution. Verify that the website has an anti-virus program. If you aren't sure, save the file to a disk and run your anti-virus software.

Beware of electronic greeting cards you receive. E-card scams are circulating, conning people into clicking on a phony Website where they can infect their system with a virus or have their address book stolen. Be on the lookout for a specific virus with the subject, "Friend Greeting application (III)." Do not open this message. Delete it from your mailbox immediately.

Back up your files on a regular basis. If a virus destroys one of your files, you can restore from the back up. You should store your backup copy in a separate location from your work files, somewhere other than your hard drive. Finally, if you are in doubt about any potential viruses, do not hesitate to call the Information Technology Services Help Desk, 395-5151.

SUNY Learning Network Update

If you haven't yet heard about SLN courses, they are SUNY Brockport courses delivered via the Internet at: <http://www.sln.suny.edu>. SLN is supported by SUNY System Administration and is overseen by the division of Advanced Learning and Information Services (ALIS). Currently, more than 50 of the 64 SUNY institutions participate in SLN. SUNY Brockport faculty have been offering SLN courses since the fall 2000 semester. The following are a few of the classes that SLN is offering this spring: CRJ 493.61-Neighborhood Crime & Violence; NUR 680.63- Advanced Pharmacology; PAD 664.63- Non-Profit Advocacy and Government Relations; and WMS 360.63- Sex and Culture.

SUNY Morrisville's Laptop PC Initiative

On November 16, 2002, Dave Rogers, Dean of School of Business and Chris Cring, Director of the Center for Educational Change, SUNY Morrisville, gave an overview of the laptop PC program that started there in 1999. In this program, all School of Business students get laptops the first weekend of school, and receive an 1.5 hour orientation when the students sign for the laptops. All student help is handled by SUNY Morrisville's Help Desk. Updates of Norton anti-virus and other software is automatically installed on student laptops.

Since 1999, Morrisville has grown to

21 laptop classrooms that have data port and electrical power at each seat. A critical part of the program's success is faculty development. All faculty were required to agree to the program for it to reach its goals. Faculty members have found that they can cover more material using on-line examples/simulations, etc. Morrisville worked in large part with IBM, Raytheon, Virco Furniture, Univisions, etc, and other partners.

This invited session was presented to Brockport business faculty, who has been considering the feasibility of a similar laptop program.

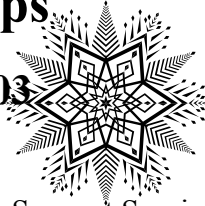

GIS Update

On October 8th and 9th, 2002, Dr. James Zollweg provided an explanation of the benefits of ESRI's ARCVIEW software, a GIS package. Dr. Zollweg discussed GIS as a way of visualizing data to solve problems. For example, Dr. Zollweg mentioned the use of the software by biologists in order to map animal, fish and plant habitats for the use of population studies. He also demonstrated how the software could be beneficial in the case of catching a criminal using geographical profiles.

GIS is a tool that has found hundreds of applications and uses. GIS and ESRI software are used in television shows, including "The District." Fall 2002 Computer Skills Exam Update

Almost 1,500 students took the Computer Skills Exam this fall. Our Fall 2002 freshman class took honors with 95% of all freshmen passing the exam. The freshmen started off in a big way last summer by filling up all the Early Bird testing sessions. We had 100% attendance at the Early Bird exams on 7/25 and this was an early indicator that this freshman class was motivated and ready to go. Many other students attended classes until they felt confident that they were prepared and were able to pass the exam before the end of the semester.

In addition to the freshmen, we had 300 new transfer and readmitted students who also passed the exam. While disappointed that more transfers did not take the exam this semester, we will continue to encourage them to take the exam as soon as possible and not put it off until later. If we continue to build a backlog of new students each semester who do not take the exam, it could eventually delay graduation for students who haven't satisfied the requirement.

We had 88 exam sessions this fall and plan to run another 44 sessions this spring. This should accommodate the incoming transfer students in addition to the remaining students from the fall. Our goal is to have 80% of transfer students pass the exam by the end of their first year here at Brockport. Computer Skills' dedicated staff will work toward that goal. We would ultimately like to see the transfers match the achievements of the freshmen!

Angel Steering Committee appointed

SUNY College at Brockport has adopted the ANGEL course management software college wide. ANGEL was developed at Indiana University – Purdue University Indianapolis, and is now marketed by CyberLearning Labs, Inc. of Indianapolis. Angel is a highly integrated software product that enables faculty to maintain class rosters and grade books, facilitates communication with students in classes via email, listservs and chat rooms, permits faculty to make available a wide variety of course content (printed material, electronic materials via the web, audio and video materials, other), and allows faculty to develop, administer, score and report grades on quizzes and examinations. By integrating ANGEL with the college's BANNER student information system, faculty will be able to retrieve class lists, and file grades through ANGEL.

The purpose of the ANGEL Steering Committee, comprised primarily of College faculty representing all three Schools, the Honor Program, and Delta College will be to help the College reap the benefits of this new technology, while safeguarding the College from growth-related problems and planning for future expansion of ANGEL at SUNY Brockport.

As of late October 2002, ANGEL faced the following immediate challenges: hardware support (including servers, storage, and communications); Help Desk and user support; and training for faculty and staff in the use of and capabilities of ANGEL. In a long-term view, the ANGEL Steering Committee will consider and develop recommendations about the following issues and concerns:

- Development plan
- Budget
- Staging (scaling)
- Equipment
- Access and Use Policy
- Security
- Copyright and related policy issues
- Other Issues
