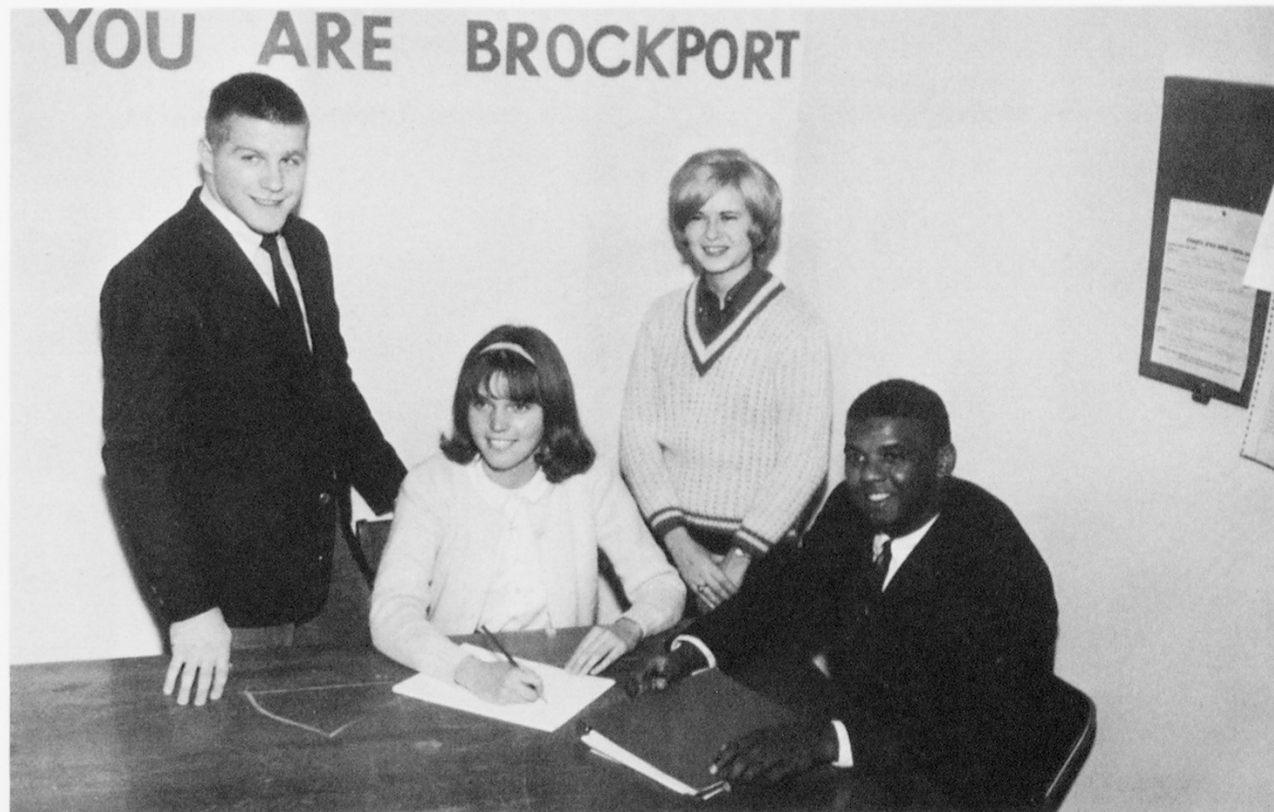
Frost Select Officers

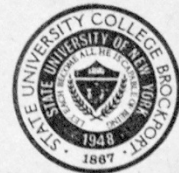

The Student Leadership Group, the 33 member standing committee of the Brockport Student Government that handles needed changes in institutional policy as sought for by the students of Brockport, sent a recommendation to the House of Delegates of BSG last Monday. This recommendation as it was finally approved by the House, by a vote of 40 to 4, will provide a student referendum on women's hours. The entire student body will be given a week to vote on the following eight item proposal:

1. The women of the State University of New York, College at Brockport, shall have no hours and no signout procedure.

2. The senior women only, shall

Ballard Honored

Joe Ballard, defensive fullback for the Golden Eagles, was named to the small-college All East Team of the Week. This is the second Brockport player to be honored during the first three weeks of the season.

Ballard was cited for his defensive work in the 21-14 loss to Southern Connecticut. In the private "score" kept by Brockport coaches, Ballard was given 32 points for assisted and unassisted tackles. He called defensive signals throughout the game, and his aggressive play forced two Southern Connecticut fumbles.

Bill Brooks, a halfback, was named to the All-East team for his play in the season's opener against Clarion. Both boys will receive a certificate from the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference.

Two other players, Bob Nugent and Wayne Hartman, have received honorable mention for their play. The E.C.A.C. awards certificates in three categories, depending upon the size of the school. Brockport is in Division

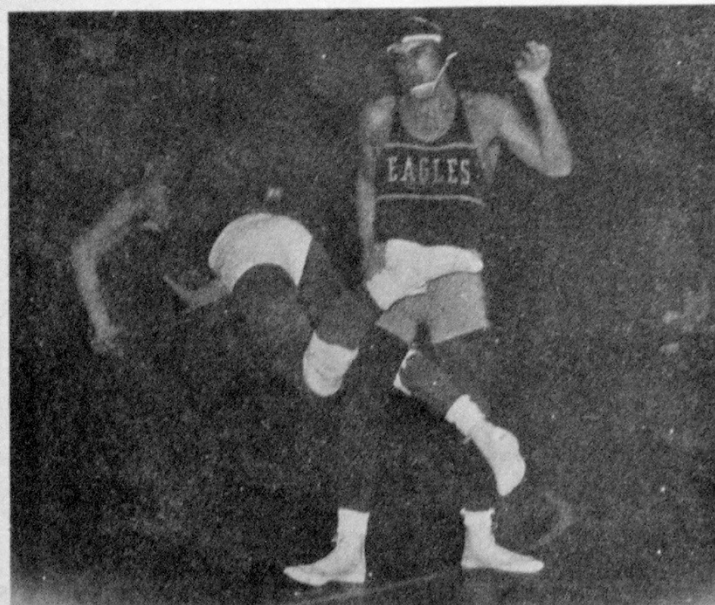
