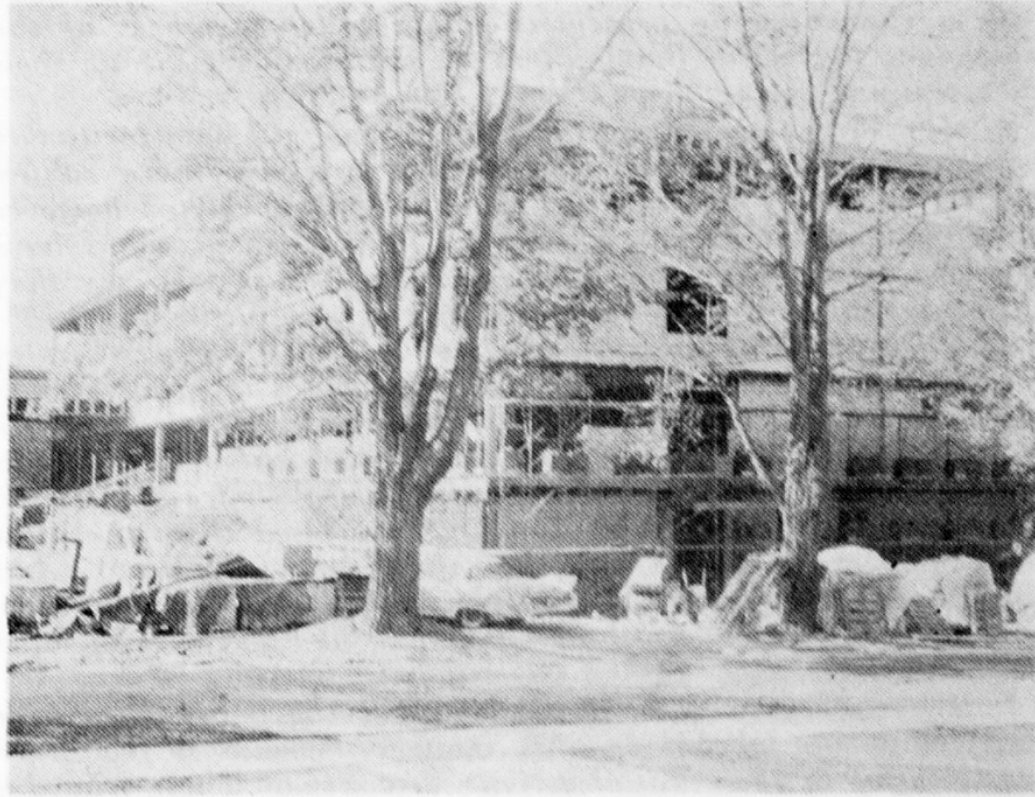

Janet was awarded the Arvid Eldred scholarship, given annually to a junior or senior who shows greatest potential by the New York State Teachers Association. Award is for \$1,000, paid in four equal installments. Janet is a junior health and physical education major at the Brockport college.

Candidates' petitions must be handed in before 12 noon April 25 at the SFA mailbox in the College Union. The petitions, which must have the signatures of five

percent of the student body, also must include such information as the candidate's name, the office general, in order for a student to sought, and his party if any. In be qualified to run for an office, he must have a 2.00 or better cumulative index for the three previous semesters before the election, he should have been enrolled at the college for at least two consecutive semesters when he takes office, and he must be scheduled to be on

campus throughout his entire term. An officer can student-teach and remain in office as long as he resides on campus.

Additional requirements for specific offices are listed in the **Student Guide**. Other questions about elections can be answered by either Leo Teerlinck or Pat Diana.

Spoon River Anthology

Brockport's Readers Theatre announces its upcoming production, "Spoon River Anthology" by Edgar Lee Masters. Directed by Mr. Robert Denning, this very moving play was originally a series of poetic monologues, which have been woven into a play which is a chronicle of several generations of a whole community. Via musical interludes the audience is introduced to the former inhabitants of Spoon River, an area near Lewiston and Petersburg, Illinois.

Although Masters has published other books of verse, plays and essays, "Spoon River Anthology" remains his greatest achievement. The cast that is working on this production includes; Kristine Allen, Eleanor Kenerson, Cynthia Reynolds, Robert Denning, James Kunstler and David Hammond, while the musical component is

of their souls. The audience is introduced to such memorable characters as; Tom Beatty, the gambler, Russian Sonia, the dancer, Shack Dye, the Negro, Anne Rutledge, first love of Abraham Lincoln and Hannah Armstrong, who kept a boarding house in which Lincoln once lived. These are just some of the undistinguished citizens of Spoon River, whose deaths have placed them among all those who are "sleeping, sleeping on the hill". From the hill their monologues depict both the sordid and the humorous sides of life.

Due to the scandalous behavior of some of the characters, which were recognizable as influential figures lately dead or still living in Spoon River, the book had a notorious success. One reviewer has called this play, "a procession of unforgettable men and women

Desegregation To Be Studied

Some 30 educators in the area will participate in a State University College at Brockport institute designed to help them understand the process of desegregation in the classroom. Dr. Albert Brown, president of the college, announced. The institute is made possible under a grant from the U.S. Office of Equal Education Opportunity under the provisions of Title IV of the Civil Rights Act.

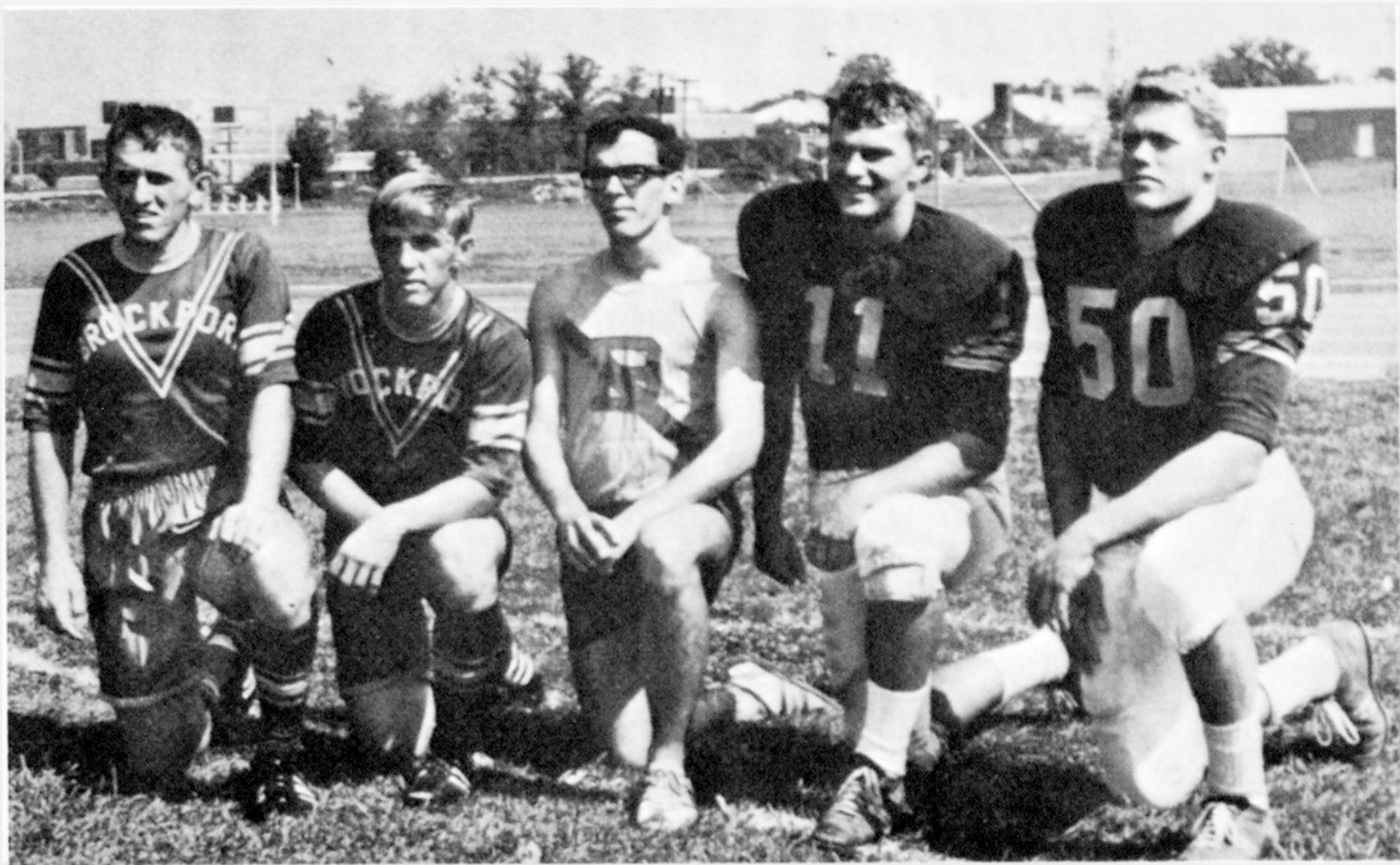
Approximately 80 youngsters from Rochester's Inner City will provide the basis of the institute, which runs intermittently from July 1, 1967, to June 30, 1968. The Inner City students will represent a cross section from every grade from kindergarten through eighth grade. Dr. Andrew Virgilio, principal of the Brockport college Campus Demonstration School, is director of the institute.

The program involves profes-

Those selected for the institute will begin with three weeks of intensive study this summer. The first week will see consultants from the local scene meet with the participants in the mornings, with small discussion groups occupying the afternoon.

The second week will be somewhat like the first, but with consultants from the national scene. The third week will consist of guided observations of the program in action in the Campus School classrooms.

During the year there will be two one-day sessions, again with consultants available for questions and discussions. Next February the participants will again gather, this time for a full week, for guided observation of the on-going program. A final, one-day session will be held in May, 1968.

DOLPHINS WIN STATE MEET

Female Splashers Dunk Oneonta

Last Saturday saw the Brockport State Dolphins defeat the New England Champions (ONEONTA) to win the third Annual N.Y.S. Invitational Swimming Meet for College Women. Brockport totaled 83 points while second place Ithaca grabbed 56. Oneonta sneaked in third with 49 pts. This is the second time in three years that Miss Carmichael has coached a victory in the State Championships. Last year, Oneonta nosed ahead of Brockport on a disqualification and an unfortunate loss of nose plugs! This year, the story was different.

Our undefeated Brockport Team faced some very tough competition in the State Meet. But four months of strenuous training paid off as the Dolphins dominated the meet, breaking many pool and meet records.

First the 200 yard Medley Relay team took first place with the record breaking time of 2:12.2 minutes. This race featured Jean Weninger swimming backstroke, Sue Grimm, breaststroke, Carol Novak, butterfly and Carolyn Gerow, freestyle. Next, freshman Diane Mason won the 50 yd. freestyle with a time of 29.1 seconds. Again the crowd watched Diane Mason capture top honors in the 100 yd. Individual Medley, breaking the meet record with a time of 1:11.8. A close

Director Of Erie

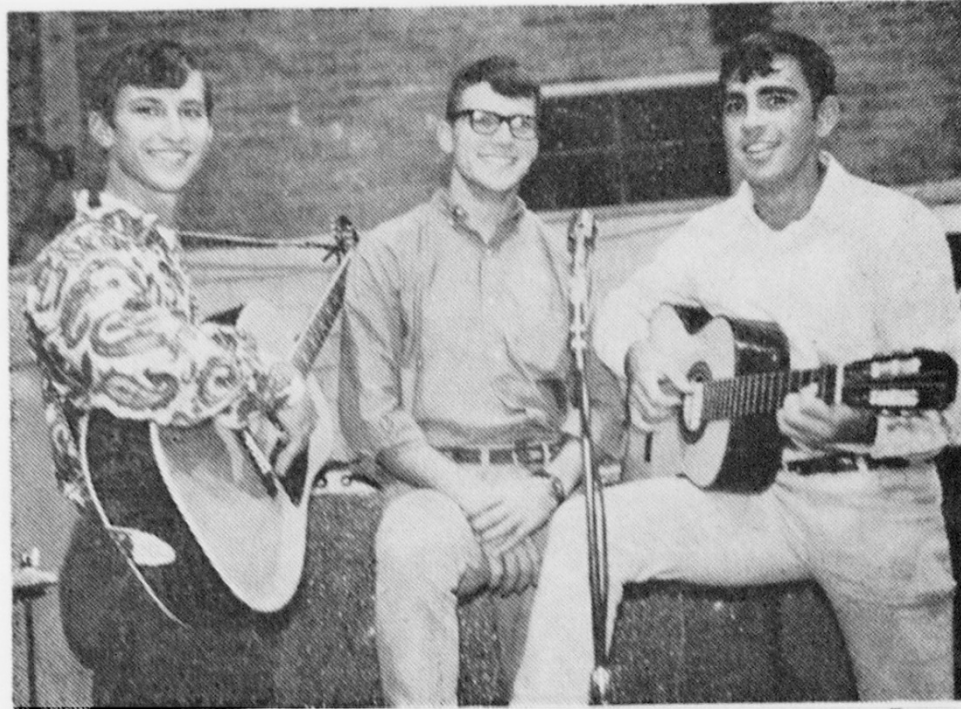
N. Sidney Archer, a former Brockport student, was named director of the Eastern Regional Institute of Education (Erie) in June of 1966.

Mr. Archer is the son of Dr. Russell Archer, who is the chairman of the speech department here at Brockport, and received his bachelor's and Master's degrees from Brockport.

Working with Mr. Archer will be William A. Fuller, dean of the University of Rochester College of Education, treasurer; and James U. Mitchell Jr., R.R. professor of education.

The U.S. Office of Education has granted Erie \$199,613 for the purposes of establishing these educational laboratories to encourage innovation and improvement in education.

Erie is based temporarily in Syracuse, but Mr. Archer said that permanent headquarters

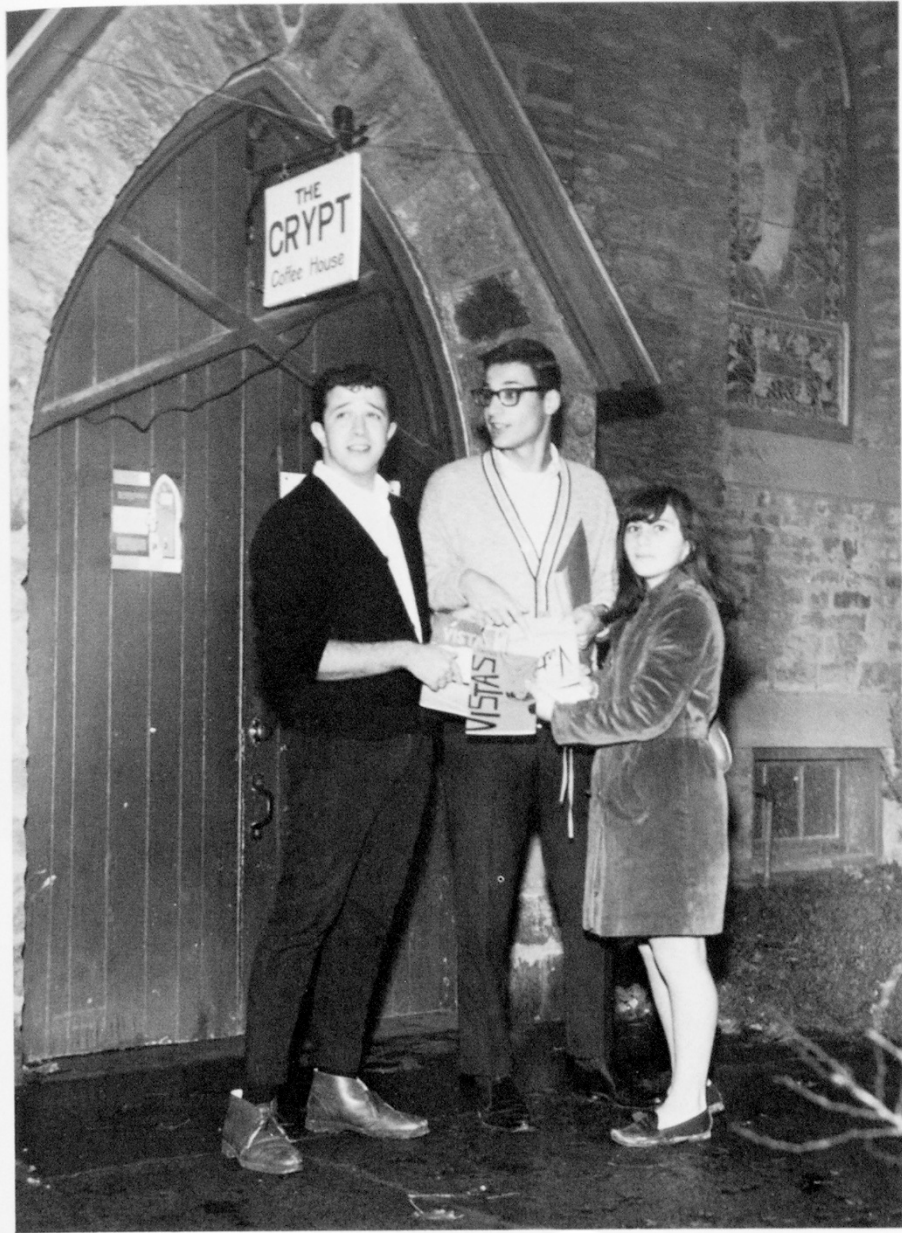
