

Summer Session Features Workshops. Courses in Many, Varied Disciplines

This summer, Stritch will offer 106 undergraduate and graduate courses. special workshops for in-service teachers and youth ministers, and a China study tour. Regular classes are scheduled during the 6-week session, June 20-July 29, and two 3-week sessions from June 20-July 8 and July 11-29. respectively.

Highlighting the 1983 Summer Session are two 5-day workshops on Increasing Teacher Effectiveness, K-12 and Clinical Supervision: The Hunter Approach, which will be conducted on campus by Dr. Madeline Hunter and

UCLA staff members, June 18-22.

A record-breaking total of 1,350 men and women are enrolled fulland part-time at Stritch during the second semester of 1982-'83, according to Sr. Francis Marie DeLany. registrar.

Registrants for credit courses include 767 undergraduates and 583 graduate students, respectively -

as of Feb. 1

Another 700 adults are enrolled in non-credit, continuing studies classes at the College.

Tuition is \$115 per credit.

Graduation Plans for May 22 Announced; Dr. Richard Warch Will Deliver Address

Cardinal Stritch College will hold its 1983 Commencement Exercises on Sun., May 22, at 2:00 p.m., in Uihlein Hall of Milwaukee's Performing Arts Center. At that time, 285 graduates will receive Associate, Bachelor and Master degrees.

Dr. Richard Warch, president of Lawrence University, Appleton, will be the graduation speaker, and Sr. M. Camille Kliebhan, CSC president, will award diplomas to 202 undergraduate and 83 graduate students during the ceremonies.

Campus Improvements Include Parking Lots

Two new parking lots were constructed late last fall as initial steps in implementing the College's longrange plans for improving, expanding and remodeling Stritch's physical facilities — according to Dr. Robert Flahive, vice president.

As part of CSC's Jubilee '87 Building Campaign, a large parking area accommodating over 220 vehicles was built along the southeastern edge of the campus. A second lot with 22 spaces was provided immediately east of the Administration Building to afford more visitors' parking.

Other developments and fundraising efforts will be reported in the next issue of Stritch '83.

The 1983 Class includes the first graduates of Stritch's Bachelor and Master of Science in Management degrees. It also includes the second group to receive Associate of Science in Nursing degrees.

Committee Prepares Plans

A special committee of students and faculty members will help plan arrangements for Graduation Weekend activities - a reception for families and friends, a liturgy in the College chapel and a Sunday meal in Serra Hall.

Formal announcements and detailed instructions will be sent to all parties concened, according to Sr. Andree Gaspard, academic dean.

Congregation Elects Three As Directors

The Sisters of St. Francis of Assisi have elected an administrative team of three Sisters to lead the Congregation for the next four years. Sister Joanne Meyer was re-elected director, and Srs. Nancy Kazik and Marcia Lunz were elected associate directors of the Congregation.

Sister Joanne, former CSC Math Dept. head, holds degrees from St. Louis University. Sister Nancy graduated from Stritch ('70) and Seattle University; Sister Marcia graduated from Stritch ('67) and Northwestern University.

Science Remains Essential to Liberal Arts

In this "space age," education, communication and other aspects of daily living are influenced directly by the discoveries of science and their applications to technology. Besides, such current concerns as ecology, energy, conservation, food production, genetics and deadly diseases call for more and greater advances in science — particularly as these relate to many areas of general interest and public welfare. To the degree, then, that science works in the service of humankind, it is a means to an end.

Similarly, at Stritch, rather than being an end in itself, science is a meaningful and integral part of the liberal arts curriculum. This means that students majoring in the sciences also take courses in the humanities, social and behavioral sciences, fine arts and other subjects, while students in these latter fields broaden their perspectives with science courses.

Two Majors Offered

Stritch offers academic majors and minors in biology and chemistry. The Biology Department services students through its 16 distinct courses. Lower level offerings introduce students to scientific contributions and scientific methods, while advanced courses prepare students to teach or to enter graduate and/or professional schools. Courses in micro-biology and physiology meet the requirements for students in the nursing program.

Headed by Sr. Ann Ferschl, professor, the Biology Department has two other faculty members: Sr. Mary Ann Polasek, associate professor, and Sr. Renee Costanzo, assistant professor.

For those who wish to have a better understanding of their physical environment, Stritch's Chemistry Department offers introductory courses. It also offers advanced courses as a basis for related fields, as preparation for nursing, dietetics, teaching or graduate study. In all, the department provides 16 courses in chemistry and two in general physics. Its two full-time instructors are

The newest program at Stritch is a Broad Fields Science Major which prepares students to teach at the middle school or junior high level. It features a spectrum of courses drawn from biology, chemistry, earth sciences and physics, which may be combined with such minors as teacher education, business preparation or mathematics.

Many Careers Possible

Few fields at the College offer as many job opportunities as those awaiting the liberal arts student with a science major. Armed with a Bachelor of Arts degree in biology or chemistry, a graduate can pursue higher studies; elementary or secondary school teaching; research positions in business, industry, government or health professions; medical technology or laboratory work.

He/she can become an environmentalist, conservationist, forester, horticulturist or naturalist, or hold a position in biochemistry, food service supervision, clinical chemistry, pharmacology, geochemistry, oceanography, polymer science and toxicology. The many job career possibilities range from pre-medicine, pre-dentistry, pre-nursing, and pre-veterinary to business preparation for development, marketing and sales.

Hence, while Stritch recognizes science as being important, basic and relevant, it also recognizes the need to supplement analytical methods learned in the scientific disciplines with other knowledge, understandings and appreciations needed for making balanced value-judgments so important where moral issues are involved. Thus, at Stritch, science exists to serve the humanities and vice versa.

Stritch Selected in National Competition; The Brunswick Foundation Presents Award

Stritch is one of ten small colleges and universities in the United States named winners of The Brunswick Foundation's 1982 national competition. Each school received an unrestricted grant of \$3,300 from the Foundation, based in Skokie, IL.

The ten colleges were chosen on the basis of action plans they are implementing on their campuses to strengthen the quality of education in four categories: (1) Financial Aid what the college is doing to adjust to the reduced external funds available for student financial aid: (2) Education Programs — what the college is doing to integrate some of the new technological advances into its educational programs; (3) Student/Teacher Relationships - what the college is doing to assure that the faculty remain vital as teachers; and (4) Facilities — what the college is doing to prevent necessary maintenance projects from being deferred and thus avoid deterioration and/or obsolescence of the physical facilities.

Ray Hartstein, Brunswick Founda-

tion administrator, presented a check to Sr. Camille Kliebhan during a visit to CSC.

Along with Stritch, the other award winners are: Arkansas College, AR; College of Idaho, ID; Hartwick College, NY; Hollins College, VA; Lake Forest College, IL; La Roche College, PA; Phillips University, OK; Tougaloo College, MS; and Upsala College, NJ.

Semi-Formal Dance



Stritch Reading Clinic Marks Forty Years Of Service to Child and Adult Registrants

With the approaching summer session, the College will mark the 40th Anniversary of its Reading Clinic. Since 1943, the Clinic has helped approximately 13,000 children, nearly 2,000 adults, and hundreds of students who have utilized the Clinic facilities for college-level courses in study skills and speed-reading.

Staffing the Clinic are 12 clinicians during the year (more during the summer) — plus laboratory teachers enrolled in the College's graduate Reading Practicum. This composite staff handles 300-400 students each semester and during the summer months.

Other Information Given

Registrants, who range from ages 6 to 60, sometimes travel great distances to attend classes. Some come from such points in Wisconsin as DePere, Superior, Kewaskum, Richfield and Sussex, as well as from surrounding places like Cedarburg, Elm Grove, Mequon and Wauwatosa. Last semester, according to Sr. Marie Gerard Peter, director of the Clinic, one 16-year-old girl commuted weekly via Amtrak from Cresco, IA.

'Renew' Groups Meet For Weekly Sessions

Sr. Doris Pehowski, director of campus ministry, reports that over 50 students and faculty members are involved in Stritch's fourth RENEW season, Feb. 6-Mar. 30.

Six small groups meet weekly on campus for Scripture reading, group discussion and prayer sessions.

The general theme of these six weeks is "Empowerment by the Holy Spirit."

Those seeking help in reading come from all walks of life: professionals, like doctors and lawyers, hoping to improve their speed-reading techniques to keep abreast of current literature in their field; exservicemen, laborers and parents who need to read for various reasons; young adults preparing for college; and school-age youngsters who either are experiencing difficulties in classroom situations or are not working up to their potential.

Until this year, the Clinic held classes on the Fox Point campus and at the Franciscan Congregation's Motherhouse on South Lake Drive. The latter operation was closed to consolidate the Clinic's programs, personnel and facilities in one location.

Venture Student Total Continues to Increase

Enrollments of full- and part-time Venture students have continued to climb over the past six or seven years, according to Margo Frey, coordinator of Career and Placement Services

As of Fall 1982, over 260 men and women 25 years of age and older were registered in Undergraduate Division courses leading to either a two-year Associate or a four-year Bachelor degree.

CSC provides special counseling and other services for these adults who may be entering college for the first time or returning to campus after "stopping out" for a year or more.
