B. Scott Gaudi

B. Scott Gaudi is a 1991 IMSA graduate. Scott graduated Summa Cum Laude from Michigan State University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Astrophysics. He received a Master of Science and Doctorate in Astronomy from Ohio State University. Scott is currently a Hubble Fellow at the Institute for Advanced Study. During his time at Michigan State, he was named the Outstanding Junior Physics Major, the Spartan Scholar, and was recipient of the Graham T. Schmidt Scholarship. While attending Ohio State, he received the Presidential Fellowship, and first place in the Edward F. Hayes Graduate Research Forum.
