## Cardinal Principles of Lutheranism

The Rev. Edward C. Fredrich is professor of church history and chairman of the Department of Church History at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary in Mequon, Wisconsin. He edits the Wisconsin Lutheran Quarterly as well as being a contributing editor of The Northwestern Lutheran. He has served on the board of directors of the Lutheran Historical Conference since 1976.

He earned the B.A. degree at Northwestern College, Watertown, Wisconsin, in 1938 and received his theological education at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, Mequon between 1938 and 1941. He earned the M.A. degree in history at Michigan State University in 1958.

Prior to assuming his present position, he served in teaching capacities at Martin Luther College in New Ulm, Minnesota, from 1964 until 1970 and Michigan Lutheran Seminary, Saginaw, Michigan, from 1954 until 1964. From 1948 until 1954 he served as pastor at Paul the Apostle Church, Detroit, Michigan, He started his teaching career at Winnebago Lutheran Academy, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, as instructor in 1941, and later, from 1945-1948 served that institution as principal.

In 1979, he presented an essay to the Congress on Lutheran Confessions, and in prior years has presented essays to the Synodical Conference and the

Lutheran Historical Conference.
