Course Number: ENGL 1301 Course Title: Composition I

Course Description: Intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis. Lab required.

Lab Requirement:

The lab component is an integral part of this writing course. Over the course of the semester, you will need to complete a combination of typically 5 selections from the list below. This lab is not the same as regular daily course work that you must complete to stay on track in the class; it is, instead, designed as additional writing-focused activities that will help improve your writing throughout the term. During the semester, you will need to track and provide evidence of completing these lab requirements outside of class.

Lab # 2: Annotate an article of YOUR choice from the textbook (30 pts.). Your goal is to take notes on an article so you understand the rhetorical components of the text and can use those notes to write a rhetorical analysis of your chosen article. Submit **BEFORE 11:59 PM on October 8.**

Lab # 3: Writing Center Tutor Session (30 pts.)

See the Writing Center page on the Collin college Web site for guidelines regarding tutor sessions (note what the Writing Center will and will NOT do for you).

Write a brief (1 page) essay that summarizes what was covered in the session with your tutor, and explain how it specifically helped you. Submit **BEFORE** 11:59 PM on October 29.

Work with a tutor in one of the Collin Writing Centers (make an appointment)

 Work with a tutor via the Online Writing Center (OWL)—use the drop box to submit your draft (Note: Tutor Text does <u>NOT</u> qualify for lab credit)

In addition to your written summary of the tutor session, I must receive a report from the tutor you worked with confirming your session—YOU are responsible for making sure that report gets to me. Remind your tutor that he / she should send me a report.

Credit for the Writing Center Tutor session will be recorded ONLY if both the written summary AND the tutor confirmation are received before the deadline.

Minimum Student Skills:

You should know how to access a Web site when given an address, use the features of your Web browser, download files, attach files to emails, disable popup blockers, and use word processing software. If you do not have these skills, you can get assistance at the lab on campus, get help from a friend, or take this course in a classroom setting. I will NOT teach computer skills in this class.

Attendance Policy:

Attendance in the course is expected and is mandatory. As with most skills-based courses like this one, it's very important to be in class and on time so you can practice your writing skills on a daily basis. As with all college courses, absences usually result in a negative impact on student grades. So, you are allowed 3 absences; after these three absences you will begin to lose 5 points for each absence. So, please keep close track of your absences and avoid missing except in extenuating circumstances.

Method of Evaluation:

Final grades for the semester are based on the following point system:

- 1. Essay # 1 100 points
- 2. Essay # 2 150 points
- 3. Essay # 3 150 points
- 4. Essay # 4 250 points
- 5. Daily Work/Quizzes 200 points
- 6. Lab Assignments 150 points

Grading Scale:

A = 900 - 1000 points

B = 800 - 899 points

C = 700 - 799 points

D = 600 - 699 points

F = Below 600 points

The major essays will be accepted late in this class, but only for the first three days (with ten points deducted for each calendar day late). After three days late work will NOT be accepted. Also, daily assignments and

in-class work will not be accepted late (they are due in class on the day assigned for in-class work and on the next class day for homework).

Daily Work/Quizzes:

Daily work includes in-class work (like outlining, brainstorming and other writing process tasks), as well as occasional take-home work (like responses and summaries). Quizzes will be given periodically (particularly when it's clear that students haven't completed reading assignments) and will be multiple choice and will cover relevant and recent material. The number of quizzes depends on factors like the material that needs to be covered and whether students are reading the materials.

Delivery Method for Graded Material:

Major papers will be returned via Canvas (as they will be turned in through Canvas). Daily work and quizzes will be returned in person.

Instructor Response and Availability:

- Replies to e-mail and telephone messages will be made within 48 hours
- Essay assignments will be graded in *approximately* fourteen days after submission

Course Calendar:

- 1. All essay assignments must be submitted in Canvas (I DO NOT take them by email unless there is some problem with Canvas): on the left column in Canvas, select "Assignments" and scroll down to the appropriate assignment; follow the directions after you click on that assignment.
- 2. Essay assignments must be uploaded (in Canvas) as Microsoft Word attachments. Please do not use any other file format, as I may not be able to open it or grade it. This will result in a delay in you getting your paper back, so I WILL NOT GRADE ANY OTHER FORMAT.
- 3. Carefully review and follow ALL grading criteria as outlined in the individual Assignment Instructions (assignment requirements and guidelines).

A note about submission of writing assignments: if you wait until the last minute to submit your papers (11:55, 11:59. etc.) it is likely that the system will not accept it, as it does take a bit of time for your paper to load into the system. If you miss the submission deadline, you miss the assignment (and the allotted points). Please manage your time carefully, and allow yourself ample time to complete the writing and submission process--I recommend that you wait no later than 11:30PM to begin the submission process to insure there are no glitches, especially because assignments are due so quickly and so often during summer courses.
