Course Number: ENGL 1302

Course Title: English Composition and Rhetoric II

Course Description: This is a second semester freshman level course with an intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for developing research-based expository and persuasive texts. Emphasis is on effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical reading of verbal, visual, and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions. Lab required.

Course Credit Hours: 3 (Lecture Hours: 3)

Prerequisite: ENGL 1301

Attendance Policy:

During class, students must participate in and actively contribute to class and group exercises. Credit will be given for projects completed in class. Many of these projects cannot be duplicated (made up) by absentees; therefore, students are urged to attend regular and be punctual in their attendance. Even if you are absent, you are responsible for all announcements, all materials, and reading covered. Therefore, consult your syllabus often. Your final grade will be docked one (1) point for every absence after the first three. If you miss more than nine (9) classes, please make arrangements to withdraw from the course.

Tardiness is disruptive to the class. Many in-class activities that take place in the first 5-10 minutes cannot be made up. Students who are consistently late will be penalized. Three (3) tardies = one (1) absence.

Classroom Disruptions:

To minimize classroom disruptions and distractions please turn off all electronic devices while in the classroom. The use of electronic equipment--including cell phones, audio or video players, recording devices (except by permission from the instructor for recording lectures for personal use only), internet browsing, text messaging or instant messaging--is prohibited during class. Students may use laptop computers only for taking notes during lectures. All exceptions must be approved by the professor in advance.

All students are expected to treat your professor and fellow classmates with dignity and respect. Therefore, do not carry on private conversations or participate in other distracting and disruptive behavior during class. Your final grade may be lowered up to **one letter grade** for creating a negative class environment such as: refusing to participate in class exercises, making unconstructive critical comments to other students, sleeping in class, completing assignments from other courses, and any other disruptive acts. Repeated acts will be reported to the Office of the Dean of Students and may result in disciplinary proceedings. (Collin College Student Handbook "Student Code of Conduct" Section 7-2.4).

Reading/Writing Assignments:

All reading is to be completed by the date assigned. You will be quizzed to ensure completion of assigned readings. Quizzes and in-class writings will not be announced, so come to each class meeting prepared. Quizzes typically will be graded with a numerical grade between 0 and 100. These assignments will be weighted equally and will be averaged together at the end of the semester to determine your quiz grade. **There will be no make up for Pop Quizzes**.

Written assignments are due at the beginning of class on the day assigned. All papers must be typed, double space, with a 1-inch margin on all four sides. Use a standard font and a font size of 12 (letters per inch). If you are unfamiliar with the proper way to set up your paper, consult the MLA Handbook and/or utilize the Writing Center. Some of this material will be covered in class.

All graded essays will feature both in-text suggestions/notes and a summary end notes to give you feedback on your writing, suggestions for revisions, and questions for further thought. Essays receiving a grade below "C" must be revised to improve the quality of your writing. For revisions, submit all previous graded draft (s), peer editing, and final draft of revisions.

All formal essay assignments must be submitted to Turn It In.com. Failure to submit to "Turn It In" will result in an automatic <u>"F"</u> on the assignment.

NOTE: Printers tend not to work when we need them most; therefore, on days that assignments are due please bring a copy of the written assignment on a removable drive/USB as a backup and e-mail yourself a copy.

Writing Journals:

As an opportunity to enhance your thinking and writing ability, you will be expected to keep a journal with entries that will be turned in periodically to be reviewed (not for content but for effort). Your journal is an opportunity to respond to class reading assignments and to write your thoughts and feelings about whatever is going on in your life. You will be assigned *some* journal entries in class. Journals may be handwritten; however, you may also type them. Write at least 250 words or one handwritten page. By the end of the course, you should have a minimum of 45 journal entries. **Bring with you to every class**.

Lab Units:

All students enrolled in English 1302 must complete at least **16 units** of lab work in order to fulfill the requirements of the course.

The lab component is an integral part of this writing course. Over the course of the semester, you will need to complete a combination of selections from the list below. This lab is not the same as regular daily course work that you must complete to stay on track in the class; it is, instead, designed as additional writing-focused activities that will help improve your writing throughout the term. During the semester, you will need to track and provide evidence of completing these lab requirements outside of class on a **Lab Credit Sheet** which will be distributed in class.

Lab Options:

Approximately 30 – 45 minutes of your time constitutes one lab unit. You may select a combination from the following options:

- Attend one of the Auteur Film Series. Write a one-page summary (3 lab units).
- Participate in a community, civic, or religious activity and write about the experience. Share what happened, what you thought would happen, and what you learned from the experience (3 lab units).

All lab work must be completed by: <u>Wednesday, December 5, 2018</u>. If you fail to do **ALL** the lab work, you will receive an incomplete (I) for the course.
