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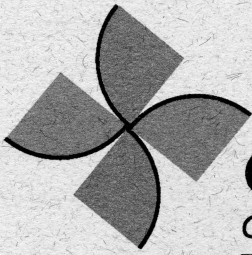

Kunz Article Published

Russell Kunz, management professor, had an article titled "Teamwork: Teaching Reality" published in *Innovation Abstracts*. The article describes the curriculum development used in teaching Principles of Management courses at CCCC. Students, as members of self-directed work teams, create their mission, team charter and peer evaluation forms and accomplish their stated goals by proving mastery of course competencies.

Kunz also has been selected to serve on the state advisory council for Tech Prep. David Leigh, the director of the council and a staff member of Temple Junior College, selected him as council member after Sylvia Kelley nominated Kunz for the position. A management development Tech Prep program is currently being developed by members of Global EDGE for implementation at CCCC next fall. This program is thought to be the nation's first in the management degree field.

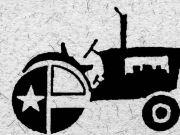
Art Staff News

Those work requests categorized as projects (those taking more than eight hours to complete and/or modify data) **must** be introduced by the requesting party's Priority Committee representative. All other requests, such as lists and labels, should be entered on WORKLOG or submitted on the green Computer Services Software Work Request form (please allow a minimum of 10 working days for the request to be processed).

Once the request is received by Computer Services, the appropriate Priority Committee representative will be notified of the request and given 24 hours to deny the request. Otherwise, the request will be processed

according to the order it was received, the date required, and/or the priority assigned by the Priority Committee member. Please contact Computer Services at ext. 6640 with any questions concerning the submission of programming work requests and/or the Priority Committee.

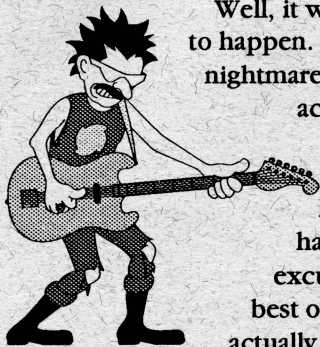
BC/BS Rep on Campus — HELP is here!

Counseling Corner

Date rape and partner abuse is such a sensitive and serious subject that CCCC's counseling department decided to develop a special educational seminar on it in addition to our existing seminars on gender discrimination and sexual harassment.

The college would obviously like to advocate the prevention of date rape and all forms of abuse. Students have received a lot of information about this issue, yet the problem continues. How then, can the college best help students avoid situations where rape and abuse can flourish?

Perhaps the best approach to tackling such a delicate issue is to conduct sensitivity training for our students. That is, create a non-judgmental learning situation in which students can explore their own values and make appropriate decisions. This is the goal of the counseling department's approach to this subject.

In my opinion, it is essential that any program considering date rape and partner abuse be sensitive to men's issues and not present women as totally helpless victims with respect to this problem. Let me be specific here, in order to avoid misunderstanding. Rape and abuse are always wrong. However, women also abuse men, and women sometimes act in ways to contribute to the continuance of an abusive cycle.

This problem is so serious that it can only be solved by men and women working together toward a constructive solution. The counseling department's training program attempts to lay the groundwork for men and women to explore their feelings within a non-judgmental context and to begin to engage in constructive dialogue about such topics.

There are no easy answers to date rape or any other social problems. Constructive dialogue, however, can certainly do no harm, and it is likely to be helpful to our students.
