#### SCOPE NOTE

The Dabu Gizenga\*collection on Kwame Nkrumah spans the time period of 1939-1974. The collection measures approximately 13½ linear feet. The collection contains newsclippings, journal articles and documents, printed materials, tape recorded interviews, photographs, and artifacts. The Moorland-Spingarn Research Center acquired the Dabu Gizenga collection by bequest of Gizenga's (Jesse A. Dixon's) will, in 1980.

Two major themes are emphasized in the collection: (1) the life of Kwame Nkrumah and, (2) Pan-Africanism. The major portion of the collection is devoted to Kwame Nkrumah, first Prime Minister and President of Ghana. Items within the collection document Nkrumah's education, rise to power and rule as leader of Ghana, his writings, speeches, and the coup d'etat which eventually overthrew the Nkrumah government in 1966.

Another significant amount of material contained within this collection concerns Pan-Africanism. The collection is strong in material which views Pan-Africanism as a theory and a working experience utilized by Africans throughout the diaspora.

An additional area of interest within the collection is the files on individuals. These files for the most part concern individuals who shared some relationship with Kwame Nkrumah. Some notable individuals include Julius Nyerere, C. L. R. James and George Padmore. A few organizations have also been included that have no apparent relationship to Kwame Nkrumah.

Photographs within this collection include photographs of Dabu Gizenga, Kwame Nkrumah and events in Ghana following the overthrow of Nkrumah. Artifacts within the collection include stamps and currency of Ghana; also memorabilia from the Young Pioneers, an Nkrumahist youth organization.

#### SCOPE NOTE continued

The collection originally included books, journals, newspapers, recorded music, and posters. Books, newspapers, and journals have been transferred to the M.S.R.C. Library Division. Recorded music and posters have been transferred to the M.S.R.C. Music, and Prints and Photographs Departments respectively.

<sup>\*</sup>Dabu Gizenga was also known as Jesse Andre Dixon. Within this collection he most often identifies himself and is identified as Dabu Gizenga. We have elected to continue the use of the name Dabu Gizenga as it appears to be the donor's stated preference.

#### Series Description

#### Series A Dabu Gizenga

Box 128-1 This series contains some personal items of Thedra Dixon, mother of Dabu Gizenga (Jesse Dixon). It also contains correspondence, which for the most part concerns Gizenga's pursuit of information about Kwame Nkrumah. The series also contains questionnaires used to gather information about Kwame Nkrumah, notes used to conduct tape recorded interviews, other holographic notes and a type-script of a play entitled "Scotch Tape".

#### Series B Kwame Nkrumah

Box 128-1 This series has been arranged into related subseries. It is the largest series of the to Box 128-17 collection and contains information on Kwame Nkrumah and Ghana. The subseries contain newsclippings, pamphlets, journals, journal articles, and some correspondence. Some of the subject areas covered in these subseries include biographical information about Nkrumah; his speeches and writings; his "American years"; his education in the U.S. and England; and the coup which toppled Nkrumah from power. The subseries also contains articles and newsclippings which report Nkrumah's death in 1972.

#### **Series C** File on Individuals

Box 128-17 This series is primarily concerned with individuals who shared some relationship with Kwame Nkrumah. Included in this series are both friends and foe of Nkrumah. The files for the most part are newsclippings, and some contain correspondence. Notable individuals within this file include: Julius Nyerere, J. B. Danquah, C. L. R. James, George Padmore. There are some files in this series devoted to organizations such as the N.A.A.C.P., the Ku Klux Klan and others.

#### Series D Pan-Africanism

Box 128-21 This series is devoted to information collected about Pan-Africanism as both to Box 128-23 a theoretical and a practical movement. The series contains articles, journals, newsclippings, pamphlets, leaflets, and conference proceedings. Of special interest are folders which document the proceedings of the Sixth Pan-African Congress held in Tanzania in 1974.

#### **Series E** Printed Material

Box 128-24 This series is composed of journals, newspapers, pamphlets, and articles which to Box 128-25 cover a wide spectrum of interest. Much of the material in this series has a direct bearing on Africa and African affairs. The series is dominated by a large number of isolated journals.

#### **Series F Photographs**

Box 128-26 This series contains photographs of Dabu Gizenga, Kwame Nkrumah, Nkrumahist Ghana, and post-coup Ghana. Other photographs in this series are of Lincoln University, a symposium on Nkrumahism held at Howard University in 1974, and students at Jackson State College.

#### **Series G** Artifacts

Box 128-26 This series consists of items from Nkrumahist Ghana: currency, stamps, Young Pioneer buttons and a scarf. The Young Pioneers were a Ghanaian Nkrumahist Youth Organization

#### **Series H** Tape Recordings

Box 128-27 This series consists primarily of cassette tapes. The tapes are of two types: (1) interviews conducted by Dabu Gizenga with people who knew or had impressions of Kwame Nkrumah; (2) speeches and programs about Nkrumah. The interviews comprise the largest amount of tape. Gizenga Conducted interviews with people in Africa, Jamaica, London, and the United States. Interviewees include Mrs. Marcus Garvey, Dr. Rayford Logan, C.L.R. James, Basil Davidson, and others.
