### Student Protest Continues

#### Students Demand Pres. Cheek's Resignation

A face-to-face confrontation between HUSA president Howard Newell and University President James E. Cheek earlier this week highlighted three days of rallying and protests by Howard students.

Angered by the expulsion of Hilltop editor-inchief Janice McKnight, students demanded the resignation of Cheek and others in the university adminsitration during the protests on the main

Newell asked Cheek, who was standing next to him, to resign his office three times in Monday's confrontation, which took place at a rally around the flagpole on the main campus yard. Using a megaphone that the two alternately spoke into, Cheek first stated that he would not respond because a "reasonable discussion" could not be held in that atmosphere.

But when asked to resign a second time Cheek said, "I am not going to respond affirmatively to that request."

When Newell asked the crowd of over 200 'what its' sentiments'', shouts of "Fire Cheek!" resounded for over a minute as Cheek looked on

Approximately 800 students shouted "We're fired up; we won't take no more!" as they marched from the Blackburn Center to the Administration Building.

From there, led by Newell and other student government leaders, the crowd went to Cheek's fourth floor office and demanded to see him. Howard Special Policemen guarding the door let only three persons in the locked office. Cheek later said that he was not in the office at the time and was at home all that week with a cold.

"This is not a case of Janice versus the university; this is a case of all of us," Newell said to the tightly packed assemblage in the 4th floor hallway. We are tired of the bureaucratic structure and the mickey mouse games they (administration) play." He added, "If Janice McKnight is not reinstated by February 11, we will close this university down."

There was only one violent incident during the protest involving Cheek's son, James III.

Saturday's strategy and information session in the ballroom of the student center where Newell continued to point out the inconsistencies of the Cheek administration, reached a climax when he cited a few excerpts from Cheek's 1980 convocation address.

Reading Cheek's words, Newell said: "We are long in the business of undoing the yoke of bondage . Some universities perhaps can be at ease with a discourteous staff, a sloppy administration . . . but not Howard University.

After an uproar of applause from the audience he continued: "for the first time emancipation is the birth of the white man and that is why it remains only a proclamation, but the 2nd emancipation is the birth of the black man and that is why it must remain a reality: And I ask you if you do not assume this burden then who will?"

The confrontation on the main yard Monday afternoon was sparked by Cheek's failure to appear before a student audience in Cramton Auditorium. Newell said that Cheek received an invitation to the gathering on Friday, but according to Cheek the letter never reached his desk.

"It was not delivered to the president's office," said Cheek. The president said he received "something" on Friday but "it wasn't signed by anybody. I have received letters on (HUSA) station before that HUSA didn't send". Cheek added that the letter did not contain anything about the McKnight case.

But Newell, admitting that the letter his office sent was unsigned, said that Cheek's secretary confirmed on Friday afternoon that it was on the president's desk.

"The students united will never be defeated," chanted 300 students with raised fists as they marched from the main campus to the schools of Medicine, Dentistry and Business on Tuesday urging other students to join their fight. They then filed to the Administration Building to further denounce the Cheek administration.

"I'm assuming that most of the students do not know the circumstances," said Vice-President for Student Affairs Carl Andeson, giving his reactions to the student protests. "It's important that they have the information."

The office of Student activities would not release information on McKnight's dismissal last week, stating that section 438 of the General Provisions Act protects the privacy of student records (The Hilltop, February 4, 1983)

Although the university has not issued a statement on the complaints filed by former university attorney Michael Harris (the handling of whose story precipitated several sweeping restrictive actions by the univeristy's adminstration), Cheek did say "they are unsubstantiated allegations."



### McKnight Sues for \$100,000

"I am asking for \$100,000 dollars in damages and bringing an additional punitive suit against the university," Janice McKnight announced in a Hilltop interview following Tuesday's order by D.C. Superior Court that she be reinstated both at Howard as editor-in-chief of the Hilltop newspaper.

The order is temporary until a formal hearing on Feb. 18th. McKnight said that her attorney, John M Cliford will ask for \$100,000 because she had n mained in good academic standing for three years and because The Student Handbook published by the Board of Trustees guarantees to "any student ac cused of violating university regulations" a hearing composed of students and faculty. According to McKnight additional punitive damages are sought by her attorney. The dollar amount, determined by the court, will be donated to the Howard Scholarship

Regarding Howard as an institution of higher learning McKnight said, "I love Howard. One has to make a distinction between Howard and the administration. I do feel bitter toward the administration because it is not in touch with what is going on with the student body and the community." Regarding her reinstated position on the Hilltop McKnight said, "We (The Hilltop) will stand fast and continue to print facts about the Howard community and community at large now more strongly than ever. McKnight added that she agrees with the call for Cheeks resignation. "... Although he is a great man he has lost touch with the issues pertinent to the Black community and it is time for him to step down," McKnight said.

Contacted by telephone Wednesday, Public Information Director Alan Hermesch made clear to The Hilltop that the university is committed to McKnight's expulsion. Of McKnight's up-coming hearing Feb. 18th, Hermesch said, "Our attorney will be there. We are making an effort to preserve the integrity of the institution, and on that basis we have to be able to expel those applicants who do not meet the requirements of our procedure for admission."

Attorney Michael Harris is also scheduled for court hearing Feb. 18th. Harris was dismissed from the university following his report to the Washington Post that Howard's General Counsel, Dorsey Lane gave favored treatment to the women in his office. In a telephone interview with The Hilltop, Wednesday Harris expressed his feelings about Howrd. "I can distinguish between the university as an institution and the Cheek administration. I feel no real animosity even toward the Howard administration. I feel sorry for President Cheek and Dorsey Lane. It's too bad they felt forced to take the position they did," said Harris. Harris' attorney, William Lightfoot is basing the case on title 7 of The Government Code of Federal Regulations governing sex discrimination. Lightfoot will argue that "Harris' dismissal was retalitory," he told The Hilltop Wednesday.

That both Harris and McKnight are sueing Howard on the claim the university was motivated to silence them raises the issue of whether Howard is following an active policy of censorship.

Wednesday The Hilltop attempted to contact Raymond Archer, Director of Student Activities. and President James Cheek for their responses to McKnight's reinstatement. Archer said, "It is not my responsibility. . . It is President Cheeks' responsibility to respond-put it to his face." Cheek was not available to comment.

## Flewellen and Raper Battle WHUR

Kathy Flewellen and Karen Raper, former news reporters for WHUR, are presently pending legal action against the station for being fired last month, according to Kojo Nnamd i WHUR news director.

Flewellen, who had been reporting for WHUR since 1978 and had a daily feature. The African News Roundup, for the past year and a half, said that she and Raper, who had been a Capitol Hill correspondent since 1980, have been advised by their legal council to withhold comment until further action is taken.

Their legal interests are being served by the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (AFTRA). Don Gainer, the AFTRA representative handling Flewellen and Raper's case, refrained from comment. Nnamd i said that Raper and Flewellen rejected severance pay and have requested arbitration, rather than taking the case to the courts. Nnamd i explained that he recom-. mended the firing of Flewellen and Raper because he was dissatisfied with their "style of work."

"Their [Flewellen and Raper's] style did not suit the news operation that I'm trying to

run. As a result, I recommended their termination," continued Nnamdi .

The news director added that although Robert Taylor, WHUR general manager, had offered severance pay as an "amicable parting of the way," Flewellen and Raper have requested arbitration to regain their positions at WHUR. Taylor declined to comment on his actions concerning Flewellen and Raper and on the pending

arbitration proceedings. The Citizen's for Community Involvement in WHUR, a coalition of D.C. community members, was formed recently to speak out against the firing of Flewellen. Damu Smith, a spokesperson for the coalition, said that they support Flewellen's decision to request arbitration.

"Kathy Flewellen is a highly respected reporter because of her knowledge of Africa and particularly of South Africa, and she is an important source for this community. We feel that her termination at WHUR is a case of selective prosecution," Smith com-

The spokesperson added, "We have sources within WHUR who have conveyed to us that Flewellen was fired for technical reasons that could be used to terminate many others at WHUR. Why is she being

singled out?"

Nnamd i said that he has never known any one to be fired from his department for rea sons other than those that were given publicly. "I have been as outspoken and as radical as anyone at WHUR, and noone has yet requested my termination," exclaimed Nnamdi.

Smith said that the coalition is presently seeking to set up a meeting with the vice president of Administration and Secretary Owen Nichols. Smith explained, "In this proposed meeting we will want to discu five issues: 1) arbitrary firings and program changes; 2) handling of internal differences and the right to dissent; 3) censorship and arbitrary standards of news judgment; 4) commitment to community responsiveness; and 5) insensitivity to the economic plight of Black Americans, particularly Black women who are single heads of households, like Flewellen."

Smith added that there is no scheduled date for the meeting.

### C.S.H.U

The Coalition to save Howard University (C.S.H.U.) has called for the resignation of University President Dr. James E. Cheek. The Coalition, which is composed of Howard University students, was formed in response to the censorship of the campus newspaper, the Hilltop.

The Editor of the Hilltop, Janice McKnight, was expelled allegedly for falsifying her application for admission. However, McKnight, who is a senior, refused to adhere to university officials' request that she cease printing stories surrounding a sex discrimination compalint filed by Michael Harris, a former employee of the office of the General Counsel

In an editorial printed on January 21, McKnight demanded a full investigation of Harris' complaint. On February 1, she was expelled.

Howard Newell, President of the Howard University Student Association, explained the strong univeristy-wide support the coaliour faculty. Dr. Olive Taylor, professor of tion has received. Newell stated, "The act of censorship by the university and the manner in which Janice was expelled-without due process-outraged us. In addition, President Cheek's close ties with the Reagan Administration further provoked the student body."

Along with the resignation of Cheek and the reinstatement of McKnight as student and editor of the Hilltop, the Coalition demanded the following:

- The revocation of the recent Board of Trustees' decision to censor the Hilltop.
- A full investigation of university procedures for expelling students.
- · A full and immediate investigation of the Harris complaint.
- · A continuation of the Deferred Payment Plan.
- · A full accounting of the extent of the University relations and the Reagan Administration.

### Diagnosis

Washington, a city whose white, majestic buildings gleam at night against the dark hills of Virginia, and the Soviet Union, who watches the moves of every important decision maker in the U.S., are thread that has hemmed in Eastern and Western Europe between nuclear arms build-up talks being held in Geneva.

While advocating N.A.T.O.'s deployment of intermediate-range missiles in Europe, and the zero option proposal made by President Reagan (which calls for the Soviet Union to dismantle their total 333 SS-20 intermediate-range missiles already in place in Europe if N.A.T.O. deploys zero of its missiles) the U.S. has sent Vice President Bush to Europe to remove what U.S. negotiator for the intermediate-range Nuclear Forces talks with the Soviets, Paul Nitze, called "... a wedge between the U.S. and its Western European partners." Bush feels that the zero option proposal is


the most moralistic option available. The Soviet Union on the other hand feels that the zero option proposal is not a realistic negotiation stance. They feel this way most obviously because they know that even if they uphold their end of the proposal, by removing their intermediate-range missiles from Europe, and if N.A.T.O. cancels its deployment of missiles into Europescheduled for late 1983-that there would still be missiles in France and Britain pointed at the Soviet Union.

Europeans, because they have put most of their pressure on the U.S. to halt the deployment of missiles by N.A.T.O., appear to be more anti-American than anti-Soviet. However, the Europeans neither accept N.A.T.O.'s intention to deploy missiles in Europe, nor the Soviet Union's already resting missiles in Europe. Europeans simply feel that the U.S. appears to be the most flexible of the two nations in the negotiatons. The objective of Vice President Bush's ten day tour of Europe has been to . . . convince European leaders and political parties that the U.S. is capable of some form of stern yet flexible posture in negotiations with the Soviets.

Bush's most difficult task in Europe will be to convince opposition parties to Chancellor Helmut Khol's government in Bonn, West Germany—especially the anti-nuclear Green Party-that the U.S. is not going to be soft retreating from its zero option proposal while at the negotiations in Geneva.

Khol supports the zero option proposal as the most plausible solution available for the West German government to accept at this stage in the negotiations. His opponents don't think that the U.S. will stay the course with the proposal. They will, if they feel that the U.S. is wavering from its position, move to increase support for their candidate, Social-Democrat, Hans-Jochen Vogal. The U.S. would prefer to see Khol leading the West German government.

In Britain, despite current and growing antagonism toward the zero option proposal by the British people, Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher is one of its strongest supporters. Ninety percent of the people favor a "joint key" arrangement that would guarantee the British a voice in the firing of some 160 U.S. missiles to be based in Britain. With the elections coming up soon in Britain, the Thatcher government may opt to change its position on the proposal.





### Cable T.V.

Within the next year the district may be a major patron in the advancing telecommunications industry according to the members of the D.C. Design Commission.

William Lightfoot, chairperson for the D.C. Design Commission said that the organization is hoping to have a cable TV system installed in the area by the end of 1984. A 2-way interacting system with over

100 channels has an estimated cost of \$10 million to lay cable and run it.

The 28-member commission, whose members are appointed by the mayor and city council, are in the process of drafting a R.E.P. (Requirement for Proposal).

The committee will decide in the proposal the minimum requirements for the number of channels, the number of mhz and the number of channels that will be dedicated to public use. And they will submit the finished draft to the city council for their approval.

"Cable TV is more than home movies." Lightfoot commented. The biggest part of cable TV deals with the transformation of information," he aded.

He further explained that the system will have the capacity to transmit information from law firm to law firm, from classroom to classroom and from university to university. Students at Howard could take courses at Georgetown and vice versa. It will also have the capacity for teleconferencing teletext and video-text.

"There are multiple uses for cable that we are willing to implement if people are willing to pay", Lightfoot continued."But it will take time for cable to generate reve-

nues to make it possible," he added. Tony Gittens, publicity chairman on the commission said that the committee has set up a special task force. There will be public forums held at various libraris in the city to inform the public about cable TV and to find out what they would like to see on cable. (See date chart.)

# Subsidized Housing

The Department of Housing and Urban Development, headed by Samuel Pierce, Jr., has met with strong opposition from pro-subsidized housing advocates and congressmen for its proposal of a voucher system to be voted upon by the Senate Subcommittee on Housing and the Reagan administration in the new fiscal year which begins in October 1983.

The voucher system would provide financial assistance certificates to people who want to rent housing. The certificates would be for a certain dollar amount, redeemable at housing in the private sector. There are two divisions that housing falls under-public, which are government-owned buildings and private, which are people who won apartments and rent them out.

The House Subcommittee on Housing, which falls under the House Banking Committee, is chaired by Henry B. Gonzales, a major opposer to the voucher

Jerry McMurray, special assistant to Gonzales, said, "The whole Reagan Administration philosophy that you can do everything from the private sector is incorrect. Private sector principles are not in sync with low-income problems and needs. They are mainly interested in making profit."

"The private sector would not make any money if they gave away housing at a cheap rate to people in need of a place to live," he continued.

McMurray stated that the dollar amount of a given certificate would be too low for a family to rent housing anywhere because the rental prices would be too high. He also said that the number of certificates available to the renters would be limited, thereby still

placing many people without a place to counts for the large number of homeless live.

Seth Bogos, research director for the Association of communities Organized for Reform Now (ACORN), a grassroots group which advocates the squatter movement, said, "We think that the administration's budget is an outrage. There is no way given its priorities, it is concerned about housing for low-income people. Our constituency is low-income people." Squatters are individuals who claim abandoned houses in cities and repair them, taking over the ownership of the home.

"Personally, I don't think the voucher system concept is a bad idea. I would like it more if it were an entitlement which says that anyone in a certain class tion. income in is entitled to a voucher. But, then, only 2 percent of the people in the country who need housing would get. housing, because the number of vouchers available is inadequate for the housing problems in America," Bogos continued.

Bogos stated that if, hypothetically, in the Washington area 50,000 people were eligible for the certificate, if the area only got 20,000 vouchers, many people would be in the streets.

Currently the Section 8 program pro vides subsidized housing assistance to low-income families. It would be eliminated by the new law. Under Section 8, any person whose income that is 80 percent or less of the average income for that specified metropolitan area can receive Section 8 assistance. Under the program, renters pay 25 percent of their household income as rent. The government pays whatever the balance is to the realtor or landlord.

The Section 8 Existing program is designed to place people in housing already in existence; Section 8 Rehabilitation provides funds for repairs and Section 8 Reconstruction provides funds for building of new subsidized housing units.

"The Section 8 program has it's flaws. It leaves the government at the mercy of landlords and local housing markets Therefore, the government is forced to pay the landlords whatever the balances are. Some landlords seek to make large profits at the govenment's expense. But, it's better than nothing," said Bogos.

As an alternative the Hose Subcommit tee has suggested the construction of subsidized rental housing. McMurray stated that there isn't enough inexpensive rental housing and that this acpeople, many who are on the long

waiting lists for public housing.

The Temporary Mortgage Assistance program, which is still in litigation, is also a proposal strongly backed by the House. TMAP states the people who have conventional bank mortgage loans cannot receive assistance. The Legal Services group is suing HUD because of certain provisions such as this one.

The House is also seeking a \$100 million program within and using the funds of the Community Block Development Grant to assist cities in developing and expanding shelter for the homeless.

Under TMAP, participants must have loans from the Federal Homeowners Assistance or the Veteran's Administra-

ACORN has proposed to Congress the expansion and reformation of the Homestead Program. Homesteading occurs where renters move in vacant, city-owned and tax delinquent, and abandoned houses, after purchasing the building for a minimal fee of one dollar. Bogos stated that the current program is too small and that there is not enough

"They are operating on the \$12 million that they received about three or four years ago," he commented.

money in it.

Not being targeted to low and moderate income families was another problem that he cited. According to Bogos, such homes have usually been given to middle income families who are thought to be politically more conscious and more powerful and more financially stable that other groups.

If the owner can't pay his mortgage after a few months, then forclosure begins, and the deteriorating process of the property begins.

"Usually no one pays any taxes on the abandoned house. City foreclosures on the owners usually takes at least ten years. In the meantime, the house becomes more expensive to rehabilitate," said Bogus.

ACORN suggested to Congress to spped up the process of tax foreclosure procedures because, technically, it is illegal for the squatters to move in the houses. Bogus explained that from a moral and practical standpoint, the house has been abandoned. The group also suggested the government allow cities to use federal money to make minimum bids on the foreclosed homes, enabling them to resell them to people

#### After Slavery There Was Slavery

After the abolition of slavery, the majority of us though we were truly free. All of a sudden, we thought the same oppressor now saw us as their equals and would do everything possible to "help" -- TOTAL NONSENSE! We never have nor will we ever have handouts which help us. Handouts are only another guise of oppression. Give a person a fish and he/she will always come back for more, teach a person to fish and he/she will fish for himself/herself for a lifetime. Thus, handouts will keep us going back for more from "Massa", let us fish for ourselves. The catch was that the amount due to the master was loosely defined and thus could be widely interpreted. If the master said he did not receive his share then the ex-slave would be in debt. The master could also find fault with the wear and tear of the equipment and thus demand a greater share. Thus, the share-cropper slave found that he/she was emancipated yet still in bon-

Wage-labor--Many ex-slaves migrated North in the hope of finding a new and better life. What they met was an industrial lifestyle where one needed a job in order to get money to survive. The ex-slave also encountered the same master, only now he changed his name to "boss". The ex-slave was "free" to apply for jobs, but with the boss-class

calling the shots along with his prejudices, blacks were discriminated against and so obtained only "shit jobs". These shit jobs were those which no white man wanted to do, also the wages were way below those of the average white. Blacks, because of their low incomes, could not afford very much and so ghettos became thier home--sub-human living.

So ex-slaves travelled to the free North to be enslaved in "shit jobs" and ghet-



### March On!

We thank you. This week has been a very trying, arduous time. Exhausting to say the least. Through it all we have learned that information is power. We learned this while chanting on the Yard, while waiting outside President Cheek's office. We marched from the flagless flagpole and took our concerns to every nook and cranny of the university. Hot. Sweating. Cold. Shouting. Organizing. Mar ching. Trying.

We strategized and prioritized together--Janice McKnight, Michael Harris, James Garrett, Robert Cummings and Aclyn Lynch became our martyrs and friends: Seaga, Bush Botha, Reagan, and Cheek became the foe. Africa, South Africa, Jamaica, Washington and Howard University--all home, OURS.

We have been told that the issues of censorship, sexual harrasment, deferred payments, student rights, faculty tenure and Solomon's Act in Congress are minor problems. They are. Truth is the real issue and we demand it now

The student movement in 1968 wanted to know if the Howard University administration was "truly" concerned about the welfare of, not only students, but also the universal Black community worldwide. They wanted the truth and wanted proof of it. We want the same (and then some more).

Dear Sirs: The events of the past few weeks, which have culminated in the firing of attorney Michael Harris from the general counsel and the expulsion and later "semireinstatement" of student Janice McKnight, are shocking and very disgusting. The Administration should be ashamed of itself! The entire situation is even more of a pity because the administration has always expounded on the idea that they are always doing what is best for the students and Howard University. We say that the actions of the administration during the past few weeks have not been in the best interests of the Howard Community! Dr. Cheek, this episode has even progressed to the point that you are openly contradicting yourself. Let us quote some lines that you should be familiar with, "Our campuses are battlegrounds for the serious who seek this place to confront ignorance with knowledge where truth grapples hand-in-hand with falsehood, where understanding comes face to face with confusion. Howard University is no resting place and there is no hiding place down here." These lines were from your 1980 opening convocation speech. We ask, are these words truth or illusion? Are they some sort of "Fantasy Island" ideal that you have created to deceive the students?

Dr. Cheek, this University is the third oldest, but first largest predominately black institution in the United States and is founded upon such principles as educational growth, freedom and expression. This university is a constant producer of black leaders who will one day help our people out of the agonizing plight that we are now experiencing. The Howard Community cannot afford to lose such future leaders such as Janice McKnight and Michael Harris. We say if you deny Janice or Michael this chance to participate in the liberation of their people, you can deny anyone of us our chance. We say, Dr. Cheek, that nepotism, in any form, cannot exist at Howard University.

On February 4, 1983, Janice McKnight was expelled from Howard University for printing articles detailing sex discrimination charges filed by a male staff attorney against the University's General Counsel's office. The University has said that McKnight was dismissed because she gave "untruthful" information on her admissions application in 1979 when she transferred from Syracuse University in New York.

Before you knew it, the student body of Howard University erupted like Mount St. Helens. The McKnight case was just the ignition to set off the bonfire. The student body began protesting everything from high tuition payments to president James E. Cheek's close relationship with the Reagan administration.

The leader of Howard's "Fire Cheek movement has been H.U.S.A. President Howard Newell. Mr. Newell has been out spoken against President Cheek's 13 year reign over Howard and he along with 50% of the student body believe that the end is near for James E. Cheek as president of Howard University.

Although many feel that president Cheek will resign, I really do not think he will give up his position right away. However, if there is one person to blame for what is going on it is president Cheek. He has let the problems of Howard University get so out of hand that there is a point of no return Before the McKnight incident, President Cheek should have had some idea that the problems that have plagued Howard could not be swept underneath the rug and forgotten. There are serious problems here at the school and hardly anything has been done about them. These problems include: tuition rates, housing, censorship, and the faculty in general.

### NCAA Rules Aimed at Black Athletes

The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), has passed a new set of rules that require graduating high school student athletes to have a 2.0 GPA, score 700 out of 1600 on the SAT test, or 15 out of 36 on the ACT, in order to qualify to play in Division I sports. In addition they must complete a high school core curriculum of three years of English, two years of math, two years of social studies and two years of physical or natural science.

Black college presidents, educators and civil rights leaders have said the rules exploit and discriminate against Black athletes. Dr. Joseph Johnson, president of Grambling State University; Dr. Jesse Stone, president of Southern University, Baton Rouge, Louisiana; president Luna I. Mishoe of Delaware State and other Black college presidents have spoken out against the rules. "A large number of students who enroll at Grambling State University do not meet the criteria," said Joseph B. Johnson the University's president. Also, Dr. Mary Frances Berry, a senior fellow at the Institute for the Study of Educational Policy at Howard University, Rev. Jesse L. Jackson of Operation Push and Joseph Lowery, president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference have denounced the implications of the rules.

For athletes currently in college the new requirements go into effect on August 1, 1984. For entering students the rules go into effect August 1, 1986.

Truth in testing has long been a debated issue among students and educators, and cultural bias has been proven to be a factor in standardized tests. The tests assume that young people have been exposed to certain types of information in their home and classpom environments. However the assumptions often are not valid for Black high school students.

A number of tests show that Blacks generally do not score as high as whites on standardized tests because they are designed by whites for young people who are also white. College Board figures show that the average combined score for all Black students who take the test score over 700 on the SAT and only 28% score over 15 on the ACT test. The tests are culturally biased and as a result do not serve as a fair measurement of how well a student will perform in college.

The committee that proposed the new rules had no Black

representation. And they claim that their concern is to improve academic standards for all student athletes. However, if they are truly concerned with academic standards, why then do the rules had no Black representation. And they claim that their concern is to improve academic standards for all student athletes. However, if they are truly concerned with academic standards, why then do the rules only apply to NCAA Division I schools? They do not apply to Division II and III schools. Nor do they apply to women athletes from the ranks of major college sports.

Black Colleges have traditionally shown a concern for individuals beyond their athletic ability. The NCAA problem of plummeting academic achievement on the part of College athletes is mostly a problem at major white universities. It seems as though the NCAA wants to put all of the academic responsibilities on high schools rather than themselves. Superb Black student athletes have been exploited because winning teams mean large gate receipts, television revenue, and national recruitment exposure for the school. That is also why large white institutions have maintained an interest in Black student athletes as athletes first and students second.

There are so such testing standards and guidelines for hiring coaches or athletic directors. Many are not academically qualified to teach college level courses. However, they often make several times as much money as a Ph.D. on the backs of amateur Black student athletes.

It is no secret that the back who can score the winning touchdown, or the quick guards that can move the basketball down the court and the forward who can hit the long jump shot with seconds remaining—is Black. So white coaches will move at a snail's pace to get rid of these athletes they know will bring them a winning season.

College athletics has become another big business. All that really matters is the money. In the past, athletes have been encouraged to take useless classes. And their records have been falsified in order to make sure Black athletes remain eligible. Division I football players must devote a minimum of 40 hours a week to their sport and basketball players at least 35 hours. It is a full time job. Even work-study limits students to 20 hours per week for fear that work may infringe upon academic performance.

According to an article in The Chronicle of Higher Education, Harry Edwards, a University of California sociologist who along with H. Rap Brown inspired the "Black-Power salute" at the 1968 Olympic Games, says that the standards are not stiff enough. He claims Black students can pass the SAT and ACT tests just as whites do if the American educational system straightens up its act. But he must consider the fact that while Blacks are capable of achieving academically and in anything else, many of the school systems from which Black athletes are coming do not have the concern and motivation that he may have. Very few white teachers are committed to teaching Black high school students. They do not intend to make sure Black students can pass the standardized tests.

This American educational system does not necessarily want to rectify its own inadequacies if it means sharpening Black minds. Even Black athletes who have outstanding athletic ability do not get an educational opportunity in many cases. Between 25 to 35 percent of the Black highschool athletes who qualify for college athletic scholarships do not get them because of academic deficiencies.

If white rule-makers keep this madness up, Black athletes across the nation should pull out of sports all together. Surely Sugar Ray Leonard surprised a lot of money hungry promoters and businessmen when he decided he was not going to fight any longer. And the NFL players strike was an example of what athletes, now at the college level, can look forward to as they advance in their careers. College and professional sports would become dismal at best if Black athletes were to withdraw their participation all together.

Dear Editor:

Now that Ms, McKnight has regained her status as a student as well as the editorship of the Hilltop, (and will remain if what I have been reading is any indication) is it possible to have a long moritorium on the insanity that has taken hold on this campus in the last few weeks? After getting a grip on ourselves for while, let us each ask ourselves: were my motives in the recent furor centered upon the best interest of the University, or was I merely serving a personal agenda by letting off steam or whatever?

The fact that the present administration has been callous and insensitive in general and during the handling of this matter in particular is well documented. Instead of participative in their approach, they have been authoritarian: instead of cooperative, they have been recalcitrant: instead of being sensitive to the concerns of their life blood. their constituents, their foundation: the student body, they have been cold, mechanical and uncaring. A modecum of foresight and flexibility could have been used to deal equitably with this and other issues and much misunderstanding, mistrust (not to mention nationwide scandal) could have been averted.

The administration is, however, not alone. The administration could not, on its own, bring about such mass confusion. It needed help to make a perfectly manageable situation into a fire-breathing behemoth with the ability to turn our institution into a pile of ashes by exhaling too hard. It needed Howard University Student "Government." I would hardly go as far as the Washington Times and ask Howard Newell to "shut up," but I would earnestly ask him to take a deep breath, count as high as he possibly can and THINK before he says an-

other word. As should be concluded from earlier paragraphs, I am in total support of making our administration accountable to our needs, concerns and interests. There is, however, only one term to describe the tactics being used by the "leaders" on this campus—outright demagoguery—period.

The intent of these recent disturbances has not been constructive. There has been no attempt to build the university; the only plan was one of destruction. I think we should all take a good, long look at what has happened and ask ourselves whether the good of the University was actually at heart. If we come up with some doubts in the meantime, ponder your own fate and that of the University. Calm, objective thought has never proven a detriment to a sound, cogent argument.

Recalcitrant administrators and belligerent students produce a frightful mix
that is inherently counter-productive. Each


Janice McKnight may be the nemesis that will haunt Howard University. McKnight, as managing editor of *The Hilltop*, the student-run newspaper, published series of articles describing a sex discrimination complaint filed by a Howard employee. Howard's administrative officials engaged in negotiations with McKnight asking her to cease publication of the story. McKnight refused. Subsequently, the university expelled McKnight because it claimed she

submitted false information in her admissions application in 1979, which, university officials say, is grounds for expulsion. McKnight vowed she will take Howard to court. Now the administration faces not one but two more court actions against it from among the many already filed.

However, the McKnight expulsion is only a small part of a larger, much more serious issue. Freedom of Speech. Censorship. And university officials, in my view, are embarking upon dangerous ground when they begin to tackle with First Amendment rights. At this moment, Howard University President James Cheek is seriously considering placing tighter administrative controls over The Hilltop. The implications of this probably action are far-reaching and quite disturbing. The Hilltop, instead of being a medium where information vital to the Howard community (i.e, its students and faculty) is transmitted, instead of being a medium where ideas are offered up for healthy, robust debate, could quite conceivably become a mouthpiece for university official-much like the Russian newspaper Tass is the unofficial voice of the Soviet government. In addition, the University is in a position to exert control over the students and faculty by allowing only information or ideas it considers of importance to Howard students and faculty members.

Moreover, I feel university officials are sending clear but dangerous signals to its faculty, for what is freedom of speech but "absence of censorship." And freedom to express opinions (even if they differ sharply from those of the university), to debate, to explore new avenues of thought are the lifeblood of any university. We cannot presume that the strong-arm tactics used by the university to suppress McKnight from publishing information embarrassing to Howard

## Third World Debt Bomb Ticks Steadily

In recent times, international hysteria has a crupted with regard to the astronomical debt burden of Third World countries. Headlines have indicated that never in the history of mankind have so many nations owed so much to so few. There has also been fear of a possible financial collapse in international markets which could trigger shock waves, thus transforming a global recession into a global depression a la the 1930's

One factor, however, that must be borne in mind is that the debt burden of Third World countries has not accumulated overnight. The burden has accumulated as a result of decades of "unequal exchange" between these nations and the industrial western nations within the domi-

nant international capitalist economy—an exchange that historically has been characterized by the legacy of underdevelopment and dependency for the exploited. More specifically, Third World countries have been burdened by slumping prices for their exports, increasing protectionism in the industrial countries and global inflation.

If we were to take a cursory look at the total disbursed external debt of Third World countries, we would find that the figure reached a peak of \$626 billion as of December 31, 1982. This represents an increase of 18.1 per cent over the 1981 figure. Debt service payments have been estimated to be \$131 billion at the end of 1982.

According to the International Monetary Fund (IMF), the debt of low-income countries stood at \$110 billion in 1982, while their debt service payments were \$\$1.5 billion; for the middle-income countries the figure was \$144 billion and \$24 billion respectively; for the newly industrializing countries (NICs) the figures were \$266 billion and \$63 billion, and for OPEC countries they were \$106 billion and \$33 billion.

In more specific terms, the debt burden for Third World countries reveal for example that at the end of 1982, Brazil's external debt stood at \$87 billion; Mexico \$80.1 billion; Argentina \$43.0 billion; Zaire \$5.1 billion; Zambia \$4.5 billion; Venezuela \$28.0 billion and so on.

The fact is that the 141 Third World countries have indicated that they are in no position to repay their debts and that unless their export earnings increase and import prices decrease, their financial situation would deteriorate. This situation is compounded by the fact that the index for terms of trade of these countries fell from 111 in 1960 to 89 in 1980.

Needless to say, U.S. multinational banks are very nervous. U.S. bankers have publicly admitted that about 10 percent of their total assets are jeopardized or are at risk to Third World countries who are now in severe financial trouble. These banks include New York's Chemical, Chase Manhattan, Citicorp, the Valley National Bank of Arizona and Texas Commerce Bank in Houston. As a whole, the nine major U.S. banks have loaned about 130 percent of their equity to Mexico, Brazil and Argentina. Their outstanding loans to developing countries and the Eastern bloc now total \$130 billion, including \$68 billion to Latin American and Caribbean countries. Taken as a whole, therefore, the total debt of both east and west developing nations will aggregate circa \$756 billion.

In order to manage this financial crisis, the group of 10 major leading industrial

nations met in January and created a \$19 billion emergency fund for the IMF so as to fend off the impending "threat to the stability of the international monetary system." They also agreed to support a "substantial" increase in the financial resources of the IMF (i.e. quotas or deposits of member countries). It should be pointed out that this perceived 50 percent increase in IMF rsources, or \$32 billion, comes into effect in 1985. By that time the debt burden of Third World countries would also increase by that same amount so that these countries would be back to square one.

The question that comes to mind is: how

can the IMF bail these countries out? The primary purpose of the IMF as stipulated by its Articles of Agreement is "to provide member countries with temporary balance of payments support". However, recent history has shown that the IMF has been used to destabilize/overthrow foreign leaders and governments. Indeed, several Third World leaders have complained about the harsh draconian "conditionality" measures the IMF imposes on their economies and peoples are pre-requesites for loans and debt relief.

President Kenneth Kaunda of Zambia, for example, has complained that the IMF "seems indifferent to, or ignorant of, local conditions," while Julius K. Nyerere of Tanzania has indicated that IMF con-

ditionality measures, e.g. devaluation of their currency, reduction of import controls. increase in bank interest rates and abolishment of price controls, "are foolish ideas [which] would hurt the poor people in our country." It is no secret that the IMF has become and functions as "the financial disciplinarian of the international capitalist system" and ensures "the repayment of the debts which the poor countries owe to govemments of the developed countries and private multinational banks." In the case of Jamaica under former Prime Minister Michael Manley, the conclusion has been clearly drawn that the IMF conditionality destabilizing program not only perpetuated Jamaica's dependence on the developed capitalist countries but also exacerbated its internal backwardness. All these in turn, led to the eventual downfall of the Manley government. Norman Girban, former director of that country's National Planning Agency and a member of the Jamaican negotiating team with the IMF has pointed out that "the IMF proposals were regarded as punitive and murderous and a prescription for the downfall of the government.' Chile, under Salvador Allende, is another case in point

Added to this scenario is the collusion between OPEC, the IMF and the multi-

national banks in escalating the debt burden of Third World countries.

The collusion between OPEC (the petrohegemonists) and multinational banks plays a vital role in the escalating debt bur-

den of the developing countries and deserves some comments here—a collusion which is especially crucial due to the fact that since the oil price increase in 1973, multinational banks have become the primary source of financing for the balance of payment deficits of these countries. Ever since OPEC first began to accumulate its fortunes, neither OPEC nor western governments have had a decisive voice in the process by which these funds were channeled through the international banking system. Instead a handful of powerful multinational banks-the only institutions with the adequate financial expertise-acted as the principal intermediaries between OPEC and the developing countries. As money was paid by oil consumers to OPEC, massive amounts of greenbacks did not pile up in the treasuries of governments in sandy desert sheikdoms as conventional wisdom suggests. Rather, vast amounts of money were deposited by OPEC governments in New York and London banks.

According to the U.S. Treasury depart ment, out of a total of \$133 billion oil revenue surplus accumulated by OPEC between 1974-76, an estimated \$48 billion was invested in government securities, portfolio and long-term direct investment ventures in the industrial countries; \$9.75 billion was loaned to international institutions like the International Monetary Fund; and \$49 billion or 37 per cent was deposited in private commercial banks in New York and London. Only \$16 billion or 12 per cent went directly to the developing countries, mostly in the form of grants to Moslem countries OPEC did increase its direct lending to developing countries in 1975 and 1976. But this increase may have been largely offset by a cut in 1976 contributions to official international lending institutions whose chief clients are the LDCs.

In sum, the petrodollars are being recycled back to the oil consuming industrial nations. But the distribution of the recycled funds is such that countries with the strongest economies and external financial positions like the United States, Britain and Germany are the recipients of the biggest share of petrodollars at the most favorable rates. In 1976, for example, the United States received an estimated 30 to 35 per cent of OPEC's surpluses. The recycled funds go to the rich industrial countries as payments for goods and services, as direct investments and in the form of commercial bank deposits. They thus get back into the capital account of these countries and so take up the slack they "lose" on their oil trade account. On the other spectrum, those countries with the weakest economies which are hardest hit by the oil price hike can only gain access to these petrodollars by borrowing at a high rate of interest from the commercial banks in the wealthy countries and from the international lending agencies.

So that whereas the oil surplus OPEC nations are willing to "lend" directly to the "safe" borrowers like the United States, Britain, and Germany, nevertheless they interpose the commercial banks and international lending institutions as a buffer between themselves and the high risk borrowers, the non-oil developing countries, who experience huge deficits and large external debts OPEC helps create in the first place. Thus, even if their petrodollars ultimately are made available to finance

the deficits of the poor oil importing countries, OPEC has thereby shifted any risk involved in lending to those countries, from themselves to the intermediary institutions. Of course, these intermediaries charge a fee for taking such a risk, a fee in the form of a high rate of interest on the loans.

Consequently, the majority of the poor oil importing countries find themselves increasingly squeezed between chronic large balance of payment deficits and the steadily rising cost of financing those deficits.

And so, despite OPEC's public claim to be championing the cause of the Third World's poor and powerless nations against the rich industrial West, our analysis of the record shows that OPEC's actions have been antithetical to the needs of the LDCs and have made them even more dependent on the West. By raising the price of oil by

almost 600 per cent over the years and then funneling the surpluses to Western treasuries and private and public multinational banks, OPEC has greatly increased the leverage these institutions have over the poor developing countries. What emerges, therefore, is a scenario where OPEC is in the middle of the whirlpool of exploitation between the public and private banking institutions and the developing countries.

According to Latin American economist Celso Furtado, "the only way ahead for Third World countries in the face of the current financial upheaval is to force a major [radical] restructuring of the international monetary system." Rescheduling of debts is just a band-aid solution. Third World countries MUST demand that western international financial institutions and commercial banks cancel their debts immediately. If these institutions do not take this initiative (and we assume they would not), then Third World countries should. This is their only way out of the "debt trap" in which the industrialized nations have caught them. The only way Third World countries can extricate themselves from decades of dependency and Balkanization is to ignite the debt bomb. And have no fear, the international monetary system WOULD NOT COLLAPSE.

### Affairs in Brief

#### **NIGERIA**

The second group of Nigerian soldiers on Peace-keeping operations in Lebanon have returned to Lagos.

An official statement in Lagos says the last group of Nigerian soldiers who served in Lebanon will return home on January 26.

Nigeria terminated its further participation in the operations in October last year.

The first set of 66 medical doctors trained at the University of Jos were among the 722 graduates to receive their degrees at a special convocation ceremony in Jos.

The Minister of Education, Dr. Sylvester Ugoh represented President Shehu Shagari at the ceremony.

The Minister of State for Industries, Dr. Ishmail Igbani, has said in Lagos that the exit of illegal aliens will not affect the labor situation in Nigerian industries.

Dr. Igbani said the Federal Government's order that illegal aliens should leave the country would open up areas of gainful employment to Nigerians.

He said employers of illegal aliens in the country ought to be penalized because they break the laws of the country, adding that the policy of the Federal Government has been to provide gainful employment to Nigerians and that should be the country's priority.

Commenting on unskilled aliens, Dr. Igbani said that the ECOWAS treaty did not empower citizens of neighboring countries to flood Nigeria's labour marked with unskilled workers, adding that Nigeria had enough of its unskilled manpower problems.

#### OAU

Senegal's President Addou Diouf has said that African states may now abandon attempts to reconvene the twice-abortive 19th summit of the Organization of African Unity (OAU), the National Leader reported. Instead, the Organization may combine the 19th summit with the 20th anniversary summit schedule to be held in Conakry, Guinea, on May 25, 1983.

### Doe Condemns Expulsion of Aliens

Nigeria's expulsion of some two million illegal aliens—most of them Ghanians—has been criticized for "undermining the foundations of the Organization of African Unity and the Organization of West African States."

In a telegram to Nigerian President Shehu Shagari, Liberian Head of State Samuel Doe said last week he was also concerned about the plight of more than a million other displaced West Africans. Doe said Nigeria's expulsion might lead to repercussions on millions of Nigerians in the region, many of whom were living in other countries illegally.

The Liberian Head of State, however, assured Nigerians and other Africans living in his country that they would not be molested or forced out of the country as long as they remained law-abiding.

If African leaders encouraged systematic expulsions such as Nigeria had done, Doe said, there could be "an endless process of involuntary migration everywhere on the [African] continent." Doe's message was broadcast over the Washington, D.C. African News and Bibliographic Center Habari News Service over the weekend.

For an African country to which most Africans looked up for leadership, Doe said, Nigeria had shown "a disappointing example."

Despite Liberia's own economic hardship, Doe said his country was contributing \$20,000 as a "brotherly act" to help in the resettlement of the repatriated Ghanaians.

Nigeria's Minister of Internal Affairs Ali Baba announced the deportation order on January 17, 1983. Under the order which has been widely supported in the Nigerian press and by the recession-stricken populace, some two million aliens were ordered out by February 1. Skilled and professional aliens were given until February 30 to pack up and go.

By mid-week last week, about 500,000 Ghanaians were reported to have returned home. Estimates of the total number of Ghanaians caught up in the hasty exodus ranged in press reports from one to two million.

Other nationals affected by the

mass exodus were from the West African countries of Mali, Chad, Niger, Upper Volta, Benin, and Togo. Most of the aliens asked out of

Nigeria came to that country under an

agreement by the Economic Com-

munity for West African States (ECOWAS) which permits free movement by nationals from member states. Under the ECOWAS agreement, citizens from member states are entitled to a 90-day entry visa. Those who entered Nigeria under the agreement were allowed in as travellers, but Nigerian officials allege they violated Nigerian law and the ECOWAS agreement by taking up jobs much to the anger of Nigerian citizens at a time when the oil-rich nation is undergoing its own economic difficulties.

The stated reason for the expulsion was to open up jobs for unemployed Nigerians. But knowledgeable sources indicated there were underlying political reasons behind the drastic move. Nigeria's second elections since civilian rule was re-established in 1977 are scheduled for August this year. And some Ghanaians reportedly were illegally registered in order to influence the outcome of the polls.

Other sources cite crime as one of the major concerns which aroused the ire of Nigerian officials to take the severe measures. Such a theory is supported by a story which says that three weeks before the expulsion order was announced, a man, said by Nigerian officials to be a Ghanaian, was caught and shot dead as he attempted to break into the house of Vice President Alex Ekwueme.

Whatever sparked off the expulsion measure, one thing is clear: Ghanaians were hardest hit. At least 20 people were estimated dead in road accidents and more than 100 injured during the evacuation process. Some were also reported to have died of starvation although there were only a few in this list reportedly due to the ages of most evacuees. Most of them were in their 20's and therefore able to withstand the harsh conditions under which they had to travel home.

Some accounts reported overcrowding at departure points where people were packed so tightly in trucks and ships that they could not sit. One report cited the case of a woman who delivered a baby on board a ship. Another cited 30 people who were too weak from the overcrowding and exhaustion to walk off the ship that brought them home to Accra, the capital of Ghana.

Some of the refugees interviewed by reporters said they had been beaten by Nigerian youths who extorted money and possessions from them. Although others mentioned official molestation, these accusations were not persistent.

Besides Liberia's "brotherly act" of \$20,000, other governments and relief organizations have chipped in to help the returnees. The United States government contributed food and money. The International Commission for the Red Cross flew in shipments of blankets, tents and food from Geneva, Switzerland. The Catholic Relief Services and Togo's Baptist Mission also helped the refugees as they were in transit from Nigeria to Ghana. The organization of African Unity (OAU) sent a delegate to Lagos, Nigeria to review the refugee situation and asked the Nigerian government for "humanitarian treatment' of the expelled aliens.

On arrival in Ghana, the returnees were assembled in a sports stadium in Accra which served as the main transit point. The transit camp processed as may as 20,000 people a day giving out food and medicines before putting them on trucks bound for the countryside where the government had given them farmland. The camps also served as security checks where they were searched for illegal weapons.

There was little immediate reaction to the expulsion from Ghanaians or Nigerians on the campus of Howard University. One Ghanaian student who did not want to be named deplored the expulsion of her countrymen as "unfortunate." She said she had been in contact with people in her country by phone and there was real concern over the mass influx.

Another Howard student, a Nigerian studying for a Masters degree in International Relations, called for a "deeper understanding of the issues" involved in the expulsion. He felt that crime was "certainly" a factor. The Nigerian, who also requested anonymity, was against the publication of the story on his country's action saying it "served no useful purpose." He, however, was critical of the Nigerian decision and said the expulsion harmed African unity although he insisted there was more to the problem than had been reported.

The influx of a million or more people seeking gainful employment is sure to hurt Ghana which is struggling to recover from rising inflation and scarcity of essential goods.

Last year Ghana was hit by another mass influx of its citizens when Britain decided to exel more than 500 Ghanaians who officials said had improper immigration documents.

# Nigeria's Self-Reliance

President Shehu Shagari has re-iterated the need for self-reliance in order to justify the vast material and human resources endowed to the nation by nature.

In an address at this year's convocation of the University of Lagos, read on his behalf by Vice-President Alex Ekwueme, the President said, "Unless we can quickly develop self-reliance, we will probably be unable, in our life time, to construct this country from its present developing state to a technologically developed advanced state."

He said that self-reliance was one of the guiding principles of his administration under the Fourth National Development Plan.

The President urged Nigerian universities to harness their energies towards realising the self-reliance goal.

He pointed out that in the area of univer-

sity education, a self-reliance policy would help to improve experimentation, ingenuity and innovation.; The president stressed that the country's

manpower needs were great, adding that

education must be first and foremost linked to economic growth.

On graduate unemployment in the country, President Shagari said, "Some of these were self-induced, arising from the reluct-

were self-induced, arising from the reluctance of Nigerian graduates to take on certain jobs such as teaching, or to work in rural areas, or states other than their own."

However, he expressed the hope that the

new national policy on education would make university course-content reflect the national requirement, adding that consultations would be made between universities, employees and the government for mutual cooperation in national decisionmaking.

In his remarks, the Pro-Chancellor of the

University, Chief Dennis Osadebay, enjoined the graduates to realize that the problems in the country today are not so much political, but ones that need objective, realistic and meaningful reappraisal of the societal values.

He said that there was a need for all to rededicate themselves and yield to the clarion call contained in the ethical revolution launched recently.

The Vice-Chancellor of the University, Professor Akin Adesøla, said that the new national policy on education was one of the most well thought-out, comprehensive programmes on education ever produced for the country.

He announced that the University's Alumni Association donated \$100,000 to the institution for the development of a post-graduate hall.

The Howard University women's basketball team captured back-to-back victories last weekend in Burr Gymnasium.

Last Friday, the Bisonettes routed the Aggiettes of North Carolina A&T by a score of 74-52 and on the subsequent day pulled off a squeaker against St. Joseph University, 63-62.

Against N.C. A&T, the Bisonettes initiated slowly but did not lose any ground as the guests began even slower. Both teams committed turnover after turnover, but the Bisonettes managed to break their giveaway streak a few times with some baskets, which the Aggiettes failed to do in the first five minutes.

At the 16:04 mark, Robin Duncan hit a free throw to give Howard a 7-0 lead that was not to be surmounted for the remainder of the game.

A&T point-guard Martha Simmons answered with a 10-foot jump-shot to begin the Aggiette scoring a minute later and teammate Pam Benton scored on a breakaway lay-up at the 12:59 mark to narrow the Bisonette lead to one, 9-8.

The tempo began to increase at this point as both teams constantly scored on fastbreaks. But with 5:58 to go, Bisonette center Claudia Eaton converted on a three-point play to give her team a 24-18 advantage.

With 3:00 to play in the first half, A&T guard Laura Smith hit the second of her two successive 20-foot jumpshots to trim the Howard lead at 26-24. The Aggiettes again failed to capitalize on the shifted momentum and the halftime score stood at 28-26. Bisonettes favor.

The Aggiettes again cut the Bisonette lead to one-point at the start of the secondhalf. Howard's Duncan made a three-point play at 17. It to increase the Bisonette lead to six and teammate Eaton hit a lay-up and a 12-foot baseline jumper at 16:39 to give her team a 41-31 lead.

The hosts never looked back at this point and overwhelmed their counterparts with their fastbreaks, produced by a scrappy fullcourt press. They opened up a 21-point lead at the 6:16 mark when Donna Wood scored on a fastbreak. This deficit proved to be too much for the Aggiettes as they never got closer.



### Foreign Athletes at H.U

One glance at the Howard University soccer team's roster reads somewhat like the membership slate for a League of Nations Conference. To a lesser extent that is also the case with teams such as track, swimming and volleyball. All of these sports have foreign athletes as participants.

Foreign students have always been a part of the Howard community but they were not always part of the Howard athletic program. According to former coach James "Ted" Chambers, the soccer program was organized because the athletic department was concerned about getting the foreign students more involved in the athletic program.

"Soccer served as a medium that got foreign students involved in the University," observed coach Chambers. Track and swimming also attracted many of the foreign athletes in the early days of Howard sports (as is the case today), coach Chambers said.

The question of why foreign athletes frome to Howard is continually asked. There are a variety of reasons but the most common answer seems to be Howard's international recognition as a good academic institution.

Some other reasons include the diversity of the Howard community. Many foreign athletes are glad to perform on teams which are made up of people from all over the world. For others the opportunity to play sports on a scholarship is incentive enough.

Howard coaches do not necessarily go over to foreign countries to recruit athletes,

according to Athletic Director Leo Miles. Sometimes coaches in foreign countries recommend foreign players or the Howard coaches, in the case of track, may recruit them at meets (such as the Penn Relavs) held in the United States.

It is not always easy to recruit a foreign athlete said soccer coach Keith Tucker. "After as much research as possible, then you guess and gamble," Tucker said. "It is easier to recruit foreigners, when you have a source in the foreign country."

"What we try to do is find the best athletes regardless of which country they're from," said Miles. He added that foreign athletes are generally recruited from the places where foreign students at Howard

The American culture can be difficult to assimilate into for many of the foreign athletes; however, Tucker said the orientation program for new students at Howard is extensive and usually lets the foreign student "know what's going on."

Karen Gascoigne, a junior from Jamaica on the women's track team, said she had problems adjusting to American food and the weather. Not many foreign athletes, however, complain about loneliness because there is usually someone here at Howard from their country with whom they can associate.

The "NCAA Guide to International Academic Standard for Athletic Eligibility," which came out in 1981, outlines the requirements for foreign student athletes to participate in a NCAA sports program such



### PROFILE:

Going from an almost all-white college in Eugene, Oregon to a predominately black university in Washington, D.C. can be a difficult transition for almost any student. The adjustment, though, can be even more difficult for a student-athlete. This is just one of the obstacles that have been hurdled in the life of Bisonette Claudia Eaton.

Throughout Eaton's athletic career, problems have been as hard to tackle as any opposing player is to defend. During Eaton's high school athletic career, problems and obstacles were few and far between. Eaton led her high school team to a remarkable 52-0 league record during her school girl days in California. This achievement is overshadowed, though, by the fact that her high school's overall record during her four year reign was a whopping 124-5. Life indeed was rosy for the 6'2" hoopster.

She was voted the Most Valuable Player award in her section (San Jaocquin) of the state and was one of the most highly recruited female basketball players in the country. After sifting through hundreds of scholarship offers, Claudia finally decided upon Oregon University.

At first, both basketball and academics seemed easy for Claudia. "Local newspapers and fans really supported us well," said Claudia. "The people in Eugene loved the girls' team because we were successful and the boys' team wasn't very good." Claudia moved right in and started as a freshman. At one point during the season, the Lady Beavers of Oregon were ranked number 13 in the Associated Press and number 15 in the United Press International polls. Oregon played traditional powers such as Louisiana Tech and South Carolina.

After a successful season, her team was invited to play in the prestigious National Womens' Invitational Tournament (equivalent to the Mens' NCAA Tournament). The Oregon squad had a tremendous tournament and finished a surprise third in the tourney. After the season ended, though, problems began to arise. Claudia's academic work (telecommunications) at Oregon was very good, but her feelings about the coach and the basketball team weren't. She decided to leave school for a quarter and re-evaluate her situation.

After considering her options, Claudia decided on Howard University. Once again, she moved right in the started, but once more problems started. Claudia injured herself while participating in a pick-up game

while playing in the auxiliary gym in Burr Gymnasium.

"One of the guys who was playing hacked me on the neck," said Claudia. "After a couple of days, I couldn't even move my

She later went to the hospital and sought the help of a neurologist to help rectify her injury. The doctor told her that the injury was similar to an ulcer, because the muscles on her right side pulled or stretched whenever she moved. The doctor made her wear a brace around her neck for two weeks to help aid in her recovery. The road to recovery though, has been a long and tiring one.

After rehabilitation and hard work Claudia began to play basketball again. Her eagerness to play may have been one of the reasons that she was slow in recovery. Many of the injuries Claudia has had since then have been caused by her neck injury She said she may have tried to come back

While life at Howard has been easy for Claudia academically (she recently changed her major to political science), the same does not apply athletically. The girls' record after a thrilling 63-62 victory over St. Joseph's is 5-13.

Compared to Oregon, this is a come down to Claudia. "The quality of competition here at Howard is not nearly as good as it is at Oregon," stated the star center.

She said that last year's trip to the NCAA tournament was a chance for the Lady Bisonettes to grab some publicity. (The Bisonettes qualified for the NCAA tournament by capturing the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Tournament.)

"The NCAA was a good opportunity for us to get some recognition because nothing is guaranteed in basketball. If we could have done well, maybe it would help Howard recruit some players that could help make it a top 20 team," Claudia pointed out.

Though the team has been struggling. Claudia has been a pillar of strength. During the course of the season, Claudia has been scoring (14.2) and rebounding (9.7) at a good pace. The Lady Bisonettes have been blown out by national powers such as Maryland and Cheney State, but Claudia feels that games like those against top level schools will eventually help the girls out later on down the road-a road that the senior center hopes will once again take them back to the NCAA Tournament.

### Hoopster on the way to MEAC Journey Win

With their 87-71 mutilation of The North Carolina A&T Aggies and with its last second 81-79 squeaker over The South Carolina State Bulldogs, The Howard University men's basketball team made a continuance of a couple of factors that have made this season so intersting.

First, they still continue their struggle over lowly-regarded teams, while continuing to have less trouble over highlyregarded ones. Second, they continue to have more productive play from the players that surround the catalyst, Bernard Perry. Third, they continue to be the only team in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference that displays dominance in the conference both away and at home. And fourth, they continue to outstep any other MEAC team in their quest for the regular season title.

Before a packed house of last Friday night, the Bison put the A&T Aggies in their place and forced them to stay there. Once they got gong the rest of the game was never close. Never. Starting the game off with a David Wynn jumper with 19 seconds into the first half, the Bison made the Aggies play in their tempo of the game and built a double figure lead with 11:15 remaining in the first half. Joe Lopez, Antoine Collins, and Eric Boyd kept A&T from being completely blown out of the game, htting all but three of their total points in the first seventeen minutes of play.

While the Bison displayed a broad shot selection and shot a fine 63% from the field (seems that they have made their horrid field percentages a thing of the past), Joe Binion less A&T (referring to their leading scorer and last year's MEAC Player of the Year) was cold.

They had plenty of scoring opportunities and missed them because of poor shooting. Many of the shots they missed were unguarded and beneath the goal. Down 28-17, they were outscored by the Bison 14-4 in the last six minutes of play and trailed 42-24 at

In the second half, the Aggies began to heat up, but they just could not cool the Bison down. Each time the Aggies made a run, it was only silenced by the Bison making a run of their own. With 15:30 to go, an inside bucket by Derek Caraciolo made the score 55-32. It was the Bison's biggest lead of the game.

The Aggies then socred on their next two possessions followed by the Bison scoring on their next two. The Aggies scored on their next two and the Bison again followed suit. The series continued in that fashion until the Aggies scored eleven unanswered

points on the Bison to cut the lead to 75-62 with 2:29 remaining. Again the Bison pre-

Led by Kevin Scott and Bernard Perry, the Bison hit clutch shots in the colsing two minutes of the game to secure the victory. a left. shot by guard Jeff Williams in the final seconds of play finished the scoring, and the Bison had defeated the Aggies for the first time in four tries.

Coach A.B. Williamson had only good things to say about his team: "The guys played with a great deal of intensity. Coming off a bad loss to Brooklyn College) with a great win, we executed on what we were working on, and we did the little things in basketball that makes one a winner."

The Bison were led by Perry with 23 points, followed by Derek Caraciolo with 15 and Kevin Scott and David Wynn with 14 each. Caraciolo led with 8 rebounds followed by Perry with 6 and Robert Jones with 5. Perry led in assists with 9, followed by Gino Warner with 8 and Jeff Williams with 4. Warner also had 5 steals for the Bison.

The Aggies were led by Jimmy Brown Jr. with 18 points followed by Brian Booker and Eric Boyd with 14 apiece. Brown and Antoine Collins led Aggie rebounders with 6 apiece.

After the Bison's 81-79 thrilling victory over South Carolina State, a dejected Bulldog fan said of Bernard Perry "He is just a nemesis."


"We were looking for a man-to-man defense, said Williamson. "What we planned to do was set picks and throw the long ball and hope for a layup."



The towner instructor and founder of Howard's first dance program graced the eampus once again to share a little bit of his magic.



You're not bombarded with multi-million dollar special and cinematic effects, like during the first scene of "Raiders," but it's more like you're an invisible spectator. walking, listening to, and, in this case, rollerskating with the characters themselves.

"The Personals" is a movie totally devoid of star names, alluring measurements (with one exception), profane paragraphs, and revving engines. But, it still holds your attention and sends you from the theater smiling. Like "Raoul," it's not for everyone. It's for those moviegoers still interested in the human experience, no matter what the color of the humans, and who still enjoy feeling the joys and sorrows of anoth-

"The Personals" follows the development of Bill Hendricks, a 32-year-old, slightly balding male, recently divorced and falling into the trap of wrapping himself in his work as a magazine editor to avoid his feelings. 

The movie had played for three minutes when I cracked my first smile, and it was 15 minutes later when I realized that I hadn't stopped smiling. I took a look around me and everyone in the theater had the same stupid grin on their face.

The movie enchants you from the beginning. Bill Hendricks, (whose most traumatic moment up until his divorce was "running out of white meat at Thankskgivig''), is someone you can identify with if you've ever been hurt and afraid to feel again. 



officials deem to be recalcitrant faculty members McKnight's story and the subsequent re-

sponse of university officials show us that Howard University needs to tidy up an unorderly house. It cannot do that by suppressing information that shows its house is in disarray. Rather, it must look to the cause of the problems and start there.

McKnight is disappointed in Howard University. I am ashamed of it. But I heartily endorse her position to settle the dispute between Howard and herself in court. Nevertheless, most foreign athletes interviewed said they enjoyed representing Howard in athletics. It gives a "sense of pride to represent Howard' said André Cropper, a junior swimmer from Trinidad and Tobago. David Sabir, a freshman from Bermuda, added that playing soccer for Howard brings about a feeling of accomplishment for him. Many athletes said they would recommend other foreign athletes to academically come to Howard.

Because many of the foreign athletes who represent Howard were or are national team members for their respective countries, they all express a certain national pride which seems to be a motivating factor. "I feel that I am representing both Howard and Trinidad," said freshman Ronald Simmons a soccer player.

Foreigners put Howard on the map internationally, said coach Chambers. Those men and women who came and still come from those distant countries to represent their own countries were not better than Howard in athletics have made a distinctly Howard's.


