Charter amendment sent for approval


A charter amendment recommended by the Senate Executive Committee of the University will go to the president and the Board of Trustees for final approval. The amendment focused on attaining congruency among all parts of the char-ter. An amendment was added to the charter in the Spring of 1994, eliminating grounds for appeal. It was discovered that the amendment only fixed one section of the charter. The change will focus on adademic dishonesty dis-covered after graduation, matching the punishment given to the same crime discovered while still at the University

Robert Holmes, Vice Chairman for Faculty Sen-ate, said the amendment was the cause of an oversight on the part of senators voting on the first resolution. "The change should have

been made before," Holmes said. "Someone prepared the resolution without knowing what they were do-ing."

Book depository dedicated Area schools' joint effort yields library storage facility

Northwest Ohio leaders gathered in Perrysburg Monday to dedicate a \$3.1 million library storage facility.

A joint effort between the University, the Medical College of Ohio and the University of Toledo, the 14,800 square-foot Northwest Ohio Regional Book Depository contains 10,000-square-feet of space for the high density storage of materials. Rows of specially designed 30-foot-high shelving, which reduces the space requirements for storing massive amounts of materials, provide the equivalent of

this facility for many years in the future.

Paul Yon, University Archival Collections director, said the Ohio Board of Regents-funded facility will clear valuable space in the Jerome Library.

"It releases some space on main campus so we can put more contemporary materials on site, which I think will be in greater demand by University students and the University community." Yon said the new building will

save his department money. "It saves us some money in the purchasing of hardware and shelving," Yon said. "It could save us thousands of dollars. It



Officer suggests case be rejected

A chief hearing examiner recommended in a report issued Monday that the Ohio Civil Rights Commission order a dismissal of a complaint made against the University Journalism Department.

The recommendation, which will be forwarded to the five OCRC members, is the result of a March 21 hearing concerning a complaint filed by John Hartman, who applied for a faculty position in the Journalism Department in April 1994.

Department Chairwoman Nancy Brendlinger said she was very pleased with the decision.

"I never thought the man had a case. I knew that his race and his gender had nothing to do with the hiring decision," Brendlinger said. "I expected the Ohio Civil Rights Commission to be reasonable and find for us, but it's a great relief when you find out that the system really does work."

Hartman, who teaches journalism courses at Central Michigan, said he was not hired so the department could keep its accredi-tation. The ACEJMJ states a department must reflect society, which it defines as 20 percent minority and 50 percent female. Debbie Owens, a black female who was hired for the position, fulfilled the department's requirement.

Hartman said he will file an appeal with the commission before the Oct. 28 deadline. He said he has several problems with the

report. "There are several troubling aspects to the document," Hartman said. "One is that it suggests that whites who suffer discrimination have to be held to a higher standard than minorities who suffer discrimination."

Hartman said he also had a problem with the standard Chief Hearing Examiner Franklin Martens used with higher education. "Another concern is a suggestion that Universities should not be held to the same standard with regard to their hiring practices as other public entities," Hartman said. Martens stated in his report that higher education is not above the law. "While universities are not exempt from scrutiny by the Commission, it should be noted that as long as the decisions involve professional judgment of various members of the faculty, they should not be disturbed," he stated. Clif Boutelle, Public Relations director, said the report approves of University procedure. "The recommendation supports the University position that no discrimination took place in the hiring of a journalism faculty member," Boutelle said. "The recommendation also supports the University's contention all along that the job search and the hiring was conducted in an appropriate matter." Hartman said he still intends to follow through with a lawsuit against the Journalism Department and their accrediting agency, the Accrediting Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communications. Hartman filed the suit in federal court in July.

I read with some interest Andrea Wood's editorial in Monday's BG News and thought it important to comment. I ap-plaud Ms. Wood's attempt to do research before writing from emotion. There are points, however, that should be clarified. First, while the crime and police employee statistics she reports may be correct, they have no meaning as they are pre-sented. Are these figures high or low? Rather than look at raw numbers, rates of offending should be examined, since this al-lows you to make comparisons. Such an effort would show that the assault rate is less than half that for the State of Ohio, and the assault rate is less than half that for the State of Ohio, and one-fourth the size for the U.S. The rape rate is 60 percent of the Ohio rate and 73 percent of the U.S. data. In terms of the police numbers, the rate is almost identical to that for local law enforcement agencies across the U.S.

enforcement agencies across the U.S. Second, even if campus security was comparatively under-staffed, increasing the number of officers would not reduce the level of crime. Police officers typically appear AFTER a crime is committed, take reports, and do their best to identify and arrest the offender. Rarely to they stop a crime in progress. Third, the use of arguments from victim advocacy groups should be considered in light that these groups rarely look at the scientific evidence and typically provide the "politically cor-rect" position. While many of their suggestions make sense, oth-ers are founded on misinformation. Indeed, many groups pro-vide contradictory information on how to avoid crime (particu-larly in terms of how victims respond during sexual assault). Fourth, Ms. Wood inaccurately quotes me at several places. I did not say that there is an emergency phone every 10-15 feet

I did not say that there is an emergency phone every 10-15 feet or that there is a light on every corner of the University. I said

or that there is a light on every corner of the University. I said "Your parents, home towns, and other employers do not provide ... lights on every corner, or emergency phones every 10-15 feet." This was in response to comments made in earlier letters and editorials by others in the BG News. Ms. Wood also provides other inaccurate information, such as the fact that there are "roughly 15,000 students" at BGSU (according to the Registrar's Office there are 16,791 students at BGSU this year). This differ-

ence in numbers is important in making calculations of rates. While I welcome debate, I suggest that individuals do more than collect raw data, read partisan documents, and report in-formation without knowing what it really means. It is important to be able to put information into its proper perspective. Crime data and information works the same way data and information works the same way. Steven P. But like other high-sound-ing abstractions that attract immediate applause, the fact that community exists, is about to be found, or will be created is the easy part. But the struggle for the soul or character of the community persists. A standard avenue for hiding the internal conflicts that conthe internal connects that con-stitute any institution, whether it be a university, corporation, or church, is to define one cud-dly and inchoate idea, e.g., community, by using equally fuzzy attributes to "explain" what the first mushy word really means.

For example, we note with reluctant amusement that the BGSU community is said to have as a core value, creative imaginings. Beautiful! Now there is a substantive ideal We ask you to engage in some creative imaginings of your own: Can you imagine anyone ever supporting uncreative imagi-nings? We certainly would never do so. We asked several faculty and students what the term meant to them, and they just grinned. We wonder why. Another common strategy

for ignoring ruptures in the community is to pretend that we can support everything. Football is great; doctoral pro-grams are splendid; undergraduate learning is a focus; honors programs are nifty. This scenario suggests that we all live lives that are infinite in

duration, and that the institution has unlimited funds for at least the capacity to do everything with less). Conflicts at BGSU and in

other organizations are public relations nightmares, but they are real despite the understandable efforts of institutional spokespersons to portray diversity of vision and values in more agreeable terms. Anyone doubting the existance of legitimate, inconsistent diversity at BGSU need only read the edi-torial page of *The BG News* where more or less reasonable students articulate with feroc ity what university spokesper-sons would prefer not to notice: There are many versions of community at BGSU, and they are neither compatable nor even on speaking terms despite the well-intentioned efforts of the University's leadership to

encourage conversation. A Letter to the Editor in the News on Wednesday makes this point dramatically. The letter is angry; it speaks forcefully on behalf of one version of community at Bowling Green State University. The letter brands those BGSU students who did not attend the football game on Saturday as PATHETIC. We appreciate the candor of this charge. Apparently, many people at BGSU believe we should call a halt to our lives when our athletic teams are playing "games" and "support" the athletes by our attendance.

CLEVELAND -- Landel Shakespeare was both pupil and subject on Monday, the day after Bob Dole mentioned his name while discussing education during the first presidential debate.

The debate between Dole and President Clinton was the first topic of the day in Landel's second-grade class at Our Lady of Peace School. Classmates greeted the 7-year-old with applause and a note of congratulations on a blackboard, said his father, Delvoland Shakespeare.

Dole mentioned Landel, who participates in a test school voucher program, to illustrate the need for school choice. The reference earned the Republican another look from Landel's father, a lifelong Democrat.

"Presidents come and go but Landel - I'll have him with me for the rest of my life," Shakespeare said. "Anybody who supports my son and things for my son deserves a second look."

Shakespeare would not say how he will vote Nov. 5. "I like to keep who I vote for private," he said.

Dole had met with Landel and his father during a July 19 visit to Cleveland. They discussed a voucher program that allows parents to use state money to send their children to private or religious schools.

Landel's parents use a voucher to send him to a Catholic school rather than to one in the financially and academically troubled Cleveland public school district. The tuition costs \$1,700 a year.

In Sunday's debate, Dole said money now used to finance the U.S. Department of Education could be used to help students such as Landel







More offense needed

The Falcon football team has regrouped after Saturday's disappointing loss to Toledo and has its sights set on Kent and this week's Homecoming game.

Coach Gary Blackney discussed the team's fledgling offense Monday during his weekly press conference. BG is 103rd out of 111 Division I-A teams in total offense through five games.


"Offense is a concern," Blackney said. "Probably my biggest disappointment outside of losing the game Saturday was the fact that we didn't come off the ball and run the ball for at least 100 yards, which we had done for every other game, including Alabama.

The Falcons were held to just 59 yards of net rushing against the Rockets, by far a season low.

Blackney also talked Monday about quarterback Bob Niemet, who was shouldered with much of the offensive burden due to the rushing stalwart handed out by Toledo. Blackney had said after Saturday's game that the Falcons can't expect to put so much pressure on a sophomore quarterback and expect to win.

"He's still learning and growing," Blackney said. "You're hoping each week that you're going to see improvement by large gains, in large amounts, from week to week. That hasn't happened.

"It's not all on Bobby Niemet. If we catch four or five of those [dropped] passes on third down



that we had, we keep drives going and [Bob's]stats improve.'

Niemet was 14-of-37 passing against the Rockets for 220 yards. For the season, he has completed only 52 of 121 passes (43 percent). He has thrown two touchdowns and seven intercep-

Blackney went on to term Niemet's performance to date as "average.

'Again, go back and look at Erik White when he was a sophomore," Blackney continued, referring to the quarterback that led BG to back-to-back MAC championships in 1991 and '92. "He turns around one year later and he's the best quarterback in the MAC.

"I think it's very, very hard to

be a sophomore at this level." Again, Niemet didn't get a whole lot of help from his teammates against the Rockets Satur-

"We've just got to go back and work on blocking and being physical and playing with great effort and great enthusiasm," Blackney said. "If we can get Courtney [Davis, running back] to the line of scrimmage, he has proven that he can do a lot of things with the football."

Cates is cleared to play

Running back Keylan Cates has been cleared to play by his doctors in Columbus, Blackney said Monday.

"I don't see him coming back for a few more games yet, but he'll be involved in practice," he said. "He still needs to get his conditioning back before he would be able to play."

Cates is rehabilitating after suffering a ruptured ACL during spring practice.

Hamilton approaches record with Saturday performance

Damron Hamilton's 155 receiving yards Saturday against Toledo was the most by a Falcon receiver since Mark Szlachcic's school-record 189-yard day in the California Bowl in 1991.

"He's made some big plays for us, but, like the rest of the offense, he has to develop more consistency," Blackney said. "He has a lot of athletic ability, and he has asserted himself as a go-to guy for us."

LAS VEGAS - Tiger Woods and Davis Love III were playing a nine-hole practice round in Georgia a few weeks ago when the subject first came up.

Barely a month into his pro career, Woods was already trying to figure out a way to play in the Ryder Cup.

"He said to me, 'Do you think if won two or three times before the Ryder Cup team is picked that I would make it?"" Love recalled. "I told him if somebody could not pick you after you won two or three times, it would be amazing."

The way Woods won his first pro tournament Sunday, it might be amazing if he doesn't win several more in the next year before the Ryder Cup team is selected.

Playing with the poise of someone whose game is far past his years, the 20-year-old Woods stormed from four shots off the lead to beat Love in sudden death and win the Las Vegas Invitational.

Not since a 22-year-old named Jack Nicklaus beat Arnold Palat 25,000, were testament to the impact Woods has had on the game. Tournament officials estimated there were some 10,000 more people at the tournament Sunday than a year ago.

Woods blew past a leaderboard that included names like Love and Fred Couples, then calmly laced a 9-iron within 20 feet of the cup on the first playoff hole to seal the victory.

"Knowing that I hit the shots when I had to down the stretch and coming from behind to win is very satisfying," Woods said. "What really makes it great is how many players were between me and the lead at the start of the day. I knew I had to post a low score and I did."



"(His biggest challenge) is learning the offense and learning as much of the system as he pos-sibly can," Marchibroda said. "By the same token, you're not going to use him a great deal of the time because he's not quite ready yet."

Morris said he was excited to resume his football career, and hopes to put his well-publicized troubles behind him.

"Mr. [Art] Modell and the Ravens organization have given me a second chance," Morris said. "It's just time to come back and prove everybody wrong. People make mistakes, and I think that people are due for a second chance. This organization gave me one, and I'm going to make the best out of it."

16 touchdowns in his two years in Pittsburgh, but was released when his drug problem came to light following the 1995 season.

In other news, Marchibroda said he was calling a special coaches' meeting late Monday to decide what to do about the Ravens' beleaguered defense.

The team's biggest concerns revolve around the pass rush and the secondary, both of which offered only token resistance to New England in Sunday's 46-38 loss. Patriots quarterback Drew Bledsoe passed for 310 yards and four touchdowns as Baltimore's defense sank to 13th in the AFC.

"We'll have a meeting and we'll see what transpires," Marchi-broda said. "I don't know what it's going to mean. We'll have to wait and see."

While Marchibroda ruled out the possibility of acquiring help, he said the likely response will be to shift around personnel. Two boosts to the defense could come with the likely return of safety Eric Turner and defensive end Anthony Pleasant on Sunday.

Turner, who came out of Sunday's game against the Patriots early in the second quarter after spraining his left ankle, is listed as day-to-day, and will likely return to action. Pleasant, out since Week 1 with a more serious ankle injury, also will be ready, according to Marchibroda.

Florida puts out champs

Try to figure out the last time a team from the state of Florida wasn't in the running for the national championship.

Florida, Florida State, and Miami, usually ranked No. 1 at some point during the last 14 seasons, are at it again. The Gators are No. 1, the Seminoles No. 3 and the Hurricanes No. 6.

The trio have been involved in seven of the past 10 games that decided the national championship, setting a standard for excellence unmatched by any other state.

It used to be the Midwest, storied teams like Notre Dame and Michigan and Minnesota. Then came the superpowers at Oklahoma, Texas, Alabama, Nebraska and Southern California

That's not the case anymore. Since 1983, Miami has four national titles and Florida State one, while Florida lost its chance in last year's Fiesta Bowl. Miami and Florida State each have to No. 2 finishes in that span.

The college elite are in Florida," said Jacksonville Jaguars tackle Leon Searcy, who passed up Notre Dame and Michigan for Miami and left with two titles, "Just look at the polls - Florida schools have got three in the top 10. That speaks for itself."

Searcy is just one of many reasons the three Florida schools have reached a level of success unmatched by any other state. Top prep players like Searcy used to leave home for places like South Bend, Norman, Okla., and Tuscaloosa, Ala. Now, many of those players are staying home, knowing a national title could be just around the corner.

The state produces prep players like Emmitt Smith, Michael Irvin, Cortez Kennedy and Deion Sanders, kids who go in get somebody outside the state of

to look very far to find college football at its finest.

That's why the toughest games for Miami are not always the ones for a national title, why the Gators can win the tough Southeastern Conference every year and still be second-best in their own state.

That's why Bobby Bowden doesn't measure success at Florida State by how high it finishes in the polls or its record 11 straight bowl victories.

"If you want to know how you did, see how you come out in the state of Florida," Bowden said. "That's usually what determines whether you meet your goal."

It all starts again Saturday in Miami when No. 3 Florida State plays the sixth-ranked Hurricanes. And if the Seminoles can make it out of Miami, their regular season end Nov. 30 against No. 1 Florida

All three schools - the only Division I teams in the state until Central Florida moved up this season -- have finished in the top 20 every year since 1990.

Miami stumbled through probation and a bevy of off-field problems last year. The Hurricanes still won their last seven games and ended the year No. 20, their worst showing in the final poll since 1982.

Florida, which had its first shot at a national championship last year, only to be blown out by Nebraska in the Fiesta Bowl, has finished no lower than 13th this decade. That was in 1990, Steve Spurrier's first year as head coach.

And Florida State, which won its first national championship in 1993, has finished no lower than No. 4 since 1987.

This year is no exception.

"I don't know what it takes to

search of a winner and don't have Florida to be No. 1," Penn State coach Joe Paterno said.

It is a trend that doesn't figure to end soon. As long as the teams keep winning, they will continue to get the best prep players from the fertile state of Florida. And as long as they keep getting those players, they likely will continue to win.

"I had a kid two years ago who wound up at Notre Dame. He could have gone anywhere he wanted, but there was some family ties up there," said Corky Rogers, a high school coach in Jacksonville the past 25 years.

"But you take that same kind of a kid who had no other ties, and it would shock me if he didn't choose a state school."

"It just goes to show the caliber of athletes in the state of Florida," Searcy said. "That's why you see so many other schools outside the state try to come in and steal the great athletes away from Florida. And the leftovers - if you can call them that -- are pretty damn good themselves.'

Iowa State found one at Southridge High School in Miami -r Troy Davis is now on pace to become the first running back to rush for over 2,000 yards in two straight seasons.

Still, all three Florida schools do a remarkably good job of keeping the local talent. And there obviously is enough to go around.

Career Fair Success Tips

1) The 60-second commercial When you approach an employer, be prepared to give a 60-second commercial detailing what special skills you possess and specific interest areas you have. Your skills might include research and writing and critical thinking, for example. Proven leadership, strong work ethic, and resourcefulness are other examples of desirable skills. Mention, too, any committees which you have chaired or your role in student government or other organizations. You might also ask the employer where a person with your education and experience might fit into the organization.

2) Don't overlook unfamiliar organizations They could be a gold mine of opportunities. Also, don't assume certain organizations only offer one type of position like sales, for example. They may have many different opportunities for qualified applicants.

3) Ask for a brochure, business card, and follow up with a note of thanks

It's common courtesy to thank the employers for spending time with you. Also, find out when the organization will be coming to recruit on campus or what the timetable is for interviewing applicants.

4) Avoid being vague about your career plans When asked about your interests, be prepared to give a list of jobs in which you would be interested


