

### On MAC's biggest stage, Miami's Roethlisberger shines once again

On perhaps the biggest night in football history,

Roethlisberger stole the show.
The RedHawks' quarterback completed 26 of 35 passes for 440 yards, breaking Byron Leftwich's record of 426 yards in the 2001

MAC Championship game.

"That quarterback, he's a great player. I can't wait to play them when he's gone," Bowling Green head coach Gregg Brandon said.
"We had no answer for him. "We had no answer for him. When we did pressure him, he eluded it and found receivers, and they ran past us all day."

Two aspects of the game that Brandon said the Falcons had to control were turnovers and converting their scoring opportunities. Both aspects came back to haunt the Falcons in the second

Despite not having an answer Despite not having an answer for Roethlisberger and the RedHawk passing attack, the Falcons found themselves very much in the game at halftime. A 42-yard field goal by Shaun Suisham on the final play of the first half put the Falcons within four at 21-17 four at 21-17.

The second half is where the problems began. After moving

the ball to the Miami 47-yard line on the opening series, tailback P.J Pope fumbled the ball and Miami's Phil Smith recovered it at the BG 45-yard line. The RedHawks capitalized by moving the ball 45 yards in nine plays to go ahead 28-17.

On the following drive the Falcons once again turned the ball over on the RedHawk side of the field. And once again, Roethlisberger made the Falcons pay for their mistake. On the next play, he hit R.J. Corbin for a 33 yard pass to the Falcon 16-yard

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## Brandon disappointed in turnovers

Miami offense as the RedHawks won 49-27.

In the second half alone, Miami outscored BG 28-10.

Coach Gregg Brandon said it was the Falcons' turnover troubles that led to the loss, specifically the fumbles on two consecutive possessions in the third quar-

ter.
"You're not going to win if you and don't get turn the ball over and don't get any [turnovers]," Brandon said.
"They pretty much blew the game open after those two turnovers.

Yet when the game began, it looked like it was Josh Harris and the Falcons who would domi-

BG was able to hold Miami on its first possession, forcing a punt. Then the special teams came up big.

T.J. Carswell blocked the Miami punt, and BG took over on the Miami 3i.

It didn't take long for the Falcons to cash in.

Five plays into the drive, Falcon quarterback Josh Harris found Steve Sanders on a fifteen-yard running play. On the next play, Harris completed the drive with a six-yard touchdown run to give

the Falcons an early 7-0 lead. But Roethlisberger brought the RedHawks back, only giving the Falcons a preview of what was to

After Miami had driven to its own 47 and faced a first and 10, Roethlisberger went deep, finding a wide open Ryne Robinson for a touchdown to tie the score.

After both teams squandered scoring chances at the end of the first quarter, BG took the lead in the second quarter. Harris led the Falcons on an eight-play, 68-yard drive.

After a 28-yard pass from Harris to James Hawkins moved BG to the Miami seven, Harris found Charles Sharon over the middle on third down for his second touchdown pass of the game, and giving the Falcons a

Once again, it wouldn't take

Miami long to respond.

A 41-yard completion from Roethlisberger to Michael Larkin moved Miami to the BG 21. On the very next play, Roethlisberger found Matt Brandt for his second touchdown pass.

It was just the beginning for Roethlisberger, and for the BG defense

After BG was unable to convert a fourth down in Miami territory, Roethlisberger led the RedHawks on a nine-play, 69-yard drive, cul-minating in a 16-yard touchdown pass from Roethlisberger to

After the two teams traded turning the ball over on downs, BG mounted a last-second half drive, driving the ball to the Miami 25, where Shaun Suisham hit a 42-yard field goal as time expired in the first half, bringing BG to within four, 21-17.

In the second half, Falcon Ben turnovers and Roethlisberger made sure that the game would get no closer.

Still, after Miami had scored two touchdowns to take a 35-17 lead, it looked for a moment like BG would make a comeback.

Following Miami's fifth touchdown, BG responded with a drive to within the Miami 10, but was forced to settle for a 29-yard Suisham field goal to cut the Miami lead to 35-20.

BG then surprised the RedHawks with an onside kick, which Falcon Tim Arnold recovered.

The Falcons then drove to the Miami 27, but another turnover this time an interception by Matt Pusateri in the end zone put the game out of reach.

Roethlisberger shined in the win, setting a MAC championship record by throwing for 440 vards.

Miami added two more touchdowns, and won its first MAC championship since 1986.

Miami head coach Terry Hoeppner said he was proud of his players' performance.

"This is a storybook season," Hoeppner said. "This team has been spectacular."

A holding penalty put them back on the 18 and B.J. Lane was hit for a seven-yard loss on the following play. The Falcons would have to settle for a field goal.

The Falcons surprised the RedHawks with an onside kick that was recovered by Tim Arnold. However, the Falcons could not capitalize as Harris' pass was intercepted in the end zone by Matt Pusateri. Three plays later Roethlisberger put the Falcons away with a 55-yard touchdown pass to Cal Murray.

first bowl game since 1992 when they won the Las Vegas Bowl against Nevada.

Unlike the early announcement last year to include the University of Toledo in their bowl game, commissioners of the Motor City Bowl recognize the impact their timing has on team motivation, said J.D. Campbell, director of athletic communica-

According to Campbell, the Falcons have been focused on a MAC championship and the possibility of a bowl game has

kept them going.
"I think the MAC championship needs to mean somehe said. "With the uncertainty on the line going into the game, there's a sense of urgency that a team has to play with. I think in the future, bowls will let things play themselves out before offering a bid like they have the last two years against Toledo."

The team's participation in a bowl game will earn them their fifth nationally televised event this season. With such national exposure, it has been hard not to hear BG mentioned in even the oddest places, said Edward Whipple, vice president of Student Affairs.

"One of the neatest things is people talking about Bowling Green in places you wouldn't think they're talking about Bowling Green," he said. "A lot of students will be able to relate to a relative, to a friend, to someone talking about Bowling Green and that's because of the national vis-

Motor City Bowl representative Ken Hoffman said after last night's game that the delay was necessary, and that the game is happy to have Bowling Green participating.

"It really came down to that we wanted Bowling Green after the Toledo game," he said. "But this was a very special year in Mid-American Conference history, with three teams with 10

"It's great [to have Bowling Green]," Hoffman said. "It's been 11 years since Bowling Green has been in a bowl game ... We know there is a lot of excitement here, the team is fired up, and it's going to be great on Dec. 26.' The attention that a bowl

game brings will not only impact University athletics, but will also carry over into the academic realm, Whipple said.

"It's fantastic for the football team, but it's even more fantastic for the University," he said. "The football team is just an entrée to a greater visibility for the institution. We have some outstanding academic programs here and it's a chance to highlight those too."



## Northwestern U. professor honored for his assistance

### 12-year investigation changes jail policies

David Protess and his dogged students Northwestern students at Northwestern University's Medill School of Journalism have helped establish the innocence of eight prisoners wrongfully convicted of murder that led to the moratorium on the death penalty imposed by former Gov. George Ryan in 2000.

With the help of a \$100,000 prize Protess will receive Thursday, he can focus more on helping such individuals make the difficult transition to life once they're on the other side of the

"Most of these men have been wrongly kept in a cage for many years where they've experienced pent-up rage for being unjustifiably confined, and they've often lost their youth," Protess said.

Thursday, Protess is scheduled to receive the Puffin/Nation prize for Creative Citizenship, given jointly by the Puffin Foundation Ltd. of New Jersey and the Nation Institute, the New York City-based foundation started by the owners of The Nation, a liberal magazine. It's intended to recognize Americans who challenge the status quo "through distinctive,

# Residence Life should be more lenient in housing appeal process

Imagine you're a senior at Bowling Green State University wanting to finally move off campus. You've put in three and one half expensive years in on-campus housing, and now that you inally have a chance to live your last two semesters off campus, you're trapped in a non-negotiable housing contract.

Three fellow senior friends and I who have all lived on campus three and a half years finally have the chance to move off campus because we no longer hold positions in our sorority chapter. We all turned in appeal forms for personal reasons to the office of Residence Life on Nov. 18. Two of my friends were immediately notified they would be allowed to live off campus because they would be student teaching. However, my other friend and I had to wait the full two weeks to be notified we were denied our appeals because our personal reasons were not ade-

My friend who was denied has one semester to complete before she graduates. She informed the office of Residence Life that because she is a twin, on-campus housing is too expensive for her parents to afford. She is also having neurosurgery the week before Christmas and will not be allowed to climb stairs for four months. My friend lives on the third floor of our chapter house and there are no elevators to the second or third floors. She will also need help from her twin sister who is living off campus according to Residence Life. Even though her spot has all ready been filled in the house, my friend was still denied. My friend and her mother called Residence Life where they were treated rudely and my friend left her conversation crying. They told her mother she would have to write another letter to Disability Services where it could take up to five weeks to get any response. This letter will go straight back to the same people who denied her the first time.

Confused? So were we.

I appealed to live off campus because I would be in my methods classes. I'm 21 years old and I have simply outgrown my chapter's house, and I'm a senior who still has to park in overflow. When I called to ask for a face

when I caned to ask for a face to face interview with Amy O'Donnell in Residence Life, I was told she was completely booked. I asked to have an appointment with anyone in Residence Life, and they said everyone was completely booked. After I asked how there could be no open appointments, she said that it wasn't that everyone was booked; instead, no one was accepting appointments.

I then said I would take up the matter with President Ribeau's office. Magically, two review board members appeared in the Office of Residence Life. What luck for me. They went on to tell me that I was more than welcome to write another appeal, but if I used the same reasoning, they would both vote to deny me again. They told me the University does not regularly accept personal reasons as a means for moving off campus. Why is the personal form even an option then?

Plus, I was informed I'm not even allowed to attend the review board's session to defend my appeal. I don't understand how this is a fair process if I'm not even allowed to state my case face to face.

When my mother called the Office of Student Affairs they told her they have quiet, single room accommodations in junior and senior dorms where I wouldn't have to have a meal plan. The University wants me to leave all my friends behind, move into a freshman-sized dorm room where I know no one, and pay more money than where I'm paying to live now? Seems like cruel and unusual punishment to me. I refuse to accept myself as a commodity who can be trundled off to live wherever I'm

The University states that a housing contract is the equivalent of a full-year lease. However, I'd like to know that why, if it is a full year contract, I only received my housing assignment for the

fall semester of 2003? This notion is not conducive to a person remembering they've signed a contract for a full year. I've learned a valuable lesson in what it means to sign my name to a piece of paper. Call me what you will for not reading the fine print, but I refuse to see this situation happen to another individual.

Also, the consequence of

Residence Life's decision to deny my appeal may never fully be known to the University. First of all, I will have no hesitation in introducing myself to each and every tour group on campus. I will be more than happy to share my Residence Life ordeal with every incoming freshman I come in contact with. Secondly, I have a father who's a teacher of college preparatory classes and a brother who's a senior in high school. They'll be happy to share our family's discouraging experi-ence with the University's Office of Residence Life. My father is also an alumni of this University who's often donated money. My father will think long and hard before considering another donation to Bowling Green. Finally, I've contacted two area news channels and will be writing a letter to the Toledo Blade and my local newspaper to inform them of the hypocritical and condescending views of the Office of Residence Life.

In the end, I will have to file for disability reasons. It's a very personal reason that I did not want to bring to the attention of the entire world, but I have no other choice. If I'm denied again, I will continue my fight against the dictatorship of Residence Life. I don't want any younger members of this University to go through the same thing I have. I would be more than happy to receive information from or discuss the other lies I've been told by Residence life with others who've had disputes with

In the end, I don't want to sound infantile; however, after spending approximately \$45,000 so far on my education, without books, I don't feel it's that much for the university to give up \$2,000 in housing fees rather than forcing a patron of this University to live in an extremely uncomfortable housing situation.

## 'Will and Grace' does not hold true for all

The average American television viewer is more than happy to laugh at all these boys' antics and quick wit. Yet most viewers are hard-pressed to actually discuss the inequalities queer people experience in society. After the Massachusetts ruling on gay marriage, media polls claim that the majority of Americans oppose gay marriage. Maybe the poll should ask "Do you think Jack should propose to Will if the "Fab 5" handle the ceremony?" I bet those numbers would be different.

Stereotypes, as true as they may be for some of us, do not help anyone. I hear the claim that it is a celebration of diversity within the community. This is a lunatic's remark. When all of the shows have a consistent character type, all the media does is narrow the American public's actual experience of the queer community.

These stereotypes allow for an unreal person to be formed in every living room in America. If we would actually try to diversify character types of queer people for the average American, maybe we could make some progress. But I have yet to see a show talking about the lives of rural queer people or even an episode where someone says "I don't really like the clubs; I think I will stay in and read." That, of course, is a formula for bad TV.

I am not trying to say that these shows should be banned from the air, but we should try to reinforce the position that they are not the flagships for representing the queer community. Stereotypes may break a few barriers in the short run, but only create much larger schisms for the future.

## Yankees make a deal for Vazquez

NEW YORK — The New York Yankees made their first big move of the offseason, bolstering their rotation by agreeing yesterday to acquire Javier Vazquez from the Montreal Expos.

In exchange for the 27-yearold right-hander, New York sent first baseman Nick Johnson, outfielder Juan Rivera and left-hander Randy Choate to Montreal.

The deal is contingent on all the players passing physicals, the Expos said. New York did not immediately acknowledge the trade.

"It's tough to trade a pitcher like Javier Vazquez, but I think we have a better opportunity with the situation going forward," Expos general manager Omar Minaya said at a news conference in Montreal.

Vazquez fills one of the holes in the Yankees' starting rotation. He went 13-12 with a 3.24 ERA for the Expos last season, ranking third in the NL in strikeouts with 241 in 230 2-3 innings.

He's three years younger than
Bartolo Colon; a free agent that
attracted the Yankees' interest.

New York's rotation, the backbone of its run to four World Series titles and six AL pennants since 1995, is unsettled. Roger Clemens retired, and Andy

After two tough road losses, the Bowling Green men's basketball team will return home to the friendly venue of Anderson Arena where they are 2-0 this season.

The Falcons suffered back-toback defeats on the road when they visited Bradley and Mid-American Conference foe Buffalo — the Buffalo loss was the worse of the two, as it was the first loss ever by a BG team to Buffalo.

And even though this weekend's matchup with

Northwestern is a home game, it couldn't have c0me at a worse time for the Falcons, whose play has been lackluster up to this point.

Head coach Dan Dakich states it simply when talking about this weekend's matchup.

"If we're not ready, we're going to get killed," he said. "I'm hoping this stretch will help us prepare for conference play."

But the game is important to the Falcons as it will bring a Big Ten team to Anderson Arena, a feat which Dakich is quite impressed with.

"Short of me giving birth, get-

ting a Big Ten team here is the second most impossible thing ever," he said jokingly. "There is nothing to gain by them from doing it."

The Wildcats come in with a 3-3 record with each of their losses coming against top notch opponents including Florida State and Colorado.

Northwestern will be led into the game by a core of six players that average over six points per game. Their leading scorers are their guards Jitim Young and T.J. Parker, both play over 37 minutes per game. Young comes into the game averaging 18.3 points and 6.8 rebounds per game. Parker is averaging 11.2 points and 3.8 assists per game.

Needless to say, the Wildcats are not the team the Falcons would most like to face at this point in the season, a season that has not panned out for the Falcons the way Dakich had hoped.

"It's ridiculous to play the way we've played as hard as we work and get after things," he said. "We've got a long way to go to be a good basketball team."

The Falcons will look to many players to score for them as eight of them are averaging over five points per game. Ron Lewis has led the Falcons with 17.3 points per night, but he failed to start against Buffalo. Forward John Reimold is the second leading scorer with 15.5 points per game, but he is injured. And Kevin Netter is the third leading scorer at 11.5 points per contest, but he has been in consistently in foul trouble.

"We're not a very good basketball team right now," Dakich said.

The Falcons will try to live up to their preseason expectations this Saturday when Northwestern comes to town.

## Taylor recuperates from staph infection

BEREA, Ohio (AP) - The tiny scratch on Ben Taylor's right elbow was no big deal. It wasn't even big enough to warrant a Band-Aid.

The Cleveland Browns' second-year linebacker figured it was just like countless other scrapes and nicks he had gotten

during a lifetime playing football. Taylor was tough, and this was nothing.

Never would he have imagined the seemingly innocent scratch could have killed him.

"A little scratch," Taylor said, examining the bandage covering 12 stitches in the 3 1/2-inch inci-sion in his arm. "It's crazy how things go sometimes.'

Taylor is still recuperating from a staph infection in his elbow that required him to undergo two operations and led to a five-day stay in the hospital.

Two weeks ago, Taylor figured he had the flu when he awoke in the middle of the night with a slight fever and body aches. He went to the Browns' training facility the next morning, intent on practicing. But he began feeling worse during team meetings one day before the Browns played the Pittsburgh Steelers.

"My body started to shut down," he said. "I was going to go out and practice and figured I'd get checked out afterward. I'm kind of lucky that I didn't."

Taylor told the Browns' medical staff he wasn't feeling well, and after examining him, they decided to transport him to the Cleveland Clinic, By the time he arrived at the hospital, Taylor said he was shaking from a high fever



Credit Lewis, who has taught them how to focus on what's important and ignore everything else.

The Yankees' rotation includes Mike Mussina, Jose Contreras, Jeff Weaver and Jon Lieber, who hasn't pitched in the major leagues since reconstructive elbow surgery in August 2002 but hopes to be ready for the start of the season.

Johnson, 25, played first base for much of last season because of Jason Giambi's knee injury after starting the season as the regular designated hitter. While he's regarded as a top hitter— he batted .284 with 14 homers, 47 RBIs and a .422 on-base percentage - he has been injury prone throughout his career.

Rivera, 25, hit .266 with seven homers and 26 RBIs in 173 atbats and has a strong throwing

Choate, 28, pitched only 32-3 innings over five relief appearances for the Yankees last season, compiling a 7.36 ERA. He went 3-5 with one save and a 3.91 ERA in 54 games at Triple-A Columbus.

Montreal, which is owned by

Moreover, the lead character, Irish O'Flanagan played by Tiffany Trainer, has a spunk that can get irritating. She can be compared to a 1940s Scrooge in New York. She's unhappy, which could leave an audience infuriated.

O'Flanagan parades on stage to open the show with Irish, as she was called in the early 1930s began as a blossoming, spunky girl who had her heart set on marrying her oldest friend, Eddie.

As the story goes, her mother is very ill, her father forces her to work in a zipper factory and she is all-around unhappy. Her friend, Cookie Gibbs, informs Irish of her night job at the night club as a "stripper." Irish inevitably becomes a night club dancer and contin-

ues to become a huge star. Her ego becomes larger and so does her attitude. Her humble demeanor diminishes as she becomes encompassed with herself, her personality and her wealth and greed.

But alas! An angel, Albert, played by Matthew Russell, comes to her rescue. Or does he? He is sent by God to make

things right for Irish. almost feel sorry for this lost woman. In addition, the other characters are in an uncomfortable midst of Irish's forfei-

The audience will begin to feel distant until the angel, Albert, appears. Albert seems to soothe tension with humor.

The actors in seemed compliant with a very strained script. They portrayed their characters with enough effervescence to develop their characters further than the writer had intended.

"Times Square Angel" can be compared to "A Christmas Carol" by Charles Dickens. Only, "Times Square Angel" seems desperate for approval.

with his friend Aaron Calafato. "We had a lot of fun doing it," Ellison said.

For Ellison, this was his most challenging film he has worked on during his young career. This film was 10 minutes longer than any other film he has done, and required more than double the amount of special effects compared to his last film.

With each film I do, the stakes get higher," Ellison said. He was most proud of a scene that took place in a science lab between the characters Dr. Ross and Kolker. This scene demonstrated good acting and good technical

As another bonus surprise, Andy Lyon and Mike Bahurinsky put together some amazing special effects for the film. "I am really proud of how the visual effects turned out," Ellison said.

Even though the sci-fi thriller movie "Alien" is Ellison's favorite horror film, he was not influenced by it during the filming of "Full Moon Fevor." Rather, the largest influences rather, came from the "Evil Dead" series of films and Peter Jackson's somewhat comical horror movie

Ellison doesn't know if his film is going to make audiences scream or even jump out of their seat, but that wasn't his goal when he started it. "I think there is going to be lots of laughs and amazement," Ellison said.

During the making of the film, Ellison learned from his mistakes more than anything else. He quickly found out that directing isn't as easy as it might sound.

"I didn't realize how much a director had to know about acting," Ellison said. He learned that to be an effective director one

must be able to communicate with his/her actors using terms they understand.

Looking back to when he made his first film in high school, Ellison never imagined he would be premiering a horror film at the Cla-Zel in Bowling Green. "I had no idea there was even a Cla-Zel theater in Bowling Green," Ellison said with a smile on his face.

Now that the film is in its final stages, Ellison has begun to work on promoting it. Large posters will be put up around town next week, and posters promoting the fundraiser are already up.

"It is actually getting a lot of hype," Ellison said. Many people have already heard about the film through word of mouth, according to Ellison.

He has even put together two Web sites this week to help promote the film at www.jayellison.com/fullmoonfevor and www.jayellison.com.

As most people would imagine, Ellison is a little bit nervous about the first screening of his film. When premiering a film, he usually ends up standing in the back of the theater because he is so nervous about how the audience will react.

"It's a little nerve-racking and exciting at the same time," Ellison said. If the audience doesn't react how he thought they would, then he feels like he didn't do his job. He had a lot fun making this

horror film, and would not be opposed to making another one sometime in his future.

Ego Tripping at the Gates of Hell is a seven-song EP that is, drugs or no drugs, the soundtrack of our dreams. The songs are fleeting and too short, vague and wispy, but most of all, com-pletely delightful. The opening track,



## Close to 800 will preview BGSU

The University will put its best foot forward tommorrow as hundreds of prospective students come to the University's Preview

Prospective students will have the opportunity to tour campus, see residence halls and learn about academic programs and finacial aid options during Preview Day.

As of yesterday, approximately 758 students were registered for Preview Day and between 75-100 students normally do walk-in registration the day of the event, according to David Rice, associate director of the Office of Admissions

Rice said students learn more by visiting a college campus than by any other promtional material, such as a brochure or video. "Preview Day shows students what the campus is really like,"

"Students get to see the stu-dent body and notice things like

'Do people smile, or look at me and divert their eyes?'... the visit is the most important piece of the entire selection process," Rice

Rice descried Preview Day as becoming more of a 'family affair,' in which parents, grandparents and siblings accompany students to tour campus.

Students and families can attend walking tours of campus that will run from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tours will leave from the first-floor hallway in the union by the Black Swamp Pub and last about an hour.

Students can also view resi-dence halls also between the times of 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

If students are unsure of what major they would like to pursue they can meet with over 100 academic departments and student services from 9:30 a.m. to noon in the Lenhart Grand Ballroom and the Multi-Purpose Room in the student union.

Meeting with a faculty mem-ber and talking one-on-one

about an area of study might make all the difference for a student considering the University, Rice said.

Community organizations will also play a role in this year's Preview Day. Representatives from Campus Ministry, Mainstreet BG and the Bowling Green Fire Department will also be present in the Lenhart Grand Ballroom to meet with students and their families.

Prospective students may also be interested to know that if they enter the University next fall they may be included in a new scholarship program that includes scholarships for academic achievers, scholarship grants for students who live in Michigan and scholarships for students who demonstrate economic

Chad Niezgoda, a student financial aid office employee, said students are most concerned with their eligiblity for scholarships and grants. "Then the next thing is loans, and what

is the quickest way to go about receiving them," Niezgoda said.

The student financial aid office will conduct information sessions at 10:30 a.m., 11:15 a.m. and noon in the union theater. Information sessions will discuss the "financial aid basics" as well as scholarships, according to

Niezgoda. Although Preview Day will receive the help of resident adviers and student tour guides, students not invloved with Preview Day can help in their own way, Rice said.

"If students see someone with that look of 'where am I?' — help them out," Rice said. "Be prepared to share experiences, such as why you are here and where you are from," Rice said. "You only get one chance to make a good first impression.'

Rice's hope for the next open house, which is on President's Day, is to organize a student organization fair that highlights student organizations on cam-


