# Copper Beech stop adds time

South off-campus bus picks up students at new apartments

With the addition of a south offcampus bus stop at the Copper Beech Townhomes, an estimated seven to 10 minutes has been tacked on to the route.

The change - which began this week — was the result of a number of University students that live at the East Court Street complex requesting the service.

And although the stop is temporary through the end of the month, it could become permanent if the amount of shuttle riders increases, according to Jim Wiegand, University police chief.

"If we're not getting more riders, we're not gaining anything," Wiegand said, "If I pick up 50 people from Copper Beech and I lose 50 from other streets, I didn't gain anything."

The south shuttle route pro-

vides an average of 100,000 rides a year proving the service is essential to students.

But shuttle driver Marilyn Hamnan fears regular riders will be frustrated by the lengthened route and stop using the service.

"Some of the kids on the regular route are getting irritated and are not riding," Hamnan said. "I have a feeling I'll lose more here than I get out there (Copper

Beech) unless things change."

During the first day of operation, 19 students of 606 total riders were picked up at Copper Beech, said Shuttle Service Manager Fred Smith.

Although those students accounted for just 3.1 percent of the day's riders, the shuttle service is striving to adapt to the continuous development of houses and apartment complexes around Bowling Green.

"We've modified over the years to suit the needs of the town and this is just one more of those modifications," Smith said.

For students like Adam Hook junior, who live at Copper Beech, the bus offers a convenient way to get to campus quickly - and saves fuel.

"It's nice to have the bus with gas the way it is," Hook said.

Ray Hawkins, junior and also a resident of the complex, refuses to drive and rode his bike to campus prior to the change in the shuttle route.

But Hawkins is concerned he

# Controversies brew over zoning opt

Development next to I-75 causes student outcry, vote to be held

A development on the east side of 1-75 surrounding Meijer has sparked controversy as to how it should be zoned — residential, commercial, agricultural or industrial.

On November 3, Bowling Green voters will decide how the land should be developed.

The 26 acres is currently zoned for agricultural purposes, but Bowling Green Citizens For Smart Growth — an organization that promotes a high qual-ity and character of life — fear it will turn residential or into restaurants.

Local resident Christine Drennen said the master plan suggested that this area be slated

for industrial and commercial

"How you get from agricul-ture to multi-family zoning would be two opposite ends of the spectrum for land use. They need to stay to the master plan, she said.

Brooke Blessing, junior, would like to see more commercial stores and restaurants fill the area.

"We need close shopping," Blessing said. "I would like to see outlet stores, Kohls, Target, Olive Garden, and Friday's to fill that area.

Restaurants are exactly what some fear will lead to the failure. "We have watched restaurants

come and go on that side of town and there's a reason for their failure," said David McClough, professor of economics at the University. "This is not an opti-mal development plan to bring tax revenue to Bowling Green."

But B.J. Fischer, president of

City Council, favors the rezoning due to its potential benefits to the area.

"I voted for the rezoning out by Meijer, residential and retail,' Fischer said. "A lot of people in the community want to see retail and restaurant development. This development, I believe, would strengthen the community."

McClough, along with Bowling Green Citizens for Smart Growth fear that if the area becomes residential and retail it will be hard to attract industries

"You don't put heavy industry with residents for a reason," McClough said. "Whenever new zoning is proposed you ask, 'What will rezoning do to the traffic in the area?' Also, Will police, fire and rescue response times remain the same everywhere?

"We really care about the people and community," Schaller said. "It's not just about doing hair ... we have the opportu-



# Site moves forward

Despite innovations, initial reactions to new MyBGSU lacking

The new MyBGSU web por-tal, which expands on the University's Blackboard Learning Environment, may be just the beginning of many new technology options offered to students in the near future.

In the immediate future, students can be on the lookout for changes that focus on technical improvements, rather than software, said Cindy Fuller, Communications Coordinator at the Office of the Chief Information Officer.

a focus," said Fuller. She added that the University would like to see more wireless hot spots around campus, as well access to additional applications "on a 24 x 7" basis.

Yet, using initial reactions to the MyBGSU upgrades as a barometer for the future would offer less than stellar results.

"I think it's harder to use, especially with the three separate columns, I just think there's too much to it, a lot more confusing," said Tara Mullins, senior. "I know for myself and a lot of my friends, they're still using that Traditional Blackboard link

Mullins' concerns were often echoed by other students.

"I really don't care for it that much, it's very cluttered, it's hard to find things ... I'm a [computer science] major and it seems like it violates a lot of the rules we

have for Web sites and such," said Andrew Kuntz, senior. Sophomore Daniel Martin

was even less enthused. "I hate it, I think it's horrible,"

he said. But the University has not

become discouraged. After some initial technical hiccups — most notably lon-ger waiting times — the new MyBGSU system seems to be

running smoothly. Bruce Petryshak, chief information officer for BGSU's Technology Information Services, credits his team for quickly responding to complaints, placing most of the blame on the 32,000 unique logons that the system was faced



shuttle services. The short extension in the route could potentially decrease

Growing up on the west coast, Sader learned to prepare food with a different style than

other restaurants. El Mercado, which opened the first week of May, offers chips and salsa, nachos, a spiced shrimp salad, tacos, burritos, tortillas ensaladas, and authentic Mexican drinks.

Students can expect a typi-cal meal at El Mercado and Qdoba to cost around \$6 or \$7, including a drink.

But the quality of food is worth the price, Shihadeh said.

No food is frozen and guacamole is made fresh daily.

"Everything is made to order fresh," she said.

As an escape from classes and the stress of college, Annie Crabill, sophomore, likes not only the food at Qdoba, but also the atmosphere.

"I keep coming back," Crabill said. "It does not feel like BG here.



# igh court must ensure diversity

As if there weren't enough tension in politics last fall during the presidential election, students return to campus on the preci-pice of political history in the making, this time surrounding the U.S. Supreme Court. President Bush should take

care in selecting his second nominee, and make sure to preserve the ideological diversity of the Rehnquist court.

Until the passing of U.S. Chief Justice William Rehnquist last weekend, it seemed that the

nomination process for John Roberts—who was to take the place of retiring Justice Sandra Day O'Connor — would begin this week with relatively little

inter-party strife. But now that Bush has nominated Roberts for the position of chief justice, this week's confirmation hearings promise to grow more intense, as will the anticipation of whom Bush will nominate to fill O'Connor's stillvacant seat.

A great deal lies in the balance. If confirmed by the Senate, Roberts would become the youngest chief justice since John Marshall.

There are many pending

issues to be concerned about, and no citizen is immune to the influence of the court's rulings. During the past decades, 5-4 rulings have dictated the norm for many mainstream issues including reproductive rights, voting regulations and discrimination, corporate responsibility and the environment.

In promoting Roberts, Bush has altered the shape of the nomination process from how it appeared earlier this summer.

As a former clerk of the late

Rehnquist, it can be inferred that Roberts will continue his prede-cessor's conservative ideological legacy, bringing the core issue of the judicial nomination season back to the forefront — the future balance of the Supreme Court without O'Connor.

Certainly, Bush has earned the right to select a nominee who will undoubtedly reflect his beliefs.

Yet the judicial process extends beyond labels of conservative or liberal - it is about the quality of judicial review and the integrity of the decisionmaking process.

Now that Bush nominated

Roberts, he has the opportunity to bring someone new to the table, and not select another nominee with the same philosophy as Roberts.

Choosing judges with varying judicial philosophies on the key issues of the day will ensure that decisions regarding the highest laws of our country are given proper debate.

# Smith a hit on Falcon defense

It wasn't quite the 'shot heard around the world,' but when Wisconsin quarterback John Stocco was sidelined after tak-ing a vicious hit Saturday, more than a few people took notice of the true freshman who delivered it.

Meet Antonio Smith. Age 18. Starting cornerback for BGSU.

Mere months after graduat-ing from high school, the 5foot-10, 170-pound Florida native found himself on an ESPN televised game trying to contain his excitement from

the big play.
"Afterwards 1 wanted to go crazy, but I didn't want to get a 15-yard penalty for celebra-tion," Smith said. "The first thing that came to my mind was my mom at home. I know

she was watching."
Although he is one of the youngest members of the team, Smith already feels comfortable on the field. His performance Saturday during BG's 56-42 loss proved that to everyone else.

'I believe it proved that I can play just as well as any other guy on the team," Smith said. "I don't think they see me as a freshman anymore, it's just, you know, a regular player on their team. Teams that play against us might still put that freshman label on me, but I think [my teammates] trust me.

Falcon defensive backs coach, John Bowers, has that same confidence in his young player, even when he's playing in front of an 82,000-plus crowd in his first game.

"For a true freshman, he played very consistent and really has had a great savvy for the game at this point, which is unusual for a guy that young," Bowers said. "You never know how a kid's going to react, but you just get a gut feeling about him, that he's going to play the same way no matter where he's located."

Smith felt BG was a good fit for him after his first visit to campus

"The team had this unity, everybody had each other's back," he said. "I felt like this was the right place for me. The only thing I was worried about was the cold weather. I'm not looking forward to it.

Some of his goals before he graduates include earning All-American honors and following in the footsteps of some of his role models by serving as team captain.

"I look up to Steve Sanders, Omar [Jacobs], Charles Sharon, Jelani Jordan, Rob Warren, those guys," Smith said. "Most of them are seniors. They've been here, they work hard all the time, and I'm trying to get on their level.'

Smith, who recorded six tackles in Saturday's game, enjoys playing on defense, and after his big hit on Stocco, the Falcons are glad he's on their

"I like defense because I like to hit people, and just stop peo-ple from doing things," Smith said. "Like I'm in control."

# Lovett gets defensive about D Coordinator vows for improvement from Wisconsin loss

It is safe to say new defensive coordinator John Lovett did not envision his first game with the Falcons going as poorly as it did against Wisconsin. The defense, which acted more like speed bumps than road blocks, as dominated both by the Badgers' bigger offensive line and by transfer running back, Brian Calhoun.

Asked whether he was dis-appointed, coach Lovett did not equivocate.

"You're damn right I'm disappointed. I mean it's not for me as the defensive coordinator, I'm disappointed for the kids that didn't play well and I'm disappointed for the fans," he said. "Hell, our offense scored [42 points] and we didn't win the game. That is not going to be the MO of this defense.

Calhoun rushed for 258 yards and five touchdowns. His backup, Booker Stanley, gained 106 yards on only 14 carries and also scored a touchdown.

Not counting Wisconsin's 4 second possession right before halftime, the Badgers were able to score touchdowns on six consecutive possessions.

To improve on the lacklus-

ter showing against Wisconsin, Lovett said he planned to "go back to the drawing board" by emphasizing things such as tackling, getting off blocks and overall execution

"We didn't finish plays well."

he said. "That was a very good back we had a hard time tackling. Their offensive line was very good, but again we didn't execute some fundamentals and techniques as I hoped we vould. I put that on myself."

Although he was disappoint-ed, Lovett said he expected a few growing pains in the first game, as the team adjusted to a new defensive coordinator, and he adjusted to getting used to

some of the players.

Lovett, who served in the same capacity at Clemson from 2002-04, said not being around during the spring meant he is still evaluating some talent and trying to put them in the best

possible positions to succeed. However, the defeat at Wisconsin didn't dampen his spirits or lower his confidence in how good the defense can be

"We're all grounded a little bit better, and we have an idea about where everybody [is] at," he said. "We're going to get bet-ter this week and we're going to continue to get better as the eason goes on." Even though there were

lot of questions about the Falcons' new secondary fea-turing rookie Antonio Smith starting at cornerback and Terrill Mayberry shifting over to starting free safety, Lovett thought they did well.

"I tried to protect them at times and not put them in bad situations," he said. "They just have to get used to being there and the speed of the game and playing together as a unit."

Lovett vowed for a much better performance from the defense against Ball State on Saturday.

"I think we can make a big jump this week and next week to really improve," he said.

He was looking forward to the contest against Ball State because it represents an even bigger challenge than Wisconsin.

"The game this week is more important than Wisconsin, this is a MAC game," Lovett said. "Our goal is to win the MAC. This is the beginning of the real season. The preseason


That got the attention of the Longhorns and their fans. Carpenter hasn't spoken to reporters since, but Schlegel jumped to his friend's defense



# Jacobs among all-time MAC elite

If he continues to be successful as a football coach, it's unlikely Gregg Brandon will ever use his education degree for its intended purpose.

But what a great Reverse Psychology professor the coach would make.

The third-year BG coach has routinely received positive results when he makes a pessimistic prediction about his sensational junior quarterback, Omar Jacobs.

When Jacobs visited BG on a recruiting trip during a blistering-cold January day, Brandon, the prognosticator, knew the native of

Florida would opt to play in a warmer environment.

Then, in Jacobs' first collegiate start last year at Oklahoma, Brandon believed his signal caller would be intimidated by the raucous Sooner crowd. He went as far as to say he felt sorry for Jacobs at the time.

Here's to hoping we don't see

Brandon's face anywhere near an "Omar Jacobs for Heisman" campaign ad.

"We're standing on the sideline at Oklahoma, and I get the headset on, and I can't even hear it's so loud," Brandon said of the season opener in Norman. "I look at Omar

and think 'holy smokes' this is this guy's first game as a college football quar-terback. And look where he is."

Or look anywhere in Northwest, Ohio for that matter. The publicity Jacobs has received since throwing for 218 yards and a pair of touchdowns in that 40-24 loss to Oklahoma has been

unparalleled by any athlete that has come before him at the university.

Jacobs finished his first season at BG as the successor to now Cleveland Browns quarterback Josh Harris, with a stat line that may have NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue announcing his name early in April's draft.

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Jacobs' 4,002 passing yards set a school mark, while his 41 touchdown throws and four interceptions are Mid-American Conference records. Jacobs also proved to be of the prototype mold by rushing for 300 yards and four scores, while showing his elusiveness in being sacked a league-low 10 times.

And it all started during that early September game when Jacobs and the Falcons stood tough before falling to the eventual Big 12 champion.

"Most definitely. That was a huge confidence booster playing with the Heisman winner (Jason White) from the year before," said Jacobs, the reigning MAC Offensive Player of the Year. When I was out there playing, I was like 'I can play with these guys.' That was a confidence booster throughout the whole

Jacobs began last year not exactly knowing why he was on the same field as a Heisman winner. He'll start this season as a dark horse candidate for the same honor. The humble, if not shy Jacobs appears receptive to the thought of leaving early for the NFL, but it's a situation he will address more as the season progresses. Right now, he's welcoming the comparisons drawn between he and some of the elite professional quarterbacks who got their starts in the MAC, including Byron Leftwich, Chad Pennington and Ben Roethlisberger.

The similarities Jacobs has received aren't patented to MAC alumnus, though. He garnered a couple more Oct. 2., in what may go down as possibly his best collegiate game. Jacobs torched Big East's Temple for 367 yards and four scores on 21-of-26 passing in the Falcons' 70-16 laugher over the Owls.

By halftime, Jacobs had already made a case to be named MAC Player of the Week by throwing for 242 yards and three scores all the while he connected on 16-consecu-

"The game he had against us - he stacks up around the best of them," said Temple coach Bobby Wallace, whose team will become a member of the MAC in 2007. "He's not quite the runner of Michael Vick, so I'd say he reminds me more of Donovan McNabb. He's very accu-

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rate, mobile, big. I don't think he's going to rush for 1,000 vards, but at the same time he can use his feet to get out of trouble."

So what possibly can Jacobs do for an encore? A season like he had in 2004, in which he passed for 300 yards in eight of the Falcons' 12 games, can only make for a letdown this year. Brandon, though, thinks

he has a solution to the "problem."

"The one thing we need to do is win a (league) championship," Brandon said. "We'll challenge Omar to take us as far as he can take us."

How far? Brandon didn't specify. Apparently, he's learned not to make forecasts when talking about Jacobs.

### BG Falcons: Running Backs

Bowling Green has quite a onetwo punch in the backfield in seniors PJ. Pope and B.J. Lane. Pope has consistently been one of the most productive running backs in the nation over the last two seasons, compiling over 1,000 rushing yards and over 400 yards receiving each year.

Perhaps instead of calling Jacobs "The Fantastic Four"

this season we should calling start him Batman, because Pope is certainly his Robin. Pope's versatility vital for the Falcon offense to get going. Without an established

the passing game can stagnate,
In that sense he is the perfect

Pope's backup, Lane is more than capable in the Falcon backfield. Lane has run for over 1,000 yards and a 5.5 run per carry average over his thee-year career in Bowling Green.

While both backs have the speed to turn the corner, Pope is more of a north-south runner and Lane is an elusive slashing tailback.

Waiting in the wings are junior Dan Macon and freshman Chris Bullock. Bullock has already turned a lot of heads with a standout spring performance.

# BG looks for revenge against Rockets

The 2004 Mid-American champions, and BGSU's ultimate arch-rival, the Toledo Rockets come to town on Nov. 22 in what may become one of this season's pivotal games, one that could send one or the other to the 2005 MAC Championship game.

The Rockets will come ready to ultimately defend their crown when they travel south-bound on I-75 to

face a Falcons team that is more prepared than ever to deny UT a chance to get their third title in the last five years.

BG and UT are both on the radar this season, being named the two top non-BCS sleepers, according to ESPN's College Gameday. Both could easily end up top-25 teams.

Last season the Rockets led one of the greatest comebacks in school history to defeat BGSU in a Nov. 23 game at the Glass Bowl, which gave them the bid to advance to the MAC Championship game. In that game, UT came out with their backs to the wall and withstood a 27-7 halftime deficit. They scored 35 unanswered points in the second half to take over the lead and did not look back as they shockingly rolled to a 49-41 victory.

This year the Falcons hope to put this painful memory behind them, and work toward another MAC-title run in 2005.

This season, UT comes back with 14 returning starters, including eight on offense and six on defense.

The Rockets return with one of the most accomplished quarterbacks in school history, Bruce Gradkowski.

Gradkowski was one of the most efficient passers in the nation last season, completing roughly 70 percent of his passes and has already thrown for a school-record 56 touchdown passes in his two years as a starter.

UT will showcase other top performers and All-MAC candidates, such as running back Trinity Dawson and wide receiver Steve Odom on offense, Anthony Jordan

and David Thomas at linebacker, and defensive backs Keon Jackson and Nigel Morris.

The Falcons will have to respond on defense, and avoid another meltdown like the one that disallowed a chance to go to the MAC-title game.

Though BG has the weapons on offense to get it done, the Falcon D will have to face a passing offense that is just as efficient as theirs, and a running game that is a consistent threat every year.

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# Timchenko not afraid to follow Suisham

Things could not have possibly looked more auspicious for the BGSU football team entering fall camp.

The Falcons were the preseason

pick to win the Mid-American Conference and returned the majority of an offense that routinely beat opposing defenses into submission a year ago en route to a 9-3 record.

There was a kicker entering this season, though. They didn't have one.

Graduated was Shaun Suisham, who set school records for career points (361), points in a season (111) and career field goals (45).

Enter Joe Timchenko, a fifth-year senior with no big game experi-

ence on his resume. Furthermore, Timchenko, a transfer from Pasadena City College, was recruited to BG as a punter, not a kicker.

"I think the biggest aspect of my game as far as what I need to improve on is mentally," Said Timchenko,

who hails from Glendora, Calif. "With five years of (college) experience, I think I'm definitely ready."

If the last day of camp was any indication, Timchenko is feeling quite comfortable in his new starting role. He kicked a 47-yard field goal in the wind on the second drive of the team's final preseason scrimmage. Timchenko made all but one of his six extra point

attempts during BG's 56-42 loss at Wisconsin on Saturday.

goal he made during the scrimmage," BG coach Gregg Brandon said. "That was a tough kick with the cross wind."

Timchenko, like his predecessor Suisham, will certainly have plenty of opportunities to score points this season on a prolific BG offense, which is spotlighted by stalwart quarterback Omar Jacobs and a plethora of talented receivers.

Timchenko, who was never seriously challenged for the kicking job heading into the season, converted a 40-yard field goal against Southeast Missouri State —his only attempt of the season — in BG's second game last year. Stuck behind Suisham, who was recently released by the Pittsburgh Steelers, Timchenko used 2004 as a chance of getting accustomed to the Division I game.

"Obviously, anybody if you're putting in that kind of work wants to be out there and playing." Timchenko said. "It wasn't that difficult because of the kid Shaun Suisham was. I take it more as a learning experience than anything.

"I was down a few times and he just told me that the biggest thing is to have fun," he continued. "He just kept me focused and having a good time."

Despite the large void he is being asked to fill, Timchenko isn't concerned about duplicating Suisham's impressive statistics. Instead, he's aiming on becoming another variable in one of college football's most dynamic offenses.

"To be honest, I really don't even think about it," Timchenko said of being the heir apparent to a potential NFL kicker. "The only person I need to compete with is myself. I have high standards for myself. Obviously, Sean's a great kicker, but I need to stay within my capabilities and that's what I intend on doing."

During his senior year at Arroyo High School, Timchenko connected on four-of-five field goals and averaged 43 yards per punt. In addition to his special teams roles, he played defensive end and tight end and helped his team win the Mission Conference championship. He's hoping his senior year in college also culminates in a league championship.

## **Ball State Cardinals**

They then have to face an improving Boston College team two weeks later.

Another factor is the Cardinals will be missing their star running back and reigning MAC Freshman of the Year Adell Givens. Givens was dismissed from the team for academic reasons.

The good news is that the MAC West is up in the air as teams will be fighting for third place after mainstays Toledo and Northern Illiniois.

Ball State has some continuity and experience on their roster that Central Michigan, Western Michigan and Eastern Michigan lack.

"Winning is a process that takes

time," said third year coach Brady Hoke. "We have made progress in each of the last two seasons, and we are really excited about the 2005 campaign."

If they manage to squeak through their first six games with more than just one win against Western Michigan to show for it, they have a chance to secure third place in the West and keep building toward more success.

With the departure of former Falcon center Scott Murkowski to the NFL, Warren realizes he needs to be the leader of the Falcon offensive line.


"I feel like I'm the oldest guy in the group now," he said. "I feel like I have to pick up where Scottie left off, you know and just start leading these guys."



The Owls won't get much time to get used to the MAC, facing three of its toughest teams this year — Bowling Green, Miami and Toledo. Their remaining schedule is just as brutal. Temple's 2005 opponents went a combined 83-48 last year eight played in a bowl game.

Temple's goal will be to play spoilers to a lot of quality teams this season, but in reality they are more likely to just be punching bags.

They have inexperience at key positions, average talent at most of the skill positions and a defense that is relying more on experience than success to hang its hat on going into the 2005 season.

The Falcons should dominate the Owls defense and their offense has not shown itself to be a big enough threat to compete with the 30+ points the Falcons are liable to put on them.

#### **BG Falcons: Defensive line**

The defensive line has been at a consistent successful level for many years now, even though they don't get the recognition of the quarterback and receivers.

The two starting defensive ends will be Devon Parks and Brad Williams. Both are quality players with different specialties. Parks is a terrifically quick player with fast and active

feet. He has a lot of experience, playing in every game since his arrival here as a freshman. Williams is being converted from a defensive tackle to a defensive end, but should have no problem excelling. He is a terrific run stuffer, but doesn't get

into the backfield as much as his counterpart, Parks.

Starting at defensive tackle will be senior Monte Cooley. Cooley is a nice veteran, who is moving from a key reserve into the starting rotation. He possesses good quickness and the ability to hunt down the man with the ball and make the tackle.

Mike Thaler returns as the starting nose guard and should be as solid as usual on the line. He is the biggest member of a modest-size defensive line, weighing in at 289 pounds. He is a strong, powerful player with a good head for the game.



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### **BG Falcons: Offensive line**

This might have been the biggest question mark when the Falcons entered camp before the season, but the coaching staff seems to be pleased with the way the situation has sorted itself out.

Three starters from 2004 are gone including the anchor of the O-line, center Scott Mruczkowski. Stepping up admirably in his yoid has been Jonathan Culp, a 6-foot-6, 288-pound senior who has slowly over the years been earning more playing time and more respect.

Also on the line is Rob Warren

at left tackle. Warren has started 25 games over the last two seasons and was named First Team All-MAC after the 2004 season. Warren has very quick feet and long powerful arms, which help him keep his man in check. This allows Jacobs to take enough time in the pocket

to find the open man. However, Warren can open holes as well as he is quick and powerful, at 6-6 and 292 pounds.

Anchoring the left side of the line is left guard Kory Lichtensteiger. Lichtensteiger, 6-3, 300 pounds, was named a Freshman All-American and Second Team All-MAC in 2004 and looks to build on that success in 2005. The right side of the line is a little fuzzier, but right guard is manned by Derrick Markray who has the size (6-5, 341) and experience (he played in 11 games last season in a reserve role) to succeed on the offensive line.

Rounding out the line at right tackle is sophomore Drew Nystrom who showed promise as a freshman and now has the chance to start and step up in a starring role.




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The Falcons lost two starting linebackers from last season, but last year's anchor, Teddy Piepkow, returns for his senior season. However, this season he will move from weak side linebacker to middle linebacker. Piepkow had 81 tackles last season, good for second on the team, to go along with two interceptions.

The outside linebackers will be key reserves from the 2004 season who will be counted on to deliver as starters in 2005. Terrell White was a good reserve last year and really came through on special teams. He will make his presence be known with some quality hits throughout the course of the season. Jamien Johnson gets the last starting nod and will be counted on to be very active both in coverage and against the run. Key reserves include Lavelle Sharpe, Jon Jacubowski, John Haneline and Pete Winovich.

### **Buffalo Bulls**

Experience is the name of the game for the Buffalo Bulls. They have 47 returning lettermen and 18 returning starters to go along with a coach that has some job stability (something rare in the MAC).

They should have a heady, competent defense that keeps Buffalo in games for at least the first half

of action before they wear down due to the fact that the Bulls' offensive game is nonexistent.

The quarterback situation is still up in the air,

with Tony Paoli showing the most potential, but also being the biggest unproven commodity.



represent the MAC and particularly Bowling Green because I think we are an example of some of the best things in intercollegiate athletics," said Ribeau, who is in his 11th year as BGSU president.

Among the issues the board is currently addressing, according to Ribeau, are academic reform and progress toward graduation for all student athletes. This is something the MAC and BG has excelled in over the years. Ribeau will continue to share the MAC's model for academic success with the committee, which meets five times annually.

'It's really applicable to what the MAC and Bowling Green has been doing for a long time," Ribeau said. 'You don't hear about severe problems with our intercollegiate athletic programs."


Despite what the Rho Gammas are challenged with, they are still looking forward to the event that makes them Rho Gammas, recruitment.

# Greek Council Advisors Ready to Tackle New Year

#### FOUR NEW GRADUATE STUDENTS STEP UP TO THE PLATE TO HELP OUT THE GREEK COMMUNITY

At Bowling Green State University, four Greek councils (Inter-Fraternity Council, Panhellenic Council, National Pan-Hellenic Council, and Greek Independent Board) work to give guidance to the forty-two Greek-lettered organizations on the campus.

Each fraternity and sorority chapter at the University belongs to one of these governing organizations, and the councils meet on a weekly basis in an effort to unify the Greek community.

As each council faces unique problems, members of the Office of Greek Affairs work with the groups to guide them to resolve these issues. But to add a fresh perspective, graduate students also serve as additional advisors for the groups, each with their own list of goals and expectations for each council.

This school year, each council received a new advisor to help them achieve what they have set out to do.

Josh Harraman, a secondyear graduate student within the Gollege Student Personnel (CSP) program, will be working with the Inter-Fraternity Council (IFC) this academic school year. The IFC is the governing body for the seventeen National Interfraternity Conference fraternities at BGSU.

Harraman, who previously did a lot of work with public relations this past year, will be doing double duty as he plans to work with both IFC and the colony organizations this year.

His biggest goal this year is to help the men of IFC continually improve themselves throughout the school year.

"I would like to see IFC take things to the next level," Harraman said.

Harraman noted that the members of IFC were a great group of men, and he wants to see them recognized for their success on a national level. However, he believes one area where the men can improve is in the realm of academics.

"I would like to see our grades move up to be on par with the rest of the All- Greek GPA and the All- Undergraduate GPA. I think this is attainable by all of the men holding each other accountable," Harraman said.

Jennifer Lambdin, who is a graduate advisor for the University's Panhellenic Council, also wants to see the council she advises improve in scholarship.

"This year, the council has accepted the Academic Excellence Challenge by the National Panhellenic Conference, stating that each chapter will strive to

achieve a grade point average, which is at least 0.1 higher than their academic performance in the spring."

The Panhellenic Council oversees fourteen sororities at the University and plays a strong hand in the recruitment of these sororities over the course of the year. And whereas recruitment has done well over the past couple of years, Lambdin also wants to focus on retention.

"Iwould like to see less women drop out," Lambdin said of the recruitment process, "and instead, have more women choose to join a chapter."

Lambdin is a second-year graduate student in the CSP, college student personnel, program, and since she began the program in 2004, she has worked with risk management and the development of staff within Greek housing.

Combined with her work as the advisor for the Panhellenic Council, she should be completely prepared for what lies ahead in her career path of being a Greek Advisor.

"I hope to have acquired knowledge and experiences that I will be able to apply to different campuses and councils," Lambdin said.

The National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC), which is significantly different from the Panhellenic Council, oversees eight historically-black fraternities and sororities at the University.

Fortunately, the council members won't have to learn a new name for their graduate advisor; Andrea Weber served as the advisor last year, graduated, and left Andrea Obrachta to help the council for this upcoming school year.

"I feel very fortunate to be working with NPHC this year," Obrachta said of her new position, "and I think we can accomplish a lot this year by building on past success and lessons learned."

Obrachta is also a secondyear student in the CSP program, and her goals are more oriented with solidifying the organization as a whole. "We are working on continuing to strengthen NPHC as a governing body for its member organizations, building community, increasing awareness, and more frequently working together with other councils."

Finally, Aliya Beavers is the sole first-year student serving as a graduate advisor, and she will be working with the Greek Independent Board (GIB) through-

out the school year. Although she's new to the program, she is excited about the potential challenges she faces with the council.

Beavers' biggest goal is involvement.

"The Greek Independent Board cannot survive unless there are people to run it. I would like to see more people join these three organizations so that GIB can con-

GIB counsels Sigma Gamma Beta Fraternity, Inc., Sigma Gamma Lambda Sorority, Inc., and the Delta Chi Phi Multicultural Sorority here at the University. According to the University's Greek Report, there were only 39 members counseled by the Greek Independent Board at the end of last year, and Beavers wants to make sure that, although the organization is small, they are being recognized for their work and accomplishments.

"I would like for the Greek Independent Board to make a name for themselves on campus," Beavers "A lot of the students have never heard of them, so getting their name out about who they are and how they have helped the community is something that is important to them as well as to


