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

Businesses adjust to summer Locals push sales forward

While University students disappear in large numbers from Bowling Green during the summer months, local businesses still keep their numbers high.

The lack of University students in the city is evident during the summer months, considering a large percentage of Bowling Green's population is students. While this could be seen as a potential problem for local businesses, the shops and restaurants of Bowling Green prove it isn't too much of an issue. Ashley Peguies, an employee at Grounds For Thought, explains what the downtown coffee shop, bookstore and roaster is like on a typical summer day. "The mornings are still pretty busy. There is people going to work and people who work in the community [who] still come in for coffee. The early afternoons are also still pretty busy, but around late afternoon and night you can see it being slower than it usually is during the school year. And that's because our night time is usually when you see more college business, where students come in and study and grab a cup of coffee," she says. But these quieter evenings in the store don't affect sales much. When asked if the amount of sales changes during the summer months, Peguies responded, "Not really, they're just different. Different kind of sales." "I think the fact that it's a bookstore also helps contribute to the success of the business, because during the summers is usually when people like to read," she adds. "You see an increase in book sales during the summer." Grounds For Thought also adapts by altering their menu to contain more summer drinks like tropical lattes and fruity lem-

Orientation leaders embrace new Falcons

SOAR leaders spend the majority of their summer facilitating orientation for new incoming students.

SOAR, Student Orientation, Advising and Registration, takes place three times a week from late May to mid-July.

Jessica Huddleston, Assistant Dean of Students, said the team of 20 leaders come from a variety of different backgrounds.

Leaders are selected after attending information sessions in October, writing personal statements and completing group and individual interviews, Huddleston said.

She said diversity on all levels is important for the SOAR team to have in order to appeal to the diverse student population coming into the University.

While the stereotype is for the leaders to be loud and outgoing, Huddleston said they also need and look for more reserved leaders.

Diversity with personalities is encouraged, as well as a love for BG and leadership, Huddleston said.

After being selected, new SOAR leaders must complete two parts to their training.

The first is a two-credit hour course on training in orientation, which is taught by SOAR Team Leaders.

Team leaders are unique in that they have participated as SOAR leaders previously; all other SOAR Leaders can only serve for one summer.

This year's team leaders include senior Alison Brousseau, senior Carlye Pollack, Junior Zach Jung and Senior Emily Skibski.

Brousseau said the diversity helps them grow as leaders because they must learn how to work with different personalities.

"As a team leader, you get to see yourself expand and help other leaders expand as well," Pollack said.

Brousseau said she enjoys this program and being a team leader because she enjoys working with leaders.

Pollack said she initially wanted to be a SOAR leader to gain leadership experience, but after participating in the program, said it has come to mean so much more than that to her.

"It's developing a foundation for who you are going to be for the rest of your life,"Pollack said. "I think that's what this program does; it literally shapes you into being a leader, a

student leader and being a role model to your peers."

Jung said he thought he knew everything he needed to know about leadership from high school, but since being involved with SOAR has "learned more about the foundation of leadership."

"I'm all about knowledge and growth and I never think anyone is ever done learning, which is why I wanted to apply to be a team leader," Jung said.

A SOAR Leader's day starts at 5 a.m. with waking up and getting to what the leaders call "go time" by 6:15 a.m.

This is a time for the leaders to have a morning huddle and participate in an energizer to get excited for the day.

Then they set up from 6:45 a.m. until guests start arriving at 7:15 a.m.

Once guests have arrived, the team leaders conduct the welcome session, where the students are separated from the parents and then separated even more by college.

Throughout the day, different leaders have different responsibilities they must complete.

Checkout can end anytime from 4-5 p.m.

At the checkout, new students receive their official BG i.d.

The team leaders said they enjoy seeing the excitement on students' faces when they receive their i.d.'s and Brousseau said she makes the students make two promises.

"One, never ever ever root for Toledo and the amount of people who gave me these looks like 'I would never!' just made me so happy," Brousseau said. "Then I told them to wear orange and brown on Falcon Fridays, they were like 'of course, not even a problem'. Hearing their responses to that kind of a thing shows they are getting excited."

BG pride is stressed throughout the day with the BG chant during the welcome session and the Freddie and Frieda coming to lunch because the goal is to have the students fall in love with campus.

"To see the students you worked with going to class and falling in love with campus and getting involved is the absolute coolest thing in the entire world," Brousseau said, "I don't even care if they know I was their orientation leader, I just love being able to see them personally succeeding."

Jung also said seeing the students they worked with in the summer is a rewarding experience.

"It makes it so real to see them in the fall," Jung said. "To see them ready to take on the next four years is remarkable."

There is an info-graphic floating around on the internet accusing society of mixing up the gender wage gap by using the explanation of, "Men work longer hours and are more likely to spend the majority of their adult lives in an office, so naturally they get paid more. They put in more hours."

This fluffed by the argument that men put in those hard-earned hours at high-end jobs that are demand tears and sweat from each of their workers, male or female.

I don't disput that high-

end jobs don't lead to an aggressive 6-figure salary, but I do feel uncomfortable handing men all the credit.

Let's backtrack for a minute.

A boy and a girl go the same public elementary school, same high school and end up studying at a university that is of the same caliber in admission standards and both nationally recongnized. They both major in the same thing, and to push my point forward further, a major related in the STEM field. [I choose this field because many high paying jobs come from STEM related areas.]

FUTURE FALCONS FOOTBALL CAMP

Parents of children entering grades 1 through 8 have the opportunity to register their children for participation in the "Future Falcon" Youth Football Camp this summer.

The camp will be held at Bowling Green State University's Doyt Perry Stadium from 9 a.m. until noon on Mon., June 22 and Tues., June 23.

This is the second youth football camp being hosted by the University athletics staff and is being headed this year by Roy Wittke, the 2015 Recruiting Coordinator for the Falcons. Last season, Wittke served as the Director of Football Operations.

According to Wittke, the goal of those running the camp is to introduce younger players to the game of football while allowing them to work on basic fundamental elements of the game in a positive and fun environment.

"We would like to see the kids that participate in our camp have a great experience so they continue to play

and watch the sport," Wittke said.

At the beginning of camp each day, campers are divided into groups based on their grades — grades 1-3; 4-6 and 7-8.

During the time of the camp, each group spends time being introduced to fundamentals of offense, defense, and strength and speed development and have the opportunity to practice what they learn.

The end of each camp session, there will be skill related contests and games for campers to compete in.

Wittke hopes to see more than 100 children participating in this years camp.

According to information provided by Bowling Green Athletics, this camp is an "up-tempo football experience tailored to meet the need of youngsters of all different football backgrounds."

Campers need to be wearing appropriate workout gear to attend the event. Participants will receive a "Future Falcon" Youth Football Camp T-Shirt along with an up close look at the BGSU Football program.

"Our camp will be a fun way for youngsters to spend

two mornings developing their physical skills and knowledge of the game of football," Wittke said.



Blackhawks Stanley Cup Victory



Chicago Blackhawks take third Stanley Cup title in six seasons.

The Chicago Blackhawks officially ended the Stanley Cup Finals Monday, and took home their third Cup since 2010.

The 2-0 blowout gave the Blackhawks the game they needed to win the series 4-2 against the Tampa Bay Lightning.

A score by Blackhawks defenseman Duncan Keith in the second period gave the team a 1-0 lead over the Lightning.

Right wing Patrick Kane scored the second, and final goal of the game at 14:46 in the third.

Game 6 was the only game in which one of the teams has held a two point lead, as most of the games within the series involved the two being tied at the start of the third.

This is the first time that Chicago has won the Stanley Cup at home since they faced the Toronto Maple Leafs in 1938.

The end of the fifth game of the season brought Chicago fans to their feet as the Blackhawks landed a win over Tampa Bay opening potential for the Blackhawks to claim the Stanley Cup 2015 title at home.

Game 5 of the series took the Blackhawks to Amalie Arena in Tampa, Florida where they defeated the Lightning in a 2-1 game, allowing them to lead the series 3-2.

Ben Bishop, goaltender for the Lightning, returned to the game after missing Game 4 due to an injury and made 27 saves.

Blackhawks center Antoine Vermette scored two minutes into the third to provide the team with the win over the Lightning.

Vermette did not score during the 19 regular season games for the Blackhawks, but this was his fourth playoff goal and second goal in the series. Though the Stanley Cup Finals are a place for teams to face off in competition, there is nothing stopping players from acknowledging one another's skill levels.

"You can see how close these two teams are," Ryan Callahan, forward for the Lightning said in an interview with Corey Masisak. "They're a very good team over there, and we still feel really good about ourselves. The margin for error is so small in these games. That's the type of hockey you expect at this time of year."

Blackhawk left wing Patrick Sharp made the first goal of the game during the first period.

During the second period, center Valtteri Filppula scored for the Lightning, bringing the game to a 1-1 tie before Vermette slammed the puck in during the third.

In an attempt to see the full scope of what they have to offer, along with another BG News editor, I decided to try some of the more unusual flavors offered. These were selected primarily on their name and have been brewed in a standard French press at coarse grind after being sold to us in whole bean. In some regards these are not representative of the

in-house Grounds for Thought experience as these roasts are not necessarily always available for drinking in-store. That said, selecting something like coffee solely based on the name is a good bit of fun and a nice way to expand one's horizons; many a dollar album has been bought simply for its outlandish band name or cover art and coffee is certainly another way to take this method of trying new things and running with it in an aspect of life many experience at extremes of the spectrum Either plain, black coffee or barely recognizable frappa-latte-chino abominations. These exist in a middle ground, a road less traveled of which, I am happy to partake.

CANDY BAR CLASSIC

Whiff: A dark coffee with strong elements of sweetness, almost hazelnutty. Grind: The sweetness if overpowered by the odd nutty odor.

Brew: More of the sweetness dissipates, but not so much as to be bitter. Verdict: A nice, light and sweet coffee that is easy to drink, but lacks the bite some prefer in coffee drinks.

CRANBERRY CREAM

Whiff: Very strong berry, with a milky tone. Almost overpowering, little coffee smell.

Grind: Similar to whiff, but brought out the milky tone. Brew: The cranberry cream flavor is distinct and the coffee carries it well. Verdict: Crisp and unlike any coffee flavor I have had; the cranberry can be off-putting but definitely woth a try

CUPCAKE

Blackhawks coach John Quenneville said in an interview with Masisak. "The buzz will be off the charts. [I'm looking] forward to it."

Wednesday, June 10 left the Blackhawks fighting the Lightning to even the series in Game 4.

Bishop was out with an injury, so Tampa Bay put in rookie Andrei Vasilevskiy who made the team proud by making 17 saves, only letting two goals go through.

"If you tell me we're going to come in and he's going to give up two goals, that's a hell of a job in my book," Lightning coach Jon Cooper told Masisak. "He showed the pinnacle of the sport, that he can play. That a pretty big achievement for a 20-year-old."

Corey Crawford made 24 saves for the Blackhawks including a shot from Steven Stamkos, the captain of the Lightning, near the game's final minute.

Blackhawk center Jonathan Toews made the first goal of the game in the second period, followed shortly by a goal from Lightning center Alex Killorn.

Blackhawk left wing Brandon Saad scored the final goal of the game in the third period, earning the Blackhawks a 2-1 victory to tie the series 2-2 at Game 4.

Monday, June 8 brought the Blackhawks and the Lightning once more for a faceoff for Game 3 of the series.

Lightning right wing Ryan Callahan scored early in the first for his team and nearly 10 minutes later, Blackhawks center Brad Richards followed up to tie the score in the first.

The second period passed without a single shot managing to pass the goaltenders for either team, resulting in a 1-1 tie at the start of the third.

The third started and 4:14 in, Saad charged in, scoring a second goal for Chicago.

Only 13 seconds passed before Lightning left wing Ondrej Palat retaliated, adding another goal to the Lightning scoreboard.

In the last five minutes of the third, the Lightning found the pace they needed and center Cedric Paquette drove the puck past the goal line when Blackhawks goaltender Corey Crawford failed to cover it.

"It's frustrating," Blackhawks captain Jonathan Toews told Masisak during an interview after the loss. "A lot of things we did today gave us the feeling we were going to come out on top with the effort we gave. It's just a couple of little bad habits that ended up hurting us."

Game 3 resulted in a 2-1 series lead for the Lightning after the game ended with a final score of 3-2.

Jun 6 featured Game 2 of the Stanley Cup Finals at Amalie Arena.

Paquette opened the game with the first goal for the Lightning near 13 minutes in the first period while assisted by Callahan and defenseman Victor Hedman.

Just over three minutes into the second, the Lightning found themselves facing a highly active offense for the Blackhawks as two goals were made within two minutes of each other.
