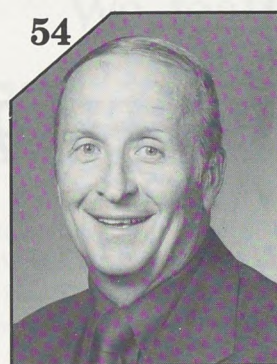

# TODAY'S GAME

**TODAY:** The BGSU Falcons begin seven consecutive weekends of MAC games by hosting defending league champion Central Michigan. The Falcons can move into a first place tie in the MAC with a win this afternoon.

**BG GAMES BY PHONE:** All BGSU games this season can also be heard by telephone through a service provided by TRZ Sports, Inc. in Kent, Ohio. By dialing 1-800-232-3396 and entering a VISA or Mastercard number a person can listen to the live radio broadcast of the game over the phone. The broadcast includes everything, including commercials, from the pre-game show to the post-game show. A listener is charged on a sliding scale that decreases the longer a person listens. For example, a three-hour game would cost \$38.95. The Gary Blackney Show is also carried by TRZ and can be heard by calling the same telephone number on Monday evenings.

**THE GARY BLACKNEY SHOW:** Every Monday evening throughout the season, the Gary Blackney Show will be held at Kaufman's (downtown location) Restaurant. The show will begin at 7 p.m. and be broadcast live on WFOB radio (1430 AM). Fans can talk to Coach Blackney at the restaurant or by calling (419-352-4200 or 419-435-5555) the station.

**CENTRAL COACH HERB DEROMEDI:** Deromedi is the dean of the MAC

coaches having served as the Chippewa's head coach for the last 14 years. His 97-42-8 record (.687) puts him fifth on the all-time MAC list and second in victories. His 78-29-7 mark in league games is sixth on the all-time list while his win total is the best by any coach in league history. Deromedi's .683 winning percentage prior to the start of the season was ninth best in the nation among active coaches. Deromedi joined the CMU staff in 1967 as an assistant coach after spending six seasons at the high school level. Deromedi's teams have compiled an 8-5 record against the Falcons, 3-4 in games at BGSU.

**THE SERIES:** In a series that has been dominated by the home team since 1983, the Falcons hold a slim 14-13 edge. Every year since 1983, the home team have been the victor, including last year's 17-0 win by CMU. The last time either team broke that trend was the 1982 season when BG captured a 34-30 decision at Mt. Pleasant. Prior to 1982, CMU had won six straight, the longest winning streak since the series started in 1924. The Falcons have won the last four series meetings in BG, all of them by slim margins. The Falcons won 15-14 (1983), 23-18 (1985), 18-17 (1987) and 24-20 (1989). CMU won the 1981 meeting at BG by a 6-3 count. Overall, BG has an 11-4 edge in the series at home. There have been nine shutouts in the 27 series games with BG having four of those. Only two of those whitewashings have come

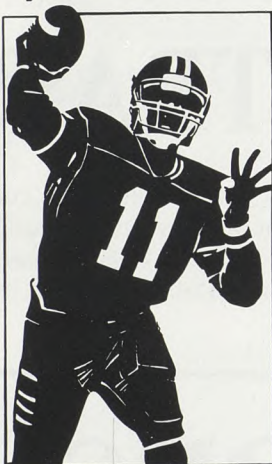

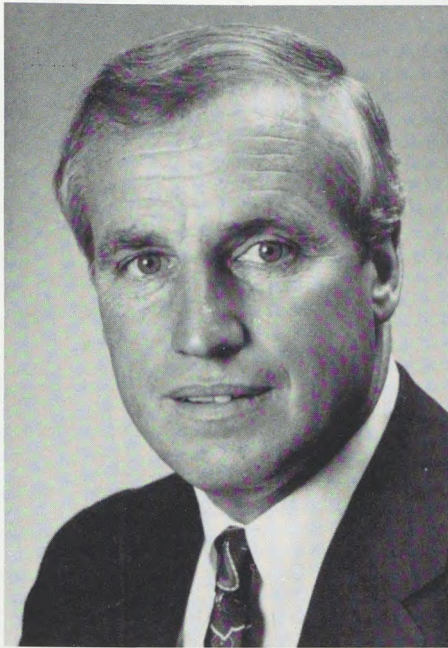

## GARY BLACKNEY

Gary Blackney got quite a birthday present this year - a present he had paid his dues to receive. Five days prior to his 46th birthday, December 5, 1990, Blackney was named the 14th head football coach in the 72-year history of the program at Bowling Green State University.

Blackney has more than paid his dues having made stops at seven different universities from one side of the map to the other covering 24 years of coaching on the collegiate level. All 24 years were spent as an assistant until BGSU Athletic Director Jack Gregory changed that in early December.

The new BGSU mentor has helped get some of the top programs in the country to where they are today including UCLA, which played in the Fiesta Bowl in Blackney's first season there, Syracuse and Ohio State.

Blackney comes to the Falcon program after spending the last seven seasons at Ohio State where he coached the defensive backs for one season (1984), was the defensive coordinator for three seasons (1985-87) and coached the inside linebackers and the special teams the last three seasons. During Blackney's coaching tenure the Buckeyes played in four bowl games, including the 1985 Rose Bowl, and compiled a 53-27-3 record. OSU earned the Big Ten title in 1984

and shared the league crown with Michigan in 1986.

Blackney's 1986 defensive unit led the Big Ten in scoring defense and was fourth in the nation in turnover margin. OSU was ranked in the top 10 of both wire service polls in 1986.

The Plainview, New York native began his coaching career at his alma mater, Connecticut, in 1967 where he spent three seasons. Blackney earned his undergraduate degree in education from Connecticut in 1967 and one year later received his master's in physical education while also coaching. He was a running back for head coach Rick Forzano at Connecticut during his playing days starting as both a junior and senior.

In 1970 he moved to the Ivy League where he coached the defensive backs for three seasons at Brown. From there he spent two seasons as the offensive coordinator while coaching the

quarterbacks and running backs at Rhode Island. In 1975, he began a three-year stay at Wisconsin where he coached the defensive backs for two seasons (1975-76) before being named the defensive coordinator for the 1977 season.

The next stop for Blackney was the West Coast where he worked with the defensive backs at UCLA. Kenny Easley earned consensus All-American honors at defensive back under Blackney's tutelage. Following his stint at UCLA, Blackney joined Dick MacPherson at Syracuse in 1980 where he spent four seasons coaching the defensive backs while helping get the Syracuse program back in the national limelight. Blackney also served as the recruiting coordinator for one season while at Syracuse.

Gary and his wife, Loretta, have four children, Debbie, 24, David, 23, Kyle, 16 and Gary Jr., 12.

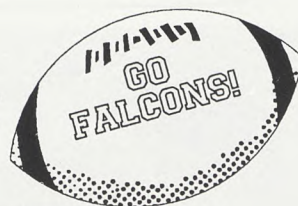

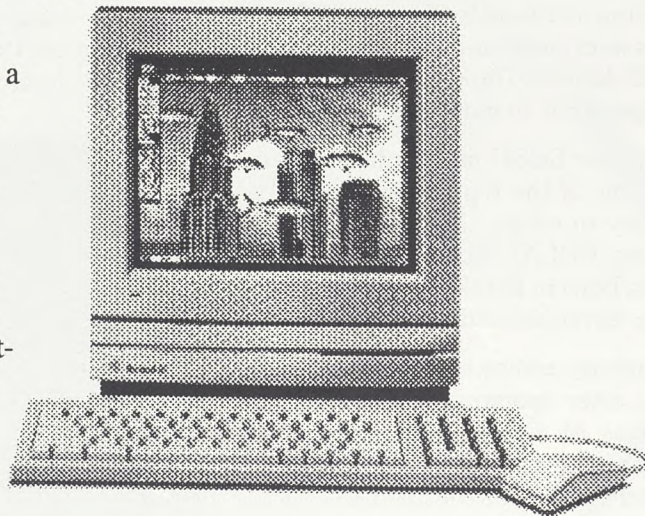

### BOB BABICH

Bob Babich, 30, joined the BGSU staff in early January after serving as a volunteer assistant coach at Tulsa, his alma mater, last season. He coaches the inside linebackers and recruits Northeast Ohio, Pennsylvania and the Southwest United States. Babich has five years of collegiate coaching experience, three of those coming at his alma mater. He also spent the 1988 and 1989 seasons at Wisconsin working with the tight ends and the offensive line. The Aliquippa, Pa. native played collegiately at Mesa Community College and Tulsa. Bob and his wife, Nancy, have two children, Bobby, 8, and Janice Lee, 5.

### JACK BUSH

Jack Bush, 42, joined the staff in late January and will work with a deep and talented corp of running backs. Bush recruits the junior colleges as well as Washington, D.C. and St. Louis. Bush has extensive experience at the high school level as well as four years on the collegiate level at, most recently, Central State (Ohio), Johnson C. Smith and Lincoln University, his alma mater. Most of his high school coaching was done in his native Kansas City, Mo. while he also spent time in St. Louis. Jack and his wife, Jacqueline, are the parents of three children, Ollisha, 14, Leslie, 10, and Jonathan, born in June.

### MICHAEL FARAGALLI

Michael Faragalli, 32, brings with him a wealth of experience on the offensive side of the ball in his first season at BGSU. Faragalli, the offensive coordinator, works with the quarterbacks and wide receivers while recruiting Canada and the New England states. Faragalli has been one of the top offensive minds in the Canadian Football League the last six years, most recently with Edmonton helping Tracy Ham develop into the CFL's Most Valuable Player. The Philadelphia, Pa. native is a Rhode Island graduate where he also coached for three seasons. Michael and his wife, Kathy, have three children, Joseph, 8, Phillip, 5, and Theresa, 2.

### PAUL FERRARO

Paul Ferraro, 32, takes over as the defensive coordinator at BGSU after joining the staff in mid-December. Paul will work with a veteran defensive secondary while recruiting the Cleveland, Toledo and Chicago areas and the state of New Jersey. Paul has nine years of collegiate experience, most recently as a member of Tom Lichtenberg's staff at both Maine and Ohio the last two seasons. The Ridgewood, N.J. native earned three letters at Springfield as a defensive back during his playing days. Ferraro is single.

### BOB LIGASHESKY

Bob Ligashesky, 29, joined the staff in mid-December and will coach the outside linebackers. Ligashesky is responsible for the Cleveland and Akron-Canton areas as well as Northeast Ohio and the Western United States. The McKees Rock, Pa. native comes to BGSU from Kent where he coached the inside linebackers. Ligashesky also coached collegiately at Wake Forest and Arizona State. Ligashesky, who is single, earned three letters at Indiana University of Pennsylvania during his collegiate playing career.

### TERRY MALONE

Terry Malone, 31, is in his sixth year at BGSU and will be coaching the offensive tackles and tight ends this season. Malone is responsible for recruiting Northwest Ohio and the state of Michigan. The Buffalo, N.Y. native has also coached the centers and guards during his tenure at BGSU. Malone previously coached at Holy Cross and Arizona. Malone and wife, Ann, are the parents of two children, Kara, 2, and Patrick, born in April.

### TONY PUSATERI

Tony Pusateri, 40, is the newest member of the coaching staff having joined the program in February. Pusateri has been one of the top high school coaches in the state the last 15 years, spending 10 of those seasons at St. Francis DeSales in Columbus. At DeSales, Pusateri's teams won almost 75% of their games and the 1985 Ohio division III title. Most recently, Pusateri coached at Westerville South. The Columbus, Ohio native is a graduate of Capital University. Tony's wife, Kim, is a teacher.

### SCOTT SEELIGER

Scott Seeliger, 41, returns for his second stint as an assistant coach at BGSU having been a member of Denny Stoltz's staff for five years between 1979 and 1983. Seeliger joined the staff in January and was named the assistant head coach by Gary Blackney. Seeliger will coach the guards and centers while recruiting Southwestern Ohio, Indianapolis, the state of Wisconsin and the Southeast United States. Besides his five years at BG, Seeliger's 14 years of coaching experience on the collegiate level includes nine seasons at Wisconsin where he spent most of his time coaching the offensive line. The Madison, Wis. native was a tight end on the 1972 Iowa State team that played in the Sun Bowl. Scott and his wife, Karen, have two children, Keri, 18, and Kori, 16.

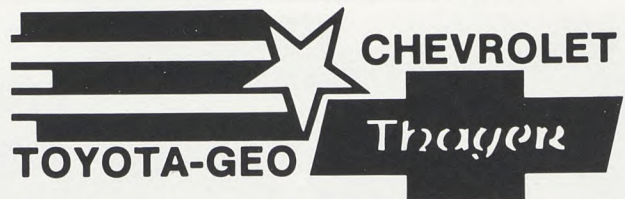

# MID-AMERICAN CONFERENCE

Founded in 1946, the Mid-American Conference is one of the nine Division I-A conferences in the country along with the ACC, Big 10, Big Eight, Big West, PAC-10, SEC, SWC, and WAC.

The MAC consists of nine state-supported institutions in the midwestern states of Ohio, Michigan and Indiana. The nine current members—Ball State University, Bowling Green State University, Central Michigan University, Eastern Michigan University, Kent State University, Miami University, Ohio University, the University of Toledo and Western Michigan University—have all been members of the conference for 16 or more years.

For the first time since 1986, the configuration of the MAC will change next season as the University of Akron becomes a league member and will vye for conference titles in 13 sports. The Akron football program is under the guidance of former Cincinnati Moeller and Notre Dame coach Gerry Faust. The Zips play their home games at the Akron Rubber Bowl.

Throughout its existence, the MAC has been in the forefront of national legislation that has enhanced the academic integrity of intercollegiate athletics. The MAC has had an academic progress rule, strengthened admittance standards and qualitative grade point average requirements for its student-athletes long before the NCAA adopted or discussed implementing such academic standards.

The MAC currently sponsors 18 championships. In men's sports, the MAC has sponsored championships in football, baseball, cross country, golf, tennis, and track and field since its founding, and added swimming and wrestling championships five years later.

In 1980, the MAC Council of Presidents voted to bring women's athletics into the conference structure. The MAC currently sponsors women's championships in basketball, cross country, field hockey, gymnastics, softball, swimming, tennis, track

and field, and volleyball.

In the 45-year history of the conference, numerous MAC football teams and players have received national recognition. Bowling Green was recognized as the national college division champion in 1959, and Ohio won similar honors in 1960. After MAC teams achieved major college status, Toledo compiled a 35-game winning streak from 1969-71, the second longest such streak in modern major college football history. Miami beat Florida, Georgia and South Carolina in the 1973, 1974 and 1975 Tangerine Bowls. In the last few years, among the non-conference victims of MAC teams are opponents from the Big 10, Big

Eight, SEC and WAC.

The 1991 MAC Champion will represent the conference against the champion of the Big West Conference in the California Raisin Bowl on December 9 in Fresno, CA.

MAC schools have a reputation for developing outstanding coaches. In the 1989 Fiesta Bowl, which pitted Notre Dame against West Virginia for the national championship, it was Kent graduate Lou Holtz against Bowling Green graduate Don Nehlen. On the same day in the Rose Bowl, Miami graduate Bo Schembechler directed his Michigan team to victory over Southern Cal coached by Bowling Green graduate Larry Smith. Among other current or former head coaches who played at and/or coached at MAC schools are Woody Hayes, Ara Parseghian, Don James, Paul Brown, Bill Mallory, Dave McClain, Don McCafferty, Weeb Ewbank, Frank Lauterbur, John Pont and two of the three 1988 inductees into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame: Doyt Perry and Jack Mollenkopf.

Among current NFL players from MAC schools, Dolphins' linebacker John Offerdahl (Western Michigan) was the 1986 Rookie of the Year, Rams' center Doug Smith (Bowling Green) is a Pro Bowler and 14-year veteran; and defensive lineman Brent Williams (Toledo) is a rising star with the Patriots.

After concluding successful NFL careers, Bernie Casey (Bowling Green) and Tim Brown (Ball State), two former standouts at current MAC schools, went to Hollywood and have made numerous television and movie appearances.

MAC student-athletes are regularly selected to the GTE Academic All-America teams. In the last seven years alone, MAC student-athletes have received Academic All-America honors 98 times. Since the Academic All-America program was established 21 years ago, MAC football players have earned that distinction 47 times.

- **Emergency medical aid** is available from the ambulance crew in the northeast and northwest corners of the stadium. Services are provided courtesy of the Wood County Disaster Services Agency.
- **Field headquarters** for stadium game operations is located on the ground level of the east side of Perry Field. The telephone number is 372-2401.
- **First aid** is located on the east side of the stadium next to the equipment room. It is easily marked for emergency situations. Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Bowling Green State University football games.

# INDOOR FACILITY BECOMES A REALITY AT BGSU

What Bowling Green State University officials think will be a facility that many in the future will use as a model became reality last Wednesday with the groundbreaking for the \$10 million Falcon Fieldhouse. The facility will be located on the northwest corner of Merry Avenue and Mercer Road across from the Student Recreation Center and Steller Field. The new building will be located diagonally from the BGSU Ice Arena.

Expected to be completed in early 1993, the facility will consist of two rectangular-shaped wings with a smaller area between the two wings with offices, showers, building operations and a training room.

One wing of the fieldhouse will house a 70-yard artificial turf football field. Batting cages will also be a feature of this wing of the building. It will also be possible to practice golf, tennis and soccer in this area. The turf room wing, which will also house an observation deck for coaches and filming as well as a meeting room for 100 people, will be over 54,000 square feet in area.

The other wing will include a six-lane 200-meter track and four basketball courts. On one side of the track will be an eight-lane 60-meter str-

aightaway to be used for sprinting and hurdling events. All five indoor field

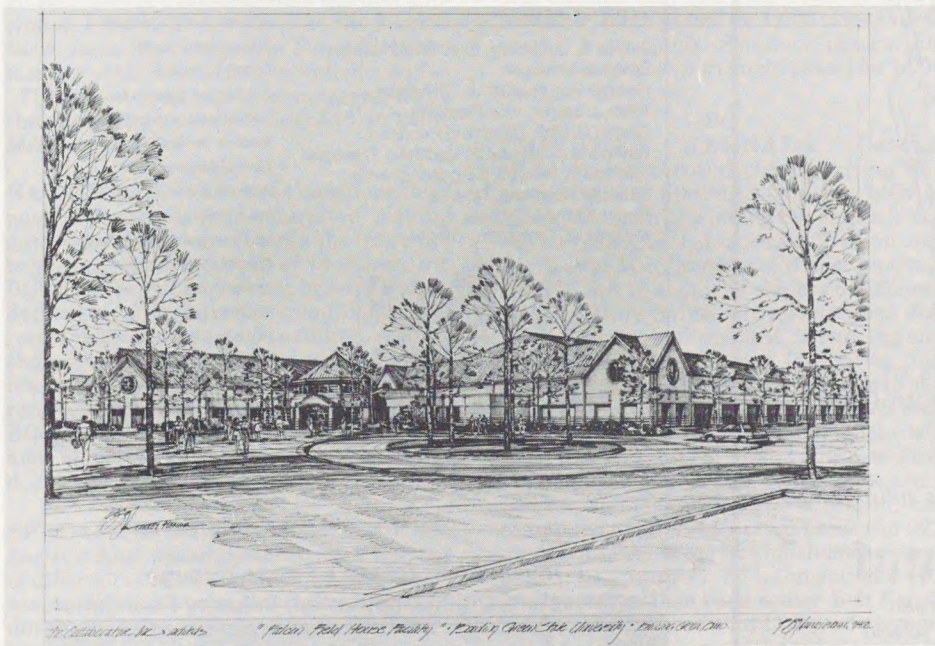
events can also be contested in the area. The track room is better than 48,000 square feet.

The total cost of the facility, which has more than 127,000 square feet, is expected to be \$10.85 million with physical education classes, intramurals and BGSU athletic teams all utilizing the facility.

"I don't think there will be one quite like it in the country," said University Architect Roland Engler. "This will be a showcase building, very much like the Student Recreation Center," said Dr. Ronald Zwierlein, project coordinator and interim director of the facility.

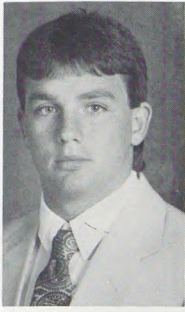
The exterior of the Falcon Fieldhouse will be distinct from, but similar to, the Student Recreation Center.

The general contractor for the facility is Peterson Construction of Wapakoneta, Ohio and the project's architectural and design firm is the Collaborative Corporation of Toledo.

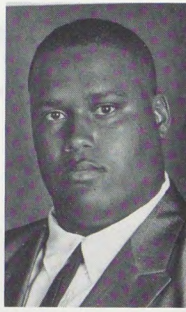


An artist's drawing of the fieldhouse.

since BG became a MAC member in 1952. CMU joined the MAC in 1976. Twelve of the series contests came between 1924 and 1952. The Falcons hold the edge in close games having compiled a 5-1 mark in the six games decided by three points or less with four of those five victories coming by one point. BG holds a 9-3 edge in games decided by seven points or less.

**HOME SWEET HOME:** BG's win over Cincinnati two weeks ago added to the success the Falcons have enjoyed at Perry Field the last few years. BGSU has compiled a 34-9-3 (.772) record in its last 46 home games while the record improves to 31-6-3 (.813) in home MAC contests.

**NAILBITERS:** The Falcons have done their part to keep the fans interested playing games decided by small margins. Since the beginning of 1990, a span of 14 games, the BGSU football program has played 10 games decided by 10 points or less compiling a 4-4-2 record in those contests. In addition, eight of those games were decided by seven points or less with the Falcons compiling a 3-3-2 record. Over the last 14 games, BG is 6-6-2. BGSU has recorded wins this season by 4, 3 and 11 points while losing a seven-point decision.

**SPREADING THE WEALTH:** Erik White has also done a good job of hitting a number of different receivers in the four games this season. White had completed passes to eight different receivers by the halfway mark of the Navy game on just 15 completions. For the season, White has completed passes to 11

different receivers.

**SZLACHCIC JOINS ELITE LIST:** White's favorite target is junior wide receiver Mark Szlachcic who extended his pass-catching streak to 17 games with a career-high nine catches for 97 yards against Navy. Szlachcic, who is the leading returning receiver in the MAC, has caught at least two passes in every game of the streak except two. Szlachcic has caught 16 passes in the last two games. He also became only the 16th receiver in BG history to catch passes for 1,000 career yards in the Navy game. Szlachcic enters this week's contest having caught passes for 1,004 yards in his career.

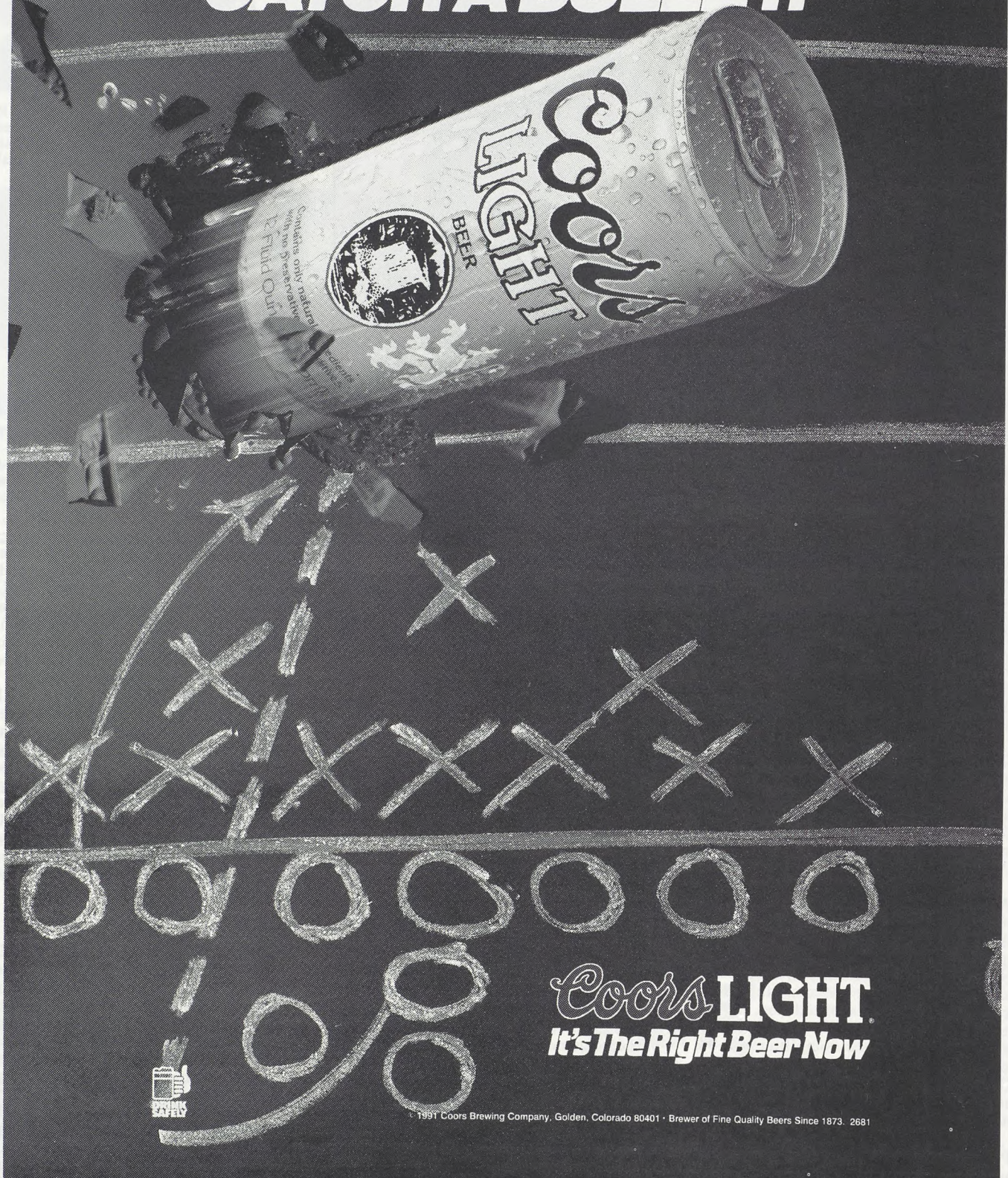
**CHIPPEWA KERNALS:** Central Michigan has certainly been exciting this season having played to two ties, both in MAC games, while winning two games in the last seconds. CMU also owns a 20-3 win over Big Ten foe Michigan State in East Lansing. CMU is led by a pair of seniors on offense, tailback Billy Smith and quarterback Jeff Bender. Smith leads the MAC in rushing and was eighth in the nation (averaging 152 yards per game) before Toledo held him to just 90 yards in their 16-all tie Saturday. Smith comes into the game this week having rushed for 698 yards on 171 carries. The rest of the team has just 50 carries thus far this season. Bender, the league MVP last season, has completed 53% (83-150) of his passes for 922 yards while throwing five touchdown passes and a like number of interceptions. His favorite target has been senior Bob Kench who has 28 catches for an 11.2-yard average. Senior Ken Ealy is one of the top receivers in the MAC and is averaging 16.7 yards on his

17 catches to date. He caught three TD passes in the Cal Bowl last season and averaged 20.8 yards per catch for the year. In all, CMU has seven seniors and three juniors starting on offense. The defense, which is allowing an average of just 292 yards per contest and is the trademark of CMU teams, is led by senior inside linebackers Clarence Rose and Todd Reynolds, who leads the team with 55 tackles. Rose missed two games this season with an injury. Junior Lamar Sally (39 tackles) is the leading tackler among the lineman while sophomore safety Darrall Stinson is the leading tackler among the defensive backs. Stinson has two of the five interceptions for the Chips this season. CMU held Toledo to 11 first downs and only 222 yards on Saturday. CMU starts five seniors and five juniors on defense which has just four starters returning.

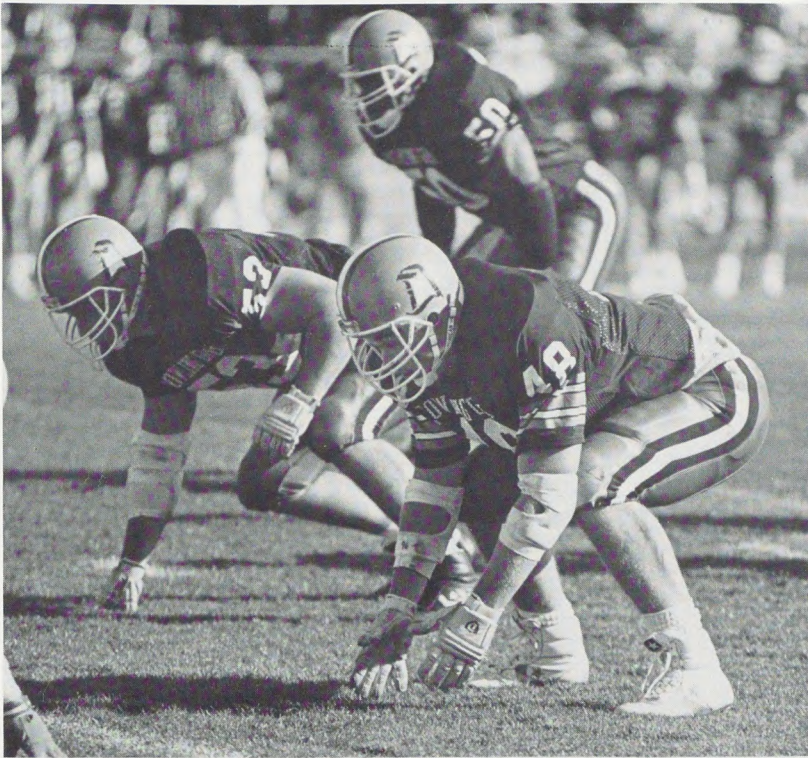
**BG PLAYERS AMONG MAC LEADER:** LeRoy Smith is fourth in the MAC's rushing category (99.5 yds./game) and fourth in all-purpose yardage (115.8). **Mark Szlachcic** leads the conference in pass receiving (6.0 cpg) and is sixth in scoring averaging 5.0 points per game. **Dave Bielinski** is tied for second averaging 0.50 interception per game. **Terry Wilson** is second in kickoff returns averaging 23.5 yards per runback. **Mike Calcagno** is third in tackles averaging 14.5 per game. **Erik White** leads the MAC in passing efficiency with a 131.34 mark and is also the MAC leader in total offense (197.3 yards/game). Senior **Todd Powell** is tied for third averaging one field per contest while freshman punter **Rob Donahue** is ninth in the league averaging 35.2 yards per punt.

# CALIFORNIA RAISIN BOWL

For the last ten years, the Mid-American Conference has been sending its champion to the California Raisin Bowl in Fresno, California.

Hosted by Fresno State University in its 40,552-seat Bulldog Stadium, the Cal Bowl pits the MAC Champ against the Big West Conference Champion.

The 1991 Cal Raisin Bowl is scheduled for December 14.

Bowling Green is one of two MAC teams to have made the trip to Fresno twice, with Toledo being the other. The Falcons appeared in Cal Bowl II on December 19, 1982 and lost a 29-28 heartbreaker to Fresno State. BG had a 21-0 third-quarter advantage in that game.

The Falcons met Fresno State again in Cal Bowl V, but this time the Bulldogs rolled to a 51-7 victory on December 14, 1985. BG also lost its head coach, Denny Stoltz, who announced earlier in the week he was leaving to coach at San Diego State.

More than just a bowl game, the California Raisin Bowl is a community happening for San Joaquin Valley citizens, whose support benefits the Valley Children's Hospital. The benevolence of the Greater San Joaquin Valley Sports Association is displayed as every aspect of the Cal Bowl revolves around the well-being of the young patients of the Valley Children's Hospital.

Fund-raising activities include a 10K run, bike rally, and a coronation ball, in addition to the bowl game. The Cal Bowl has generated more than \$300,000 for hospital equipment and services.

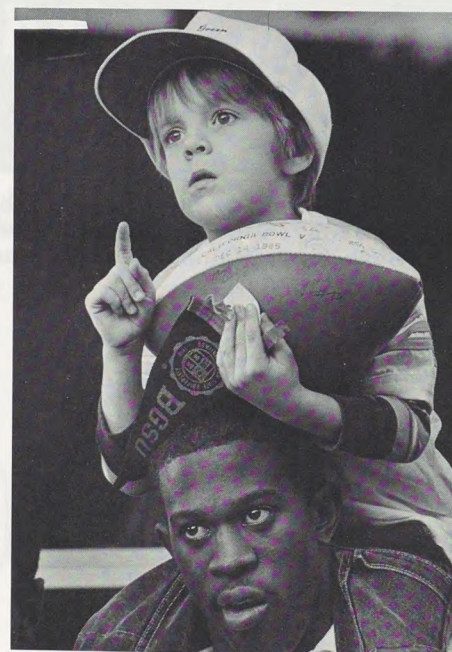

BG's Chip Otten in 1982 Cal Bowl.

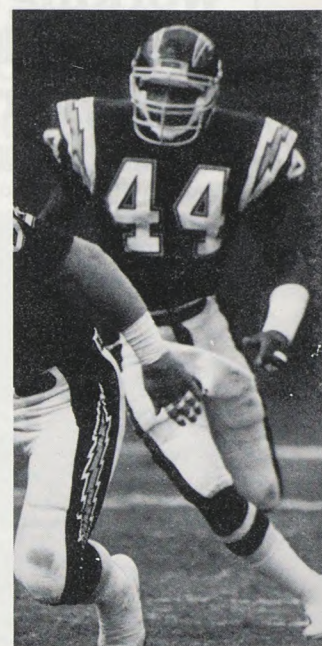

# BGSU, EDISON CENTER JOIN FORCES TO DEVELOP MANUFACTURING CENTER

Precision. Reliability. Flexibility.

Those are three of the keys to manufacturing success in the highly competitive global marketplace. Those are also three qualities which a newly created center now offers Ohio manufacturers.

Called the Center for Quality, Measurement and Automation, it is located in the University's College of Technology.

The \$3 million center is funded equally by The Edison Industrial Systems Center, business and industry, and the University.

Businesses involved in the project include the Brown and Sharpe Manufacturing Co., the makers of precision measuring and manufacturing equipment; the Digital Equipment Corporation, a computer hardware and software firm; the Hurco Manufacturing Co., the makers of precision machine tools; and the DeVilbiss Co., which donated robots to the project.

The center will be fully developed over a four-year period and when completed will be equipped with a number of state-of-the-art machines located within the College of Technology.

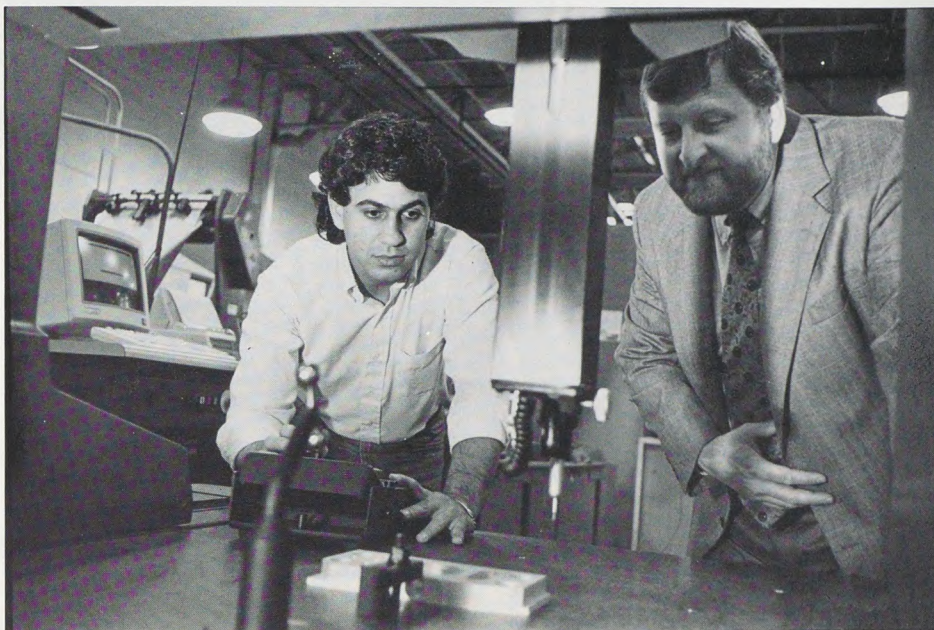
The heart of the system will be a coordinate measuring machine (CMM) made by Brown and Sharpe. Using a touch probe, the CMM will be able to inspect an object and measure its dimensions to one-millionth of an inch.

It will then be able to match the dimensions with those in the product's specifications and—if not identical—order adjustments to the machines which do the actual machining of the product.

All of these machines will be linked electronically to make up a full-size test bed, similar to what might be found on a state-of-the-art shop floor. The test bed, which will be computer controlled, will be able to perform all the functions of measurement, manufacturing, inspection, correction and re-manufacturing, without the need for human involvement.

The test bed will also be able to perform reverse engineering. In this operation, a part for which drawings do not exist or are inaccurate is placed in the test bed and the CMM's touch probe is used to measure the object's dimensions. This information can then be stored in the system's computer and exact duplicates or new drawings produced.

Dr. John Sinn, acting dean of the College of Technology and the executive director of the new center, said the center "will place Bowling Green State University on the

leading edge worldwide in quality and automation."

Charles G. Depew, president of the Edison Industrial Systems Center, said he sees the new center as a vital component to keep Ohio business competitive. "This is an excellent example of the state's Thomas Edison Program objective of linking academic expertise with the industrial needs of Ohio."

As the world becomes more "high tech" it becomes ever more important that products—especially component parts—be made to stricter measurement standards, Sinn said.

Soon, measurement tools used by humans, including calipers, micrometers and the like, will not be able to measure the tolerances necessary for world-class manufacturing. Computer-driven machines, which today can measure to one millionth of an inch, will be necessary.

Sinn said this change is occurring gradually, but it is happening. To stay competitive, manufacturers will need to upgrade their standards as well as their equipment. "There are probably a lot of small companies that are in trouble and probably don't even know it yet," Sinn added.

For these companies, the center can help in a number of ways. First, the center's machines can be used to manufacture a few specialty pieces, such as small dies used in the manufacturing process.

Second, companies can test the center's machines to determine how they can be applied to their specific manufacturing concerns. And third, the center can be used as a training ground for companies which purchase similar machines. The employees could be trained and ready to use the equipment when it arrives.

The center also offers a number of benefits to the University. Both undergraduate and graduate students will have the opportunity to study and work with the machines. Faculty will be able to use the equipment to conduct research projects.

Other academic departments, mostly in the hard sciences, could use the machines to make specialty equipment needed in classroom instruction and research.

Sinn said he also expects the equipment to lay the groundwork for a new academic program in the quality sciences, adding that the University and Ohio's businesses now have one of the finest facilities in the world for the study of quality, measurement and automation.

In large measure, Bowling Green State University's success has centered on its ability to offer its students the educational diversity and excitement of a large university, while maintaining the caring and camaraderie of a small college.

As the University completes the first year of the new decade, it continues to build on that past while preparing students for the challenges of the fast approaching millennium.

Bowling Green's history began in 1910 when it was created by the Ohio legislature as a Normal School for the training of teachers. In 1914, when Bowling Green opened its doors, 15 faculty members and 158 students were present.

Today, the University has nearly 1,000 full- and part-time faculty and 18,000 students on its main campus. Degree programs are offered through the colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education and Allied Professions, Health and Human Services, Musical Arts, Technology and the Graduate College. Within the undergraduate colleges are schools of Art, Mass Communication, Nursing, and Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

In all, the University offers more than 170 undergraduate degree programs, 13 master's degrees in 69 fields of study and doctoral degrees in 14 departments with more than 60 specializations.

In addition to courses on the main campus, the University's Firelands College campus, located in Huron, Ohio, offers five associate degree programs, as well as courses which fulfill the first two years of a bachelor's degree requirement. Firelands enrollment tops 1,500 students.

Fully accredited at the highest state, regional and national levels, the University has chapters of most national academic honor societies, including Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Kappa Phi. Bowling Green is also a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges.

The University's faculty members, 78

percent of whom hold Ph.D's, include Fulbright Scholars, authors and nationally known researchers. The caliber of the faculty is reflected, too, in the number of academic programs which are regionally and nationally recognized. Three academic departments—chemistry, philosophy and industrial/organizational psychology—are home to Ohio Eminent Scholars. The scholar program was created by the Ohio Board of Regents to attract world-class educators and researchers to the state's universities.

While committed to teaching, faculty are researchers as well, generating new knowledge through independent research and involvement in University units such as the Population and Society Research Center, the Center for the Study of Popular Culture and the Social Philosophy and Policy Center.

Bowling Green is also the site of the Na-

tional Drosophila Species Center and the Mid-America Stock Center—the largest scientific facilities of their kind in the world—where University faculty assist in supplying some 400 species of fruit flies to scientists involved in genetics and cancer research around the globe.

The University's students come from throughout the United States and nearly 60 foreign nations. While most students are between the ages of 18-22, the number of those older than 25 is increasing. Each academic year, more than 1,100 "non-traditional" adult students enroll in undergraduate and graduate programs on a full- or part-time basis.

The focal point of the 1,177-acre campus is the nine-story Jerome Library, with its collection of more than four million items, including 1.6 million volumes plus journals, periodicals, microforms, government documents and other materials. Special sections of the library include the Center for Archival Collections which houses materials relevant to northwest Ohio history and the Sound Recording Archives with 400,000 recordings. The Institute for Great Lakes Research, located in Perysburg, contains an extensive collection of materials on the shipping industry's past and present.

The University is continually refurbishing its more than 100 existing buildings and upgrading facilities to meet current needs. In the past 10 years, nearly \$116 million has been allocated for new construction and remodeling projects.

The University is also meeting the challenge of tomorrow's high-tech education. It currently has 19 computer labs, including one in every residence hall complex, for use by students. And this year, computers are being put into the rooms of Chapman Hall as part of a pilot program which may eventually lead to a computer in every residence hall room.

## C. ELLEN CONNALLY

Judge C. Ellen Connally is serving her second term as judge of the Cleveland Municipal Court. She is the first black woman in Ohio to be elected to a judgeship without first being appointed. Very involved with civic affairs, she is the chair of the Task Force on Violent Crime and is a member of the Cleveland Board of Education's Adult Continuing Education Advisory Committee and Board of Trustees of Templum House (a shelter for battered women). Connally, a 1967 graduate of BGSU, is serving as Board of Trustees representative to the Firelands Advisory Board and is a former member of the Alumni Association's Board of Trustees. She was appointed to the Board in 1988 for a term ending in 1997.

## JOHN A. LASKEY

John "Jack" Laskey of Perrysburg is the chairman and president of Port Lawrence Title and Trust Co. He also is an owner of GulfAtlantic Title Insurance Group which has offices in Orlando, Palm Beach and Daytona, Florida. Actively involved in regional economic development, Laskey has served as a trustee of the Toledo Area Chamber of Commerce and the Mid-American Council on Economic Development. He has written two books on the economics of the area entitled, "Toledo Toward 2000" and "Inside America's Waterbelt." Laskey, who attended the University of Notre Dame, was appointed to the Board in June 1989. His term expires in 1998.

## JOHN C. MAHANEY JR.

John C. Mahaney Jr. is the president of the Ohio Council of Retail Merchants in Columbus. He is also director of the American Retail Federation and serves on its executive, federal affairs and policy committees. A graduate of Niagara University, he is a former sports editor of the Piqua "Daily Call" and sales manager for radio station WJMA in Orange, Va. He was appointed to the Board in 1987 and his term expires in 1996.

G. Ray Medlin Jr. of Toledo is executive secretary treasurer/business manager of the Northwest Ohio District Council of Carpenters and is responsible for contractor relations. He also is president of the Northwest Ohio Building and Construction Trade Unions, representing 10,000 members throughout northwest Ohio. The council consists of 19 affiliated local unions. He has received certification from the George Meany Institute in labor law, the Ohio State Workers Compensation Institute and the International Foundation of Employee Benefit Plans. His term will expire in 1999.

Nick J. Mileti, vice president of the Board, currently resides in Beverly Hills, Calif. An entrepreneur, he is well-known throughout the state and in his hometown of Cleveland for his careers in law, real estate development, broadcasting and sports. In 1970 he created the Cleveland Cavaliers professional basketball team and in 1972 purchased the Cleveland Indians baseball team. As a major contributor to the Alumni Center fund drive and other fund raising programs on campus, the Alumni Association's Board of Trustees voted to name the Alumni Center in his honor. Mileti is a 1953 graduate of Bowling Green and was appointed to the Board in 1985 for a term that expires in 1994.

## G.O. HERBERT MOOREHEAD JR.

G.O. Herbert Moorehead Jr. is the branch manager for AT&T Information Systems, overseeing the major accounts group in southeastern Michigan. He is a 1957 graduate of Bowling Green and earned a master's degree in management from Pace University in New York City. He and his wife, Dorothy, a 1956 University graduate, are both former members of the Alumni Association Board of Trustees. Moorehead is a Dale Carnegie Human Relations Award winner and has served on the Minority Empowerment Committee Board of the Episcopal Diocese of southern Ohio. Now residing in Detroit, Moorehead was appointed to the Board in 1986. His term will expire in 1995.

## RICHARD A. NEWLOVE

Richard A. Newlove, president of the board, is the president of Newlove Realty Inc. and has been active in residential real estate development in Bowling Green since his 1969 graduation from the University. A native of Bowling Green, he is active in community affairs and is a co-founder and past president of the Bowling Green Community Development Foundation and was appointed by the governor to the Capitol Square Renovation Foundation. A former city council member, he is also a member of the Alumni Association, the Falcon Club, the Century Club and the Presidents Club. He was appointed to the Board in 1983 and his term expires in 1992.

## THOMAS W. NOE

Thomas W. Noe is founder and president of Numismatic Investments of Ohio in Sylvania. A native of Bowling Green, he has been a full-time coin dealer since 1973. He is a member of numerous organizations including the Professional Numismatic Guild and vice chairman of the Industry Council for Tangible Assets. Active in the community, he is a member of the Toldeo and Sylvania Chambers of Commerce and the Rotary Club of Toledo. He is also chairman of the Board of Trustees at Lourdes College and a member of the Board of Directors of the St. Vincent Medical Center Foundation. He is a member of the BGSU Falcon Club. His term will expire in 2000.

## VIRGINIA B. PLATT

Virginia Platt is professor emerita of history and taught at the University for nearly 30 years before retiring in 1975. She has authored a number of history publications and has been active in and has held key leadership positions in several organizations. She was the first woman to be elected president of the Ohio Academy of History and was president for three years of the Ohio-Indiana American Studies Association. A resident of Bowling Green, she was appointed to the Board in 1984 for a term ending in 1993.

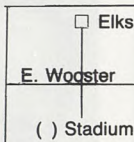

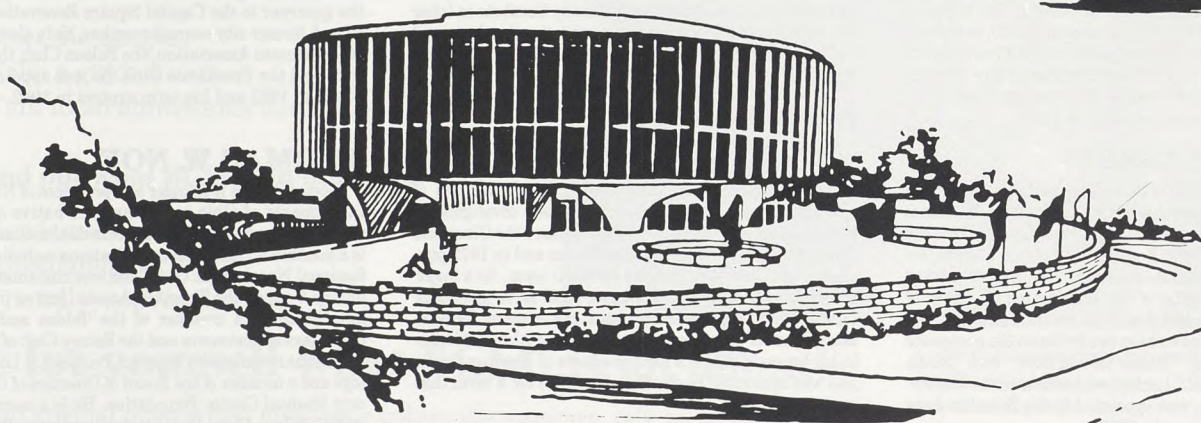

"An Environment for Excellence." Dr. Paul J. Olscamp adopted that slogan for his administration when he became Bowling Green State University's eighth president in 1982.

To create that environment, he charted a course that has moved Bowling Green into the ranks of the country's most important colleges and universities. The effort focuses on teaching, research and service and involves a University-wide commitment to excellence.

Since arriving on campus, everything the president has done has been aimed at fulfilling that vision. Early in his administration, Olscamp and the faculty outlined the task ahead in a 27-goal document called the Role and Mission Statement. Most of the goals centered on improving the quality of incoming undergraduate and graduate students, the academic programs, the learning environment and the faculty and its resources.

Now, as Olscamp begins his 10th year at Bowling Green, many of those original goals have been met and new priorities have been established, including the recruitment of minority faculty and students, and greater emphasis upon research production.

One of his most important accomplishments has been to fully involve the faculty in University governance. Faculty now have a key role in developing the annual budget and share authority with the president in interpreting the University's Academic Charter. The faculty also have greater control over the curriculum and development of new academic programs.

While always a concern, finances have taken center stage in recent years. With a tightening state budget, Olscamp has directed efforts to increase private giving. During his tenure, the school's endowment has increased to nearly \$32 million from \$1.9 million when he arrived. Private contributions in 1990-91 exceeded \$4 million.

In 1985, in an effort to increase minority representation on the campus, Olscamp ordered the creation of the Office of Multicultural Affairs to provide services to assist minority students. Recruitment efforts also were increased, with the Office of Admissions adding a director of minority recruitment. In addition, the University has increased the number of minority faculty, with the assistance of a special minority hiring fund.

Olscamp also brings a personal touch to his presidency. He frequently hosts both students and faculty as his home. He also holds periodic forums with students wanting to discuss campus issues.

A great deal has happened at Bowling Green since 1982. Here are some of the highlights:

#### Academic Programs

\*Creation of Bowling Green's first endowed professorships, in management,

finance, chemistry and philosophy.

\*Development of the Center for Photochemical Sciences, the only one of its kind in the country. Photochemistry is a multibillion dollar growth industry and some key research for that industry is being conducted at Bowling Green.

\*Development of the Center for Quality, Measurement and Automation, the only center of its kind in the state designed to assist manufacturing and other businesses in the design and production of products.

\*The appointments of three Ohio Eminent Scholars in photochemical sciences, moral philosophy and industrial/organizational psychology; the positions are the result of three \$500,000 grants from the Ohio Board of Regents.

\*The addition of doctoral programs in applied philosophy and photochemical sciences; the 13th and 14th Ph.D. offerings at Bowling Green.

\*In 1991, 52 freshmen who are also National Merit scholars enrolled at Bowling Green; in the past four years, more than 180 scholars have attended the University, a total which places Bowling Green among the top 25 universities in the country.

\*Establishment of the University's first major scholarships for minority students.

\*Creation of a network of computer labs throughout the campus, including labs in each residence hall. This year computers are being installed in each room of one residence hall, part of a pilot project which could result in a computer being placed in every residence hall room on campus.

\*Securing more than \$5 million from the Board of Regent's Selective Excellence Programs, which are designed to attract top scholars, conduct pioneering research and develop centers of excellence. Grants have been awarded in both the sciences and the humanities.

\*Expansion of the library's holdings to more than four million items, including 1.6 million books, plus journals, periodicals, microforms, government documents and other materials.

\*Development of the Student Telephone Accessed Registration system which enables students to schedule their classes from a touchtone telephone. The STAR system has made long registration lines a part of University history.

#### Physical Plant

\*More than \$116 million has been spent in the past 10 years for the construction of new buildings and upgrading existing buildings.

\*Completion of the \$7.2 million Physical Sciences Laboratory Building in 1984 and a \$3.65 million addition to the Business Administration Building in 1988.

\*Work is now underway to construct a \$9.1 million addition to the Fine Arts Building.

\*Major renovation and refurbishing of existing campus buildings including Williams, Overman, Hayes and Shatzel halls, and Eppler Complex. construction of a \$2 million office building to house faculty and staff temporarily displaced by renovation projects and later to be used for permanent offices.

#### University Finances

\*Creation of an internal endowment fund of \$4 million from various University reserves. The balance is more than \$8 million and is expected to reach \$10 million in two years. Interest on the \$10 million principle will be used to supplement the academic budget.

\*Development of a plan to restructure debt service obligations which is projected to result in a \$35 million principle in 11 years. Interest on that amount, which could approach \$3 million annually, will go toward the academic budget.

\*Completion of the most successful fund raising drive in University history. With the assistance of the development and alumni offices, the 75th Anniversary Fund raised more than \$15 million in three years; well above the \$12.5 million goal. Donations included the University's first two \$1 million gifts—from the Stranahan Foundation of Toledo for the Social Philosophy and Policy Center and from Harold and Helen McMaster of Perrysburg for the McMaster Leadership Institute. In 1988 the Stranahan Foundation awarded a \$3 million grant to the Social Philosophy and Policy Center.

As we move further into the final decade of the 20th century, the Bowling Green State University athletic department continues to maintain its status as one of the top programs in the country.

Bowling Green sports teams of the 1980s achieved a level of success matched by few and the 90s seem headed in the same direction.

Bowling Green claimed 23 conference titles during the 1980s, 19 in the Mid-American Conference and four in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association. Twenty-one teams were involved in post-season play in the NCAA, NIT and California Bowl.

The first year of the 90s yielded two BGSU teams that earned spots in postseason play.

Each of the 19 Falcon sports teams has helped build and maintain the "Winning Tradition" at BGSU...

**BASEBALL**—The program has a young, energetic leader in second-year head coach Danny Schmitz who will be looking to develop one of the top programs in the region. Schmitz, who played eight seasons of professional baseball, coached in the minor leagues at the AAA level. Many former BGSU players have gone on to play professional baseball including two of the top pitchers in the game today—Roger McDowell of the Philadelphia Phillies and Orel Hershiser of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

**MEN'S BASKETBALL**—Coach Jim Larranaga's Falcons have accomplished something the last two years that hasn't happened at BG since the early 60s. Last year's NIT team made it consecutive postseason appearances for the basketball program for the first time since the 1962-63 season. The Falcons, who have beaten Big 10 power Michigan State each of the last two seasons, have been ranked among the top 20 teams in the country in the *USA Today* computer rankings each of the last two years. Historically, BGSU leads the MAC in postseason appearances (23 games) and victories (eight).

**WOMEN'S BASKETBALL**—Coach Fran Voll, a two-time MAC Coach of the Year, has led the Falcons to four MAC Tournament Championships and four NCAA Tournament appearances. Certainly one of the premier teams in the MAC, BG has ruled the conference compiling a 67-13 league record the last five years. The success of the program has attracted large crowds to Anderson Arena, including an MAC-record crowd of 4,100 for BG's NCAA Tournament victory over Cincinnati in 1989.

**CROSS COUNTRY**—Bowling Green begins the 1990s with Sid Sink in charge of the men and Steve Price directing the women. Sink, a former track and cross country All-American at BGSU, coached the BG women to four CC titles in the 1980s. Now, he's out working his magic with the Falcon men. Price, an experienced coach on the national and international level, is in his second year as the head coach.

**FOOTBALL**—Bowling Green's football program will take a "new direction" in 1991 as former Ohio State assistant coach Gary Blackney begins his first season heading the program. The program has a renewed enthusiasm under Blackney, who will have 38 returning letterwinners, including eight on defense. The BG defense was among the top 15 in the country last season in scoring defense. BG has a rich

tradition having won two MAC titles and two trips to the California Raisin Bowl in the 1980s, while also setting the MAC single-game attendance record of 33,527 at Doyt Perry Field.

**GOLF**—Coach Greg Nye's men's and women's golf teams play on some of the most challenging courses in the country and in some of the most prestigious tournaments on the collegiate level. The Falcon men's program has won four MAC Championships and made four NCAA Tournament appearances while the women's program is annually among the best in the region.

**GYMNASTICS**—Year in and year out, Coach Charles Simpson fields an MAC title contender. With three MAC titles since 1980, the Falcons have qualified as a team for postseason competition five of the last eight years, including last season. In each of the last three seasons, his teams have consistently increased the school record for team score, led by Mary Beth Friel, who has qualified for the NCAA regional meet each of the last two seasons.

**HOCKEY**—A winning tradition is what the Falcon hockey program is all about. One of only five teams in the country to earn 20 or more wins every year between 1981 and 1990, BGSU will be looking to make its fifth NCAA Tournament appearance in the last six years this season. In all, the Falcons have appeared in nine NCAA Tournaments winning the 1984 national title. Coach Jerry York ranks among the best collegiate coaches of all-time with 421 career wins having led the Falcons to four CCHA regular season championships and one league playoff title. In all, the Falcons have won seven conference titles. BGSU has produced some of college hockey's greatest names, including 15 players who currently play in the NHL or with an NHL affiliate.

**SOCCER**—Coach Gary Palmisano's Falcons posted a winning record in all but one year of the 1980s and his teams in the

90s will look to continue that tradition. Perennially one of the top teams in the region, the Falcons should have one of their strongest teams in years this season. The BGSU schedule annually includes perennial NCAA power Indiana and other top teams in the region. BGSU also hosts the Kwik Goal/BGSU Classic having won the title in four of the six years the tournament has been contested.

**SOFTBALL**—Head coach Jacquie Joseph begins her fourth year in charge of the Falcon softball program. Four strong recruiting classes should produce a BG team that will be ready to challenge for the MAC title. The Falcons last won the MAC Championship in 1988, a year that ended with BGSU playing host to the NCAA Midwest Regionals.

**SWIMMING**—Coach Brian Gordon, MAC Co-Coach of the Year in 1988, is back for his fifth year with the Falcon men and women hoping to reap the benefits of his work recruiting during that time. The Falcon women have made winning a habit. It began with the 1981 MAC Championship and continued with second-place finishes in each of the next seven seasons. The Falcons train at beautiful Cooper Pool, one of the midwest's top swimming and diving facilities.

**TENNIS**—The Falcon tennis teams have

the advantage of playing and practicing at one of the finest facilities of its kind in the region—Robert Keefe Courts. The men's team, under the guidance of fourth-year coach Gene Orlando, is continuing to improve and will have three veterans returning this season. The women's program is under the guidance of Penny Dean, who is beginning her second year.

**TRACK & FIELD**—Bowling Green, long associated with success in track and field, is fast becoming a regional power in field events. The Falcon men have claimed an MAC champion in the shot put or discus in three of the last four years, while the Falcon women have produced the last four MAC discus champions, including two-time All-American Beth Manson. Sid Sink heads the men's track team, while Steve Price directs the women's program.

**VOLLEYBALL**—Seven years of hard work by head coach Denise Van De Walle paid off in 1989 as the Falcons captured the regular-season MAC title breaking Western Michigan's seven-year stranglehold and the Broncos 98-match league winning streak. Van De Walle, three times named the league Coach of the Year, has a chance to repeat the 1989 season this year as she will have all 10 players returning from a team that compiled a 26-7 record last year. BG has won 20 or more matches four of the last five years.

# VARSIY BG CLUB HONORS THREE

This afternoon is Varsity BG Day, the annual celebration that brings former Bowling Green State University letter-winners back for a day of football, fellowship and feasting.

It will also be a day to remember for three men, John Weinert, Brigadier General William E. Gernert '38 and H. Richard Dunipace '42, who have given their time and effort to the University over the years. They will be recognized prior to the start of the game.

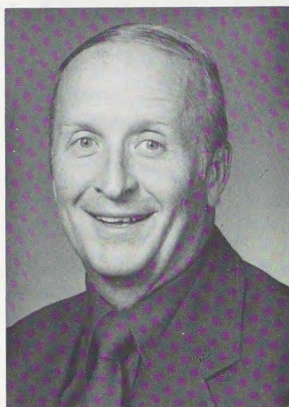
Following the football game a reception for the three honorees will be held at the Veteran's Building at the Bowling Green City Park, off of Conneaut Street, until 6 p.m. Drinks and snacks will be served. The reception is free and you are encouraged to bring family and friends.

Weinert, whose basketball teams won 146 games between 1976 and 1986, will receive the Honorary Letterman's Award, Gernert will receive the Golden Letterman's Award and Dunipace was selected to receive the Silver Letterman's Award. The Honorary Letterman's Award is presented to someone who has made a significant contribution to BGSU athletics but is not a letterwinner. The Golden Letterman's Award is given to a BGSU letterwinner who graduated 50 years ago and prior (1915-1941) while the Silver Letterman's Award is presented to a letterwinner who graduated at least 25 years ago but after 1941.

Weinert came to the BGSU basketball program in 1976 and had two MAC championship teams (1981, 1983) and six winning seasons. Prior to coming to BG, the Milwaukee, Wis. native coached at Rufus King High School in his hometown, Ripon College (Wis.) and St. Joseph's College (Ind.). At St. Joseph's, Weinert's four teams compiled a record of 72-39 and appeared in four NCAA Division II Tournaments.

Weinert, who was recently honored by the Varsity BG Club with a clock upon his announcement that he was retiring from work in the athletic department at the end of the last academic year. Weinert had been a field representative for the Falcon Club since his retirement from coaching in 1986.

In addition to two MAC championship teams, Weinert also put two Falcon

squads in the NIT tournament while six of his teams finished in the top half of the MAC standings. Weinert was named the MAC Coach of the Year in 1978.

Weinert produced All-MAC standouts such as David Jenkins, Colin Irish, David Greer and Keith Taylor, to name a few, during his tenure. His 10-year record of 146-133 places him third on the BG coaching list in wins and winning percentage.

Gernert, earned three letters in track (1936, 37, 38) as a sprinter and hurdler while he was also a member of relay teams. Gernert was one member of the foursome which set the school record in the 440 yard relay in 1938 at the Ohio Conference meet.

The Bowling Green, Ohio native, who now resides in Colorado Springs, Colo., was an honor student in chemistry and math gaining an appointment to the U.S. Military Academy in 1938. After graduating from the Army in 1942 with a civil engineering degree, Gernert began a career in the Air Force which would last 28 years.

During his career in the Air Force, Gernert earned numerous honors including a Purple Heart, awarded to military personnel wounded in battle, the Legion of Merit, awarded for specific accomplishments in the military, the Distinguished Flying Cross, awarded to people who have excelled in battle, and five Air Medals, awarded to military personnel based on the number of missions flown. Gernert flew 32 missions in the Pacific during World War II.

After advancing to the classification

of brigadier general, just three steps below general, Gernert, 74, set up a real estate appraisal company in Colorado Springs. He is still involved in the real estate business in Colorado Springs. Active in the Rotary and the Masonic Lodge, Gernert and his wife, the former Mary Alice Hawley '39, will celebrate 50 years of marriage in May.

He is a lifetime member of the Varsity BG Club and the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity. Gernert earned his MBA from Ohio State in 1948.

A lifetime Bowling Green resident, Dunipace spent the 1939 season as a back-up guard for Coach Harry Ockerman before earning his football letter in 1940 as the starting guard.

Dunipace, 71, was active in student life at BGSU serving as editor and sports editor of the BG News in 1941 and 1942. A member of the Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity, Dunipace was also active in student government.

After serving in the Southwest Pacific during World War II as a member of the Army, Dunipace attended the Ohio State Law School and returned to his hometown to set up a practice, in which he is still active along with his son, John. He also served as the local judge for 12 years.

Dunipace has seen five of his six kids graduate from BGSU. He and his wife, the former Elizabeth McClain '43, have been married for 48 years. Dunipace has been active in many community organizations, is a lifetime member of the Varsity BG Club and has been a member of the Falcon Club for 22 years.

Since his appointment 10 years ago as director of athletics at Bowling Green State University, John C. (Jack) Gregory has set a standard of excellence designed to place Falcon men's and women's teams on equal terms with today's elite intercollegiate athletic programs.

To reach these goals, Gregory challenges his staff of administrators, coaches and classified personnel to settle for nothing less than the very best. His challenge has resulted in some of the finest moments in the history of intercollegiate athletics at BGSU:

- the 1984 NCAA Division I Ice Hockey Championship;
- 13 Mid-American Conference regular season championships in football, men's and women's basketball, softball, women's cross country, gymnastics, men's golf, and volleyball;
- two California Bowl appearances;
- four MAC postseason tournament championships;
- three Central Collegiate Hockey Association regular season championships;
- one CCHA postseason tournament championship;
- 15 NCAA Tournament appearances in hockey, basketball, softball and gymnastics, including 11 in the last five years, the most of any MAC school over the period;
- three home NCAA Tournament berths in hockey, softball and women's basketball;
- and the 1987-88 Jacoby Trophy, awarded annually to the MAC school with the best overall record in women's sports.

Postseason appearances by the men's basketball and the women gymnastics teams highlighted the 1990-91 year. The appearance of the men's basketball team in the NIT for the second consecutive year marked the first time since the early 60s that the program had earned back-to-back postseason invitations.

The 1989-90 school year was highlighted by three Falcon teams advancing to postseason play. Hockey and women's basketball returned to the NCAA Tournament, while men's basketball played in the NIT. In 1989-90, Bowling Green was the only school in the country that sent teams to national postseason tournaments in those three sports.

Gregory came to Bowling Green during one of the most difficult periods in the school's 72 years of intercollegiate athletics, a time when BGSU

and the MAC were fighting for NCAA Division I-A status in football. Behind Gregory's leadership, the football program attained I-A status.

Record crowds have attended Falcon football, hockey and women's basketball games during Gregory's tenure. Soccer, volleyball, gymnastics and softball are drawing larger crowds, too.

Another "first" during Gregory's tenure occurred in the fall of 1989 when more than 25,000 fans turned out for the first night game in Perry Field history.

In 1983, 33,527 fans packed Perry Field to witness the Bowling Green-Toledo football clash, one of college football's best rivalries. BGSU and MAC single game attendance marks fell that afternoon. Two years later, the Falcons drew a record 112,110 fans for five home games, giv-

ing BGSU the second-largest average attendance (22,422) in MAC history. In 1987, Bowling Green set still another MAC attendance record by playing in front of 84,574 fans at Penn State.

Sell-out crowds for BGSU hockey games are a tradition. The 1989-90 season featured the addition of 1,700 seats to the BGSU Ice Arena, and all attendance records were broken, including single game (5,005) and season (79,376) marks.

With the world of college athletics changing constantly, it is important for Gregory to be as active on the national level as he is. Gregory has served on numerous NCAA committees including the Executive Committee and is one of the most active athletic directors on a national level in the MAC. He has also served in many different capacities on the conference level, in both the MAC and CCHA.

Gregory, 63, has also been instrumental in the development of the Falcon Club, the University's official athletic department booster club. Recent membership drives have encompassed all of northern and west central Ohio, resulting in unparalleled growth in cash and pledges. The Falcon Club has more than doubled its income and grown to such an extent that it compares favorably with any athletic support organization in the country.

Still, Gregory understands the integrity of college athletics depends on the continued emphasis of the "student" in student-athlete. In that regard, he appointed an academic coordinator in 1984, the first such appointment in the MAC.

Many BGSU student-athletes have excelled in the classroom. Volleyball's Linda Popovich became the MAC's first female to receive the Byers Scholarship in May, 1990. There were more than 170 BGSU scholar-athletes with grade point average of 3.0 or better in 1990-91, including one who was named an Academic All-American, raising the total to 15 Academic All-Americans in the last five years.

A 1952 graduate of East Stroudsburg State College and holder of a master's degree from Temple University, Gregory was a teacher and coach at William Penn High School in New Castle, Delaware, and later at P.S. Dupont High School in Wilmington, Delaware. In 1959, he returned to East Stroudsburg as head football coach and assistant professor of physical education. One of the most successful coaches in the school's history, Gregory was inducted into the East Stroudsburg Athletic Hall of Fame in October, 1983.

In 1965, Gregory was named assistant football coach at the U.S. Naval Academy. Two years later, he was named head football coach at Villanova University. In 1969, he moved to the University of Rhode Island, where he served as head football coach for seven years.

In his 25 years as a head coach, Gregory's teams compiled a record of 132-69, including four undefeated seasons and seven league championships. He was twice selected as NAIA Coach of the Year, twice selected as Pennsylvania Coach of the Year and was named NCAA District Coach of the Year once.

Gregory joined the Green Bay Packers of the National Football League in 1976 and served in the personnel department for three years, before becoming associate athletic director at Yale University from 1978-82.

Jack and his wife, Peg, reside in Bowling Green and are the parents of two sons and two grandchildren.

## Retired Jersey

The only football jersey ever retired at Bowling Green is #29. It was worn by Paul Miles from 1971-73, when he rushed for 3,239 yards and 25 touchdowns. He was a three-time All-Mid-American Conference running back, gaining more than 1,000 yards in each of his three years on the varsity.

## Frieda & Freddie Falcon

Frieda Falcon and Freddie Falcon are the official mascots of the Bowling Green Falcons. Together with the BGSU Cheerleaders, Frieda and Freddie boost spirit at intercollegiate athletic events. Tryouts are held each spring, and the winners remain anonymous to the student body until each is beheaded at the last home hockey and basketball games. The Freddie Falcon tradition began in 1950 while Frieda Falcon was added in the 1979-80 athletic year.

## Ay Ziggy Zoomba

Bowling Green's unofficial fight song. (The official fight song is "Forward Falcons"). No one knows who wrote "Ay Ziggy Zoomba," but it became famous nationally when former Falcon All-American and Detroit Lion All-Pro halfback Mike Weger sang it in the film, "Paper Lion." The Falcon football team traditionally sings "Ay Ziggy Zoomba" after each victory.

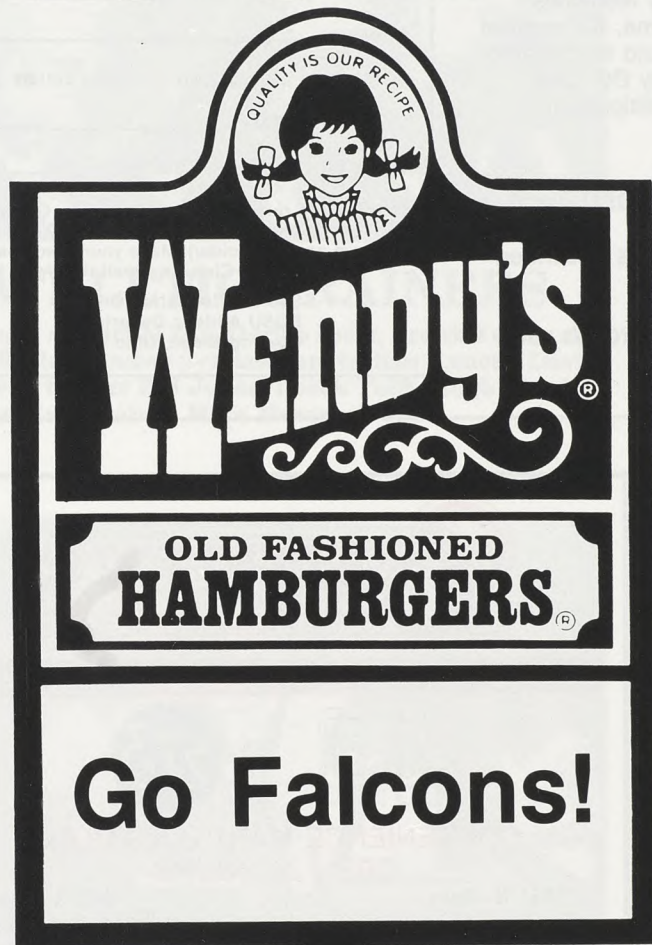
## Why The Falcons?

The 1989 season marks the 62nd anniversary of Bowling Green's nickname, Falcons. Before 1927, BG teams were called the Normals or Teachers. Ivan Lake '23 suggested the nickname, Falcons, after reading an article on falconry. Lake, managing editor and sports editor of the BG Sentinel-Tribune at the time, proposed the name change because it fit headline space and because falcons were "the most powerful bird for their size and often attacked birds two or three times their size."

## Why Orange and Brown?

Burnt Orange and Seal Brown have been the school colors at Bowling Green State University since 1914, the first year of classes. Legend has it that Leon Winslow, an industrial arts faculty member, got the idea from watching a woman's hat on a bus trip to nearby Toledo, OH. He liked the brown and orange color combination.

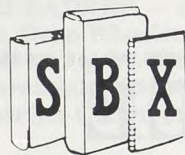

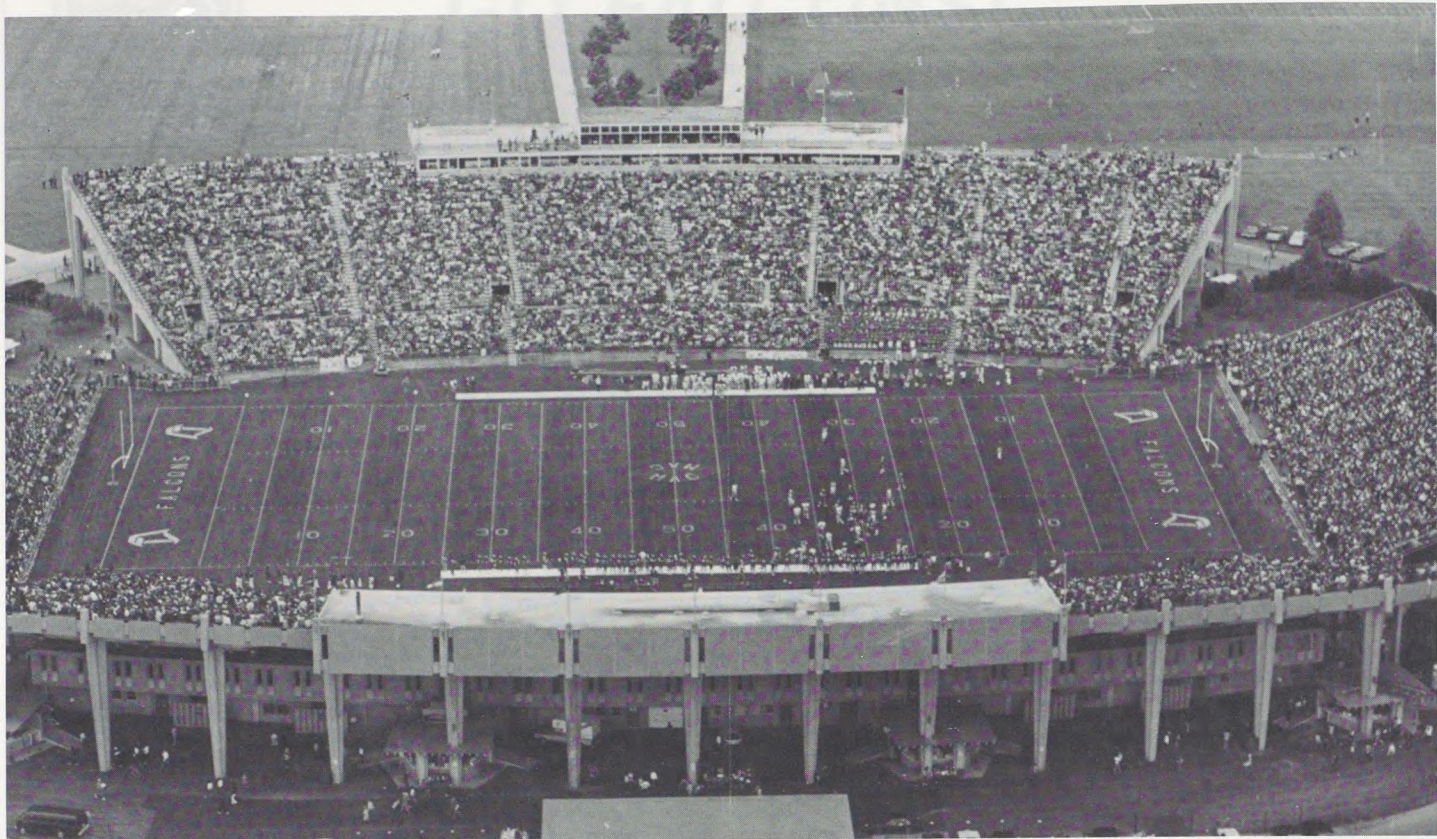

## DOYT L. PERRY FIELD



### Bowling Green holds the MAC record for single-game attendance (33,527).

Doyt L. Perry Field, with its 30,000-plus seating capacity, is celebrating its 26th year as the home of Bowling Green State University football.

Built in 1966 for approximately \$3 million as a replacement for the 43-year-old University Stadium, Perry Field had a capacity of 23,272 until bleacher seats were installed in both end zones in 1982.

One of the largest and most attractive athletic facilities in the Mid-American Conference, Perry Field holds the conference record for single-game attendance.

On October 8, 1983, a huge crowd of 33,527 packed into Perry Field for the annual Northwest Ohio rivalry between Bowling Green and Toledo, establishing a school and MAC record for single-game attendance. The Falcons went on to set a season record, breaking the six-digit figure for five games with a total draw of 100,021. It marked the first time in history that Bowling Green averaged more than 20,000 fans for five home football games.

That figure was topped in 1985, when Bowling Green posted a perfect record (11-0) in the regular season and clinched the MAC Championship by shutting out arch-rival Toledo at Perry Field in November. More than 28,000 fans turned out that day, raising Bowling Green's season attendance to an all-time high 112,000, an average of 22,400.

Perry Field is more than just a football facility. The east side of the stadium includes dressing rooms, equipment and training rooms, along with the Athletic

Department offices. The west side received a face-lift three years ago. A physical fitness center/weight room opened its doors for all 19 intercollegiate athletic teams in the summer of 1988.

Also situated on the west side of Perry Field are the Falcon Club offices and clubhouse, the academic affairs office, the track and cross country offices, as well as maintenance and storage areas.

Sitting atop the press box on the west side of the stadium is the plush Stadium Club. Now in its 12th year of operation, the

Stadium Club's 106 theater-type seats, which are all sold, provide loyal BGSU fans with a fine view of the game. The President's Box, located on top of the east side of the stadium, provides luxury seating for President Paul J. Olscamp and other supporters of Falcon football.

Bowling Green won the first game ever played in Perry Field, defeating Dayton, 13-0, on October 1, 1966. Since that time, the Falcons have won almost 65 percent of their home games, compiling a 76-42-5 record in the 123 games played at Perry

Field. Over the last eight seasons, Bowling Green is 27-9-3 at home for a .731 winning percentage.

A multi-purpose facility, Perry Field has also hosted concerts, NFL exhibition games, and major soccer tournaments.

Perry Field is named in honor of the man who led Bowling Green to a 77-11-5 record in his 10 years as the head coach of the Falcons. Doyt L. Perry was simply one of the greatest football coaches of his day. His .855 winning percentage over 10 seasons in the 1950s and 1960s remains one of the highest in football history. In fact, according to James Van Valkenburg, director of statistics for the NCAA, only two coaches on the Division 1-A list are above that figure — Knute Rockne at .881 (Notre Dame) and Frank Leahy at .864 (Boston College and Notre Dame).

Perry, 81, known for his well-organized practices and attention-to-detail meetings, never stopped thinking of ways to succeed. He was a winner in football and as a high school basketball coach. His basketball teams were 161-35 over nine seasons and his high school track teams won 70 county titles in nine years.

“First, I always tried to get the best assistant coaches possible,” Perry said of his success. “Then we sought to eliminate mistakes as much as possible.”

After stepping down as Bowling Green’s head football coach in 1964, Doyt Perry remained as the BGSU athletic director for six years.

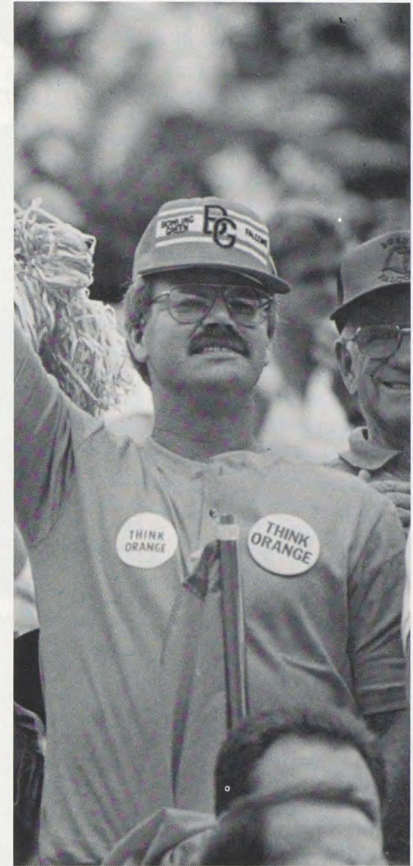

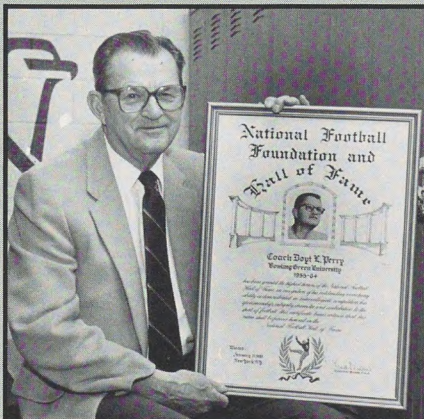

## DOYT PERRY 1988 College Football Hall of Fame Inductee



Doyt Perry

The year 1988 will be fondly remembered by Doyt Perry, the former player, coach and administrator at Bowling Green State University.

In January of '88, he learned that he would be an inductee into the National Football Foundation's College Football Hall of Fame.

In October, when Bowling Green hosted Miami at Doyt L. Perry Field, the man in whose honor the stadium was named was there for a special on-campus presentation by the National Football Foundation.

In December, Perry was in New York for the Foundation's Hall of Fame Dinner. He was officially enshrined into the College Football Hall of Fame at Kings Island, OH, the following June.

Perry's association with BGSU dates back 60 years when, as a student he lettered nine times in three sports (football, basketball and baseball). The

Croton, OH, native received his degree in 1932 and began coaching on the high school level before becoming an assistant football coach at Ohio State University in 1951.

Perry returned to his alma mater as head football coach in 1955. The next 10 years, he led the Falcons to a 77-11-5 record for a winning percentage of .855, topped only by Knute Rockne and Frank Leahy of Notre Dame. His teams won five MAC Championships and the national college division championship in 1959.

Perry, who retired from coaching in 1964 to become BGSU's athletic director for six years, developed such outstanding coaches as Jim Young of Army, Bill Mallory of Indiana, Don Nehlen of West Virginia, Larry Smith of Southern California, and the late Dave McClain of Wisconsin.

# YOUNG SQUAD LOOKS FOR THIRD POSTSEASON BERTH

What a difference a year makes.

Last year at this time, Bowling Green State University head basketball coach Jim Larranaga faced a 1990-91 season in which he would have his top 11 players returning while not losing one player from an 18-11 squad that earned a berth in the National Invitation Tournament.

After a 17-13 campaign and a second consecutive NIT berth last year, Larranaga and his staff will have one of the youngest teams in the Mid-American Conference, if not the youngest, this year.

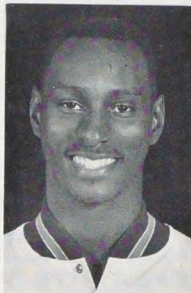
Gone are two of the top players in the conference in point guard Clinton Venable and forward Joe Moore. In combination with the other four letterwinners, two of which who were 6-9, the Falcons are losing nearly 70% of their scoring and rebounding power.

"Our biggest concern is that we lost a great deal of our offense and rebounding to graduation," Larranaga said.

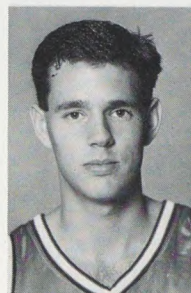
"We will be relying very heavily on inexperienced players or players who have had limited roles in previous seasons. Now those roles will be expanded. We will also be expecting a contribution from a lot of new faces. It will be very important for those players (the returning players in the program) to adjust very quickly to the role they have this year."

BGSU does return three players, who will be the core of the team, who have seen a great deal of playing time during their careers. Two of the three are seniors, the only seniors on the team.

Forward Tom Hall has been one of the top sixth men in the league the last three years playing in all 87 games, but making just eight starts. His ability to make the next

step to a starting role is one of the important questions that will be answered this season.

The other returning senior is guard Kirk Whiteman, the best three-point shooter of the returning nucleus. He has been slowed by back spasms the last two years, but his outside shooting, especially in the half-court situation, could be a factor that swings some games BG's way.

The only other player on the roster with any extensive collegiate experience is point guard Michael Huger. After sitting out the 1989-90 season, Huger emerged last year as one of the top underclassmen in the MAC. Huger made all seven of his starts for the year in the last five weeks of the season when the Falcons were fighting for a playoff position and at the same time a postseason berth. His quickness makes him a threat at both ends of the court.

Larranaga hinted there might be a need to alter their style of play this season, but because of the personnel not the inexperience.

"We will always put a strong emphasis on pressure defense, trying to force turnovers in order to disrupt the other teams normal rhythm," Larranaga said. "We will also put a great deal of emphasis on pushing the basketball up the floor trying to get easy opportunity baskets in transition.

"However, this year we will actually have a team better suited for half court basketball with players like Jason Crump, a strong, physical low post player, and Matt Otto, a long range shooter, to go along with players like Tom Hall, Kirk Whiteman and Michael Huger who have proven they can win at the MAC level. But those three players (Hall, Whiteman and Huger), in particular, have to expand the roles they have played."

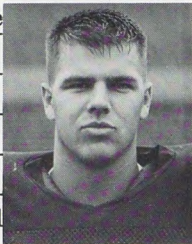
The newcomers reflect the players who have departed almost to a man. A 6-9 forward and three forwards between 6-3 and 6-6 are replaced by four players between 6-6 and 6-8. In the backcourt, the Falcons lose Venable but gain a pair of 6-3 guards, including Ray Lynch from All Hallows High School in New York City, the same high school that produced Joe Moore. Four of the seven newcomers averaged 15 points or better last season in the high school ranks.

"I do think it takes time to develop chemistry, but probably one of the biggest obstacles we face this season is getting the players familiar with the system," said Larranaga, who is beginning his sixth season at BGSU. "We have so many new faces - each of them not only has to learn what he can do, but they have to learn what their teammates can and can't do. Only time can really help in this area.

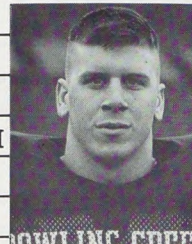
"I don't think there is any question that as the season progresses we'll learn a lot more about each other, they'll (the players) learn a lot more about the system, and they'll learn a lot more about the league and the level of competition in the collegiate ranks. That experience will be invaluable as the season draws to a climax in the months of February and March."



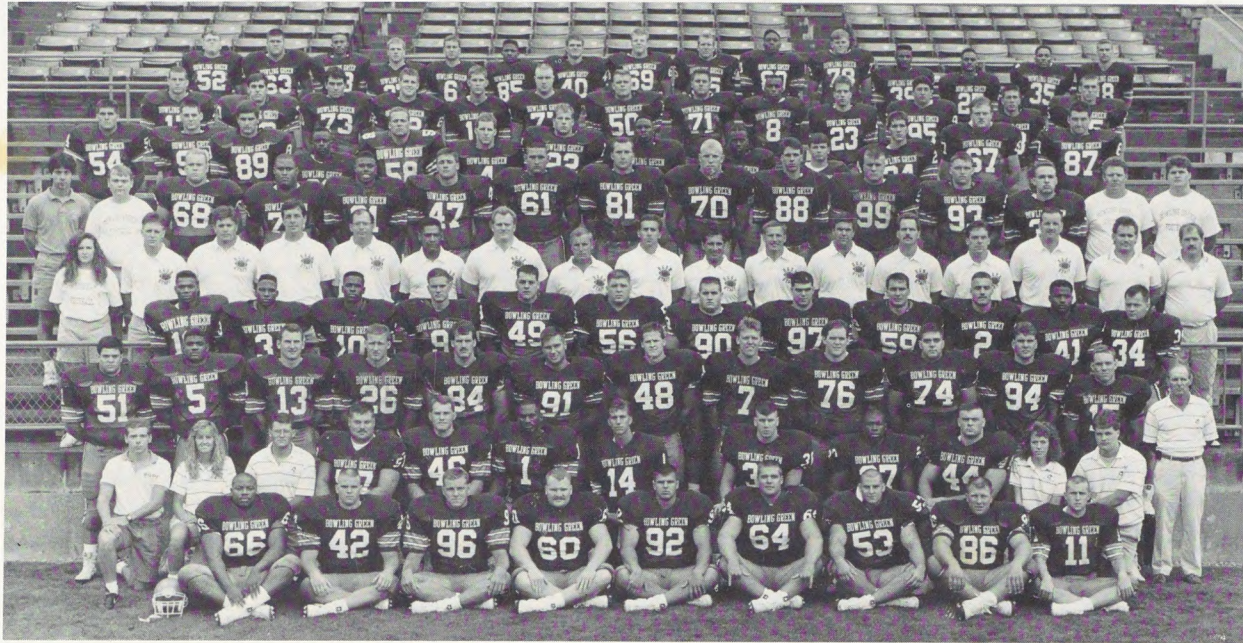
