

HOMECOMING 1944

Another year brings another Homecoming to this campus but once more war rears its ugly head and the program is streamlined to the extreme just as it was last year.

Or perhaps it is even more streamlined than before because this year finds the Homecoming Day coming before the regular fall semester has started and when the campus population includes a small fraction of the usual civilian enrollment.

Features of the program this year included the annual dance on Friday night sponsored by the Inter-fraternity Council and the Pan-Hallenic Council with the Navines providing the music.

At that time the Homecoming Queen, Miss Kay McDermott, a junior from Alliance, Ohio, was crowned by last year's queen, Miss Jeanne Powell of Bowling Green.

Tonight a movie "Wells Fargo" will be presented in the auditorium to conclude the activities. The offering features Joel McCrea and will start at 8:15.

A number of campus organizations are planning functions of their own and fraternities and sororities are attempting to carry on the best traditions of homecomina.

Dr. W. A. Zaugg, acting director of alumni relations, is in charge of the affairs but indicates that the real Homecoming is coming someday in the future when peace is restored and the "boys" are back from the job they are doing all over the world.

A KEEN RIVALRY

Bowling Green and Ohio Wesleyan have met four times on the gridiron and each has won two games. There has not been a shutout in the series to date and every game has been a thriller.

The first tilt came in 1942 when the Bishops edged the Falcons 15 to 14 after a last-quarter comeback by the Bee Gee club that made the game a dandy.

The Falcons then won from Gauthier's lads in the opener last year 18 to 7 but when the Bishops got on their home field for the return game they took the measure of the Bowling Green club 32 to 20.

This year the Staters again opened with a victory, 13 to 6, and it remains to be seen to-day whether the Bishops will again turn the tables on Whittaker's charges.

GEORGE E. GAUTHIER

Head Football Coach, Ohio Wesleyan

George E. Gauthier is in the midst of his 24th season as Ohio Wesleyan's head football coach, having served longer than any other man in the state as an active coach on one campus. His all-time record is 113 games won, 84 lost, 14 tied.

Gauthier's record in athletics is a good one. He attended Western high school in Detroit and then entered Michigan State where he was the varsity quarterback in 1912 and 1913, weighing only 133 pounds (dripping wet). He never played in a losing game. He was a regular on the basketball squad and team captain in his senior year. He also starred in track.

He was assistant football coach and head track coach at Michigan State from 1914 to 1920 and then spent a year as director of recreation at Bay City, Michigan. Gauthier went to Delaware in 1921 to take the helm of the Bishops and has remained with them ever since.

From 1921 to 1928 his teams challenged and defeated some of the finest teams in the nation. In recent years, with less plentiful material, his

record has been about 50-50. He was one of the leaders in attempting to keep intercollegiate athletics going in Ohio during wartime.

Among some of the fine memories that he carries with him are the following: 1917—A Michigan State team under his guidance defeated Notre Dame 12 to 9 to break a 3-year string of victories. George Gipp was one of the Irish players.

Ohio Conference championships in football in 1922, 1923 and 1925 and track championships in 1921, 1923, 1924 and 1925.

His leadership in organizing the Buckeye Conference which consisted of Miami, Ohio University, Denison, Cincinnati, Wittenberg and Ohio Wesleyan. The Bishops under him won the grid championships in 1925, 1926 and 1928. His track teams won the titles of 1927 and 1928.

Holding Ohio State to a 5-0 score in 1922 and 10-3 score in 1925.

Though the 1944 edition of the Bishops is the most inexperienced and youngest squad that Gauthier has ever coached, they are coming along fast. After holding a strong Case team to a 7-7 tie they were edged by Bowling Green 13 to 6 at Delaware and smothered by Denison 40 to 6 before displaying newly developed power last week to swamp DePauw 35 to 0.

GEORGE E. GAUTHIER, head coach of the Battling Bishops and director of athletics at Ohio Wesleyan, early this season began telling his green team that the "little man who is not in there on every play is the one who is going to hand the game to our opponents." To help put over the story this dummy was rigged up.

In these days of shifting campus populations football coaches have continuous nightmares. Gauthier started the season with the greenest squad he had ever thrown against intercollegiate competition. In spite of this, the lads have given a remarkably good account of themselves. But Gauthier's job will begin all over again on November 1, when most of the men on the present squad will leave the campus.





Record Of All Sports For Year 1943-1944

Bowling Green State University's athletic record last year was one of the best in its history if not the best. The football team would have ranked with the best in Ohio had not the season extended beyond the first term of the V-12 when withdrawals of seniors to officers training depleted the squad and resulted in the loss of the last two games.

The basketball team shared the Ohio College title with Denison and then accepted an invitation to play in the Annual Madison Square Garden Invitational tournament in New York City losing in the first game to the ultimate champion, St. Johns College of New York.

The track team was undefeated in dual competition, won the Northeast Ohio A.A.U. meet at Berea and the Ohio College meet at Ohio Wesleyan, including among their victims, Ohio State, and thereby being undisputed state champion.

The baseball team won the Ohio College title last spring. They also won three out of four from Camp Perry, the service-team champion in the middlewest.

The record of each sport—Football—won 5, lost 3, tied 1; basketball—won 22, lost 4; swimming—won 1, lost 5; baseball—won 20, lost 3; trackwon 6, lost 0. Totals for the year—Victories 54. Losses 15, ties 1.

ALUMNI DIRECTOR

The appointment of Dr. Walter A. Zaugg as acting director of Alumni Relations last spring was a most popular decision among graduates and former students of Bowling Green State University. He temporarily assumes the place left vacant by the death last fall of Dr. Homer B. Williams. He has been promised that a permanent appointment will be made at the close of the war to relieve him.

Dr. Zaugg came to Bowling Green in 1923 and since then has won a permanent place in the esteem of everyone. He holds three posts now. They are: Professor of Education, Director of the Bureau of Appointments and Acting Director of Alumni Relations. In addition he finds time for many speaking engagements throughout this part of the state and is very active in Rotary Club activities.
