



Roughly one-half of marriages will end in divorce (Kennedy and Ruggles, 2014; Amato, 2010). Between 1990 and 2010, the divorce rate for people over age 50 doubled. Now, 1 in 4 individuals who gets divorced is aged 50 and older (Brown and Lin, 2012). We use data from the 2010 Health and Retirement Study to compare people ages 50 and older who divorce before versus after age 50 and also include individuals who experienced a divorce both prior to and following age 50, termed "divorce careerists."
