orientation, but members of the Panhellenic executive board began preparing months in advance.
"Rush is a year-long process and hundreds and hundreds of hours of time and effort are put into it," said Laurie Allen, assistant director of Greek Life.

Debbie Nolan, vice president of rush for the Panhellenic Council said she put in an average of 30 hours a week after she was installed December 1987.
"I attended leadership conferences, prepared rush chairwomen by educating them about the rush process, had guest speakers discuss motivation and time management and held a workshop for changing rush parties," she said.

During pre-registration, Nolan held 25 workshops for the women interested in rush and their parents.
"Ironically, the majority of the questions came from the fathers, wanting to know what their daughters were getting into," she said.

Nolan also sent two summer mailings to all of the incoming freshmen and transfer students. These mailings generated responses from interested women.
"More than 600 women signed up for rush, which is the highest its ever been (at the University)," said Nolan.

These women were divided into 20 rush groups based on their housing. Their adventure began with house tours each group visited all 14 sorority houses over a two-day period.

Nolan said these open house parties served as an introduction to the Greek system. "We (Panhel) highly suggested to the chapters not to stress their own house, but to promote being Greek."

First and second parties are invitational parties. The rushees choose the sororities they want to return to from the invitations they recieve from the chapters. Through a computerized preference process, rushees are matched up with nine possible houses to which they could belong.

Nolan explained that during first parties, scholarship and social aspects are stressed. These 45 -minute get-togethers are designed to display the spirit and enthusiasm of each house. 1988 rushees encountered such themes as "Fantastic Voyage" and "Grab a Friend and Jam in the Sand."

Second parties are used to show the more serious side of the sorority - financial for example.

Formal desserts are the longest and most serious parties."This was the special time to demonstrate the strength of sisterhood," said Nolan.

Delta Zeta pledge, Desiree Summers, said formal des-

serts were the clincher. "I came out of there and told my roomates that's where I'm going. It's really inspirational and made my total decision."

Rush counselors (Rho Chis - women who deaffiliate from their chapters during rush to council the rushees) are assigned to each rush group.
"The Rho Chis were the rushees' best friends during the week of rush. They promoted the Greek system as a whole and provided support to the women rushing," explained Kathryn Miller, vice president of Rho Chis for Panhel.

Miller held four workshops to educate the Rho Chis about their job descriptions and dealing with situations that might arise.
"The most frequent question that came up was how to deal with regrets," she said. A regret means a rushee did not get an invitation back to any of the sorority houses during the rush process.

Nolan said that pledge day 1988 went exceptionally well, with the number of regrets cut by 75 percent from the previous year.
"The regrets were the lowest they've been in the last 10 years," she said.

After one week of rush parties, more than 500 women ran to their sorority houses on pledge day to greet their new sisters.

Although rush may seem like a lot of fun parties and entertainment, it can also be stressful and draining.
"At first its fun getting back seeing everyone but it seemed like all you did was eat, sleep and drink rush . . . although it was worth it in the end," said Debbie Klein, an Alpha Chi Omega.

Susan Hazen, a Delta Gamma pledge, said "I loved rush yet I was nervous a lot because of the uncertainty." By Dawn Adams and Mae Hanna

## Practice Makes

On fall Saturday afternoons when the BGSU football team leaves the field at halftime, Mark Kelly and Jay Jackson climb the ladders at either end of the 50 -yard line to "coach" the next team appearing before the crowd.

Wearing orange, brown and white, the 185 -member Falcon Marching Band steps with precision onto the field at each home game to delight the fans with their halftime show.
"It's bigger than a one-man job. We're a team as much as the football players are," said Jackson, director of the marching band.

Kelly, director of all University bands, said the marching band strives for perfection in playing and uniformity in both appearance and movement.
"Historically, the band has been a consistently excellent playing and marching organization. If you judge us on looks, moves and sound, we're the top rung of the ladder in the Mid-Am," he said. "We're always stressing to the band that we're an individual group, not a group of individuals."

Kelly has worked directly with the marching band in his


22 years at the University, but today, the day-to-day duties belong mainly to Jackson.

In his third year as director, Jackson is responsible for designing the shows, selecting the music and coordinating the efforts of the staff and students, from graduate assistants and squad leaders to the rank and file marchers.

On Saturdays though, "it's all up to the kids. We just watch and listen. When they do well, nothing makes me happier," Jackson said.

The official marching band "season" starts a week before classes begin in August, when incoming freshmen audition and learn the fundamentals of the Falcon Marching Band.
"The fun is watching them mature into one organization. A lot of the kids are from different high school backgrounds, so we have to teach them our eclectic style,"


Jackson said. "We do a little bit of everything - traditional marching, corps concepts, a little dance. Our style is to take the best from different worlds."
Jackson also applies this potpourri philosophy to music, choosing Top 40, Jazz, Broadway and Classical. "By not limiting ourselves we hope we're presenting a more interesting show," he said.
The band practices about an hour and 45 minutes Monday through Friday, as well as Saturday mornings before the games. Besides playing at all the home games, the band makes one away-trip, and ends the season with a November concert in Anderson Arena. For their effort, each student earns two credit hours.

Lora Andrews, mellophone player, said being involved in the band takes a lot of time, but has been a valuable experience for her.
"One of the best parts is the actual performance and the audience's enjoyment of it - when there's a full stadium and the crowd stands up screaming for us," she said.

"It's really an exciting feeling when I run out onto the field and everyone is clapping and cheering," he said.

Pearson, in his third year as drum major, said he helps the directors trouble-shoot the band's weaknesses for improvement, serves as a liason between the band members and the directors, and does some on field conducting himself.
"The band is a place where I meet friends and practice my leadership qualities. We all work together really well - like a big family," Pearson said.

The word "family" is heard often when asking band members how they feel about the band.
"The first people I met at college as a freshman were in the band, and a large portion of the people I know now are band members," Andrews explained.

Trombone squad leader Julie Wilson said she does "everything" with the band.

They are seen at almost every BGSU sporting event. Yet very few people know the identities of Freddie and Frieda Falcon, the University mascots. According to tradition, the mascots identities are kept secret until they are "beheaded" at the end of the basketball and hockey seasons.
"That the identities are kept secret promotes the mystique of the Falcons' identities," said Brad Browning, director of athletic promotions for the University.

Although their identities are supposed to be top-secret, some of the mascots said it is inevitable that people will discover who they are. Pat Smith, a.k.a. Freddie Falcon, said "It wasn't much of a surprise when we were beheaded. A lot of people knew who we were."

Little things caused people to suspect something strange was going on, according to Karen Radlinski, one of the two Frieda Falcons for the 1988-89 season. She said that each person has their own distinct mannerisms that lead to their discoveries.

Jennifer Murphy, another Freida, said she was probably the least-known mascot because she lived off-campus. Yet, even she had to deal with friends who wondered why she was never present at athletic events. But she resisted the temptation of divulging her identity.
"Whenever I was tempted to tell


Smith explained that people became curious when they would see hockey pucks and large quantities of bubble gum (a favorite treat of the mascots) in his room.
"People always find out who Freddie and Frieda are. They figure it out. I'm not sure how, but they figure it out," he said.

Each year, Browning, along with the four current mascots, searches for four new spirit-raisers. Radlinski explained that "the four mascots are involved in the selection because they have the insight as to what they want and are looking for in new mascots." Four steps are involved in the tryout process,-the first two being the traditional application and interview that go with just about any job. If they make it through those, would-be mascots must then submit to an in-suit tryout.
"The in-suit tryout is where we are able to see a person's creativity, how they move in a suit and what ideas they are able to come up with," explained Smith.

The final step of the process takes place at the Beta 500 , a Greek event, where prospective mascots actually relate to people in a crowd situation.

Once a person has been selected to represent the school as Freddie or Frieda, they still find there are several problems to deal with, such as adjusting to the costume.
someone I was Frieda, I would just try to picture their face when I was beheaded and think of how surprised they would be," she said.
"It can be pretty difficult to move around in the suit. It was hard to avoid hitting people in the stands, especially with the tail on Frieda's costume,"

Smith had difficulty getting used to the fact that people could not see him - the person inside the bird outfit.
"A family was taking a picture of me with their daughter last summer. When they said, 'Everybody smile!,' I did. They couldn't tell what I was even doing. I could have been sticking out my tongue for all they knew," he said.

Duties of a mascot, besides exuberating energy at every pore, include a visible support for the University in any way they can. This means appearing at all campus athletic events, not just football and basketball games. Appear-
ances are made for parades and store and community spirit promotions. The mascots have also traveled to Toledo to participate in the Toledo Fest.

What motivates these people to sweat for hours while being abused by obnoxious fans?

Murphy became interested when she saw one of her hometown neighbors perform as a mascot during the 1984-85 school year and she decided then that being a mascot was for her.

Smith also lived near a mascot on campus. "It just blew my mind when Scott (former mascot) was beheaded," he said.

It was that mind-blowing that convinced Smith to don the feathers and make the crowd laugh and cheer, like Freddie and Frieda have been doing for so many years.

Do Jackson and Martina Navratilova they are not.

But each semester thousands of Bowling Green students put on their sweats, stretch their muscles and sprint toward completing the only universal degree requirement at the University.

Each and every student must complete two hours of PEG 100 (Physical Education General) for an S/U grade to graduate unless a physical handicap prevents them from participating. It's the University's answer to gym class.

Since most majors have rigid structures, the 50 physical education classes and 175 sections offered each semester are a scheduling paradise. Courses range from the traditional sport of softball to the more obscure, curling for example, but most students prefer the classes where sweating is not a prerequisite.
"We're dealing with many students that have to take an activity but they're really not into a whole lot of physical conditioning," Physical Education Coordinator Bob Conibear said. "They like classes like badminton, billiards and bowling. In fact, we have more sections of bowling than anything else."

The filmer of a sports blooper videotape could create an epic after spending a week watching PEG classes at the University. Conibear teaches a cross country skiing class and never fails to be amused during the early meetings.
"The first time we put the skis on, students fall down and can't get up. Some even cry," he said. "They say it's too cold and complain about their heels coming off the skis. I try to explain this is supposed to happen but they still panic."

Student ability levels vary wildly in the classes so the competition is rarely consistent. Freshman Linda Knapp always seemed to find herself standing between the Tom Watsons and Arnold Palmers of her golf class.
"I would be whiffing the ball all over the place and I always ended up between two guys who hit the ball miles," she said.

But even Tom Watson lands one in


the spectators gallery occasionally.
"Once a guy hit the top of the ball, it bounced straight up in the air and he caught it between his legs. It was like a 'stupid human trick' for the David Letterman Show," Knapp said.

The importance of physical education was stressed by Knapp's instructor who felt a good golf game made even the best of resumes complete.
"There were a lot of business majors in the class," she said. "The instructor said golf was good for when you have to go out and entertain the big executive guys."

Sometimes students concentrate too much on the activities and forget minor technical details.
"Occasionally in a vaulting class a student will become so preoccupied with a vault that he'll forget to hit the
board and ram his chest into the end of the horse," PEG Professor John White said. "While it's funny to watch, it's kind of sad and disastrous as well."

Equally disastrous can be a students' behavior on skiing and whitewater rafting trips which are available for an additional fee. These classes allow students to get their hour of credit in one weekend and Conibear, who travels with each group, said he has "seen it all" on the trips.
"One kid showed up for the bus with absolutely no bags for the rafting weekend and said he was going on the trip," Conibear said. "When I asked where his swimsuit was he pulled it out of his pocket. I knew I'd have to keep an eye on this kid."

He was right.
"Every time we came to a drop in the

river he would go to the front of the boat, throw down his paddle and dive in the river. I had to assign a 240 -pound chaperone to the kid at all times," he said.

Conibear also claims he could write a book on the excuses students use for missing class. "One girl said she had to miss a ski trip because her boyfriend was flying in from Korea for the weekend," he said. "Probably the most popular excuse is the one about grandma dying. I say fine and just ask them to bring back an obituary and death announcement."

Amazingly enough, grandma usually makes a miraculous recovery.

throaty giggle escapes from Helene Gresser. Nervously fanning herself, she smiles in the mirror at the man holding a pair of glistening silver scissors. Hair stylist Tony Shamas asks Gresser if she is ready. After a pause, she quickly nods.
Shamas gathers Gresser's long golden locks into a thick ponytail. Grasping the clump of hair in his hand, Shamas slices it off.

Gresser squeezes her eyes shut. A single tear rolls down her flushed face. "I said I wasn't going to cry. It's okay though - I'm alright."

It took Gresser seven years to grow her hair threefourths of the way down her back. Yet when she saw she was cast for the part of Viola a woman who disguises herself as a man - in the University's theater production of

Shakespeare's 'Twelfth Night', Gresser knew she would have to sacrifice her hair to accept the part.

An hour and fifteen minutes after Shamas began her transformation, Gresser is left holding a cut-off ponytail that once flowed down her back. The hair in back is cut close to her neck, while the rest of it falls in an even line above her ears and eyebrows.
"I guess I'll stick it in a box so I can show my kids one day," she said as she caressed the tuft of long hair.

Not all sacrifices are of the obvious kind, like Gressers'.


Jim Azelvandre, junior theater major, who portrayed Sir Andrew Aguecheek, a foppish knight striving for acceptance, discovered he had to sacrifice his time and patience to deal with the language difficulties inherent in performing Shakespeare.
"The language is so archaic," he said. "I found I had to use my body in different ways to denote the character so the audience can understand who the character is and what he is saying. It is only when they know who the character is that they can come to terms with the language."

Unlike a traditional Shakespeare setting - where Gresser easily could have played the part of Viola with long hair - director Ron Shields and set/costume designer Margaret McCubbin, both assistant theater professors, made the decision to set the play in 1919. The 20th century time period called for the actress playing Viola to have a short, military-type haircut which fit in with the post-World War I style, according to McCubbin.
"It would have been easy for a woman to disguise herself as a man because short hair styles were popular then," she said.
The more current time period was chosen because it

allowed for a different interpretation of the play's theme. "The play itself takes place after a major war," Shields said. "But we didn't want it to be some artificial thing set in a distant place which would turn into some museum piece."
"It's a funny farce but it is also a sad play. With our interpretation, it reflects the disillusionment of postWorld War I and the coming to grips with the twentieth century," said Shields.
'Twelfth Night' is a play about mistaken identities, a common theme of Shakespeare's comedies, according to Shields. The characters fall in love with people they cannot have or who cannot return the feeling, he added.
"The play is about having a servant's heart in love," Shields explained. "Everyone in this play has to reflect a love of servitude. You know the phrase, 'how to succeed in love without really trying?' Well, this play is about succeeding in love by really trying."

Although McCubbin took classes in set design at Carnegie Mellon while studying for her masters degree of fine

arts in costume rendering, 'Twelfth Night' marked the first time one of her set designs had been produced.
"I really felt strongly about doing the show around the twenties, so when Ron and I started talking about it, I was so excited I foolishly said I'd design the set and the costumes," McCubbin said.

The set McCubbin created reflected a "feeling of going from winter into spring, from war to peace," she said.

The University theater department attempts to produce a Shakespeare play on a regular basis, ranging from one every year to every third year, said Allen Kepke, chair of the department.

Kepke said he was particularly pleased with the 198889 season because it provided a balance of different types of plays.
"We had a hot text just off Broadway with 'Noises Off.' Then we had a list of unusual titles with plays such as 'Abdication,' 'As Is,' and ' 84 Charing Cross Road,'" he said. "Of course we incorporated the good standards: 'Twelfth Night' and ' night Mother' and even threw in an


old fashioned musical, 'Kismet,' and the Greek classic 'Lysistrata.' And then there is 'The House of Blue Leaves' which is just off-the-wall."
"When the faculty decides upon a season, they try to appeal to the wants and needs of their audience, the suitability of their theaters and the talent available," Kepke said.

Because the department has traditionally had more females in their talent pool, the faculty attempts to choose plays that will reflect this talent.

Kate Haack, junior theater major, said she was pleased with the wide variety of roles, especially the availability of female parts this season.
"Compared to the scarcity of female roles in the past, I found this season to be balanced with roles for both men and women," she said. "So many plays are written with a majority of male parts that it is refreshing to have an option for a change."

Haack, who portrayed a suicidal woman in the play ' night Mother,'said the 12 play-per-season format offered by the University theater department provides actors with numerous opportunities to gain practical experience on the stage.

No matter who won the 1988 election, the results are something all of us are going to have to live with for the next four years. Republicans and Democrats alike will live out the next presidential term under the guidance of George Herbert Walker Bush and his entourage.
"Dirty" is probably the best way to describe the 1988 election campaign. Beginning in 1987 with the demise of Gary Hart and continuing well into the final days of the campaign with the harsh words exchanged by Michael Dukakis and George Bush, this election proved that not necessarily does the best man for the job prevail, but the one who can conjure up the most dirt on his opponent.

On the homefront, the statistics were less than earth shattering. The on-campus student turnout was approximately 800 short of the anticipated number, with only 1200 students casting their ballots.

Campus results closely mirrored those of Wood County. Republican candidates were victorious in all but three of the major office races on the ballot. As is normal with any campaign, big names tend to draw votes, or so the candidates think. The Bush camp may have been helped along by a visit to Wood County by then President Ronald Reagan in late-October. Meanwhile, Dukakis tried to round up support among the coeds by bringing heart throb Rob Lowe to campus on his behalf.

Whatever the tactics, the results are in and the Bush administration will be making decisions that will affect all our lives throughout the next four years.

## Campus



Who cares? Sound familiar? As students, we are constantly being accused of not caring, of not getting involved. And we are constantly denying these accusations. But do we, the students of Bowling Green, really care, really have a deep concern for the world around us? The consensus is no.
We attend a University where less than 20 percent of the eligible students vote for their student government leaders and even less for their Homecoming King and Queen; where getting students to vote for their nation's president, or simply register to vote, is a major chore; and where there are almost as many athletes as there are athletic supporters at football and basketball games.

What is the problem?
Randall Jamison doesn't go to football games. He doesn't go to hockey games. And he doesn't know who the leaders of the student government are. He said that most of the time he does not even know that campus events are taking place.
"I don't think Bowling Green is a very tight University-you know, where everyone supports each other and gets involved," he said. "But then, it's hard to be supportive when you never hear about what's going on."

# Nobody Cares 

Jamison said that even if he was kept up to date on the University's activity schedule, he still probably would not go to or participate in many of the functions.
"It's really hard to find the time. With teaching, taking classes and studying, my days are pretty full," he said.

And what of the world around us? Are we as apathetic toward it as we are toward the Falcon football team?
Shannon Frystak, member of the Peace Coalition, said that while University students appear extremely apathetic, the problem is not so much apathy as it is ignorance.
"On this campus, which is largely Greek, the general attitude seems to be 'Ignorance is bliss'," she said. "I guess that's fine for others; I know there are a lot of time demands. You can't really get that mad at ignorance because they just don't know."
"But what really bothers me are people that know what's going on and just
don't care," she said.
Frystak blamed the conservative attitude of many of the students for the lack of concern. She sighted the current homeless problem as an example of how students tend to ignore what is not in their immediate viewing area.
"Many people think that people who are on the street are there because they want to be there. That's totally wrong," she said. "They don't understand the situation because they've never been faced with the problem themselves. Their lives have always been secure and safe. They've always had a home to go to."

The Peace Coalition, whose membership of 25 represents .000156 percent of the total student population, conducts peace education sessions to help keep people informed of what in the world is going on. Frystak said that if people will just take the time to educate themselves, half the battle would be won.
"If they come and listen and find something wrong-and there's plenty to choose from-then they might feel the need to get involved and do something," she said.

Rebecca Mancuso-Schutt said she

tries to keep herself as well informed as possible.
"There are no excuses for not being properly informed. All the resources are available today-newspapers, magazines, television," she said.
Mancuso-Schutt said part of the apathy problem we hear about so much is due to the fact that we are part of a "me" generation.
"People will change when they realize what used to be a faraway or distant problem actually might affect them personally, such as abortion or the greenhouse effect," she said. "Unfortunately, in most cases, it takes personal consequences in order for people to want to get involved."
And how about the rumor that we don't hold a candle to those politically active students of the 1970's?

Rose Clements, a member of the Western Lake Erie Sierra Club and a college student of the 1970's, said, contrary to popular belief, there is not that much difference in the number of students who fight for what they believe in.
"During the Vietnam War there weren't all that many more people who protested, it's just that the way they protested made them a lot more visible," she said.

Alan Canfora was one of those visible protesters. Unfortunately his visibility got him wounded.

Canfora, who spoke on campus in October, was one of 14 students shot by Ohio National Guardsmen during an anti-war demonstration at Kent State University on May 4, 1970. Four of those students died. Canfora has spent his time since then promoting activism. He said he strongly supports student involvement in all areas-politics, environment and world injustices.
"When students take a stand, other people, businesses and the elderly, get involved and then the government pays

0n July 31, 1987, the Ohio State Legislature passed a law raising the legal drinking age for all alcoholic beverages to 21 . This new law would have a significant impact on the 19 and 20-year olds who, under the old law, could purchase and handle beer.

To alleviate this minor technicality, the legislature added the "grandfather clause" which allowed those born before July 31, 1968 to still have the right to obtain beer. The 1988-89 school year was the first year for this law to bear any major ramifications on University students.

Now, the big question remains, "What's there to do in Bowling Green?"

For Mary Katherine Currier, sophomore history major, off-campus parties have become the social medium.
"There's always an off-campus party. In fact, there seems to be more, so why bother trying to get into the bars," she said.

In her spare time, Currier likes to watch movies with
friends in the dorms, listen to music, study, read and do craftwork.
"I've got a lot of other things to do, so not drinking is no major loss," she said. She added that Bowling Green needs a few more places to dance where drinking would not play a main role in the choosing of its clientel.
"It seems to me that everything is oriented around the bars, but it doesn't seem that the bars are all that great," Currier said.

The University, in response to the "under 21 " problem, offers non-alcoholic, on-campus forms of entertainment such as Dry Dock, located in the basement of Harshman Quadrangle, Frank's Place, a UAO-sponsored dance bar which was located in Prout cafeteria during the fall

semester and B'Dazzle!, which opened in December and features live entertainment in the Falcon's Nest.

All of these places are direct responses to the call for more entertainment spots where alcohol is not a factor.

Beth Adler, college student personnel graduate student and coordinator of Frank's Place, said the program was designed "to educate people on the various forms of entertainment." Some of the activities held during the fall semester included a Halloween party, amateur night with prizes and a barbershop quartet.

Adler denied that the drinking law change forced the opening of Frank's Place. "Drinking really didn't have anything to do with it. People were just saying that there weren't things to do on Friday nights," she said.

Though the opening night of Frank's Place did not cater to an overwhelming crowd, most of the 30 or so people who attended said they enjoyed themselves.

Stephany Nowell, freshman business administration major, said she usually has a hard time finding a place to dance where alcohol does not play a major role.
"The drinking age (change) hasn't made me mad because I really don't drink," she said. "But the fact that I

can't go in a place because they serve alcohol makes it difficult to go out."

By the end of the fall semester, low attendance continued to be a problem for Frank's Place forcing UAO to close the entertainment spot. B'Dazzle!, located in the Falcon's nest, became the new attraction. Joe Matessa, UAO performing arts director, said B'Dazzle! operates under the same basic principle as Frank's Place, offering free weekly entertainment without the constraints found in some bars, such as age discrimination.
"We're trying to appea! to people of all ages those who can't get into the bars and those who are just tired of the bar scene," he said.

Even with the many University sponsored night spots, the majority of University students still prefer to go out to the local bars. Understanding this, Alcohol Awareness Week is held every fall, in order to promote responsible drinking.

Laura Shock, junior broadcast journalism major and public relations coordinator for AAW 1988, said, "The purpose of the week is to inform the campus about responsible drinking and the consequences of irresponsible
drinking, while, at the same time, show people that other places besides the BG bars really exist."

Shock, whose duties included making sure informational paraphenalia, such as buttons, flyers and posters, were available, said she felt the week was a tremendous success and hopes the effects last well into the future. She agreed that creating more non-alcoholic entertainment spots in Bowling Green is a good place to start.
"We need more things to do in BG because (right now) there's not enough to do outside of the bars," she commented.

Inside Uptown/Downtown, 162 N. Main, Jake Jerabek, senior sports management major and part-time bartender, predicted "the 21 and over drinking law will not change anything. People will drink anyway."

In answer to the law, Uptown added a 21 and under night on Wednesday. "It has received a great response. It's more appealing to go to a real bar than to go to Dry Dock or Frank's Place," Jerabek said.
"Quite frankly," he added, "alcohol is an excellent social stimulant."

Jerabek also noted, with a degree of reluctancy, that he finds it a bit difficult to turn away those who age between 19 and 21 because "I could drink when I was 19, but they can't."

## The Art of <br>  urvival

For those students not lucky enough to be able to attend school without having to work part-time, life can be a pretty grim experience - long hours, low pay and the eternal struggle between balancing classes, work and free time.

But what can make this a bearable existence for some students is the type of job they hold. Of course the cafeteria worker and the night guard may feel their jobs are rather monotonous but how about earning \$200 an hour counting magazines?

Mike Bernhardt, freshman accounting major, has such a job. Once a month he heads out to six area convenience marts and grocery stores and counts magazines. The whole process takes about an hour and he is paid $\$ 200$ for his efforts.

Unfortunately, this is a one-of-a-kind opportunity.
"A lot of my friends have asked me to get them a job but I can't. They (his employer - Madison Magazines, N.Y.) only need one person in Bowling Green," Bernhardt said.

The magazine distributor sends Bernhardt a list of magazines every month. He then goes to six local stores and if they stock any magazines from the list, Bernhardt tabulates them and sends the list back.
"I'm not sure what you call it. I guess it's kind of like a scholarship, but they
don't call it that," he said. "As far as I know, no taxes are taken out."

Bernhardt said the money he makes from this once-a-month endeavor covers his expenses for the entire month. And, fortunately for him, he should be able to count magazines throughout the rest of his college career.
"I hope so. It's pretty easy," he said.
One not so easy job was that of Craig Maturi, junior criminal justice major, who traveled to Alaska to be a logger.
"The loggers load the logs that the fallers have cut down to be transported back to the mill," Maturi explained.

According to Maturi, logging is "the most dangerous job in the world. I believe even more so than underground coal mining."
"When they're pulling down the trees, they have the possibility of swinging 360 degrees," Matruri said. "When you hear the whistle you have to run high."

Maturi said the fact that the job was in Alaska makes it unusual. Also, it's not what the average college student is doing during his summer vacation.
"Most students are working on coops. I'll have to do that soon," he said. "But I liked the idea of logging what people are going to build their houses with."

As Maturi helps people achieve the building of their own home, Michael


Albert helps other students achieve the building of their minds.

Albert, a graduate student in psychology, is a sign language interpreter, employed through the Department of Human Services to assist the University's three deaf students.

Only one, a business student, has requested Albert's services.
"He got along for two years (without an interpreter). He reads lips really well. But in accounting, the words are pretty technical," Albert said. "Sometimes I have difficulty with words like

'investment' or 'liability' and I have to make up signs."

Albert, who arrived here after graduating from the University of Illinois, was surprised to find there was no deaf community.
"I did find one professor, though, who is interested in the deaf. He directed me to UCF (United Christian Fellowship) who directed me to Human Services," he said.

According to Albert, a sign language interpreter is not something you see everyday.
"I think it's a job most people are intrigued by. It's helping a person communicate in a world where most things, in a way, are completely foreign," he said.

Another job not seen everyday on a college campus is that of a truck driver, and a female at that.
"People that meet me wouldn't think I'd drive a truck," said Kelly Collins, a business and IPCO major.

Collins drives a catering truck to factories in Toledo and Monroe, Mich. three days a week. In the summer, she

does it six days a week.
"While I'm there, I have to solicit sales. But I don't have a boss looking over my shoulder. I think that's why I like it," she said.

In the summer, Collins cooks on the moving truck while someone else drives. But during the school year, she goes to the factories around the dinner hour and sells pre-made food to the workers there.
"I don't think anyone would think of doing this. They think it's below them," Collins said. "But I really enjoy it. It's great for my major, too. I have to be able to deal with a lot of different people - from factory workers to mainte-
nance."
Dealing with people, and sometimes some very famous ones, is something Gary Downey, senior marketing major, was faced with during his employment with the Associated Press. As part of his job he attended the 1988 GOP National Convention in New Orleans, La., and the Inauguration festivities in Washington, D.C. in January.
"I served as a liaison between the AP staff and the students. The whole thing for me was to keep everyone happy," said Downey.

He participated in the program, which is the brainchild of a former University journalism professor and in-

volves students from Ohio University and Central State, partly because of the once-in-a-lifetime experience of attending those events and partly because of his love for photography.
"You have the opportunity to be right where it's happening," he said.

For Downey, that meant next to the podium at the National Convention and on the steps of the Capitol for the Inauguration.

Duties included a lot of office-type work, Downey said, but he never knew when something big was going to happen and it was that excitement that made the job unusual.
"The chances are slim that the average person is even going to get there once in his life, much less be right in the middle of it," he said.

You've suffered through four (if you're lucky) long, tiresome years of term papers, all-nighters and Bursar lines and now you're graduating. The only obstacle left in your way is finding a job. Piece of cake, right? Wrong.

Interviews, resumes, cover letters not to mention locating companies who are in need of someone with your skills-take time. The Placement Office? Nah, they just help business majors. They won't be able to help me.

The University Placement Office definitely has a bad reputation. Known for their "business bias," the services available there are almost totally ignored by arts and science majors.
"They did absolutely nothing for me," said Tom Pauken, who graduated from the University in 1983 with a bachelor of arts in international studies and in 1986 with a master of arts in French literature.
Pauken, who went through the required workshops and seminars to receive his First Choice card (which entitles the bearer to special interview signup privileges) said that for foreign language students the Placement Office is not worth the trouble. "No one I was
interested in came to campus," he said. "and the workshops were insulting. Unless you're completely stupid and don't know how to write a resume, they're a waste of time."
"I think it's a myth that the Placement Office serves only business and education majors," JoAnn Kroll, director, said. "The problem is, those majors are offered more on-campus interviews. But our services can help anyone."
In 1987, the Office received their first-ever "Award of Excellence" presented by the College Placement Council. They were successful in bringing 541 organizations to campus, with more than 60 being Fortune 500 companies. More than 8000 student interviews were held and referrals numbered more than 23,000 .
"If we're trying to attract an employer, we need a sufficient number of graduates in that field," she said. "If there's four majors in a field, a company isn't going to fly someone out here to interview."
"Just because they don't come here to interview doesn't mean we don't know about the openings," she added.
The Placement Office specializes in career and placement advising. That

means that a large part of their service is getting students prepared for the interview.
This preparation includes various workshops in resume writing, interviewing and other various pointers.
Those students who attend a required number of workshops are entitled to the First Choice Card and its more prestigious counterpart, membership in the Advanced Job Hunter's Club. According to Kroll, this type of reward system is beneficial to all.
"It's a great incentive for the students and by having the more prepared stu-

dents interview first, the employer gets a more favorable impression of the University," she said.
According to Tom Gorman, assistant director for Health and Human Services Placement, the mission of the office is education, rather than employment. "I think the services we offer are more important than on-campus interviewing," he said.

But, Gorman said, a lot of students don't even investigate. "The bottom line is, a lot of people just don't come over here. I know I never did," he said.

For those students not in the business or education field, both Gorman and Kroll encouraged students to talk with their professors. "They are very knowledgeable in their areas. We can help with preparation, but we're not experts
in the fields like they are," Gorman said.
Sal Fragapane, senior finance major and president of the Finance Club, used the Placement Office's advice and sin-gle-handedly obtained a job. After leafing through the Cleveland yellow pages, he contacted several finance companies he was interested in. "I screened them on my own," he said. "They were really impressed that I did all the work myself."
Fragapane is a strong believer in the power of the Placement Office. "I think it's a huge help, as far as being prepared for an interview," he said. "They help you with little things you might not think of, like writing thank you notes and what questions you should ask the employer in an interview."

## Fluttering Falcons Blown Away-

Bowling Green's motto for the 1988 football season was "Celebrating 70 Years Of Excellence."

The squad must have been doing a little too much celebrating as they appeared to play most the season with a hangover.

The Falcons finished the season with a dismal 2-8-1 record, 1-6-1 in the Mid-American Conference. This was the worst BG record since the 1953 campaign which saw the Falcons go 1-8.

And the BG record for points given-up, which was previously 296 , was lit-up by opponents like a pin-ball junkie on his favorite machine, ding, ding - 333 .

The Falcons opened their campaign against WVU and were promptly trounced $62-14$ in a contest where it appeared the Mountaineers may have surpassed the century mark.

The game was against a national powerhouse in WVU; BG wasn't predicted to win or even give the Mountaineers a good game. And it was now time to enter the MidAmerican Conference schedule. But the ear-ringing from the firing of muskets and cannons, which went off every time the Mountaineers scored, must have had lasting effects.

BG would drop their next four and start the season at 0 -$5,0-3$ in the MAC. But all was not lost as the Falcons would win their next outing to give them a 1-3 record in the MAC.
"When we won the homecoming game, where we beat

## 2-8-1 Finish Worst Since 1953



Ohio University 42-0, I think at that point in the season the alumni and the fans thought we had a pretty good football team," BG head coach Moe Ankney said.

But the frustration continued as the Falcons would go 1-3-1 to close the 1988 slate. And to add insult to injury, this was a season which saw the squad enter the national spotlight or, in this case, dim light.

BG, along with Rice, was dubbed as having a "cup cake" football program in a late 1988 issue of Sports Illustrated.

And in the January 3 issue of The Chicago Tribune, Ed Sherman wrote, "Notre Dame relied on big plays on offense to make sure West Virginia didn't confuse Notre Dame with Bowling Green," after ND clobbered WVU in the Fiesta Bowl.

But as every football program endures peaks and valleys, BG head football coach Moe Ankney found some favorable bumps in 1988's deep crevasse.
"Surprisingly, we came out of the season with a lot of positives," Ankney said. "We improved on our punting game from the season before, and had outstanding punting (from Chris Shale) all season."

Shale finished first in the MAC averaging 41.5 yards on 56 punts, including a booming 71 -yarder.
"We also cut down on the number of fumbles lost from the previous year," he said. "We won our first non-conference game since I've been coach, and we had the chance to see a lot of young players in action which will benefit our squad in the long run."

BG beat Youngstown State 20-16 on October 22 as Ankney captured his first non-conference victory as Falcon mentor. And the individual achievements would not be denied.

Seniors Kyle Kramer and Reggie Thornton were named first team ALL-MAC, while Chris Shale was selected on the second team. Kramer led the team in tackles with 143 from the free-safety position, and was Ankney's field general.

"Kyle has had a great four-year career where he has been named all-conference twice," Ankney said. "He was our team leader. Kyle isn't just a great athlete; he's an outstanding student. He epitomizes the true meaning of a student-athlete."

This was evident as Kramer, sophomore tight end Pat Jackson and senior quarterback Eric Smith were named to the MAC All-Academic team.

On the field, Thornton finished first on the team with 41 catches and was third in the MAC for catches per game with 3.7. Senior defensive back Tony McCorvey finished second in the MAC in interceptions with seven, while kicker Jason Zeller extended his career extra-point streak to 43 .

Smith and junior Rich Dackin split the quarterback duties on the season. Smith led the team with 104 completions for 1,306 yards, while Dackin connected 73 times for 775 yards.

Senior Mike McGee and junior Charles Edgerton were the Falcons' leading ground-gainers in 1988. McGee had 538 yards on 146 carries, while Edgerton racked-up 448 in 105 attempts.

Despite the individual triumphs, Ankney said he would prefer not to dwell on the past.
"It was a very disappointing outcome for everyone involved in our football program," Ankney said. "We're all excited to make amends in the upcoming season."

## Kramer



He was born 20 years too late.
He's the type of player that possesses the prowess of a Dick Butkus or Jack Lambert of the National Football League.

Instead of coloring his hair and wearing long gold chains, this defensive back makes his mark by playing heads up, hard-nosed football that is all but forgotten in today's game.

Kyle Kramer, the two-time All-Mid American Conference free safety, is the type of player that left more than just his cap and gown on the field when he graduated. He also left a little bit of himself.
"I just want the guys to think that I always tried to do the best I could, no matter what the score was or how much time was left," Kramer said. "Basically, no matter what was going on out on the field, I was giving my all."

Giving his all is exactly what Kramer, the Kettering native, did game after game throughout his senior season. Hampered most of the season by a shoulder injury, he still led the team in tackles with 143 . What was even more amazing was the fact that the next closest teammate was 33 tackles away in second place.

Kramer, who also led the Falcons in tackles during his junior campaign, has a career total of 399 . This ranks him third on the Falcon all-time list, since the stat was introduced prior to the 1960 season.

It was this type of effort that earned Kramer the praise of his coach.
"Kyle had a great four-year career here," BG head coach Moe Ankney said.
"He was our team leader and, not only was he an outstanding athlete, but also an excellent student."

Kramer, who had a 3.1 in biology entering his senior season, was truly the epitome of the words student-athlete. He was awarded this by being named to the Academic All-MAC team as both a senior and a junior.

But for a player with this type of
determination, last years' season had to be very trying. With the Falcons struggling with inconsistency all season, they finished a disappointing 2-8-1.
"If I could change one thing in my four years here, it would be last season," Kramer said. "Now that I look back on it, I would try to do a little more, a little extra to try and help the team turn the way the season ended up around."
"But I do think that the way last year went, it was good for a lot of the younger players because they got a lot of good experience."

But Kyle Kramer's football days may not be over yet.

Because he possesses great physical attributes and a complete understanding of the game, Kramer has become a player that quite a few NFL teams are interested in.

The physical elements are evident as Kramer stands at $6^{\prime} 3^{\prime \prime}$ and is capable of running the 40 in 4.4. And as this biology major has aspirations of becoming a physician, he operates the defensive back field with a keen knowledge of the game enabling him to dissect opposing offensive schemes.

Although the NFL is what every player who has ever strapped on a pair of shoulder pads dreams about, to Kramer it is still questionable.
"Right now it's kind of an uncertainty because I really don't know where I'll be next year at this time," he said. "It makes me kind of nervous, but at the same time it makes me work harder to get better."

Hard work is what got Kramer to this new plateau and hard work will most likely be what gets him to the next level.

But, even if Kramer doesn't make it in the NFL, he will always be remembered in BG as the guy who left his soul out on the field at the end of each game. And he'll be remembered around the league as the guy who played every down the same, hard-nosed.

## Roller Coaster

The 1988 Bowling Green soccer team learned the hard way that experience alone is not a sure-fire guarantee for winning games.

A roster laden with experienced veterans drew high praise in the pre-season as the Falcons returned 17 letterman from a 1987 squad which posted a 12-5 record and wins over national powers Penn State and Cleveland State.

With three-straight wins over Xavier, St. Bonaventure and Mid-American Conference foe Central Michigan to start the season, BG looked as if they were ready to rise to the occasion and meet these high standards.

But things started a turn for the worse when the Falcons dropped threestraight games to even their record at 33.

A 4-1 win against Detroit momentarily eased the pain, but BG proceeded to lose their next three games and their record dropped to 4-6. Suddenly, a season that was expected to be of the fantasy variety, had turned into a nightmare.

BG posted a 5-5 record the rest of the way and ended the season with a mediocre 9-11 mark.

Head coach Gary Palmisano said his team expected to accomplish great feats in the 1988 season.
"We were disappointed in the results because we had high expectations and goals in the beginning of the season," he said. "But our approach is to set high, but reasonable, goals every season."

These high expectations have been met more times than not in Palmisano's eleven years at the helm of the Falcon program.

His teams have thrived on success, posting a 109-73-16 record, throughout his tenure. Only one time other than 1988 has a Falcon soccer team coached by Palmisano finished below the .500 mark. This occurred in 1985 when BG went 4-11-4.

While the Falcons' struggle on the field was readily apparent, problems off the field also came into effect. Senior captains Jon Felton and Kevin McGrath, two players who were to provide the experience and all-important

leadership, were nowhere to be found on the roster at year's end. Both had departed due to personal reasons.

Felton, a 1987 NSCAA All-American selection as a defenseman, departed after 13 games, while McGrath, a consistent performer at midfield throughout his career, left after nine games.

Sophomore forward Shaun Howe also was absent from the roster at season's end due to personal reasons. Howe
finished fourth in scoring on the team with four goals and two assists for 10 points.

With the loss of three reliable performers, senior backfielder Ron Haines, the lone captain and the rest of the squad, did not quit fighting until season's end.

The Falcons won four out of their last five games, including a thrilling 1-0 overtime victory over the Big Ten's Michigan State Spartans.

"We had an awful lot of distractions off the field and that took away from our concentration on the field," Palmisano said. "I think it was a tribute to our team to not stop battling until the end."

Senior forward Mike Anticoli and sophomore midfielder Kyle Royer led the team in scoring. Anticoli collected seven goals and three assists for 17 points, including a team leading three
game-winning goals.
Royer made his mark as the squad's playmaker in tallying a team-high eleven assists, while adding three goals for 17 points.

Junior goalkeeper Mickey Loescher posted impressive totals for the third straight season. He played every minute of every game and posted a 1.45 goals against average, while recording
five shutouts.
Positive signs for the future came from freshman Chris Iantoni and Rob Hunt, who finished third and fifth, respectively on the team's scoring list. Iantoni pumped in four goals and three assists for 11 points, while Howe was 4-2-10.

Iantoni, Hunt, Royer, Loescher and the rest of the Falcons can now look

forward to a fresh start in the 1989 campaign. A season in which they hope to make news on the field and the field alone.

reached a personal milestone with her 100th coaching victory in 1988 but the Falcons limped through their worst season since 1985 with a 16-12 record.

The volleyball team looked like it had everything going for it as it entered the 1988 season. And with a host of starters and key letter-winners returning from last year's $24-6$ squad, the Falcons dream season was within reach.
However, due to injuries sustained by half of the starting lineup, including Lisa Mika (sprained ankle), Sheri Fella (calf) and Suzi Williams (knee), the dream season never materialized.
"This was a more up and down season than the previous two," said head coach Denise Van De Walle. "We started out setting high goals for ourselves. Then, one third through the season, key injuries started happening. We finally gained some consistency toward the end of the year when the injured players came back."

The Falcons finished a disappointing sixth place in the MidAmerican Conference at $3-5$, and failed to make the annual MAC tournament. But BG overcame adversity and closed out the season by winning eight straight matches to finish the season at 16-12 overall.
"They were a tough team about overcoming obstacles and I believe we are stronger because of it," Van De Walle said. "I am very proud of the way the team came back and won the last eight matches in a row."

Despite misfortunes throughout the season, the Falcons still managed to accumulate numerous honors.


Junior setter Linda Popovich, who carried the most awards was named first team Academic All-American, first team Academic All-MAC, District VAcademic All-American and second team All-MAC. She also increased her own school record of assists in a career to 3184 .

Co-captains Kelly Ellett and Jane Plantz would not be outdone this season. Ellett posted a new school record for aces in a career (135) and Plantz was named honorable mention Academic All-MAC.

Freshman outside hitter Mika also received All-MAC status by being named honorable mention. Mika, who missed a significant portion of the season because of a sprained ankle, set a new school record for aces in a match (10), was named MVP of the Can-Am Tournament, and led the MAC in the categories of hitting percentage and aces per game.
"The fact that Lisa did well in the conference is a bright spot for us, as well as the way we were still able to strive for school records," Van De Walle said.
In addition to outstanding individual performances, the Falcons had outstanding team performances as well. One in particular was an early season defeat of nationally recognized Notre Dame at the Southern Illinois Tournament.

The Falcons were down to the Fighting Irish two games to none, but came back to win the five game match, $5-15,11-15$, 15-5, 15-6, 15-9.
"Beating Notre dame was a win we savored all season," Van De Walle said.

But for Van De Walle, this season was a milestone. The sevenyear Falcon head coach gained her 100th victory during a defeat of Dayton on November 8.
"Some of the fond memories of this season included the 100th win," Van De Walle said. "It came at a great time being at the end of the season."

But for the Falcons, recognition for their performances off the court during the season was as impressive as recognition for their performances on the court.

Seven members of the BG squad, including back court player Julie Conner, outside hitters Fella, Jennifer Russell, Beth Wright, Plantz, Ellett and Popovich, were recognized on the BG Academic Honors Report for Fall of 1988, for maintaining grade point averages of 3.0 or better.

## No Guts No Glory

Like a great giant falling, the 1988-89 Bowling Green rugby club lost its prominence and dominance on a late Saturday afternoon in Madison, Wisconsin.
For the first time in four years, the Falcons failed to advance to the final four in the national tournament. They lost 20 seconds into sudden-death overtime in the semifinals of the Midwest tournament to Penn State University, 3-0 and finished the spring season with a 24-7-1 record.
From the beginning of the game, the Falcons faced an uphill battle, losing captian Gus Saponari to an injury in the first minute.
"When we lost Gus, we lost our field general," BG coach Roger Mazzarella said.

He added that another problem hindering their scoring opportunities was the referee; he was from England and was unfamiliar with some of the different American rules.
"He didn't know what he was doing and it really messed us up," said hooker Dallas Black.

Although the injury and the referee were uncontrollable obstacles, the Falcons were their own worst enemies, missing on five scoring opportunities.

The BG miscues included being knocked out within one yard of scoring, dropping the ball while crossing the goal line, missing a last-second drop kick and being whistled for an illegal forward pass which negated a try.

Mazzarella said the team was in a somber mood after the loss, especially the 10 seniors who had their championship dreams shattered.
"I really felt sorry for this bunch," he said. "They were the most furious defensive group we ever had. I quite frankly wouldn't want to play against them."

Although they fell short of their goal, the Falcons enjoyed another overall successful season.

In the fall season, the ruggers A team outscored their opponents 268-116 and finished with a 14-1 record, losing only to the BG Alumni team.
The highlight of the fall season came at the Midwest tournament at Ohio State University with the Falcons

defeating Kent State University and the University of Cincinnati before shutting out OSU 15-0 in the championship game.
"It was the greatest rugby game I've ever seen," Mazzarella said about the championship game.

Leading the way in the tournament for the Falcons was All-American candidate John Lonsert who had four tries, Saponari who had two tries and fall season leading scorer Steve Market who added a try.

After their winter layoff, BG returned to action on March 18 and enjoyed a 3-2-1 spring trip which included games in Nashville, New Orleans and Atlanta.
Three weeks later, the Falcons collected their eighthstraight Mid-American Conference championship. After getting a first-round bye, they defeated Miami University 20-3 and then Ball State University 9-0 in the championship game.

Scoring tries in the championship for BG was Market and flyhalf Brian Kane. The ruggers' best kicker of the year, Jim Williams added two conversions.
"It was a total team effort," Mazzarella said. "Everybody played as a unit, as a team."

The next weekend, they won their first round game in the Midwest tournament 43-3 against the University of Tennessee, only to meet their end the following weekend in Madison.

While the season's final outcome was not what the ruggers envisioned in early fall, the prognosis for next year appears promising, as 25 rookies become second-year players.
"There are some people who think we're going to take a nose dive next year because of all the seniors we're going to lose," Mazzarella said. "They're going to be in for a surprise."

# Mazzarella 



It was a chilly spring afternoon at College Park and Bowling Green's rugby club was having an unusually tough time against Notre Dame University. On the sideline paced their coach, a stocky medium-height man in his late 30s, wearing a BG rugby jacket and camouflage pants.

He was not used to seeing his team down, especially to an opponent like ND, which is not near as good a team as BG. At one moment, he could be seen discussing the game with a friend or another player, but his eyes never wandered more than a few seconds from the field of play, at least not until they had secured the victory.

His name is Roger Mazzarella, and his passion is BG rugby.

His rugby teams have won three Midwest tournament titles and have been ranked in the top four in the nation during those years. He has a career record of 229-34-11 and three Ohio Rugby crowns. Not bad for a guy who has only coached for four years.

Although his coaching career has just begun, his years in rugby span three decades.

It all started in 1968, when he came to study at the University. He wanted to remain active in sports, but didn't know which one. He was a second-string high school wrestler, but he was looking for a different sport.

Enter rugby.
In the fall of his freshman year, he was introduced to the sport and found he possessed the first basic requirement of the game, how to give and take a hit.
"I used to play a lot of sandlot football every Sunday," he said. "It was very similar to the contact and tackling done in rugby."

His first couple of years on the team were the hardest ones. Because of strict substitution rules and the number of players on the team, he had to wait a season and a half before playing in his first game; something he doesn't want his younger players to go through.
"It's hard when you're not playing," 든 he said. "So I do my best to make sure $\frac{\llcorner }{2}$ everybody plays."

- Matt Dickman, one of 25 rookies on ल a 70-man squad said that Mazzarella has been very helpful to the other youn-
ger players. "He tries to get everybody as much time as possible, even though it's very difficult because everybody wants to play," he said.

His final days of playing hard core came to an end in 1985, when it became increasingly difficult to juggle playing rugby, teaching seventh grade biology at BG Junior High and spending time with his wife and teenage son.
"We try to take much of the responsibility away from him and put it on ourselves," Captain Gus Saponari said. "He puts a lot of time into rugby and the team."

And how much time is that? Mazzarella confesses to 20 hours a week during the season, but it doesn't take a mathematician to figure out it's actually quite more.

Practices usually run two to three hours a day, three times a week. Each game, not counting pre-game warm ups, runs around 90 minutes, with a minimum of two games each Saturday.

Then there's the time he spends organizing and traveling on road trips, refereeing and meeting with The BG News to make sure his players get proper recognition.
"He's the best thing to ever happen to this team," wing Brian Kane said. "Without him, I don't think we'd be a nationally-ranked team."

Besides being a part of BG's program, Mazzarella has become one of the biggest rugby promoters in the nation. For the last eleven years, he has written for Rugby Magazine as Midwest Correspondent. He has also served as president of the Ohio Rugby Union and as a member of the U.S. Rugby Board of Directors. He is currently in charge of Midwest collegiate affairs.

Why does one person do so much for one sport? It's certainly not for the money; he receives none for coaching. It is more of one man giving something back to the sport that has given him so much.
"It easily becomes a way of life," he said. "You meet so many people and develop so many friends through rugby. It doesn't matter if you're a coach, player or a referee. I have the luxury of being all three."

# Satisfaction 

The Bowling Green hockey team shot par for the course in the 1988-89 season.

They finished in the top 12 of the field, making the money list for the third time in four years. And they lived up to their name as a top contender.

But when all was said and done, the squad was upset that it hadn't won the major since 1984 at Lake Placid.
"I'm not satisfied," senior co-captain Alan Leggett said. "You're never satisfied unless you win the National Championship."

But those words come from a player who understands BG's tradition. Heck, most teams would have been happy just being invited to the National Tournament. And as far as the predicament the Falcons had gotten themselves into, they were over-achievers.

BG finished fifth in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association with a record of 15-14-3, but won every nonleague game to give them a 23-14-3 overall at the end of the regular season. And it was a season composed of streaks, both winning and losing.

The Falcons soared into their slate, opening with a 7-1 mark, until their feathers were ruffled on Nov. 6, going into a tailspin courtesy of the Wolverines from Michigan. A bench-clearing "brawl" ensued after UM's Myles O'Connor checked BG freshman Martin Jiraneck into the boards after the whistle sounded to end the first period.

Five Falcon regulars were lost for the remainder of the game and received one-game suspensions for what referee Russ Johnson dubbed as fighting. There was grabbing, tugging, shoving, pulling and yanking, but fighting?
"I think there should be some kind of a distinction between fighting and 25 guys trying to pull guys off," BG's Marc Potvin, who was ejected for fighting, said. "There's nothing in the rule book that shows a distinction between that. You can punch a guy out and get disqualified for a game or you can pull a guy off and get the same thing. There's no justice there."

And it would leave the Falcons with a bitter taste in their mouth as they would lose six straight dropping to 7-7 and trade-off in the next seven going into Christmas break with a 11-10 record.

But BG would go 12-4-3 in the second half of the season in what one reporter referred to as the "Jerry Jolt." This is BG head coach Jerry York's yearly transformation of an immature squad into a finely tuned machine as the playoffs approach.
"I think the mark of a good team in any sport is their

[^2]ability to improve during the course of the season," York said. "This addition of the Bowling Green hockey team did that and each month we seemed to become a better team and reach another plateau."

This was completed by a strong defensive prowess led by junior goaltender Paul Connell and a corps of veteran defensemen in Leggett, senior Thad Rusiecki, junior Kevin Dahl and sophomore Rob Blake. Leggett was cocaptain and a three-time CCHA All-Academic team selection.
"Alan Leggett should go down as one of the most respected Bowling Green hockey players of all-time both on and off the ice," York said.

Connell shouldered the majority of the netminding chores and finished the season with a 21-16-3 record and a 3.44 goals against average.

Blake, who scored 11 goals and 22 assists for 32 points, was rewarded by being named second team All-CCHA. Dahl led the back line in offensive production with


## 9-26-35.

During the stretch, BG allowed only 56 goals in its last 19 outings. In contrast, they gave up 90 in their first 21.
Offensively, BG was led by first team All-American cocaptain, senior Greg Parks and second-time Hobey Baker candidate Nelson Emerson. Parks finished third in the nation in scoring with $32-42-74$, and was the top votegetter among forwards for first team All-CCHA.

Emerson, who was a second-team All-CCHA selection, was 22-46-68. Junior Joe Quinn (21-20-41), sophomore Pierrick Maia (15-21-36) and junior Potvin (23-12-35) added additional punch.

But the late season surge wasn't enough to dismiss early season failures. The six-game losing streak, and BG's inability to win a regular season overtime contest (0-5-3), put the Falcons on the road for its first time in nine years.

The fifth-place finish meant the Falcons would travel to Ann Arbor to face UM in a best-of-three series in the first round of the CCHA playoffs. UM and BG would swap wins before Blake answered in the third overtime of the
final contest.
"Our backs were to the wall coming in here (March 5 at UM)," Blake said. "We had to play away in the first round of the playoffs, and we had to win it. That winning goal just makes everything so much sweeter."

Blake's tally enabled the Falcons to venture to the CCHA semi-finals at Joe Louis Arena for the eighth consecutive time. The Falcons lost a nail-biter with nemesis Michigan State, 3-2.
The victory by Lake Superior over Illinois-Chicago made the usually meaningless consolation game crucial. The winner of the UIC-BG contest would make the national tournament, and the Falcons would prevail.

Dahl scored the game-winner on the power play with less than a minute left to send the Falcons to Newton, Mass. to face Boston College in the NCAA's first round.

But the Eagle's were simply too much as they defeated BG in two-straight, 8-5 and 4-2, sending the Falcons packing.
"That strong showing late in the year and at Joe Louis


earned us our third consecutive NCAA bid," York said. "Boston College was able to beat us, but they were a better team than us. Certainly BC was one of the top teams in college hockey this year."

And as Leggett alluded to, BG wasn't content with just being in "the show." Their tradition leads them to strive for higher goals.
"We're setting a lot of precedents for each successive team to live up to the last season Bowling Green hockey plays," York said. "We were able to get back to Joe Louis and the Nationals and it just grows and grows."

And next season will be another challenge. The squad loses capable seniors in Parks, Leggett, Rusiecki, Chad Arthur and Steve Dickinson, but the rookie forwards


Jiranek, Peter Holmes, Jim Solly and Dan Bylsma will gain experience and be counted on to add more production next season. The freshmen foursome totaled 78 points during the year.
And maybe in the 1989-90 season, BG will reach the pinnacle of the collegiate ranks again - winning its second national Championship. That appears to be the only avenue left for the Falcons to quench their thirst for satisfaction.

## Parks



Senior Greg Parks is the type of person who walks through puddles, not around them.

And spectators have seen Parks splash all opponents in his path, to the point where he's been called downright dirty. But Parks simply gets the job done; he's a competitor.
"I've never really turned down a challenge at all," Parks said. "I think I try and look the challenge in the eye and tackle as many as I can."

Has he succeeded? How does first team All-Central Collegiate Hockey Association sound? Not good enough? How about first team All-American?

That's right, Parks earned both those honors in his senior year as he led the Falcons in scoring with 32 goals and 42 assists for 74 points, good for third in the nation. And Parks became only the eleventh Falcon in history to gain firstteam All-American honors.
"I think it (All-American) put a real icing on the cake for my four years," he said. "My junior year I didn't really receive any personal recognition, and I felt that I had the numbers ( 74 points) and everything."

The centerman knows all about the critics of the sport, growing up in Edmonton, Alberta. Observers said he didn't have the size or the tools. And the carping continued through college as Parks is only 5 -foot- 8 and 175 pounds.

But what Parks lacked in size and speed, he made up for in desire.
"I think to be successful in any sport you have to have the confidence that borders on the cocky level, and that's something I've always had," he said. "Even when I wasn't winning those awards, I was telling myself I was the best player out there. That's what I used to keep myself going."

And when Parks hurt his shoulder this season, he knew he'd have to continue to play to get any recognition. So
"I wanted to play so bad, I was telling myself that me at 50 percent would be better than one of the other guys at full steam," Parks said. "That might not be
a good thing to say, and I don't mean it in a bad way to any of those guys, but that's just the attitude that I had to take over the years to get where I am."

It was an attitude which irked many to denounce his approach to the game. Other coaches would refer to him as a chippy, dirty player during his first three years of college. But for Parks, it was just a method of getting the edge, knocking the opponent off of their game plan.
"Other coaches don't like him, and they don't like playing against him," teammate Marc Potvin said. "He's always on your case and that's what you expect of him."

But in his freshman campaign, Parks' desire to win was a bit too excessive.
"When I came here, I played a lot more aggressive my freshman year (78 minutes in penalties) and coach (Jerry) York sat me down and said if I was going to keep that up I'm not going to be able to play here," Parks said. "He was right and that could have saved my career as far as college goes."

Parks toned it down and by his senior season he was rewarded by his teammates when they voted him as captain. And even the other coaches saw Parks mature.
"He gets a lot of penalty minutes, but his intensity and competitiveness are great assets to his game, " York said.
"The coaches all voted him first team in our league, so everybody appreciated what he did."

In the process, Parks quietly became the third leading scorer in BG history with 240 points. And how does Parks want to be remembered by the Falcon faithful?
"I'd imagine it would be that Greg Parks would do anything to win," he said.

Call him cocky or arrogant, but in a pick-up game you'd be crazy not to choose Greg Parks first.

Consistency is a trait which a successful team must garner. A team which plays with consistency usually challenges for championships, while a team that doesn't usually fades away.

Bowling Green faded away.
"We ended up on an emotional rollercoaster ride this season," Head Coach Jim Larranaga said.

The cagers finished the season with a 12-16 mark, and placed 7th in the Mid-American Conference with a record of 6-10.

The season started off optimistically with the squad winning six of its first nine games. In the season opener, BG defeated Siena College, who later upset Stanford in the NCAA Championship Tournament, 87-85.
BG then traveled to Lexington on Dec. 16 to play in the Kentucky Invitational and knocked off perennial power Kentucky, $56-54$, in front of 20,875 Wildcat faithful.
"The Kentucky win has to be one of the best wins for a coach or a player in a career," Larranaga said. "To go there and beat them at their place was just great."

BG, however, then stumbled into a six-game losing streak, and hit rock bottom when they lost to Miami $65-42$. At that point, BG was sitting at $0-4$ in the MAC, and people began to wonder if the squad would ever get another win.

BG returned from Miami, and notched its first MAC win of the year, 80-61 over Western Michigan. The cagers then finished the season by winning 6 of their last 12 regular season MAC games.
In the regular season finale, the Falcons nipped traditional rival Toledo on a last second 25 -foot buzzer beater by freshman Kirk Whiteman. BG was going into the MAC Tournament with some momentum, but ran into a very strong Kent State team who beat the undermanned Falcons, 65-56.
"I thought we played really well in December, but in January things didn't go our way," Larranaga said. "We had some injuries which didn't help us, and we just didn't get things going."
"The dramatic win in the last game against Toledo was an exciting way to go into the tournament, but Kent State was just a very good basketball team."

BG was led by senior Joe Gregory who averaged 13.2 points per game and 3.2 assists a game. Gregory was supported by senior Lamon Pippin ( $9.6 \mathrm{ppg} ., 4.0 \mathrm{rpg}$.), junior Darryl McLane ( 8.1 ppg .), and sophomores Ed Colbert ( 5.7 ppg., 6.1 rpg.), Billy Johnson ( 8.5 ppg .) and Joe Moore ( $6.5 \mathrm{ppg} ., 3.5 \mathrm{rpg}$.).

The urban league.
Where scorekeepers count bodies not buckets.

The court is Detroit and the player was Joe Gregory.

Or it could have been. Because Joe Gregory grew up in one of Detroit's toughest neighborhoods. Actually there were more hoods than neighbors.

And for a while, Joe Gregory was one of them. He stole and stripped cars to earn money. The money bought guns. The guns protected him from gangs other than his own. He was in the sixth grade, barely 11 years old.

The future wasn't bright either. After being removed from two Catholic schools, Gregory was required to attend Cervany Middle School, Detroit's worst public middle school. When kids at Cervany took field trips, they didn't collect insects. They stole as much merchandise as they could from the local malls.
"We would walk out of a mall with 10-12 polo shirts, an assortment of Lauren short pants and new gym shoes; and we had a good time doing it."

After several hours of cruising the streets, even some that were named for black heros, like Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King, Gregory would return to school. But he didn't return to read about those heros, he returned to be back in time for basketball practice.

Not only were the kids at Cervany corrupt, the system itself was. Whether Gregory attended classes or not, he was still allowed to play ball. Yet it was this shady system pretending to nourish the mind, that provided a way out for Gregory.

His basketball talents were noticed.
From Bishop Borgess High School, a Catholic one, Gregory was offered an athletic scholarship. Gregory's mother made it a mandate regardless of Borgess's motives. "Borgess payed for my books and tuition, but everyone knew that blacks were there to play ball."

Removing him from the public school system detoured Gregory from the dead-end road he was on. Gang
days became game days. The scoreboard lit up his life. After nearly four full years of varsity ball at Borgess, Gregory was being recruited by several Mid-American Conference schools.

He picked Bowling Green to further distance himself from urban temptations. "BG was the ideal spot for me. Here I was out of the city, into the country and I knew I would see a lot of court time as a freshman."

At $5-10$, he was one of the smallest guys on his new court, yet he made quick impressions. Gregory started 21 of 23 games and tallied 135 points.

His sophomore season he scored 281 points and won the team's Best Playmaker Award. "As a sophomore, Gregory was a vital part of our team concept," Coach Jim Larranaga said. "As his playing time increased, he began to assume the roll of team leader."

He added another 296 points his junior year and again won the team's Best Playmaker Award. These efforts earned Gregory the helm for his senior season.

From the leader of a gang in the seventh grade, to the captain of a Division I basketball team his senior year in college, Gregory turned full circle. Yet Gregory attributes his leadership ability to his gang roots.
"My gang days made me tough and strong. Being able to survive a gang has given me the confidence to handle anything."

Although the only highlights for the 1989 campaign were the win over Kentucky and the buzzer win over Toledo, Gregory proved he could lead a team.
"There is no question that Joe was instrumental to the team. If he was playing well, so was the team," Larranaga said.

By improving his production for the third straight year, Gregory earned the 18 th spot on the all time point list. He scored 357 points his senior season. But if it weren't for basketball, chances are that 22 year old Joe Gregory would have used a real .357 to settle the score.

Success

DaVinci painted the Mona Lisa, Beethoven composed Fifth Symphony, Thomas Jefferson penned the Declaration of Independence and Fran Voll coached the 1988-89 Bowling Green women's basketball team.

All great accomplishments. All wonders to be cherished for generations to follow. All forms of human perfection, the standard by which everyone else in the craft measures themselves.

Bowling Green finished with an unblemished 16-0 record in the Mid-American Conference and a school record-tying 27 victories. Voll was the artist, the team his masterpiece.

The Falcons also won their third straight MAC regular season and tournament championships. No other MAC team has three championships - either regular season or post season - in the history of the conference.

Bowling Green became the first MAC team ever to win a game in the NCAA Tournament with a 10 -point victory over Cincinnati in the first round. Over 4,100 patrons of the arts packed Anderson Arena in March for the NCAA exhibition, setting a new women's attendance record.

The Falcons succumbed in the NCAA second round to Maryland, which continued on to the Final Four in Tacoma, Wash.
"Some teams and players are expected to do well and never live up to that," BG head coach Fran Voll said. "This group was successful."

The first brush stroke of the season set the mood for the campaign with Voll winning his first opening game in his five-year tenure. At Loyola of Chicago, a layup by Senior standout Jackie Motycka as time expired gave BG the one-point victory.

Overall, the Falcons won their first six games, including the Illini Classic in Champaign, Ill., before losing at home to Michigan State. BG then lost two (at Ohio State and at Cincinnati) of its next three contests.

The Falcons lost to Cincinnati shortly before Christmas break, but they didn't come up short again until Lent. Bowling Green devoured their next 20 opponents before losing to Maryland.

Any season includes disappointments but the 1988-89 women's basketball campaign was like a rollercoaster which never stopped its ascent to the heavens.
"There are ups and downs in every season," said Voll, who was named MAC Coach of the Year for the second time in three seasons. "We were fortunate enough to have more ups than downs this year."

The all-around successful season caused the national basketball community to take notice. BG players collected enough individual accolades to fill their own gallery.

Senior point guard Paulette Backstrom was the recipient of the Naismith Hall of Fame Award as the nation's best woman basketball player under 5 -foot- 6 .

In addition, seniors, guard Megan McGuire and forward Motycka, along with Backstrom, were named first team All-MAC. Junior center Angie Bonner made the second team.

In the final USA TODAY women's Top 25 poll, the Falcons finished in 28th place.

Over the past four years, the Falcons have posted a 96-23 record. Motycka, McGuire and Backstrom, collectively considered the best recruiting class in MAC history, have led the way. They combined in their careers to score nearly 3,000 points, grab more than 1,500 rebounds and make almost 1,000 assists.

Individually, the threesome garnered MAC Player of

the Year votes at the end of season, only to fall short of the award. Motycka won the honor after her sophomore and junior years.

With their graduation loss, one might think the Falcons will struggle next year.

But that should not be the case. Bonner and forward Tecca Thompson, both starters, will return. The entire bench also will be back, which should help compensate for the scoring, rebounding and play-making losses of Motycka, McGuire and Backstrom.
All in all, BG should make another strong run at the MAC championship and continue its winning tradition.
"Some of the recruits have already been talking about breaking so-and-so's record and this and that," Voll said. "When they come in, you never know how good they'll be. But if they can be half as good as Jackie, or Megan, or Paulette, then they'll be fine."

 ered the player behind the mask.

For three years, she played a silent yet important role in the backcourt for the women's basketball team, working toward being one of the premier point guards in the country.

Her senior year, that mask of silence was removed. The intensity and leadership shined through and glory came with the unveiling.

But not without a great deal of competition.

Among the likes of Mid-American Conference standouts and fellow seniors Jackie Motycka and Megan McGuire, who have set, shared or tied more than 20 school records and accumulated numerous other honors, the 5 -foot-5 Flint, Michigan, native had a little bit of proving to do.

And proving is what she did.
" P " as her coaches and teammates call her, chalked up a host of honors including 1989 MAC Tournament MVP, two straight MAC Tournament all-star team selections, five MAC Tournament records and two first team All-MAC selections.

The four-year letter winner also led the conference in assists her junior (5.8 per game) and senior years ( 7.2 per game). Her senior year, she was ranked among the top 10 assist leaders in the nation as she recorded seven or more assists in 17 of 31 games. In her career, she totaled 559 assists, making her the third player in the MAC to reach the 500 plateau.

But for Backstrom, all these honors would not suffice.

The Falcon point guard added national recognition to her already extensive list of honors, the 1989 Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame Award, an honor awarded to the outstanding player in the nation under 5 -foot-6 for women and 6 -foot for men.
"That was the biggest award I've cever won because it was a national E award," Backstrom said.

Despite the national and conference$\times$ wide recognition, Backstrom said the ${ }_{\mathrm{L}}^{\mathrm{w}}$ honors and awards really haven't af-

## fected her.

"I am still the same," she said. "This year I think I did a lot of things to really establish myself. But I think the (media) attention has always been there, perhaps not as much as this year, but it doesn't bother me at all."

Backstrom, however, gives her teammates a great deal of credit for her success and rightly so.

Since Backstrom and her senior counterparts came to the University, the Falcons have captured three-straight MAC championships, three-straight MAC Tournament victories and three-straight NCAA Tournament appearances.

This year's NCAA Tournament berth gave BG a home court advantage which proved to be favorable as the team was the first in the MAC to advance to the second round of the tournament, where they eventually lost to final-four participant Maryland.
"Whenever you get any award you play a major role in attaining those records," Backstrom said. "A team's good record or bad record could make or break a person from getting an award."
"True you have to play a part, as an individual you have to do something, but the team also figures in. It is a reflection on not only the individual, but the team as well."

But for the Falcon standout, it was necessary to momentarily leave the limelight during her senior year to overcome one of life's biggest adversities, a death in the family.
"I've been committed to playing hard, but after dad died, I wanted to show him something," she said, in a cracking voice. "The last time I spoke with him, he was making plans to come to the MAC Tournament. Then that's when things happened. I really wanted to go out and do something special because I knew he was watching."

And for Backstrom, she did something special not only for her father, but for players to come in the MAC. She set a precedent which will definitely be hard to match.

Traveling from the heights of Colorado to the lowlands of Kentucky, the Bowling Green State University Gymnastics team had its highs and lows during the 1988-89 season.
The Falcon tumblers soared high this year and succeeded in breaking the school record three weekends in a row. The standing record of 179.70 , set in 1986-87 season against Pittsburgh, was first broken at a home meet against Western Michigan University with a score of 179.75 .
Although the squad just skimmed over the record that weekend, the tum-

blers surged past the 180 mark against Illinois State with a 180.05 . The domino effect continued as the Falcons knocked out another record, hitting the peak in Kentucky, with a score of 180.50.

The Falcons had a young squad with six freshman, five sophomores, three juniors and only one senior. With this young and inexperienced team, they had their rocky season ending with a final Mid-American Conference record of 3-3 and an overall record of 5-9.
"It's hard to end up on such a low note and feel good about yourself, but I think they (team members) are coming back with really positive attitudes and a good outlook for next year," gymnastics coach Dr. Charles Simpson said.

The team headed into the 1989 MAC Championships with an undefeated
home record and wins on the road against top teams, but stumbled in the tournament, finishing last.
"I don't want to live through that last day ever again," Simpson said. "But, what we scored at the MAC Championship would have won it at any other MAC Championship."
Individually, some of the gymnasts reached highs of their own. Sophomore Kim Crawford and Freshman Mary Beth Friel both exceeded their personal bests on the balance beam. Crawford posted a 9.55 at Kentucky and Friel qualified as a member of the All-MAC squad with a 9.5 and a second place tournament finish. This duo also received top scores on the vault at the MAC Championship with matching scores of 9.2.

Friel again made a top scoring ap-

pearance on the floor exercise with a 9.45 at Illinois State.

Junior Lori Pinegar scored the team high on the uneven bars with a 9.35 against Pittsburgh.

The 1989 gymnastics season ended in a valley but peaks are visible on the horizon. The team returns eight letter winners and promises to be one of the most talented at Bowling Green in years.
"We gave our best this year," Simpson said. "Now we're going to go back and get ready for next year. We need to see if we can become better with what we have got."

With the potential that this young group of women has, more records might be broken next year than glasses at Howard's Club H.

## Griffin

Meg Griffin has just lost her footing. A look of desperation creases her face as she plummets to the floor from the balance beam. But Griffin bounces up with her eyes tightly closed and giggling uncontrollably about her latest blunder.

Griffin is a sophomore standout on the University's gymnastics team and a ray of sunshine at practice sessions and meets.
This Cleveland native started gymnastics at age ten, when a neighbor saw her hanging from a tree and suggested that she be enrolled in gymnastics classes. By age twelve, Griffin was competing.

Gymnastics became her obsession.
"If I was even late for (gymnastics) class, I would cry," she said. "I wanted to be better than everyone else."

And she proved she could be one of the best. As a member of The Great Lakes Gymnastics Team in Cleveland, Griffin captured the sectional, district and state championships on the uneven bars.

An untimely illness made the college transition difficult, however. One month after Griffin began school at Bowling Green, she got mononucleosis. "After I got well, I had to come back and get in shape. I didn't know anyone on the team and everyone else knew each other," she said.

But the team was what would make BG different than her previous gymnastics experience. They would become her gymnastics family.
"In club it was more individual, more intense and pressured. College is more team oriented," she said. "At first it was really hard to get used to it all here. But now the girls on the team are like my best friends so it's a lot easier."

Teammates have made it easier to accept disappointment too.
"Whether we win or lose, we are in it together. I like it better as a team sport," Griffin explained.
thrill of victory. At the 1988 MAC Championships alone, she placed sixth on the vault with a 9.0 , fourth on the floor exercise with a 9.1 and sixth in the all-around with a 35.20 .

Yet, she managed to improve during her sophomore year. Griffin consistently scored nines on the vault and floor exercise and chalked up personal bests of 9.15 and 9.35 respectively. Her all-around best of 36.05 shattered her old record. 'Sophomore jinx was not in Griffin's vocabulary.
"She is so strong, and therefore everything that she does is so much easier. In gymnastics, when it looks easier, it looks better," gymnastics coach Dr. Charles Simpson said. "I don't have to stay on her to get things done. She works hard on her own."

But the high point of the 1988-89 season for Griffin was a team accomplishment.
"My most memorable moment this year was when we broke the school record for the first time," she said. "That was sweet."

Griffin came to college with many of the same insecurities as any other high school student. But gymnastics has allowed her to grow and mature at a more accelerated pace.
"I am a totally different person now," she said. "I used to be shy when I was little but now I have more confidence in myself. I am more outgoing."

She also learned that the world does not come to an end with a tumble from the beam or a bad grade on a test. "Failure is not forever," she said. "There are going to be good times and bad times."

Failure has never been a concern for Griffin in the classroom, however. She is an honor student in sports medicine.
"I want to work with sports people and sports medicine but I am going to hang up my grips in two years," she admitted. "I want to broaden my horizons and do something else."

## A Rising



It took 21 years, but the Bowling Green men's swim team finally regained some of the respectability missing since the regimes of venerable BG mentors like Tom Stubbs and Joe Cooper.

With a third-place finish at the MidAmerican Conference Championships, the Falcons marked what could be their entrance into the MAC elite for several years to come.

Another age-old Falcon shortcoming ended also, as senior distance specialist Brian Dickman captured BG's first individual swimming title in 15 years, winning the 1,650 freestyle crown.

The other Falcons performed exceptionally, too, as they broke 14 of 19 school records at the season finale.
"Our (third-place) finish is representative of what the swimmers put into it compared to the teams of the last few years," second-year head coach Brian Gordon said.

BG also faced a more difficult schedule compared to years past. They competed against Big Ten powers Michigan and Michigan State and Southeastern Conference foe Kentucky in an attempt to prime themselves for the rigors of the MAC Championship. While the Falcons may have lost these meets, they acquired experience which helped them as the season progressed.

Along with Dickman, who was a consistent performer all season, junior Rich Foster controlled the sprints for BG. At the MAC Championships, he took second in the 200 freestyle and third in the 100 and 50 freestyle events.

## The Need For



The 1988-89 version of Mid-American Conference women's swimming witnessed a changing of the guard which would make those at Buckingham Palace shudder.

While Bowling Green placed third in a competitive race, youthful Ohio University at long last ended Miami's seven-year stranglehold on the conference by swimming to a dominant victory at the MAC Championships.

Though a third-place finish was the worst for the Falcons since their entry into the MAC, head coach Brian Gordon was in no way disappointed.
"Our goal was to swim the best we could, and we did that this season," said Gordon following the Championships.

The Falcons had a successful dual meet season, however highlighted with a thrilling 165-135 victory over archrival Miami. The women also took their second-consecutive title in the Tom Stubbs' Relays which opened the season. A third-place finish at the talent-laden All-Ohio Invitational proved to be an inspirational push into the season's second half.

BG and the MAC bade farewell to their most prolific swimmer ever, Andrea Szekely. During her four years, Szekely was a dominant force in the MAC, leaving BG
with three MAC records - the 100 and 200 butterfly and the 200 freestlye - under her belt. She concluded her outstanding career by receiving the Outstanding Senior Swimmer Award at the Championships, a fitting close to a fabulous four years.

Another force for the Falcons was junior Shari Williams. She defended her 50 freestyle crown at the MAC Championships, while narrowly missing the 100 freestyle title. Williams' victory in the 50 freestyle was BG's only victory at the Championships.

Four Falcons gave their final performance at Cooper Pool after four years of swimming - Szekely, Moe Kelly, Suzanne Church and Jennifer Lakins. Their season-long determination often served as inspiration for younger members of the team.

BG divers had a roller-coaster year, as freshman Kelly Schaefer showed improvement alongside sophomore Cathy Kurela. Both qualified for regional competition in the NCAA Diving Tournament.

With only four seniors leaving the team and a host of young swimmers who gained much experience, the Falcons of the future can anticipate further success.

No one will ever accuse the 1989 Bowling Green Baseball Team of being mediocre.
During the first portion of the season, the Falcons took on the role of world beaters as they won 15 of their first 18 games. The pinnacle of the streak was reached when BG traveled to Ann Arbor on Mar. 29 and upset the Michigan Wolverines, 8-0.
"We caught them (Michigan) at a good time," Platzer said. "I think it shows we can play with some of the best teams in the nation."
The statement sounded valid at the time, but the Falcons never lived up to the compliment. As good as the BG nine was in the first half of 1989, they were every bit as bad in the second half.

After racing to a $15-3$ record, the Falcons proceeded to win just eight games in their final 34 contests to finish at 23-29 overall and 6-25 (ninth place) in the Mid American Conference.

While the team's performance was similar to that of comparing night and day, consistent performances were turned in by a handful of Falcons.

Junior first baseman/outfielder Kyle Hockman was a second-team All-MAC selection. He batted .301 and led the team in RBI's (55) and home runs (10).

Shawn Gillenwater, Greg Lashuk, and Brian Koelling earned Honorable Mention All-MAC honors. Gillenwater concluded the year with a .301 average and 18 RBI's, while leading the team with a .476 on-base percentage.

Lashuk led the MAC in batting average and doubles before he injured his shoulder in a contest against Ohio University on April 15. Despite missing 29 games, the senior captain tied for second on the team with 31 RBI's. Koelling hit .302 on the season with 19 RBI's.
In addition to the All-Conference

accolades, the Falcons set one new standard for seasons to come. Gillenwater's 48 runs scored set a new single-season school record by erasing the old mark of 47 set by Chuck Black in 1976-77.

On the mound, the Falcons found the going tough as the pitching staff struggled to a 5.13 team earned run average out of conference and an astronomical 6.77 ERA against MAC opponents. Sophomore lefthander Vince Metzger led the Falcon attack from the hill with a 4-4 record and a 3.89 ERA against non-conference opponents, 4.86 in the conference.
"We jumped out to the quick start, but some key injuries and the lack of depth on the pitching staff hurt us in the long run," Platzer said.

# New Beginnings 



After a record setting performance like the 1988 Bowling Green Softball Team had, new head coach Jacquie Joseph and her team knew they would be hard pressed to repeat that kind of success.

The 1988 Softball team won it's first Mid-American Conference championship and set a school record for games won with 35 .

However, Joseph knew she had her work cut out for her as BG lost six of the team members to graduation. This left the squad young and inexperienced.

BG started the season slow by losing seven of their first nine games. The Falcons ended with a 21-35 overall record and a 12-18 mark in the MAC as they settled for sixth place in the standings.

Yet the 1989 schedule was one of the toughest a BG softball team has had to face. The Falcons opened the season at the University of Arizona Softball Classic and then traveled to the Cal State Fullerton Softball Tournament. By April, the Falcons had played 10 games against Top 20 schools and had compiled a 2-7 record.

The year's bright spot for BG was Michelle Clagett. For

the second time in her three seasons the junior shortstop batted over .300 and earned the distinction of being the leading hitter. After a .298 season last spring, Clagett climbed back to over .300 in 1989 with a .306 average and was the only Falcon to reach .300 this season.

Freshman Terri Lattimer was the only Falcon to compile a winning record. She produced a record of $5-1$ with two saves. Lisa Hufford pitched against some of the strongest teams in the country and posted a record of 11-19 and two saves. Hufford came on strong at the end of the season as she won the last three games she pitched.

Joseph's first season will be remembered as a rewarding but sometimes frustrating season of transition. "There were tremendous impovements that were made thoughout the season which will benefit us next year." Joseph said.

The Falcons will return for the 1990 campaign in tact with the exception of senior Kris Rossi. Joseph will look to five rising seniors to lead the way. "We'll have people back for next year and I'm looking for a great season."

The Bowling Green men's and women's tennis teams netted average returns on their investment in the 1989 season.

First year men's coach Gene Orlando guided his team to a $12-12$ record in dual matches, 2-4 in the Mid-American Conference, and a fifth place finish in the MAC Tournament which BG hosted. The Falcons finished the tournament with 27 points while winner Ball State tallied 60.

Sophomore Steve Mudre paced the Falcons at the MAC Championship by finishing third in the number five singles competition. Mudre was the Falcons' most consistent player during the season, compiling a singles record of 16-6.

BG's number one doubles team of juniors John Green and Mike Hain also served up an impressive performance at the MAC Tournament finishing third. The duo had compiled an $8-16$ record during the season and was seeded sixth at the tournament's outset.

Senior Andy Sallee finished with a $9-15$ record as the Falcons' number one singles player and was named to the allconference team.

Sheila Chiricosta's women's team finished sixth place in the MAC Tournament at Ohio University which was won by Miami University for the ninth consecutive time.

Youth was the strength of the team in the tournament as freshman Carla Marshack and Cara Whalen paced the squad. Marshack finished the season with an 11-9 first singles record and was seeded sixth in the tournament but emerged as the third place finisher. Whelan also finished third in the sixth singles competition after amassing a 12-6 season record.

## Inconsistent

The Bowling Green men's and women's track teams were both ready to run at the sound of the gun in 1989, but it was the women who cleared the hurdles and sprinted to the finish, watching the men careen into the barriers and stumble across the line.

The Falcon women finished third at the Mid-American Conference Championships and were led by senior Tracy Gaerke. Gaerke piled up 25.5 of the Falcons' 115 points by herself and won the Women's Outstanding Athlete Award in the meet. She finished first in the 1,500 meters, second in the 800 meters and third in both the high jump and the 1,600 relay with teammates Allyson Williams, Janice Hare and Melissa Cole.

Senior Beth Manson repeated as two time MAC Champion in two events, hurling the discus like a frisbee for a MAC record 170 feet 4 inches and firing the shot put for 47 feet 3 inches.

Melissa Cole set a school record for the 400 meters with a time of 54.33 seconds during the 1989 season which saw coach Lee Labadie's team go 2-2 in dual meets before their successful showing in the MAC meet.

The men stumbled to a 7th place finish in the MAC Championships but also set numerous school records during their 2-3 finish in the dual schedule.

Part of the reason for the men's poor showing at the MAC meet was a medical one. Sprinter Ron Heard who won the 1988 Men's Outstanding Athlete Award was hampered with a hamstring injury which kept him out of the competition. In addition, record holders Steve Frye and Mike Young fouled out of the discus and hammer throw respectively.

Bowling Green pole vaulters Steve Cyrus and Paul Seeley shared a spot at the summit by setting a school vault record of 16 feet in 1989.

The men's power contingent also fired their projectiles school record shattering distances. Mike Young swung the hammer a record 191 feet one inch and Kyle Wray sent the shot put airborne 53 feet 7 inches.
