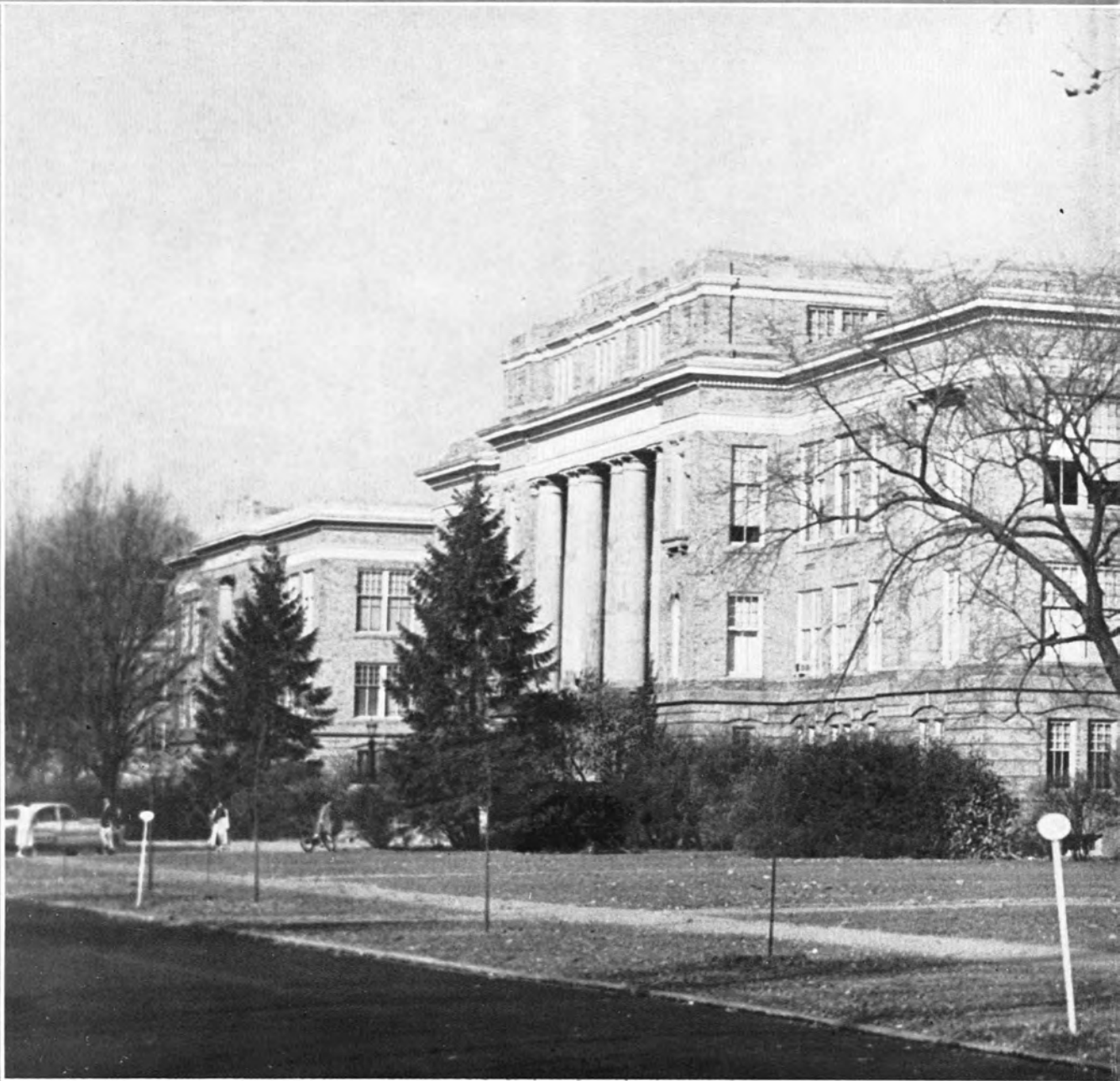

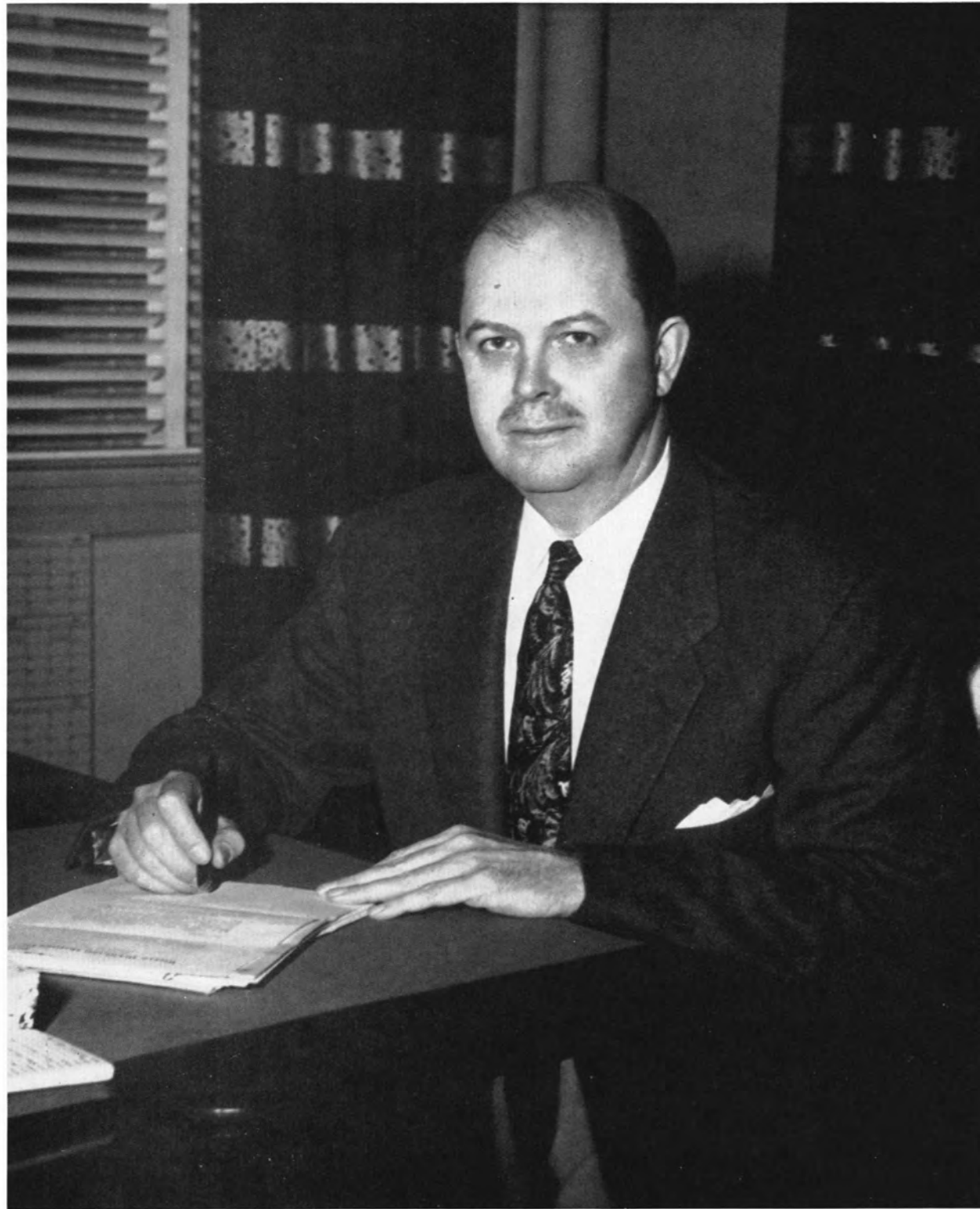

# *Administration and Faculty*

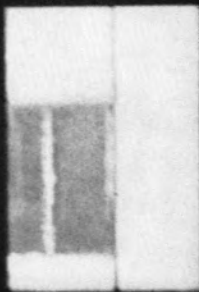
The administration and faculty are integral units which govern policies and actions of Bowling Green State University. The president and his advisory body, the Executive Council, decide all university-wide policies. Under the president, all academic affairs are planned by the Dean of Faculties and his Academic Council. The Dean of Administration controls all non-academic matters, one area of which is advised by the Council on Student Affairs. These councils are comprised of both administrative and faculty representatives, plus student members on the Council on Student Affairs. The faculty is further represented by the Faculty Senate. This body discusses and recommends matters to the administrative officials for action. This year Dr. McDonald has been working to develop a program of furthering the faculty's voice in University decisions by granting them powers more nearly equal to those of the administration.

# Thirty-eight New Members Were Added To Faculty Staff

The faculty of Bowling Green's Art Department was distinguished this year in being the first university faculty group to have an exhibit in the Toledo Museum of Art. Each of the seven faculty members displayed works in his particular field during the month of November. Since the department moved into its modern building, over 7,000 students have studied under these professors. Bowling Green State University artists also exhibited their works in faculty and student shows in the Fine Arts Auditorium. Traveling exhibits displayed there included modern artists, prize winning news photographs, a Doug Kinsman show, and a calligraphic and geographic art show from the Museum of Modern Art in New York City.

This year the Biology Department worked on completing a museum arrangement of the collections of Dr. E. L. Moseley, first professor of science at Bowling Green State Normal College. For two years, the department has been sorting and classifying these materials for the museum, located on the fourth floor of the building. When completed, the museum will contain collections of animals, plants, shells, and Indian relics.

The Department of Business Administration offered a wide variety of courses representing many areas of the field. Accounting, business law, finance, insurance, industrial management, marketing and statistics as well as general business administration were among the choices offered. In connection with the journalism department further courses in five other fields were offered for major study.

Clerical ability tests for Bowling Green students were provided by the Business Education Department. Certificates of their test ratings were given the students to use in applying for positions after graduation. Another activity of the department was sponsoring a conference of business education teachers from Northern Ohio. This was the first year for such a conference, which was held at Bowling Green.

The Chemistry Department is one of a small proportion of university departments approved by the American Chemical Society for the training of professional chemists. Students in this department had the further advantage of studying in the newest class-room building on campus.

The Economics Department offered a major to students in both the colleges of Liberal Arts and Business Administration. Many others took classes there for a background in different fields. Since World War II, the staff of the department has increased from one to six members.

Beginning as a state normal college, Bowling Green has continued to have a large Education Department, training many students for both elementary and secondary teaching. Approximately one-third of the students on campus were enrolled in these courses. Graduate students studied counseling, guidance, and school administration. Dr. Walter Zaugg, chairman of the department, retired this year after teaching with the University for thirty years.

Engineering Drawing has been a University Department for seven years. Its program is geared to meet the needs of pre-engineering and industrial arts students, and also includes a house planning course for those studying home economics.

An important step taken by the English Department this year was the initiating of an honors program of study. This was the only such program for Bowling Green undergraduates, and two students worked toward honors. Revisions within the department this year also resulted in newly arranged rooms and curriculum changes.

The Foreign Language Department began with two languages, Latin and German; French and Spanish were soon added. It was then thirty years before the courses were expanded to include Portuguese. Recognition societies in French, German, and Spanish are open to students with scholastic achievements records in the languages.

Recently organized as a separate department under the College of Business Administration, the Geography Department has its laboratories located on the Library top floor. In addition to the laboratory hours and classes held there, field trips further augmented study of this science. A small station for observing weather conditions gave students an opportunity to become familiar with meteorological equipment.

Expanding its library and map collection was one of the projects of the Geology Department this year. Student activities included field trips to hear speakers and to visit the Ohio Academy of Science, Lake Superior, and the iron ranges of Michigan. Geology majors planned for a possible summer trip to the mountains of Nevada for a six-week study tour. Thus the department gave to students a general background as preparation for later specialization.

Furnishing practical experience for students in industrial arts, the Graphic Arts Department offered courses in lithographic printing, press operation, and various phases of photography. Students in these courses did a portion of the printing for the University.

Degrees in both the College of Liberal Arts and the College of Education were offered for study in the History Department. Students excelling in this field were eligible for membership in Phi Alpha Theta, recognition society for history students.

The Home Economics Department trained students to be educators, dieticians, home demonstration agents, restaurant managers, merchandisers of textiles, and utility company workers. As a part of their

training, junior and senior students spent a six week period living in and managing the apartment located in the Practical Arts Building. Williams Hall kitchen served as a laboratory for students of dietetics and institution management.

The Industrial Arts Department was one of the original departments of Bowling Green State Normal College. Students of industrial arts worked toward both B.A. and M.A. degrees. Sigma Pi Tau is a recognition group for students in the department.

Some students in the Journalism Department worked for liberal arts degrees while others specialized in one of five areas of journalism in business administration: public relations, radio journalism, news writing and editing, photo journalism, or publication management. Student journalists worked on the B-G News, Student Directory, Freshman Handbook, and Key. At the annual Publications Recognition Banquet, awards were given to students who had done outstanding work in their field.

Offering only a one-hour course in 1933, the Library Science Department now gives twenty hours of instruction in library work. A minor may be obtained in both graduate and undergraduate courses.

Begun in 1914, the Mathematics Department offers courses to students in the fields of education, business administration, liberal arts, science, engineering, and statistics. Mathematics graduates now may receive a M.A. for work in the department.

With twenty-three faculty members, the Music Department has the largest staff of the University. Four vocal groups are sponsored by the department, and instrumental students played in five band and orchestral organizations.

The Philosophy Department was added to Bowling Green in 1947, offering studies for either a major or minor in undergraduate work and a minor in graduate studies. Approximately one hundred and fifty students studied philosophy each semester.

The Bowling Green Physical Education Department is one of the largest in Ohio for teacher training. Many students other than majors in the field benefited from a wide recreational program presented by the department.

The expansion of the Physics Department has reflected the growth of this field in popular concern, for it is the hand of the physicist which has shadowed our most powerful weapons. Previously a co-ordinated part of the general science field, the department now has a three-member staff. Students of physics were instructed in electronics, sound and supersonics, optics and spectroscopy, magnetism, and the applications of physics in industry.

Students concerned with the world situation enrolled in the Political Science Department hoping to find an understanding of, if not a solution for, the problems today. There they studied government of the United States and foreign nations, as well as other political institutions and international relations.

The Psychology Department uses both a clinical and theoretical approach to psychological problems presented to the students. A psychological testing clinic is also sponsored by the department.

Pre-professional students in the fields of social work, law, and theology were among those enrolled

in the Sociology Department. The 59 majors in this department spent one semester doing part-time field work with social agencies in Toledo.

The Speech Department is divided in the four major areas of dramatics, speech correction, forensics, and radio. Dramatics students in the University Theatre presented five major plays and a children's play in addition to several experimental and one act productions. Speech correction majors studied in one of Ohio's five universities completely certified in speech correction. Radio majors worked in their station, WBGU, and debaters traveled to forensic competitions.

## Student Senate Campaigned to Clean Up Nest

Guided by the Student Senate, the Student Union Committee undertook a year-long campaign of cleaning up the Nest. Highlights of the opening week included ashtrays sent to various dormitories on campus as reminders to use them in the Nest, signs within the Nest, and a day of judgment consisting of free coffee for all Nest clientele.

Student Senate this year revamped campus election procedures to form a new system patterned closely after city and state elections. Following nominations by class caucuses, primaries were held in which the ballot was reduced to two candidates. 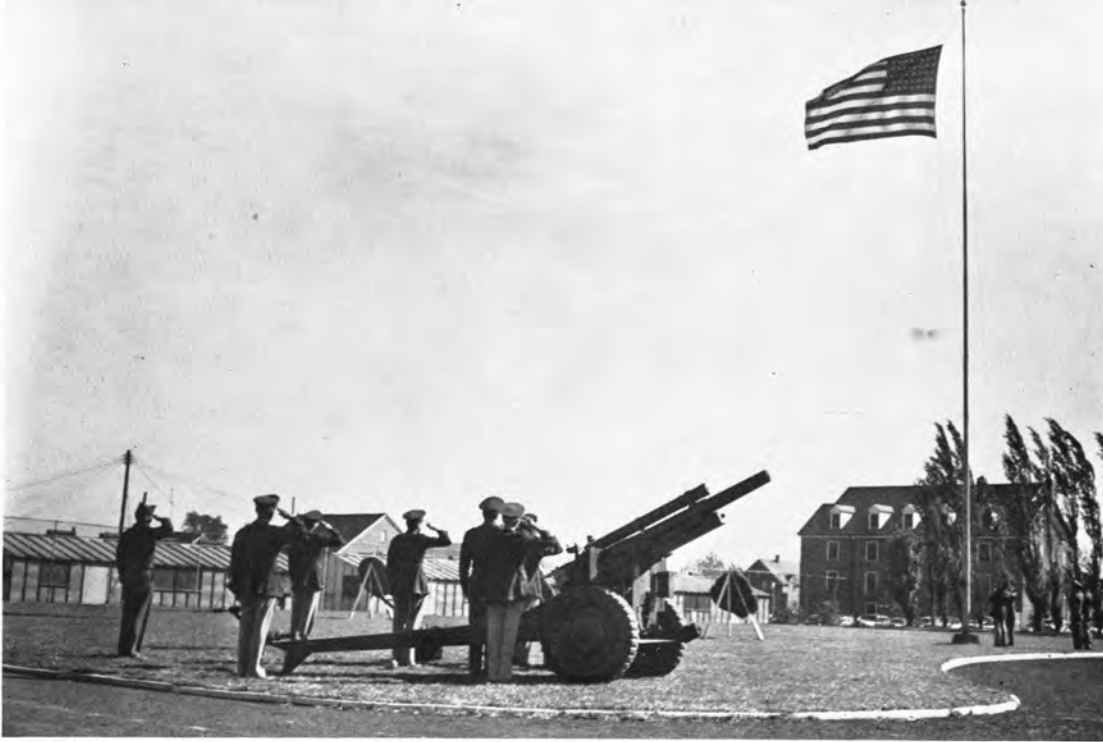

## Freshman Reigned As Homecoming Queen

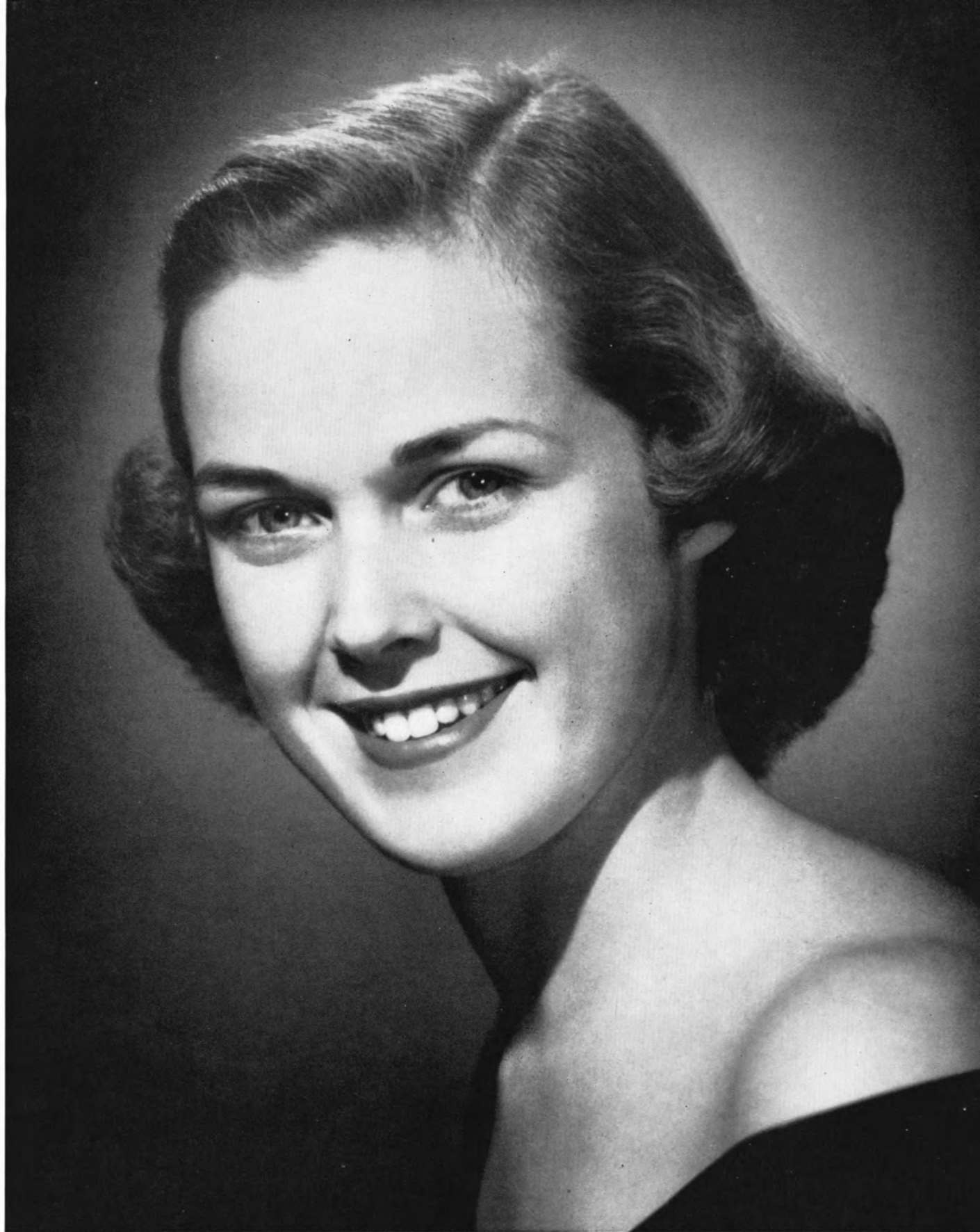

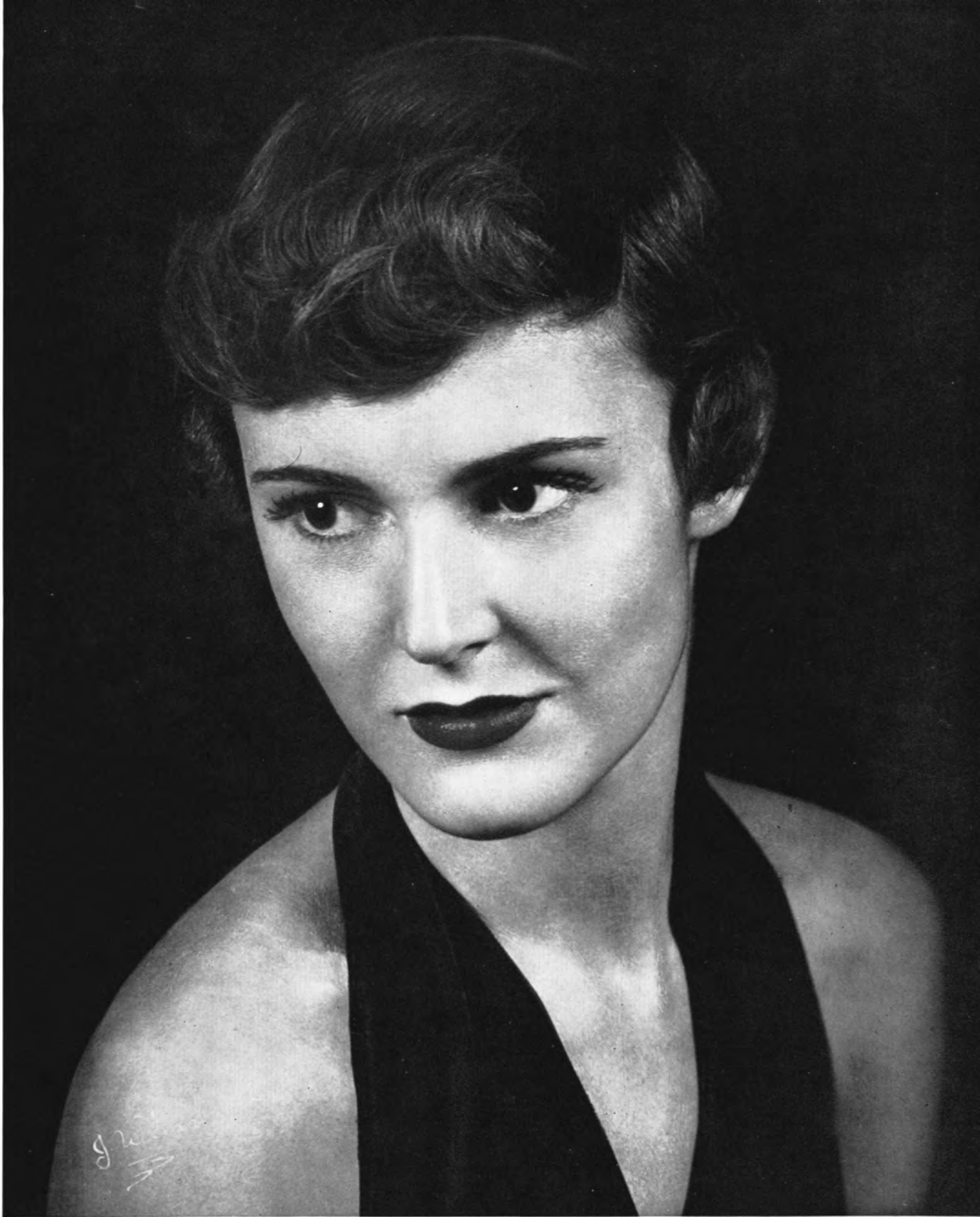


## Delores Shepp Chosen Key Queen

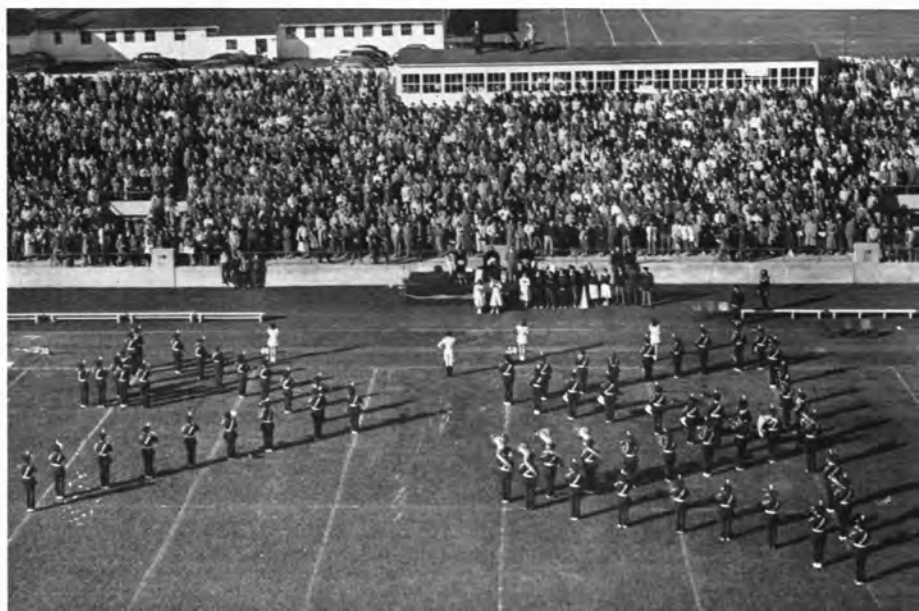
## Marching Band

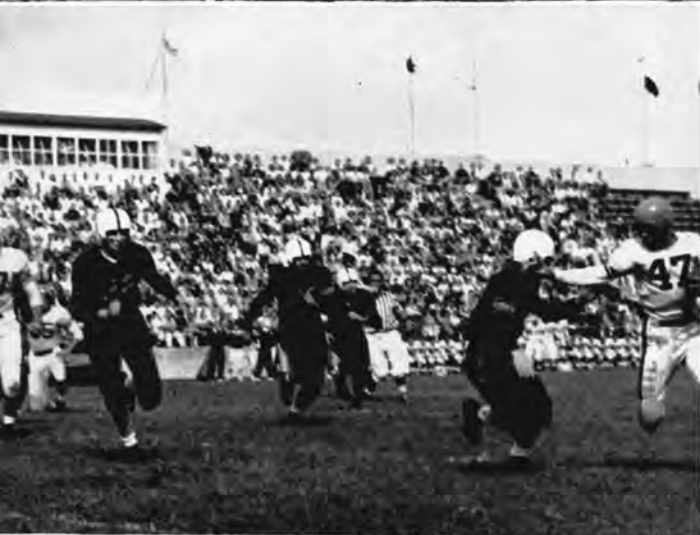

## 1952-53 Cage Season In Review

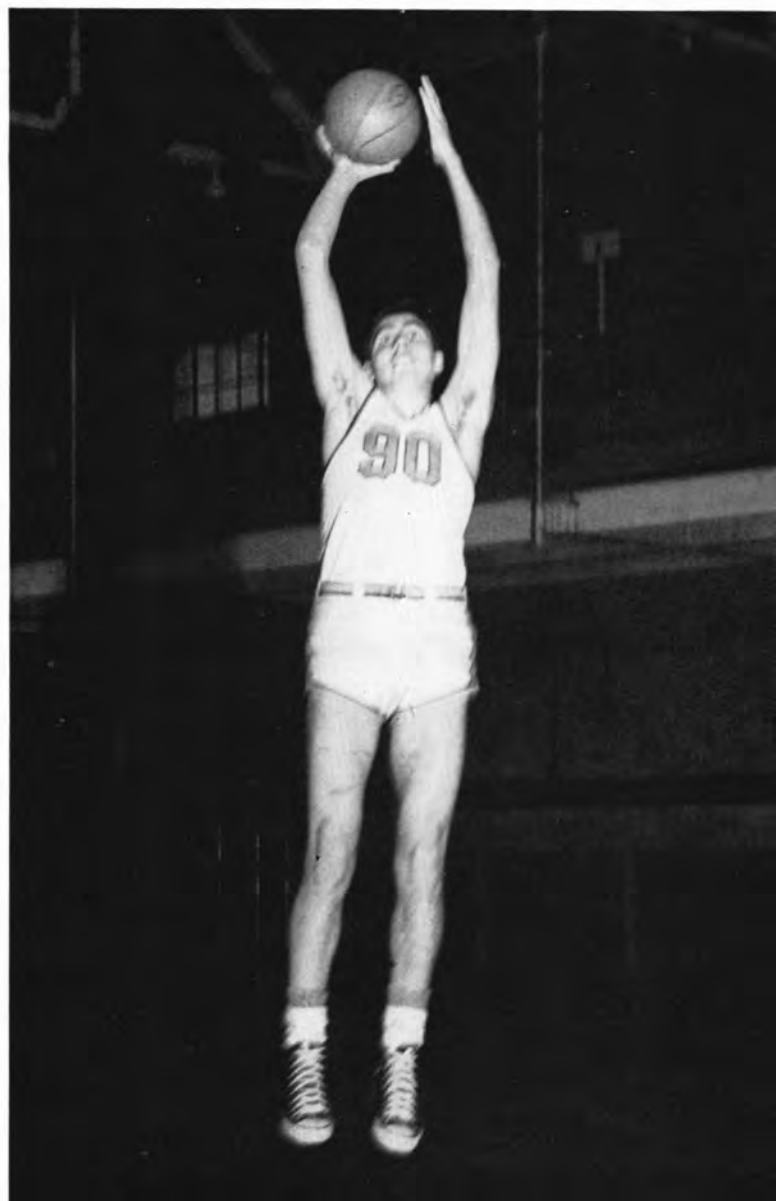


Coach Harold Anderson's team played under 500 per cent ball for the first time since he has taken over the helm as head basketball coach at Bowling Green. Coach Anderson had bad luck from the start when he learned last year's scoring ace, Jim Gerber, would be lost for the season. This year's team was without the services of any seniors; as a result, "Andy" will have his starting five back next year.

Four seasons have passed since a Long Island City High School basketball coach first ordered a rangy, inexperienced boy to practice tossing a ball through a net. Since that time, this same youth has ripened into a rapid-scoring, play-producing forward.

Al Bianchi, called "Spider" by teammates, hit for forty points in the last game of the season to tie Charlie Share's record for the most points in one season—596.

Al's forty points also set a new home floor record. Al is only a junior and should develop into an All-American next year.

Bowling Green State University opened its cage season by losing an overtime decision to Hamline 75-73. Behind 12 points at one time in the fourth quarter, Bianchi paced a torrid Falcon attack that tied Hamline, 69-69, in the final seconds of the game.

A helpless Hillsdale quintet handicapped by inexperience and lack of height, was crushed 92-48 by Coach Anderson's two platoons of Falcon Cagers. Playing without the services of their injured scoring ace, Jim Gerber, the locals got off to a sluggish start against the Dales.

Bowling Green outlasted the Gustavus Adolphus quintet 83-73 in a game which was marked by a combination of 98 tries at the foul line. BG could gather only one field goal in the last period while the Gusties hit for seven. In the final period the locals hit 16 free throws, while Gustavus Adolphus hit only three. The lead shifted three times during the last seven minutes of the third quarter, with Reis coming through each time to put the Falcons back in the ball game.

With a 2-1 record the Falcons traveled to Niagara Falls, N.I.T. prospect, to face a spirited ball club, which two nights before had lost a close game to top ranked LaSalle. Niagara, hitting over 40 per cent of its shots, won easily 65-55 in a slow moving game.

Coach Andy Anderson's hardwood aggregation took its third loss in five starts from the highly touted Duquesne Dukes in a heartbreaking 57-56 loss. Trailing the Pittsburgh school throughout the entire battle, the Falcon five tied the score at 55-all with 1:48 left in the game. Dick Ricketts meshed his tenth hook shot with 20 seconds left to give the Dukes their victory.

### Gerber out For Season

At this point in the season Coach Anderson announced that his scoring ace, 6' 6" Jim Gerber, would probably be lost for the season. Gerber was examined by a Toledo specialist, and the doctor recommended that he undergo an operation.

During the holidays Lawrence Tech, Oklahoma City, Penn State, Tulsa, and Bradley all slipped past the locals in five games that were close, any of which could have gone either way. But they all seemed to go the wrong way for the locals. Three of the setbacks, Oklahoma City, Penn State, and Tulsa, came at the Oklahoma City Tournament where BG found itself among some of the nations strongest cage powerhouses. In the Tulsa tilt the Falcons scored 75 points, their highest total in the tournament. Al Bianchi's 33 points in the Tulsa tilt broke the previous tournament record for points in a single game.

On January 3, the Falcons journeyed to Bradley to try to start the new year off on the right foot by posting a win and halting their six-game losing streak. But in a close game, and after leading at the last period, 64 to 59, the Falcons were edged by the Braves 81-78. Bianchi once again paced BG scorers as he swished 25 markers.

### Bee Gee Beats Detroit

Paced again by Al Bianchi, Bowling Green suppressed a late rally to defeat the University of Detroit 88-84 at the Titan Memorial Stadium January 9. After five minutes of the third quarter Detroit had come within three points of the Orange and Brown. Bianchi went into the pivot and out-maneuvered his defensive man time after time to lead another Falcon rush which staked the invaders to a 72-63 edge with a quarter left to go.

Sparked by the scoring of George Reis, the Falcons of Bowling Green pulled away from a stubborn Western Ontario quintet in the fourth quarter to win 76-61. Until midway in the final stanza, the Canadian squad stayed within striking distance. At this point Reis, aided by some fine set shooting by Boo Ellis, broke the game wide open with a wide variety of shots from his pivot position.

## Bowling Green Blasts Toledo

Bowling Green's vastly improved Falcon cagers pulled one of the major upsets of the season, outlasting their long-time rivals, the University of Toledo, 80-73, in a rugged see-saw battle that saw Coach Harold Anderson's boys freeze the ball for the last three and a half minutes to protect a slim fourth-quarter lead. As a team, the Falcons never looked better; they hit well, connecting on 36.4 percent of their shots, they rebounded almost at will in the last quarter, and for the most part their play was smooth and finished, seeming to prove that at last they were getting used to not having Jim Gerber around. Al Bianchi continued his phenomenal scoring pace, collecting 30 points on 12 goals and six free throws.

Bowling Green's cagers extended their winning streak to four when they conquered the Blue Streaks of John Carroll 87-71. Bianchi, who netted 25 points, continued his accurate ways, hitting nine field goals out of 20 tries and seven free throws out of 11 attempts, an average of approximately 49 per cent. Bianchi's 25 points, however, were not enough to claim scoring honors for the evening as George Dalton, John Carroll star, netted 29 tallies.

## M. A. C. Leaders Beat Falcons

Bowling Green's four game winning streak came to an abrupt halt, as Miami's Redskins scalped the home club 90 to 71. Al hit from all parts of the floor the first half to keep the Falcons within 3 points at the mid-way point. However, the fast breaking attack of the M.A.C. leaders in the second half completely over-powered the tired BG cagers.

Next the Falcons traveled to Athens in an attempt to get back on the victory trail against Ohio University. The Bobcats had other ideas and handed BG its second straight loss.

After a week of finals, Bowling Green faced eighth-ranked Western Kentucky in its famed "Little Red Barn." Paced by Bianchi and big Boo Ellis, the Falcons almost pulled the upset of the year. BG was ahead in the third quarter only to falter in the final minutes and lose 71 to 60.

On February 9 the Falcons traveled to Chicago to meet Loyola only to drop a see-saw battle 73-69. The lead shifted numerous times during the first stanzas. The cagers from BG were one point down going into the fourth quarter. Rogers played a tre-

mendous floor game and also hit the hoop for twelve points.

The Falcons returned to the friendly confines of the Men's Gym and swept to an easy 81-63 victory over their sister school, Kent State, for their eighth victory in 19 games.

### **Toledo Retains Peace Pipe**

With Frank Ayers and Harry Nicholson as pace setters and Bowling Green as an opponent, the Toledo Rockets rolled over the Falcons in the "Peace Pipe

One thing is certain, Bowling Green wasn't out on the court to see who kept or won possession of the Peace Pipe, but to make a ball game of the whole affair, and that they did until the Rocket machine started to roll. The Falcons hit on only 20 of 35 free throws while Toledo cashed in 25 of 29.

With more spirit and hustle than has been shown for some time, plus Al Bianchi's 35 points, Bowling Green's cagers romped to an easy 88-75 victory over a mediocre Loyola of the South quintet.

A crowd of 3,800 witnessed the contest between the

Dukes of Duquesne and the Bowling Green Falcons in the Pittsburgh Gardens. Led by Dick Ricketts, Jim Tucker, and Fletcher Johnson, the Dukes gained a decisive 92 to 63 victory.

### **Bianchi Sets Scoring Record**

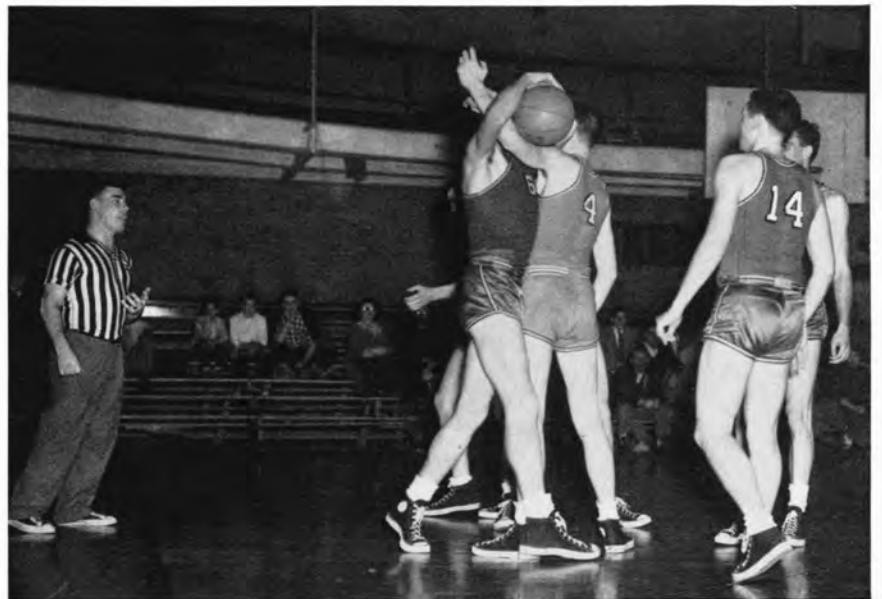

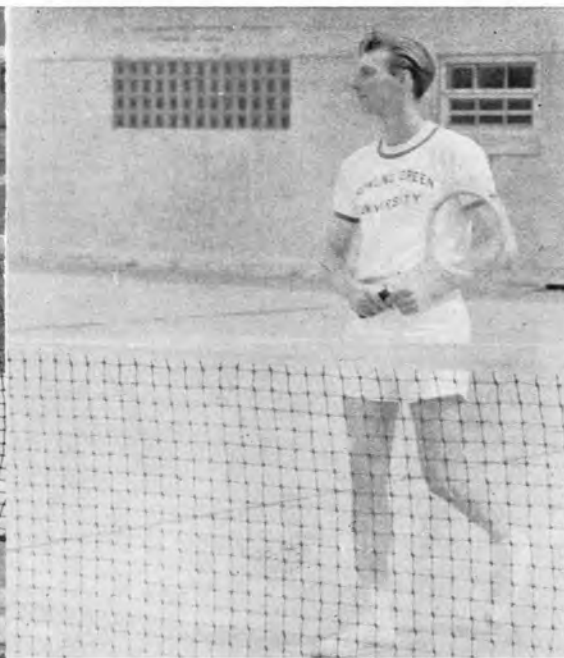

## Tennis

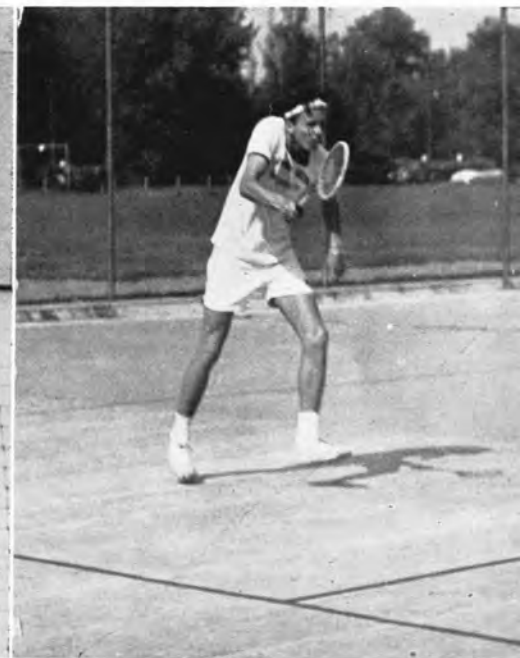
