Mr. Peakes' untiring efforts towards the promotion of a new high school building in Bangor were appreciated by all those who worked with or knew him.

Mr. Peakes left behind him hundreds of people who respected and admired his great ability and devotion in achieving better schools for the communities of Maine. Deep and sincere regret was felt at the passing of such a dedicated leader.

## Wendell Eaton Appointed SuperintendentAlvah McIntosh New Curriculum Director

Wendell G. Eaton, formerly the curriculum director of the Bangor Public School System, was appointed Superintendent of Schools on March 19, 1962.

Mr. Eaton was graduated from Dexter High School and Farmington Normal School. In 1940 he was graduated from the University of Maine and received his Master's Degree in Education at Harvard University. He is a veteran of World War II.

Since coming to Bangor in 1948, Mr. Eaton has served as principal of Abraham Lincoln School and of Vine Street School. In 1959 he organized and served as principal of the first summer school for Bangor students. His deep interest in education is shown by his statement after being named superintendent, "I know that I speak for the entire staff in expressing my desire to provide the finest educational opportunities for the children and youth of Bangor. In turn, I urge all students to take the best possible advantage of these opportunities."

Aware of the universality of the English language, the English Department at Bangor High School has an extensive program suited to the needs of every student. The main purpose of the varied curricula is to instill in the student the means whereby he can read, write, speak, and think intelligently in a changing world.

Among the methods used to accomplish this purpose is the careful study of English and American literature whose writers have established and carried on the tradition of literary excellence. As a supplement, much time is devoted to literary works of other lands in order to enable the student to examine the similarities, the differences, and the influences of one literature on another.

In this day and age of keen competition for good positions in business and industry, the person with faulty English usually finds himself at a definite disadvantage in finding employment.

It is in realization of these facts that Bangor High's classes have English usage programs designed to fit the needs of every student in order to provide him with the means whereby he can move forward in a modern world.

## Science Provides Key to the Future

1962 will be remembered as the year the United States launched a man on a space flight around the earth. The sound of rockets and space vehicles will play an important part in every individual's future, but many well-trained scientists will be needed in order to insure continued success in the conquest of space. Bangor High School is meeting this challenge by trying to stimulate in its students an active interest in every branch of the scientific world.

The school offers courses in general science, earth science, biology, chemistry, and physics. Each student enrolled in a science course is required to complete a research project for the annual science fair. There are well-equipped laboratories where future scientists may test old theories and try new ones; and since science is a living subject, students may apply the principles they have learned in the classroom to the world around them. For instance, chemistry students learn why iron rusts, and any physics student can explain what makes an airplane fly.

Twelve students-Dawn Alexander, Harvey Alpert, Joel Alpert, Bonnie Colpitts, William Frederick, Calvin Knaide, John Lancaster, Darby Larkin, Robert Politz, Joel Silverberg, Vicki Storey, and Larry Treworgy-were selected to represent the school at the regional science fair held in Guilford. Joel Silverberg, Vicki Storey, and Larry Treworgy won honors in their respective fields and went on to compete in the state science fair at the University of Maine.

## Foreign Languages Deviate From Routine

Communicating every day with people of other nations has become important in a world where Spain, Italy, France, and other countries are only hours apart. Aware of this fact, the foreign language teachers at Bangor High have tried to bring into their curricula not only the study of basic grammar and vocabulary, but also an introduction to the histories and customs of their countries.

Being so near to the French-speaking provinces of Canada, les éléves are particularly interested in that language. After proceeding from simple grammar and conversation to intermediate speech and grammar, the more advanced students start out every other year for a trip to Quebec where they can apply their knowledge of French outside of class.

The study of Spain and its language is of special interest to estos alumnos. Although far from any Spanish-speaking countries, these students begin almost immediately in their first year
conversing in el espanol. Proceeding from simple dialogues to more difficult stories, the students not only learn the grammar, but also the difference between a serape and a poncho, or a tortilla and a taco.

Students of the two modern languages have the advantage of improving both their comprehension and speed of conversation through the use of tape recorders, microphones, and earphones in the newly installed language laboratory. The lab contains twenty-three enclosed booths where each student may listen to records, tapes, or his own pronunciation.

In order to obtain a basic foundation of modern languages, Latin students study Latin grammar and vocabulary, word derivations, Roman mythology, the campaigns of Caesar, and the works of Virgil and Cicero. Through the study of Latin and ancient civilizations, the students gain a finer appreciation of modern culture.

The freshmen may take any math course from General Math to Geometry, for the students who took Algebra I in the eighth grade. From this point the courses branch out to Advanced General Math, Consumers Math, and Business Math for the non-college preparatory students. The college prep. students will get another year of Algebra along with a year of Geometry. Two optional courses in the junior and senior year are Algebra-Trig and Advanced Math.
In 1962-1963 a new course will be offered to the students who took Algebra I as eighth graders and Advanced Math as juniors. This will consist of one semester of Calculus with the other semester of some related Math.

## Industrial Arts Department Stresses Individuality

Bangor High School's Industrial Arts Department is comprised of four district departments, Drafting, Electrical Shop, Metal Shop, and Wood Shop. Students from all four departments worked diligently to prepare projects for the Maine Students' Crafts Fair held in Brewer. This was the first time the Fair has been held in this area.

Notable projects from the Metal Shop, under the direction of Mr. Gerald Covert, were stylish brass candlesticks, a bench drill press, and an anvil and hardy made from a section of railroad track.

Drafting students, under the watchful eye of Mr. Vincent Cuozzo, drew up original house plans. College Prep students voluntarily returned during the afternoon session to earn credits.

In the Electrical Shop department headed by Mr. Larry Musen, freshman work began with the unit entitled "Basic Electricity and its Uses." The freshmen made many projects of their own choosing which included a magnetic compass, battery, buzzer, and a crystal radio. The sophomores and juniors continued their first year work and began study in the field of Basic Electronics. Interest centered mainly around radio, television, Hi Fi, and other related apparatus. The senior class attempted to broaden its knowledge in all fields, especially in Electronics. The projects for all classes were chosen by the students themselves.

The Industrial Arts Program of the Wood Shop also began at the freshman level. Students were introduced to the common hand tools and were taught their uses and maintenance. Projects were quite basic, encompassing articles such as foot stools and book ends. Sophomore and junior workshop brought the student into contact with the common woodworking machines. Projects were assigned that required as many machine operations as possible - end tables, bedside stands, and coffee tables. Senior woodshop undertakings, consisting of chests of drawers and cabinets, were elective and somewhat more advanced.

## Business Department Looks Ahead

Bangor High School provides a choice of two courses for students who wish a career in the business world. The secretarial course offers shorthand and transcription, and the clerical offers salesmanship and management. Both courses include typing, general office practice, filing, bookkeeping, and the operation of business machines.

Etiquette is especially important to persons entering business; therefore business students are taught how to act, dress and use the telephone properly. Each Monday is "dress-up day for the office" for business students.

This year an "on-the-job" training program has been inaugurated. Several secretarial and clerical students report to various business offices
daily to get "on-the-job" experience and learning. Another year it is hoped that the program will be extended and also include a larger number of students. Businessmen have been very cooperative.

Twenty-three secretarial students with notebooks and pens explored the language laboratory to take dictation from pre-recorded business letters at different speed levels. It is hoped that future use of the language lab or even a real shorthand laboratory with multiple tapes will be an inspiration to students for greater speed dictation and improved transcription.

Distributive Education in a public school vocational program is designed to help high school students earn while they learn about the fundamentals of retail, wholesale, and service-selling businesses. In this way, the program supplements education with experience.

## Driver Education Promotes Safety

One of the most popular courses at Bangor High School is driver education, which trains students to operate motor vehicles safely and efficiently.

The primary objective of this course is to help potential motorists develop sound attitudes toward driving. Actually, obtaining a license at the conclusion of the course is of secondary importance. It is for this reason that students spend thirty hours in classroom work and only six hours behind the wheel.

Although anyone who is fifteen or older is eligible to take driver education, preference is given to upperclassmen. Each student is required to pass a law test and an eye test in order to qualify for the course. Approximately one hundred and ninety students have completed the program this year.

## Bangor's New Varsity Sport, Swimming, Finishes First Season

The varsity swim team, experiencing its first season, turned out a 2-4-1 record for 1962 . In the first meet, against Deering, the competition was close until the last event, the 200 -yard relay. Had the Rams won that event, they would have won the meet; but the race was a tie, so Deering won. The next meet, Bangor lost to Cheverus. In the following two weeks the Rams evened out their two loss record by beating South Portland and Edward Little. On February third, in a meet against Hebron Academy, the same situation came up as in the first meet. The last event, the 200 -yard relay, was a tie, and Hebron was able to win by a small margin. A week later, the Rams tied the defending state champions, Brunswick, and on February sixteenth, Bangor lost to Portland.

In the state meet, Bangor placed fifth in the 200 -yard medley relay, fourth place in the 200 yard freestyle relay, and second place in the diving.

A swim meet, conducted somewhat like a track meet, has ten events. The 50 -yard freestyle was
swum by senior Bob Moulaison who had an excellent year for Bangor. The 100-yard freestyle was swum by sophomore standout, Phil Emery. The other freestyle event, swum by Jim Connors, was the 200-yard freestyle. Captain Ed Bulmer swam the 100 -yard butterfly, one of the most difficult of the swimming events. The event of co-captain Jim Willey was the 100-yard backstroke. Another difficult event, the 200-yard medley, consisting of 50 yards each of butterfly, backstroke, breaststroke, and freestyle, consecutively, was swum by Tom Dorsky. The 100-yard breaststroke was swum by Vitaus Knuble. Thediving, perhaps the most interesting event to watch, was skillfully executed by Bob Arsenault.

The two relay events were what carried the team.
