



Report of the Librarian

January 24, 1950

To the Board of Managers of the Bangor Public Library:

The Bangor Public Library now contains 264,657 books. This is 8.87 books per capita. Home use of books totalled 308,181 volumes, amounting to 10.33 per capita. Sixty-two per cent of the people of Bangor, not including the non-resident borrowers who pay a fee, are registered as active users of the library.

The total cost of operating the library, including \$44,321.38 to buy and process 9,400 new books, subscribe to 1,068 copies of 762 magazines and 17 newspapers, and bind or rebind 1,547 books, amounted to \$107,279.80. Of this amount \$72,968.92 (68%) was from the income of trust funds set up by the gifts and bequests of generous citizens, \$30,397.00 (28%) from city appropriation, including state grant of \$200.00, and \$3,913.88 (4%) from other sources, principally fines and non-resident fees.

The city appropriation, amounting to about 1½ cents on each tax dollar, was made in accordance with section 6 of chapter 19 of the city ordinances, which embodies the agreement between the City of Bangor, the Trustees of the Hersey Fund, and the Bangor Mechanic Association by which the library was founded in 1883.

More comprehensive statistics of the operation of the library during 1949 are found on pages 19-26 of this report. A simplification of the operating accounts into one single account, in the form used by the U. S. Office of Education and the American Library Association, and which permits accurate comparison of our library finances with those of other libraries, is found on page 26.

Our greatest problems are (1) to employ our very large book funds intelligently and usefully, (2) to supply our public with skilled assistance so that it may make the maximum use of the great collection of books at its command, and (3) to house the books that our large resources require us to supply.

The present staff is equal to the first two tasks, but there is no margin at all to meet sudden special demands on our services and any temporary reduction in numbers, as through illness or resignation, seriously retards the smooth flow of work. This was felt acutely early in 1949 when several resignations were experienced within a short time. An illustration of the closeness of our work schedule is the fact that, though we have for more than a year had a considerable collection of music records, we have been constantly prevented, through the necessity of processing books first, from getting them prepared for public use. A reduction of our 1949 appropriation below budget estimates necessitated, among other curtailments, the discontinuance of our Forest Avenue branch, and the reduction of Music Branch hours from 33 to 14 weekly.

As to problem three, space, we are constantly weeding out books of marginal utility to make way for newer things and the purchase of a single set of twenty volumes may necessitate the moving of several ranges of books. At least twelve hours a week, continuously, is devoted to moving books in the storage room.

Several items in the field of repairs and equipment are of interest. The air compressor that is a fundamental part of our radiator thermostat system, having worn out, was replaced by a new installation. A rotary floor machine, for scrubbing and buffing, was acquired. Equipment was bought for the installation at the main desk of a visible index of periodicals. The broken wiring under the floor of the reading room was replaced. A carpenter constructed new storage cases in the extension department work room. A typewriter with twelve-inch carriage, valuable for statistical work, was acquired with trade-in of an older machine. Four typewriters were reconditioned. The office was repainted and rearranged. Many radiator traps and valves and a one-inch blast valve

were replaced. An emergency repair of a broken steam pipe was made. Lack of space in the library occasionally forces us to decline proffered gifts that under other conditions might be usefully accepted.

Rockwell Kent designed a bookplate for the Louise Baldwin Thompson Fund. This is a worthy partner in a distinguished series of bookplates, all by top-ranking designers; seven being by Sidney Lawton Smith and two by Elisha Brown Bird.

Since July 1, 1947, we have been members of the Maine State Retirement System, in which the state furnishes the machinery and the money is furnished by contributions by the city and by the employees themselves. The actuary of the system, reporting on the first two years of operation, finds our district, which is participating local district No. 19, to be in solvent condition and that amortization of prior service liability is likely to be accomplished in 25 years instead of the 30 originally estimated. He recommends no change in present contributions.

In the death of Harry D. Benson on July 6, 1949 the library suffered a severe loss. Mr. Benson, as an officer of the Bangor Mechanic Association, was a member of the Board of Managers and of the Trustees of the Bangor Public Library continuously since 1921. He was treasurer from 1941 until 1949.

The library was generously remembered by many people. An entirely unrestricted bequest of \$10,000 was received under the will of Dr. Charles E. Adams. This has been funded as a part of the Trustees Fund. Five thousand dollars was received for the Frederick W. Hill and Marianne Hill Fund as a sixth distribution under the will of Frederick W. Hill. Two hundred and ten organizations and 38 individuals made gifts of books, periodicals or other library material. Among larger gifts in this field were those by Mrs. Marjorie B. Baker, Mrs. Harry D. Benson, Miss Grace H. Boutelle, Miss Faustina S. Curtis, Mrs. William Dunfee, Mrs. Edward L. Herlihy, Mr.

Harold L. Nason, Mr. Palmer C. Putnam, Miss Alice M. Wetherell, Miss Sarah Wheatland, a group of Yale alumni, and a gift in memory of the Misses Bertha Louise Brown and Alice Belle Brown. Dr. Harrison L. Robinson gave 18 antique statuettes in memory of his wife, Lida S. Robinson whose grandfather, Capt. Samuel Skolfield, brought them from India. Mr. John Gregg Utterback gave a letter from President Franklin D. Roosevelt concerning the Quoddy project.

All gifts of books are accepted with the understanding that such items as are not need for actual addition to this library may be given to other libraries or disposed to the advantage of ours. A total of 2,537 books from among gifts or our own discards were given usefully to other libraries.

One of the interesting tasks set this library by the Public Library Inquiry of the Social Science Research Council, which was concluded in 1949 and whose results are now being published in a series of books, was to define the purpose of the library. In abridged form, my definition was as follows: The purpose of the Bangor Public Library is to preserve and disseminate knowledge and thought as recorded in print; to provide recreation through print; and to provide a maximum of assistance to its clients in the use of its collections. We are a general library yet we are also a library of record. We aim to provide printed material on all subjects likely to be of concern or interest either to present or potential users of whatever age or education. We recognize the scholarly resources of our neighbor library of the University of Maine and are interested that each library shall complement the other. The home-use privileges of the Bangor Public Library are free to all residents and to whoever, regardless of place of residence, works, goes to school, or pays taxes in Bangor.


Gifts to the Library During 1949
